P.-T.A. Round-up Shows Dental Work Heads List of Student Needs

The Rockport Parent-Teacher Association conducted a Spring Round-up of students at the Rockport and Fulton schools throughout last week.

While all reports have not been turned in, of the 462 returns it was revealed that 140 students had defective vision, 87 had bad tonsils, 420 needed dental work, 10 were listed as having some type of heart defect, and 18 showed defects of the ears.

Parents of these children will be notified of the results found during the round-up. It is recommended that these parents refer their youngsters to their family doctor for further check-up.

This health project is sponsored by the P.-T.A. in an effort to arouse the interest of parents in improving the health of children entering the school for the first time and to bring about continuous medical and dental supervision of children of all ages, especially those who are apparently healthy.

Mrs. Chas. Ankele, child hygiene chairman for the P.-T.A., was in charge of the project.

Airport No. 4 Test Makes Oil

William Herbert Hunt Trust Estate No. 4 Aransas County Airport, Fulton Beach Field, flowed 156.1 barrels of oil on potential test through 1/8 inch choke, under tubing pressure of 1,450 pounds and casing pressure of 2,625 pounds. Perforations, with 46 shots, were at 7,149-58 feet. Gravity was 42.8 degrees. Total depth is 7,185 feet and 5 1/2 inch casing is set at that depth.

The same operator's No. 5 F. G. Huffman, also in Fulton Beach Field, made 122.09 barrels of 42.2 gravity oil on potential test on 24 shot perforations at 7,169-74 feet. Test was through 10/64 inch choke, under 450 pound tubing pressure and 1,675 pounds casing pressure. Gas-oil ratio was 808 to 1. Casing is set at 7,232 feet, total depth.

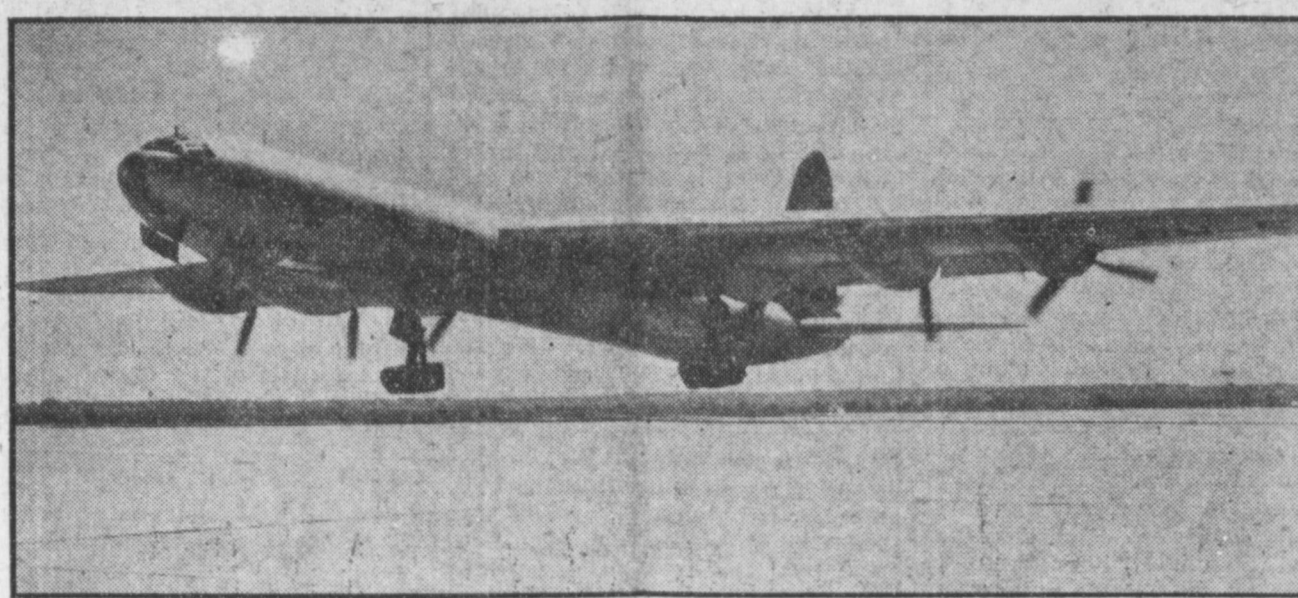

Free Chest X-Ray Survey Begins Here Next Thursday

\$50.00 in Prizes Will Be Awarded

To Participants at Close of Survey on Saturday

Thursday, April 27, marks the first day of the second annual Aransas County Mass Chest X-ray Survey, which will be held on Austin Street at Judy's Library. The survey will continue for three full days from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m., ending Saturday, April 29. A mobile X-ray unit of the State Health Department will arrive in Rockport Thursday and chest X-rays will be made of every person 15 years of age and older that will come to the library.

Chairman R. R. Rice reported that the various service organizations in the county have contributed a fund which will be given as prize money on the closing day. Every person having an X-ray made will be given a ticket. The duplicate will be deposited at the time of X-ray and the prize will be given away at 5 p. m. Saturday, April 29. There will be three prizes awarded, the first for \$25, second for \$15, and third for \$10.

Rev. H. H. Bockholt transportation chairman, has announced that school buses will make their regular route to pick up persons desiring transportation Friday morning, April 28. The buses will start on their route about 9:30 a. m. after bringing the students to school. Persons desiring to come for their X-ray should be at the regular bus stops. Those who cannot take advantage of the buses Friday but will need transportation, should contact Arthur Bracht, phone 3553, at Fulton, or Mrs. Byron Baker at the Chamber of Commerce office and transportation will be provided for them.

There will be no charge for the making of the X-ray. Every person will receive notice of the findings from the X-ray. Not only will the X-ray reveal the condition of a person in regard to tuberculosis, but will show the condition of the person in regard to 27 other chest conditions. This unit is operated by the Texas State Health Department from state tax money.

Texas Water Code Committee Meeting Date Changed

Senator George Moffett, chairman of the steering committee of the Texas Water Code Committee announced in Austin today that the regional hearings originally planned for Houston on April 24 and 25 had to be postponed because the hotels in that city will be unable to accommodate the large number of persons who are expected to attend these hearings on those dates. It is contemplated that the hearings will be held in Houston at a later time when the hotels are not so crowded.

After the postponement of the Houston meeting, the steering committee selected Greenville for a one-day meeting on April 27.

"In addition to the local problems which will be aired at this hearing, a full explanation of the proposed constitutional amendment sponsored by Senator John J. Bell, of Cuero, a member of this committee, will be made," Senator Moffett said.

"Senator Bell's amendment would provide for the construction of dams and reservoirs throughout the state by the issuance of revenue bonds," the senator explained.

Levy of Tax of Five Cents on Each \$100

Valuation Necessary to Finance District

Aransas County property owners who are qualified voters will go to the polls Saturday, April 22, to determine whether or not a mosquito control district shall be established in Aransas County and to decide if they desire a tax of five cents on each one hundred dollar tax valuation to be levied to finance the mosquito control district.

Waterway Bill Includes Fulton Harbor Project

Authorization of the harbor at Fulton was one of eight projects included in the omnibus rivers and harbors bill which passed the Senate Monday, April 17, according to word received from Senator Tom Connally.

The bill, which has already passed the House, now goes to a conference committee to adjust House-Senate differences, Connally explained. The bill does not appropriate money, but does clear the way for future appropriations.

The flood control title of the bill also authorizes seven Texas flood control surveys, including one of the streams flowing through the Copano Bay silt conservation district.

The Fulton Harbor project will include:

1. A turning basin 200 feet wide, 1,400 feet long, and eight feet deep at mean low tide.

2. A protective dike on the north side of the basin 1,000 feet long, connecting the north end of the existing breakwater with the shore of Aransas Bay.

3. An entrance channel eight feet deep and 100 feet wide from the south end of the turning basin to the eight-foot depth of water in Aransas Bay.

The project will cost \$29,800 and will return annual benefits estimated at \$11,400.

A \$45,000 bond issue was passed in Aransas County in April, 1948, to extend the breakwater at Fulton Beach north about 600 feet, build a 600 foot bulkhead across the north end, build a 600 foot bulkhead to hold a fill next to the shore from Bracht's Grocery to one block north, and build a shell drive around the bulkhead and out to the bathing beach. Bass Brothers of Victoria were awarded the contract for the improvements provided by the bond issue. Work on the breakwater got underway in February of 1949 and was completed that spring, which included completion of the concrete wall and the timber bulkhead.

Col. E. I. Davis, Corps of Engineers, was at the Fulton harbor Wednesday afternoon while on a tour of the projects in the area.

About 20 persons met with him to discuss the dredging of the harbor. Colonel Davis reported that 1952 would be the earliest possible date that funds would be available through the regular channels. Recommendations for the 1951 budget have been made; the funds for the Fulton harbor project would be included in the recommendation for 1952, he said.

However, if local interests desire to raise the sum for completion of the harbor at an earlier date, it would be possible, he said. With the approval of the Chief of Engineers, which is sometimes granted, money could be loaned to the government without interest and the dredging could be done, with this money to be paid back by the government at the time it is appropriated. If this method cannot be utilized, it will be 1952, at the earliest, before the harbor could be dredged.

In all the Texas rivers and harbors projects in the bill will cost \$16,175,070, of which \$13,305,070 will be contributed by the federal government and \$2,870,000 by local interests. The projects will return total annual benefits estimated at \$1,190,310. The benefits will equal the cost in less than 14 years.

provided this method for counties bordering the Gulf of Mexico to create, regulate and finance mosquito control districts.

Should the election pass the Commissioners Court would appoint an advisory commission composed of five members who are qualified taxpayers voters of the county. Each commissioner of the court and the county judge would appoint one, according to provisions of the act. The commission would make recommendations to the court which they deem to be necessary in regard to mosquito control.

Should the election show Aransas countians to be in favor of the establishment of the district and the levy of a tax not to exceed five cents on each one hundred dollar tax valuation, the Commissioners Court would be authorized to levy the fixed amount or to lower the tax to any designated sum it may determine, should the revenue be in excess of that needed to carry out the provisions of the act. The tax would be collected by the county tax assessor and collector and deposited in a separate fund.

This special fund would provide for such items as the cost of spraying following rainy periods when the mosquito becomes a menace or other methods which might be utilized to rid the county of the pest, as deemed advisable by the Advisory Commission.

The funds could be used for this purpose only and would be casting the taxpayer with a \$1,000 valuation, only 50 cents.

Petitions requesting the election, signed by more than 200 qualified voters, were presented the county judge early in February.

Should the election pass, funds would not be available until Oct. 1950, to finance the program.

Voting will be held in the four precincts from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m. Saturday, April 22.

Polling places will be: Precinct 1A, Aransas Pass, Viadome Court, Glen Ellis as election judge.

Precinct 1, Rockport, City Hall, Mrs. A. L. Brundrett as election judge.

Precinct 2, Rockport, courthouse, Mrs. T. H. Ratliff election judge.

Precinct 3, Fulton, school house, W. J. Moss election judge.

Precinct 4, Lamar, concession hall at State Park, Otto Key election judge.

Time to Render Property for Taxation

Rice Professor Discusses Polio

(Editor's note: The following discussion on poliomyelitis was taken from an address given by Dr. A. C. Chandler, professor of biology at Rice Institute and noted medical parasitologist, at the marine seminar held here last October):

...There is a possibility that poliomyelitis may be connected with water. We are all much interested in this disease although it is not as important a disease as a good many others. Actually there were two thousand cases in the State of Texas this year (1949) which, after all, is far from being an epidemic in the sense that some other diseases are. Nevertheless, it is important and it is spectacular and we are all interested in it.

Now the virus of poliomyelitis is found in abundance in the intestine. It is present in human feces. It is found in sewage. I have no doubt that during the height of the season, at any rate, it would be possible to isolate polio virus from practically any bayou in Houston at any time.

The question is, does it get from the sewage-polluted water of the bayous to humans, and if so, how? It is known, for instance, that flies can harbor polio virus. Strangely enough, blow flies frequently do, though how they get infected nobody knows. At any rate, house flies, too, can get infected. Flies collected from around the premises where there has been a case can be shown by inoculation into monkeys to harbor the virus. The monkeys, if material from the flies is injected into them, may develop paralysis. If, however, the monkeys are given food contaminated by the infected flies, they develop antibodies showing that they had become infected, but do not develop paralysis. I suggest that flies may play a helpful role in polio as far as humans are concerned by producing immunity. I think that a fly becoming contaminated and then depositing a minute amount of the virus on food immunizes without causing the disease.

We know that in a city like Houston, with as many cases as it has had, probably at least 60% or maybe 75% of the population of that city have had polio, as shown by the presence of neutral-

izing antibodies, but without having had recognizable polio. In the majority of cases the disease does not attack the nervous system; probably immunity is developed before the central nervous system is affected. Now, if flies deposit a small amount of virus on food that is taken in by mouth, the virus develops in abundance in the digestive tract. Before it reaches the central nervous system, the antibodies begin to develop and paralysis never results. That is just a speculation; but I do know this, that in the parts of Houston that have the most flies and the fewest screens and the most filth, there is no polio.

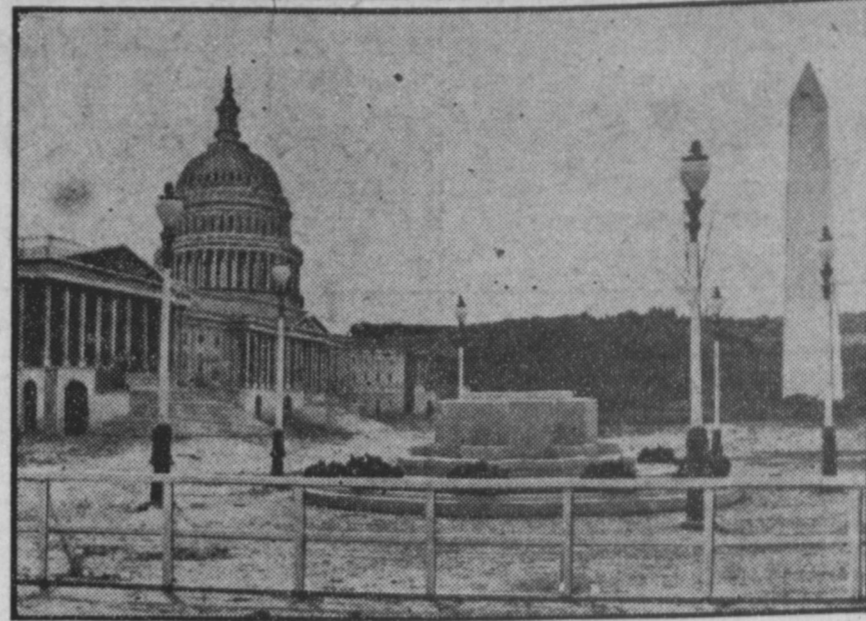
Down in the Rio Grande Valley, the cleanest towns have polio. Across the river in Matamoros, Mexico, there is little or no polio. So you can draw your own conclusions. They certainly have flies in Matamoros, and the flies get on the food, and they have filth. So that is the situation in regard to flies. Occasionally a fly might transmit the disease to somebody who would develop it. I would not say that it could not happen, but that it is the usual method, I do not believe for a minute.

Nor do I believe the disease is transmitted directly from person to person. It does not spread that way. It is not like flu or any disease that is transmitted directly from person to person in crowds. If so, there is no reason why it should begin to fall off just as soon as the cool weather comes. The peak of it is in the hot season. It occurs not in crowded parts of the cities but around the edges of them in the cleaner parts where there is shrubbery and water, etc. There is a much higher incidence in small towns and rural areas per unit of population than in cities. None of that points to direct transmission from person to person.

How polio is transmitted I do not know, but I have one idea in mind I would like to suggest to you. It is of interest in connection with water, which I am supposed to talk about. It is conceivable that a person bathing in polluted bayous, or in streets flooded with sewage-polluted water, for that matter, might become infected by swallowing some of the water. After floods, in Houston, like we had a few days ago, the children are out swimming in the flooded streets, not realizing that they are swimming in sewage. However there have not been any big outbreaks of polio following floods, so I doubt that this is an important factor. But, mosquitoes breed in water. Many people discount mosquitoes as possible transmitters of polio because the virus does not circulate to any appreciable extent to the blood. Therefore, they say, how can a mosquito get infected. She does not feed on excreta, and the virus is not present in the blood, so she cannot acquire the virus. If she does not acquire the virus, she will not transmit the infection. But mosquito larvae breed in polluted water. The filthier it is the better some species like it, and the filthy, sewage-laden bayous up around Houston breed larger number of Culex mosquitoes. It seems to me quite possible that they could get infected during the larval stage in polluted water, carrying the virus through to the adult stage, and then perhaps transmit it if they happen to bite into a nerve ending, or something like that. This is pure speculation, but it seems to me that the epidemiology of the disease is suggestive of it.

The epidemiology is quite similar to that of some of the forms of encephalomyelitis, which we know is carried by mosquitoes. The transmitter may not be a mosquito, but some other insect that breeds in the water. We must, therefore, in considering the relation of water to disease, think not only of direct transmission of the disease germs by water but also of possible carriers of germs that may breed in the water.

To sum up, there should be stricter control over the effluent from privies and septic tanks, so that nobody is permitted to have a septic tank or a privy unless he makes provisions to take care of the effluent from it, or else chlorinates it before it is allowed to go into a public stream or body of water. We need better sewage plants and fewer of them. Every new addition is likely to put in a sewage plant and there are too many. A few, big, well managed sewage plants are better than a whole lot of small, poorly managed ones. There should be elimination of mixing of storm and sanitary sewage, but that is a very difficult problem. The City of Houston, for instance, would have to go into thousands of yards, I suppose, and dig up the pipes to find out whether or not they were properly connected, and if they found that they were not, they would have to pay for correcting the situation. They could not charge the people, because the people bought the houses after they had been inspected by the city and pronounced to be all right. So it is the cities' fault, and certainly if a suit were brought the city would have to pay for it.

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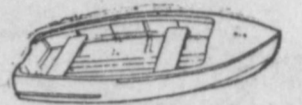

Governor Proclaims Mental Health Week

Governor Allan Shivers has proclaimed the week of April 23-29 as Texas Mental Health Week. Texas Mental Health Week coincides with National Mental Health Week, sponsored jointly by the U. S. Junior Chamber of Commerce, the National Committee for Mental Hygiene, the National Mental Health Foundation, the National Mental Health Institute and the American Psychiatric Association.

The major purpose of National Mental Health Week is to acquaint the public with the mental health needs of Texans and to urge the public to accept the responsibility for formulating and carrying into action programs for promoting good mental health on a local level.

Mental health is concerned not

only with mental illness but the well-being of the individual and many major social problems. Four of these problems particularly relate to mental illness; delinquency, since there are between 250,000 and 400,000 children under 18 years of age in our juvenile courts each year; crime, since there were 1,700,000 crimes committed during 1946; alcoholism, because there are 600,000 chronic alcoholics in the United States; and divorce, since there is a ratio of one divorce to every three to four marriages.

These facts furnish dramatic, though tragic, evidence that mental health is a social as well as a medical problem. Developing a constructive and preventive program requires that most serious cooperative efforts of all forces in the community. Mental health is everybody's business. We must extend education and public understanding for mental ill health should be recognized not as a disgrace but as an illness, like pneumonia or heart disease.

Rockport Lions Club Meets at Fire Hall

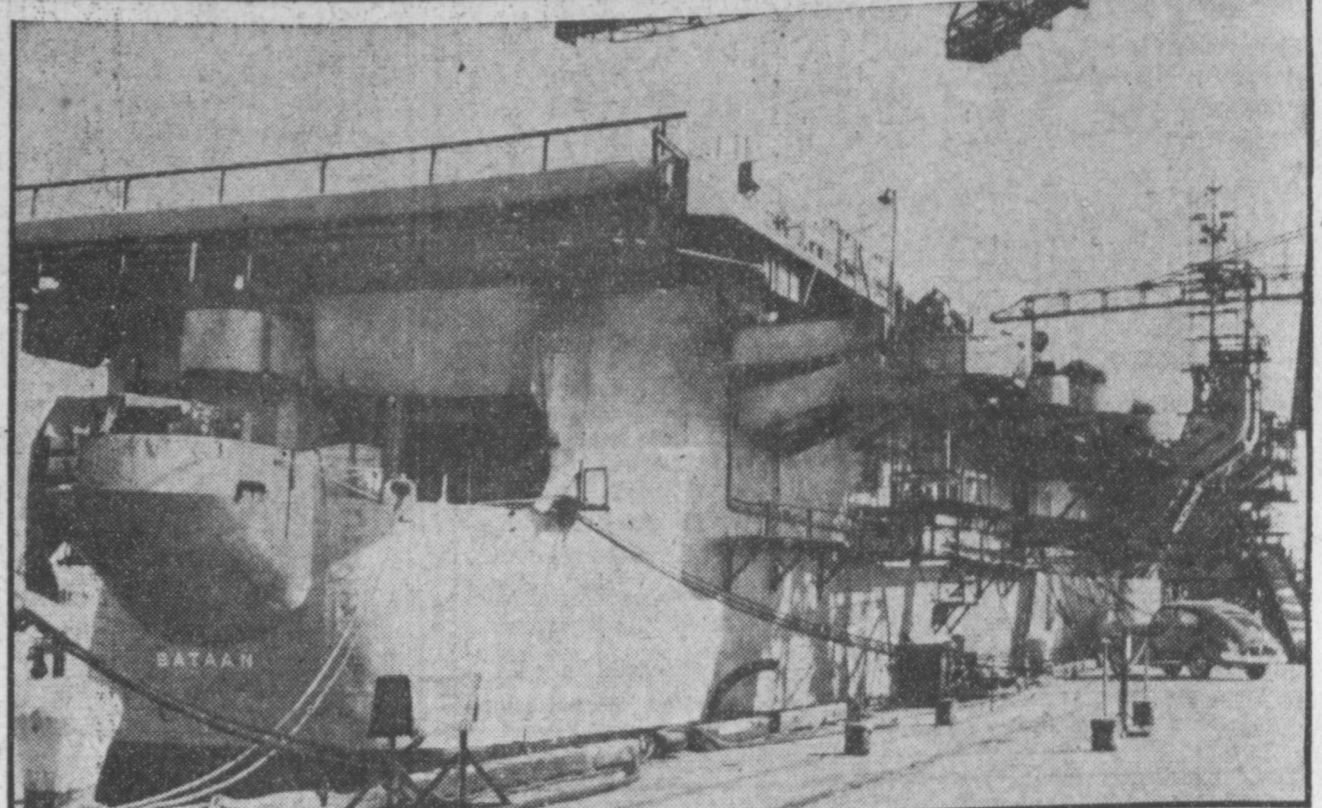

Airport No. 4 Test Makes Oil

Field and has scheduled a north outpost to the field.

Sun's Fulton Beach extender is the No. 4 State Tract 73, which made 110.94 barrels of oil on potential through 7/64 inch choke, under 1,075 pounds tubing pressure, with casing sealed. Perforations, with 16 shots, were at 7-151-55 feet. Crude gravity was 42 degrees and Sun's No. 1 State Tract 68 is the outpost.

Materials are being moved in for George W. Graham and Emory M. Spencer No. 1 J. F. Brundrett, wildcat about 5 miles west of Rockport. This test, in the William Sutton Survey, is contracted to 8,500 feet.

Hewitt and Dougherty have completed the third producer in Mud Flats and are preparing to drill another test. Their producer, the No. 1 F. G. Gabriel is waiting on potential after testing at the rate of 360 barrels of 57.5 gravity distillate daily from perforations at 9,826-36 feet.

The new Hewitt and Dougherty location is the No. 1 K. E. Werland, 660 feet from the northeast

line, and the southeast line of lot 3, block 51. It scales about 1,960 feet east of the San Patricio County line and is 1,320 feet southeast of the No. 1 Grant, field discovery.

George W. Graham and Ryan, Hays and Burke No. A-1 K. E. Werland, Mud Flats Field, Wednesday was at 9,132 feet, taking drill stem test. On 14 minute test at 9,019-16 feet, 3/4-inch choke and 1,500 foot water cushion, the well showed 750 pounds maximum surface pressure. Recovery was 260 feet of water cushion cut with distillate and 180 feet of mud cut with distillate. Twenty-minute test was made at 9,019-29 feet, with 1,500 foot water cushion and on 3/4-inch chokes. Maximum surface pressure was 620 pounds and recovery was 180 feet of 53.4 gravity distillate, 360 feet of distillate cut water cushion and 90 feet of distillate cut mud. Electrical log was run to 8,953 feet.

Graham, Ryan, Hays and Burke No. A-1 F. G. Gabriel Wednesday was at 9,101 feet in sand, taking drill stem test. The Gabriel is a north offset to Hewitt and Dougherty's No. 1 Gabriel, new gas-distillate producer, while the A-1 Werland is a south offset to the new producer.

Free Chest X-Ray Survey Begins Here Next Thursday

one who had TB.

5. You want to know that your lungs are O.K.

Tuberculosis in the lung can be found long before you feel sick. An X-ray picture of the chest and an examination by a good doctor will tell whether you have tuberculosis. If TB is found early and you start treatment at once you can get well again. If TB is not found early, getting rid of it is a tough job.

Some people think they are safe from TB because they have passed the age of 30. No age is safe. TB kills about 55,000 people in the United States each year and 40,000 are 30 years of age or over. Right now at least half a million persons are sick with TB — as many people as live in a city the size of Cincinnati or New Orleans or Seattle.

The best way to find out if you

have TB or 27 other conditions of the chest is to have your chest X-rayed. An X-ray is a picture of your chest. It takes only a few seconds. It doesn't hurt. The whole process takes less than a minute. You take a deep breath — hold it — and that is all. The picture is then developed like a snapshot. The picture will then be examined by a doctor.

Whatever the extent of the case finding program, its success depends in large measure upon the cooperation of everyone within the community.

This undertaking needs 100 per cent cooperation of everyone. Information obtained by the X-ray is supplied only to the person and the family physician which he has designated. No record is filed in the county or town of the X-ray. The X-ray picture is filed in Austin, Texas, and is available for view — not removing from Austin — by the doctor designated.

Chickenpox Common Communicable Disease

Has chickenpox come your way? If it has, or if it does come your way in the future, the first thing to do is to call your physician, says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer.

Chickenpox is a common communicable disease caused by a virus. It occurs most frequently in the winter and spring among children less than 15 years of age. The virus is present in the discharge from the mouth and nose and from the small blisters which contain a watery fluid. Chickenpox is very contagious and is probably spread by direct contact with the patient.

Chickenpox begins from about 14 to 21 days after exposure, usually with feverishness and loss of appetite. Within about 24 hours, the skin breaks out in small raised rose-pink spots which change into blisters. The blisters quickly become crusted with scabs which eventually fall off. The scabs are not contagious. Each crop completes its course from rose-pink spot to crust in from two to four days.

Scratching or picking at the blisters may cause serious sores and disfiguring scars. The doctor will probably suggest a remedy to relieve the itching, which may be severe. Usually the child is not very ill and begins to feel better in from one to three days.

Warning—Chickenpox is an entirely different disease from smallpox. But when person has not been vaccinated, mild smallpox is sometimes mistaken for chickenpox, because the early symptoms are strikingly alike. Smallpox is a serious disease which spreads rapidly among unvaccinated persons.

At the first signs of what appears to be chickenpox, call your physician so that an early diagnosis can be made. If he finds that the patient has smallpox, prompt vaccination may save the other members of the family and outsiders, who have been exposed, from an attack of the disease.

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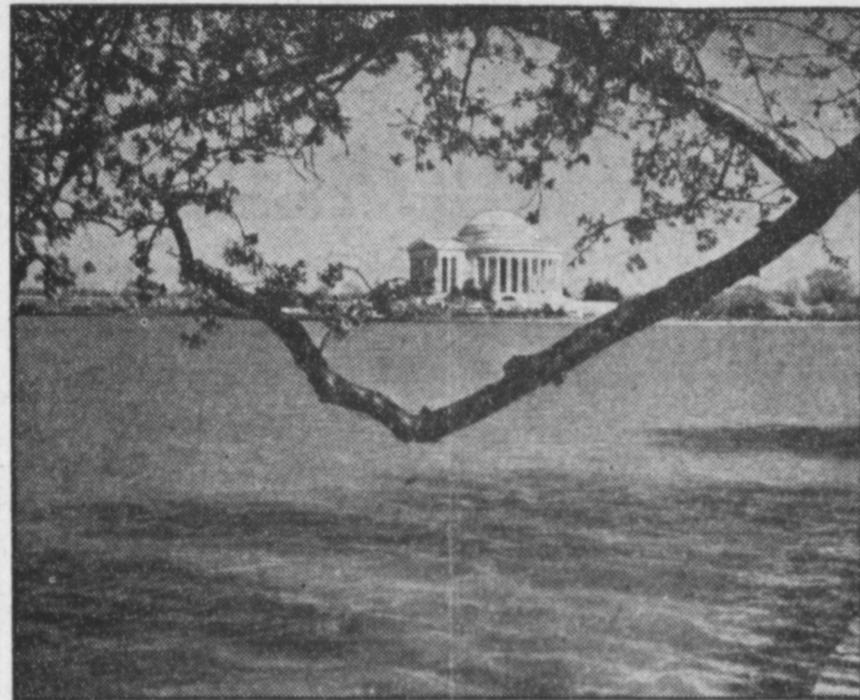

Sun to Lay System of Pipe Lines in Copano

The Sun Oil Company has proposed to erect a header platform 10 feet by 20 feet, and to lay a system of gathering lines in Copano Bay, in State Tracts 73 and 106 at a location central to a point approximately one mile north from the northwest shore of Live Oak Peninsula.

The header platform would be located approximately 200 feet west from the applicant's well No. 1 and would have a deck elevation of 5 feet above mean low water. The gathering lines would consist of 2-inch, 2 1/2-inch and 4-inch pipe lines that would be placed two feet below the bottom of the bay from the proposed header platform to the applicant's existing wells No. 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5. A 2 1/2-inch pipe line would be placed two feet below the bottom of the bay from the proposed header platform in a southeasterly direction for a distance of approximately 2,500 feet to a point on shore in Copano Village.

The Ruhl Drilling Co., Houston, recently proposed to place 2-inch steel pipes to support warning signs along their proposed submerged pipe line across St. Charles Bay, along a line approximately 1,500 feet north from Big Sharps and Indian Head Points. The pipes would be spaced 1,000 feet apart and would have a top elevation of approximately four feet above mean low water. The warning signs, 2 feet by 1 1/2 feet, would be attached with the bottom of the signs two feet above mean low water.

On April 16 a new engineer district office will be established in Fort Worth, Tex., to handle a portion of the work presently assigned to the Galveston district. All projects which are functionally flood control and water conservation are to be transferred to the Fort Worth district, and all projects which are functionally navigation and coastal drainage are to remain in the Galveston district. All military construction and the review of reports on Buffalo Bayou for flood control, which is now being prepared will also remain in the Galveston district.
