The marine laboratory reported that 271 persons attended the Semi-annual Seminar and Field Study of Marine Sciences which was held here last Thursday through Sunday.

This number represented 42 organizations, which included college students and business representatives.

This seminar, which was arranged by biologists at the marine laboratory with F. M. Daugherty, Jr. as chairman, is the first of its kind to be offered in the State. The initial seminar was held last October with 140 persons in attendance. They provide an opportunity for college students as well as commercial fishermen and other interested persons to hear discussions on the various phases of marine work by noted authorities in their respective fields.

King was riding in the car with Lovelace. It has been reported here that the car driven by the Highsaws sideswiped that in which the San Antonio Drug Co. representatives were riding.

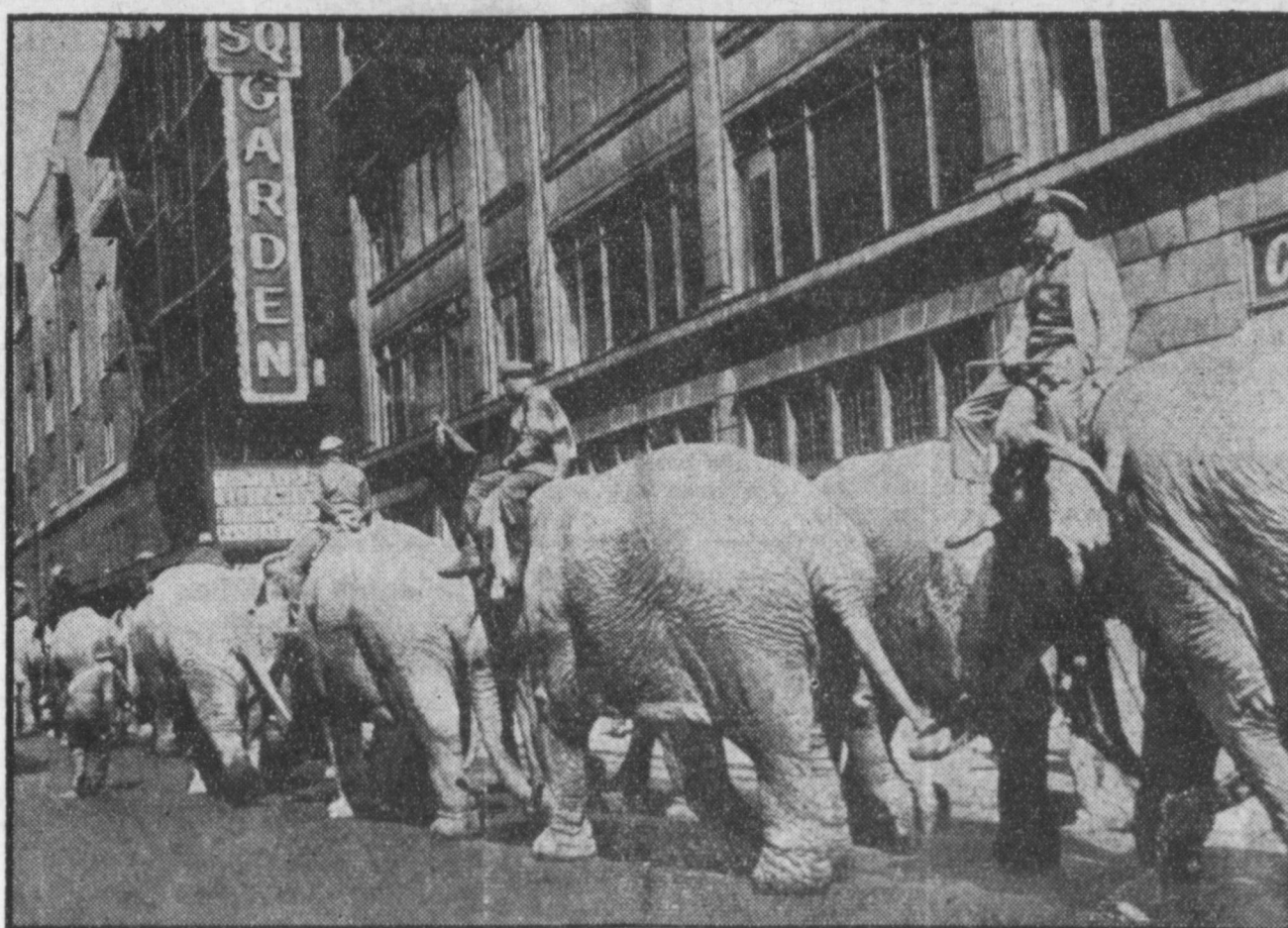
Robert E. Lee Has Surrendered to Rockport

F. J. Brundrett No. 1 to Be Drilled In Acreage Assembled West of Rockport

An 8,500 foot wildcat is scheduled to be drilled by George W. Graham and Emory M. Spencer in the Wm. S. Tutton Survey, composed of 591 acres and located 5 miles west of Rockport. Drill work is scheduled to start immediately by the T. G. & M. Drilling Co. with the rig now completing the Airport No. 4 well.

Location of the proposed well is 3,061 feet west of the east line and approximately 3,000 feet south of the north line of the Brundrett tract.

Wheeler, manager of the Beeville Chamber of Commerce, told members of the Rockport Chamber of Commerce at their dinner meeting Tuesday night that many people have the idea that the Chamber of Commerce belongs to a select group while the Chamber of Commerce is actually built for those who want their city and area to grow.

Every town has those persons who can be classified as drones, he said, those persons who are willing to accept all the benefits the Chamber of Commerce provides but refuse to put anything into the organization.

Mr. Wheeler addressed the group at their regular monthly dinner meeting which was held at the Methodist annex.

It was announced that Fred Bracht had been named to serve as chairman of the park board. The Chamber of Commerce recently resolved to assist with the project of obtaining a public ball park for county-wide use.

E. J. Albin and Jack Sanders, Jr. reported that creosoted wooden groins could be installed at the Rockport beach at a cost of about \$500 per 100 feet, which would build a sandy beach for Rockport over a period of time. Instances were given where this method was employed successfully. It was recommended that the Chamber investigate the matter further.

City and County Cooperate To Create Public Ball Park

Fred A. Bracht Named By City Officials To Serve As Chairman of Park Board

The city council at their Tuesday night meeting requested Fred A. Bracht to organize a Park Board and will arrange for an ordinance to be enacted at an early date creating the Park Board.

The ball park which has been used for many years, located on Highway 35, one block west of the Rockport school has been obtained for a ball park and declared as such.

Aransas Pass Doctors to Erect Office Bldg. Here

Dr. N. E. Graham and Dr. W. C. McElveen of Aransas Pass have purchased corner property located across the street to the north from the Auto Service Co. and are making plans to erect a four room office building. It is anticipated that the concrete building will be completed and ready for occupancy by June 1, at which time they will schedule office hours in Rockport. Both of the doctors are now practicing in Aransas Pass and will continue to do so.

Other new buildings for which construction will get underway in the near future include a seven room home for Mr. and Mrs. Jack McDavid. The frame dwelling which will be 31.6 by 76 feet will be erected on lots 1 and 2 and the south one-half of 3, block 61, Smith and Wood. Picton Lumber Co. are the contractors. Cost was estimated at \$8,000.

C. P. Hopkins was issued a building permit at the city hall to erect a 27 by 30 foot frame dwelling with shingle roof and 18 by 20 foot garage on lot 3, block 434, Manning addition. Cost was estimated at \$2,500.

J. H. Perkins was granted a permit to make a 10 by 24 foot frame addition to the west side of his present dwelling which is located on lot 3, block 128, Doughty and Mathis. Cost will be approximately \$350.

Mrs. Nellie W. Olinger obtained a permit to build a 22 by 28 foot concrete block dwelling and car port on the west one-third of lot 18, block 51, Manning. Cost was estimated at \$4,500. Wm. Winslow is the contractor.

Denver Agler was issued a permit to construct a 12 by 14 foot room on block 34, lot 5, Doughty and Mathis. The room of frame construction will be added to later in the year. Cost was estimated at \$350.

Hugh Morrison Named Schoolboard President

Hugh Morrison was named president of the school board of the Aransas County Independent School District at a meeting held Tuesday night.

Other officers named were Harry Wilson, vice president and James B. Jackson, secretary.

Board members drew lots to determine the tenure of office for each which was necessary as a result of the requirement that all members of the board of the new district be elected this year. Green Fleming and Steirly Rozzell drew three year terms. Two year terms were drawn by A. F. Dervage and Hugh Morrison. Serving for one year will be James B. Jackson, Harry Wilson and Richard Fox.

All qualified teachers were re-employed for the coming year at the Tuesday meet.

The election results were canvassed. A total of 61 votes were cast, it was reported.

Veterinary To Vaccinate Dogs Here Saturday

Dr. Habeltzer of the Spring Animal Hospital in Corpus Christi will be at the city hall here Saturday from 9 to 5:30, April 15, to vaccinate dogs against rabies. The fee will be \$2.00.

This service is arranged yearly by the city for the convenience of the public. At the present time there is not an ordinance requiring that dogs be vaccinated but if the owners do not cooperate, it will require that such an ordinance be adopted, city officials reported.

The city owned one-half of the block with various owners claiming the other portion.

Recently the city bought that part of the block not owned by the county and the county officials deeded their one-half of the block to the city for public use.

The park board is being created to administer management, financing, etc. It is contemplated that revenue derived will be used to pay for lights and improvements for the park without necessitating expenditures by the city.

Members of the Park Board are Fred A. Bracht, president; Jas. Sorenson, Jr., treasurer; Urban Hemmi, Travis Johnson, Julius Malchar, Raymond Roberts and Mrs. Joe Johnson. Mr. Bracht has requested that another lady volunteer to serve on the board.

Raymond Roberts has reported that he will arrange for the Boy Scouts to take care of the park grounds.

Mr. Bracht stated today that they hope to have the lights burning by the end of the week. The Chamber of Commerce is underwriting the expense of the lights with the sum to be paid back as it is taken in during the summer season. The grounds will also be put into shape for playing. Bids on concessions should be given to one of the members of the board.

A meeting of all ball players interested in utilizing the park this season will be held in the near future to arrange a schedule, Mr. Bracht said.

Fish Tagging Project Starts In Laguna Madre

Marine biologists and a crew left Rockport Monday morning aboard the laboratory houseboat, Vivian, to begin a fish-tagging program in the Laguna Madre. The program will be under the direction of Ernest Simmons of the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission and Dewey Miles of the Copano Research Foundation.

The project is the first of its kind to be undertaken in Laguna Madre and will require cooperation of commercial and sports fishermen if it is to be a success, J. L. Baughman, head of the marine laboratory, said.

The fish-tagging was to begin in the lower lagoon approximately opposite the Norias division of the King Ranch. They will spend all week on the first phase of the project, moving up to Pensacat and Point of Rocks during the week.

The purpose of the study is to determine the spawning conditions of all fishes, especially redfish, drum and trout; to investigate their food supplies, determine what foods the fish are eating and to learn whether fish are moving back and forth in the new extension of the Intracoastal Canal.

Sports and commercial fishermen are requested to be on the look-out for tagged fish. When tagged fish are caught the fishermen are urged to send the tag to the marine laboratory here with information stating when and where the fish were taken. It is especially desirable that they be as accurate as possible on location of the place taken, Baughman stressed.

Without return of the tags and information from fishermen, the whole project will be less effective. If the information proves important and reliable, other similar experiments will be undertaken.

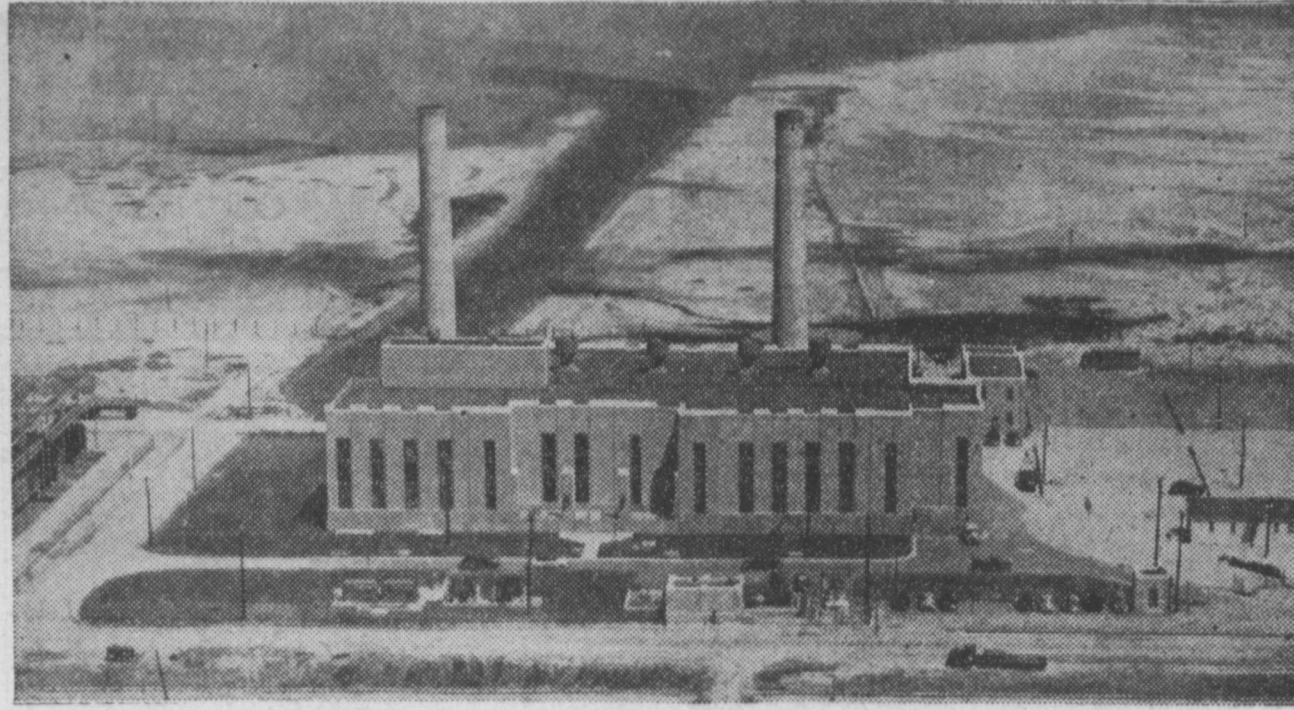

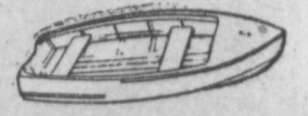

State Health Officer Gives Texas Newspapers Pat On the Back

A highly placed state official has given Texas newspaper a pat on the back.

State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox, veteran of more than 13 years as head of the State Department of Health, called the Texas press a "more potent force in mass public education," and said his department invariably turns in that direction as the first means of reaching the people with information on health subjects.

"Texas newspaper editors and publishers have consistently shown an awareness of public health problems and have given unstintingly of much valuable space to stories relating to public health," Cox said.

"I can define public health in three words—mass public education," the health official said. "Without newspaper cooperation, such education is literally an unobtainable ideal."

Pointing out the custom of rural people to read their local weekly or semi-weekly thoroughly, Cox said he was especially happy that these papers used state and local health department releases.

"It's one of the most valuable services a paper can render its readership, but then maybe I'm a bit prejudiced," he observed.

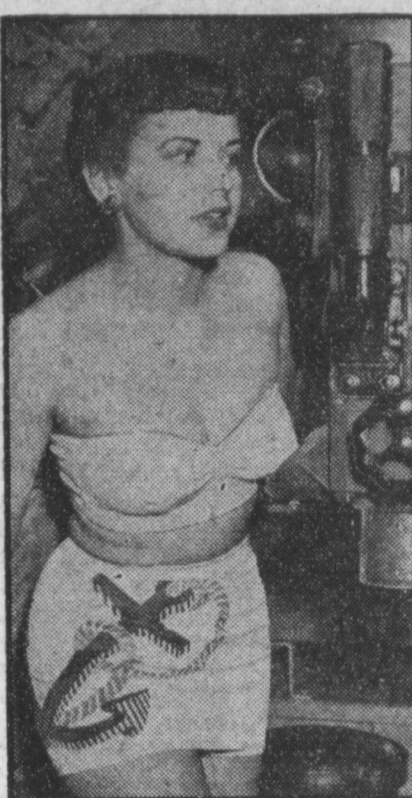
Radio is an especially valuable outlet for information relating to venereal diseases, Cox indicated, because of the availability of professionally prepared recordings on the subject. More than 100 Texas stations have used the recordings during the past year.

Rockport Hospital Affiliates With Texas Blue Cross Plan

Blue Cross benefits are now available in the Rockport hospital, now a "Blue Cross member hospital," as well as other hospitalization insurance policy benefits.

Dr. L. G. Wood has announced that the Rockport hospital is affiliating with the Texas Blue Cross plan.

In affiliating with the Texas Blue Cross Plan, the Rockport hospital joins 400 other hospitals in Texas and 4,000 hospitals throughout the United States, Puerto Rico, Hawaii and Canada, in serving 36,000,000 Blue Cross members. This means that 85% of the general hospital beds in the United States are now available to one out of every five citizens as Blue Cross members.

Blue Cross is a non-profit organization sponsored by the hospitals and the medical profession. The original prepayment plan was born December 20, 1929, in the school rooms of Dallas, Texas, in cooperation with Baylor University Hospital and was known as the Baylor Plan. Given credit for the origin is Doctor Justin Kimball, then associated both with the Dallas school system and with Baylor University.

By August of 1937, Blue Cross had its first million members, doubled in the next twelve months. The American Hospital Association then gave its official approval to the plans, setting up its essential requirements of plans with an Approval Program—these requirements being non-profit organization and control, hospital-guaranteed services, sound accounting practices, adequate financial reserves, a record of community service, comprehensive hospital service, and hospital service available everywhere.

In June, 1939, the first statewide movement in Texas began and was known as Group Hospital Service, Inc. of Texas.

In 1942, the Plan gained the approval of the American Hospital Association as the Blue Cross Plan of Texas and has progressed in size and in scope of benefits ever since.

In 1945, Blue Shield added medical-surgical benefits to the Blue Cross hospital care. Group Medical and Surgical Service of Texas was approved by the Blue Shield Commission of the American Medical Association.

Membership in October of last year reached the half-million mark for Texas, and passed the 35-million mark nationally. The record of growth for next year is expected to be 5-million new members, at which time one out of every four people in the United States would be budgeting his hospital-surgical care through Blue Cross.

Changes In Social Security Act Proposed

Many recent inquiries have been received from beneficiaries who want to know if the 50% increase in social security taxes automatically increases their benefits, according to H. M. Cleveland, Manager of the Corpus Christi Social Security Administration office. "The increase in these taxes which became effective the first of this year, has no bearing on the present benefit payments," he says.

"Only an Act of Congress can raise the benefit schedule," Cleveland stated. "A bill which proposes many changes, passed the House of Representatives last year, and it is now pending before the Senate. If Congress completes action to increase the insurance payments, those beneficiaries who are now receiving monthly payments of retirement and family insurance, would receive increases automatically."

It was further pointed out by Cleveland, that workers who are now covered by the Social Security insurance system, as well as the beneficiaries, want to know how much the monthly benefits will be raised. Under the Bill which is being considered by Congress, retired workers would receive payments averaging more than 50% above the present scale.

Another proposed change would permit an individual who is eligible for the insurance to earn as much as \$50 a month without losing his benefit for that month. At present he is permitted to earn only up to \$15 a month. The original Social Security Act provided for taxes on wages to be raised every three years until a maximum of 3% each for employers and employees was reached, but this was deferred by Congress each year until 1950. The present tax increase is designed to help build a reserve sufficient to take care of the ever-growing number of persons over 65 and the survivors of deceased workers. The rate is scheduled to go up again to 2% on January 1, 1952.

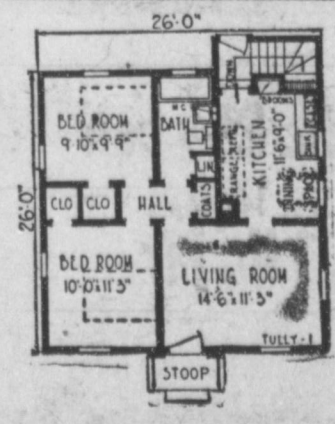

drill stem test from 7,117 1/2-22 feet. Operators set casing but were never able to shut off salt water and the well was temporarily abandoned.

The second test was drilled by Herman F. Heap on the Wheeler tract on a farmout from Graham and Spencer and abandoned as a dry hole.

The third test was drilled by Graham and Spencer, the Peden Iron and Steel Co. No. 1 and a show of oil was encountered in the A1 sand but on drill stem test at 7104-7 feet salt water with only a trace of oil was recovered.

Sullivan and Garnett No. 4 A. T. Vineyard, deep wildcat in the Lamar Field has set 7-inch protective casing at 9,600 feet preparatory to drilling ahead on a contract which may take it down to 12,000 feet. The test is south-east of State Highway 35 and is in Reserve B Survey.

A new 8,000 foot test is scheduled for the Salt Lake field. Atlantic Refining Co. No. 1 C. H. Adams is located on the line between lots 92 and 93, Coleman Fulton Pasture Subdivision, E. Kilpatrick Survey A-93, and is 660 feet from the common south line of the lots. It is approximately 500 feet due south of Salt Lake and about 890 feet from the south line of the survey. 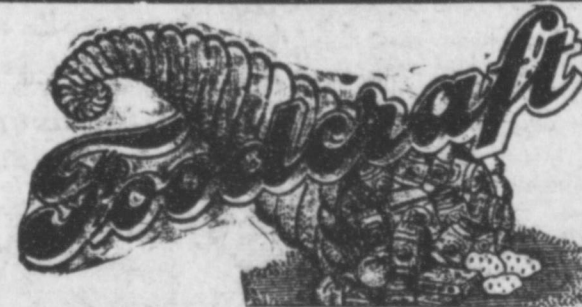
