Mrs. Fowler **Named Woman's Club President**


Mrs. C. C. Fowler was elected president of the Woman's Club of Aransas County at a meeting held at the community building Tuesday afternoon.



This seminar, which was arranged by biologists at the marine laboratory with F. M. Daugherty, Jr. as chairman, is the first of its kind to be offered in the State.
