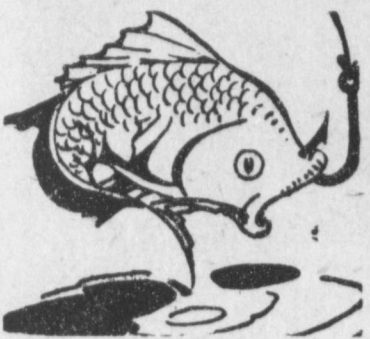


Along The Waterfront

Harris Pollard To Teach at Fulton School

Harris Pollard has accepted a position as principal and athletic director at the Fulton school for the 1950-51 school term, Supt. J. F. Harbin announced this week.

Pollard holds an administrative certificate and a major in physical education. He expects to complete work this summer on his masters degree at Austin College at Sherman, Texas.

Pollard will fill the position which was held this year by Travis DuBois. Mr. DuBois has resigned to accept a position as coach at Bruceville-Eddy.

Other teachers who have resigned their positions in the Aransas County Independent School system are Earl Morris, science instructor and assistant coach; Harvey Shomette, music director; Faiba Brown, Rockport third and fourth grade instructor; Mrs. John Haynes and Mrs. C. O. Lowery, Fulton school teachers. Mr. Shomette has accepted a position at Victoria.

In addition to filling places opened by these resignations, four new teachers are needed in the system and three are an absolute necessity, Harbin said. It is necessary that another teacher be added to the staff at the Fulton school, the high school faculty needs two teachers, and the Rockport grade school needs a teacher.

President Signs Waterways Bill

President Truman signed a bill Wednesday authorizing flood control, navigation and reclamation projects estimated to cost \$1,730,251,825. The bill includes 14 Texas projects of which one is authorization of the harbor at Fulton.

The bill carries no appropriations. It simply clears the way for future appropriations by Congress for the various projects listed.

Col. E. I. Davis, Corps of Engineers at Galveston, visited the Fulton harbor project last month while on a tour of projects in the area. He reported that 1952 appropriations would be the earliest possible date that funds could be available through regular channels to complete the harbor. Recommendations for the 1951 budget have been made; funds for the Fulton harbor project would be included in the recommendation for 1952, he said.

However, if local interests desire to raise the sum for completion of the harbor at an earlier date, it would be possible, he said. With the approval of the Chief of Engineers, which is sometimes granted, money could be obtained locally and loaned to the government without interest and the dredging could be done, with this money to be paid back by the government at the time it is appropriated. If this method cannot be utilized, it will be 1952 before the harbor can be dredged.

Fire Destroys Home On Market St. Wed.

The home of Mrs. Ethel Cruz, located about four miles from Rockport on the Market St. Road, was destroyed by fire early Wednesday morning.

Leslie Cruz, Mrs. Cruz's son and only member of the family home at the time, was awakened by the flames and escaped to a home of the neighbors. The fire was well underway at that time and he was unable to save any of the belongings.

The fire department was called by neighbors about 3 a. m. and trucks went out immediately but found the four-room house practically demolished. The firemen extinguished the blaze and returned to Rockport after 4 a. m. Origin of the fire is not known.

Heldenfels Bros. Awarded Bayside Highway Contract

Heldenfels Bros. presented a low bid of \$132,581 and were awarded the contract to construct Farm Highway 881, by the State Highway Department Wednesday.

The contract was let on the construction of a highway which will extend 14.3 miles in a north-westerly direction from Rockport to the San Patricio County line and intersect with the highway at Bayside.

The contract calls for 14.3 miles of grading, structures, flexible base and two-course surface treatment from Farm Highway 136, one-half mile south of the Aransas County line northwest to junction State Highway 35 in Rockport.

Low bids totaling \$3,729,844 on 37 highway construction projects boosted the total on 74 projects in the State Highway Department's two-day letting to \$7,386,405.

Involved in the program is 535.5 miles of farm-to-market roads, the largest farm road mileage ever offered in one month by the department, and 164 miles of non-farm roads.

Rockport School Enrollment Doubled Over 10-Year Period

Addition of Rooms Deemed Necessity For Rockport Grade School by Fall Term

Class rooms at the Rockport grade school are bursting at the seams as a result of an increased enrollment, which has more than doubled during the last ten years, and school authorities deem it imperative that two additional rooms be provided by the opening of the 1950-51 school term.

Enrollment at the grade school this year is 432 in comparison with 202 students enrolled in the 1940-41 term.

In order to provide adequate educational facilities for the youngsters next year it will be necessary for school authorities to make arrangements for two additional rooms.

There are three alternatives, if the board does not find it possible to make this addition; they are: 1. Try to arrange for two classes to be conducted in the present school plant, which is already crowded with nearly every available inch utilized at the present time; 2. Conduct some classes for only a one-half day period; 3. Crowd the students into the present rooms in some possible way.

Figures show that there will be one first grade next fall, with the enrollment figure at the present time listed at 29, the maximum number of students desirable for one teacher to handle, according to standards set by the State Dept. of Education.

According to the present scholastic census there will be 76 students in the second grade next year, which if the State Dept. recommendations are to be met, will require three second grades. In the two second grades this

Public Hearing On Gulf Intracoastal Waterway Improvements

A public hearing will be held at the V.F.W. Memorial Hall in Aransas Pass Wednesday afternoon at 1 o'clock, June 14, to review reports on the Gulf intracoastal waterway regarding improvement of Aransas Pass Channel and maintenance of Conn Brown Harbor in the vicinity of Aransas Pass.

The authorized project dimensions of the tributary channel from Harbor Island to Aransas Pass are 12 feet of depth and 100 feet bottom width. Conn Brown Harbor was constructed by and is maintained by the City of Aransas Pass.

The Board of Engineers for the Rivers and Harbors has been requested by the House of Representatives Committee on Public Works to review the reports on the Gulf Intracoastal Waterway with a view to determining whether the project specifications of the channel between Harbor Island and Aransas Pass should be modified in any way at this time and whether the recommendations contained therein with respect to maintenance should be modified.

All interested parties are invited to be present or represented at the public hearing. They will be afforded full opportunity to express their views concerning the modification of the Aransas Pass channel and the United States assuming the maintenance of Conn Brown Harbor at this time.

Advocates of the improvements are urged to present pertinent, factual material bearing upon the general plan of improvement desired and the economic justification of the undertaking. Opposing interests, if any, are also urged to state the reasons for their position.

year, there are 50 students enrolled, which will require that there be two third grades next year. Figures show that there will be at least 49 students in the fourth grade, which will require two rooms; 42 students in the fifth grade, should have two rooms, and 70 students in the sixth grade, will make two rooms a necessity. One room each will accommodate students of the seventh and eighth grades.

A total of these rooms show that 14 rooms will be required for the grade school students. At the present time there are only 12 rooms available, 9 in the main building and 3 in the annex. There are actually 10 rooms in the main building but one of them is being utilized by the high school science department.

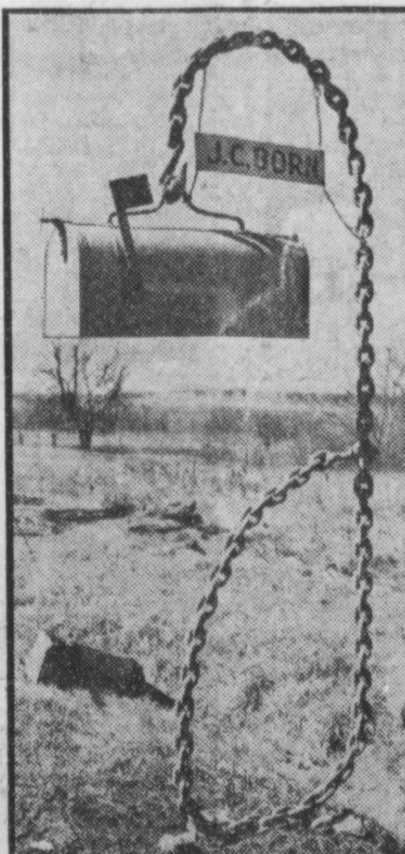
The Rockport grade school building was erected in 1935 and the rooms were built to accommodate 35 students each, and constructed according to State Dept. of Education specifications. The present rooms meet the minimum requirements set up by the State Dept.; however, the maximum teacher load has been lowered from 35 to 30 students.

High School Adequate Facilities in the Rockport high school are deemed to be adequate by the State Dept. as far as construction and number of students per teacher is concerned, even though the enrollment has doubled in the last 10 years. There were 74 students enrolled in the 1940-41 school term compared to 154 students enrolled at the present time. Each teacher in both the high school and the grade school has a home room. The main disadvantage to the high school building is the outdoor corridor, although it is used by many high schools in the state. There is a cloak room provided for grade school students but none is available for high school students and locker space is very inadequate. The home economics department can boast a building that is equipped with modern facilities and adequate in most respects. The music department is provided with adequate facilities in the school gym as is the high school study hall.

The main problem facing the school authorities in regard to the high school for the coming year is that 37 students are requesting shop training. The only space available to set up a shop is the building on the present grounds now being utilized as a garage. Authorities deem it desirable for the school to offer four years of shop to take care of terminal education for those students who will not go on to college. At the present time two diplomas are given by the high school: The academic diploma, which shows that the course of study has been successfully mastered providing the student with the requirements for going on to college; and the vocational diploma, which requires passage of basic subjects and vocational subjects desired by those who do not intend to continue their schooling.

A lack of equipment is as much in evidence throughout the school system as lack of space. Heading the list, no doubt, is the need for improved lighting facilities. Other needed facilities would range from desks to an adequate film library. It has already been reported that plans are being drawn to provide for two additional rooms and an office for the principal at the Fulton school. These rooms are as much of a necessity at Fulton as they are at Rockport.

School authorities report that they will attempt to find available space to provide for two extra rooms for the Rockport grade school without having to make additional expenditure of building these two rooms at the present school. The addition of these two rooms would be necessary in the event that a new high school structure is erected.

31 Courts Prepare For Summer Visitors

Memorial Day weekend will bring the advent of the summer tourist season and court operators are prepared to take care of the summer visitors.

During the spring several new courts have been constructed and units have been added to establishments erected to take care of vacationers have received redecorating jobs inside or out, and in some instances both, following the winter season in preparation for the summer influx.

There are now 31 tourist courts with 348 units in the area to accommodate the many persons who flock to the coast to enjoy the vacation pastimes the area offers. These courts can accommodate more than 1,300 persons.

The vacationer should have little trouble in locating the court of his choice as they are established from the bay front at Lamar to the southern city limits of Rockport.

The smallest court is made up of four units which will accommodate eight persons while the largest provides 34 units which will take care of 184 persons.

Many of the courts provide accommodations with or without kitchen facilities. Fishermen who flock to Rockport prefer to reside where they can prepare the days catch while others look forward to a vacation without cooking and seek living facilities without a kitchen.

Many court owners report that early reservations have resulted in a full house for most of the summer season. Holiday reservations have been made well in advance, however court owners stress the fact that it is not necessary to make reservations during the summer months to insure accommodations. It is advisable to do so on holidays but at other times the vacationer will be able to find a place to stay, though he may have to look for it.

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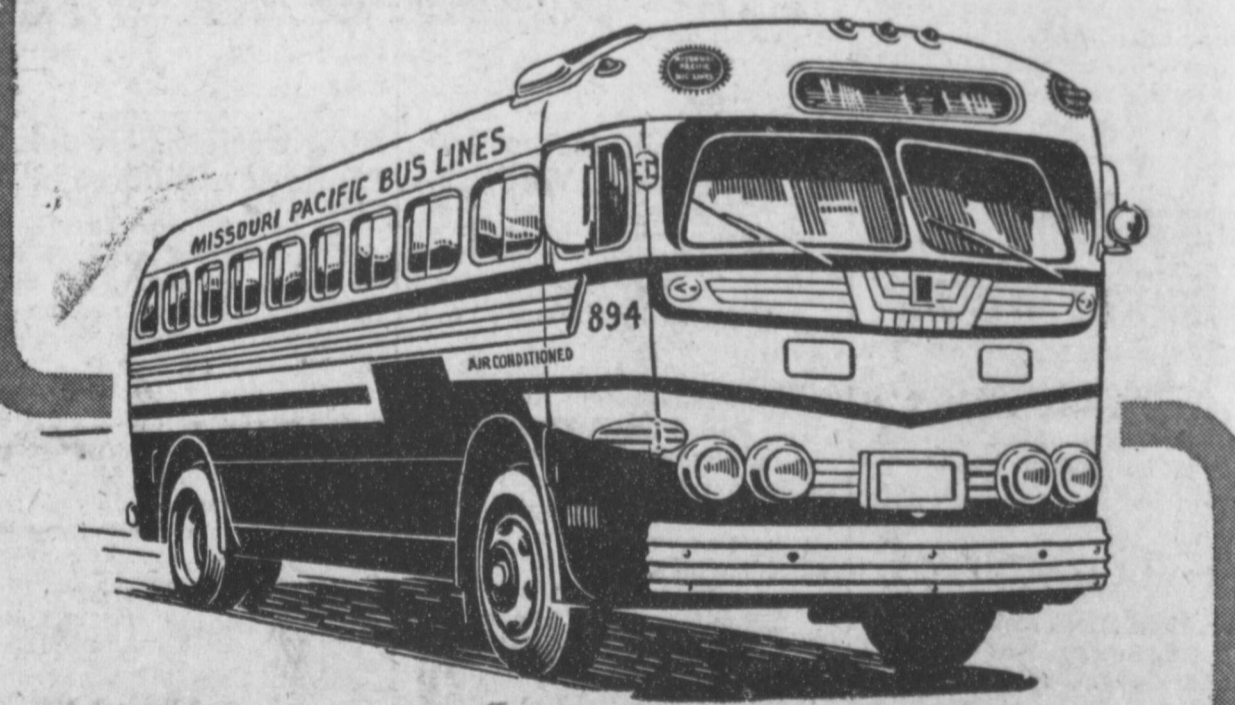

Armed Forces Day Schedule of Events

It was announced today that the USS TRITON will hold an "Open House" on Armed Forces Day, May 20th. The TRITON, commanded by Lieutenant Commander John L. Barron, US Coast Guard, is the only Coast Guard Patrol Craft operating out of Corpus Christi. She has a complement of five officers and 43 men. The commanding officer stated that his ship will be open for the public's inspection from the Captain's bridge to the galley. The only areas which will be closed to inspection will be those which contain restricted gear.

Tour of Air Station—The air station will be open for the public's inspection from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m. Special displays will be located in one of the seaplane hangars but other buildings and equipment therein will be open an operating.

1:00 P.M., Memorial Service—A service in memory of our war dead will be held in one of the large hangars. Civilian ministers of the Catholic, Protestant, and Jewish faiths will conduct this service. Immediately after the Memorial Service, flowers will be placed in a plane and dropped over the Gulf.

2:15 P.M., Jet-Assisted Take-off—A PBM "Mariner" will make a

water take-off assisted by jet power units. This event will be alongside the ramp to afford a close-up view.

2:30 P.M., Air Show—Simulated attacks by 24 Navy planes will be made on the Air Station. Sixteen fighters and 8 attack bombers will participate.

3:00 P.M., Parachute Jump—The landing will be made in the water near the seaplane hangars. This is the first time a water landing by parachute has been demonstrated to the public in the Corpus Christi area, as far as is known.

3:00 P.M., Helicopter Rescue—The parachutist will be rescued from the water and deposited on the seaplane ramp. This will afford a close-up view of how a helicopter "hovers" and how an individual can be hoisted aboard in a sling.

3:30 P.M., Baseball Game—A baseball game between the NAS team and the Randolph Air Force Team is scheduled at this time.

In addition to the timed events listed above there will be many static displays of equipment used by the various branches of the Armed Services. These will include each type of aircraft presently in service in the Advanced Training Command and a bridge display by the Army Engineers.

Other activities which will be

open to the public:

Rides in the Link Trainers which are used to simulate instrument weather conditions. Rides in Operational Flight Trainers. Observation of Radar Ground Controlled approaches of aircraft attached to the All Weather Flight School. Continuous movie shows will be run of combat and training film. The Special Devices Building will be open for inspection of the many special pieces of equipment used in the training of Naval Aviators. A band concert will be conducted in the hangars where static displays are placed.

In addition, the USS HUGH PURVIS (Destroyer) and the USS TRITON (Coast Guard Patrol Cutter) will hold "Open House" as part of the Armed Forces Day ceremonies. These vessels will be moored at Pier One, above Bascule Bridge.

Gain In Shrimp Landings Reported for March

Landings of fishery products at Texas ports during March amounted to 1,771,278 pounds, compared with 987,838 pounds in the same month the previous year. The increase was due to the gain in shrimp landings, which totaled 1,492,514 pounds—803,264 pounds greater than in March, 1949. Landings of finfish amounted to 268,526 pounds, compared with 262,935 pounds in March, 1949.

Landings from Gulf waters accounted for 85 percent of the Texas catch during March. The Laguna area accounted for the major portion of the catch, followed by the Galveston, Aransas and Matagorda areas in the order named.

During the first seven months of the State fiscal year (beginning Sept. 1,) landings at Texas ports totaled 31,448,478 pounds—37 percent more than the poundage taken in the same period the previous year. Receipts of finfish were nearly 1.5 million pounds less than in the first seven months of the previous fiscal year. However, landings of shrimp were over 10 million pounds greater.

These figures are released each month by the Dept. of the Interior Fish and Wildlife Service in cooperation with the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission.

Ben Ramsey Announces Candidacy for Lieutenant Governor

Austin. — Ben Ramsey of San Augustine, who has a long record of service in both houses of the Legislature, recently formally announced his candidacy for lieutenant governor of Texas.

The tall East Texan resigned this spring as secretary of state in order to prepare to make the race. He was appointed secretary of state in January, 1949, by the late Governor Beauford Jester and continued to serve under Governor Allan Shivers when he took office.

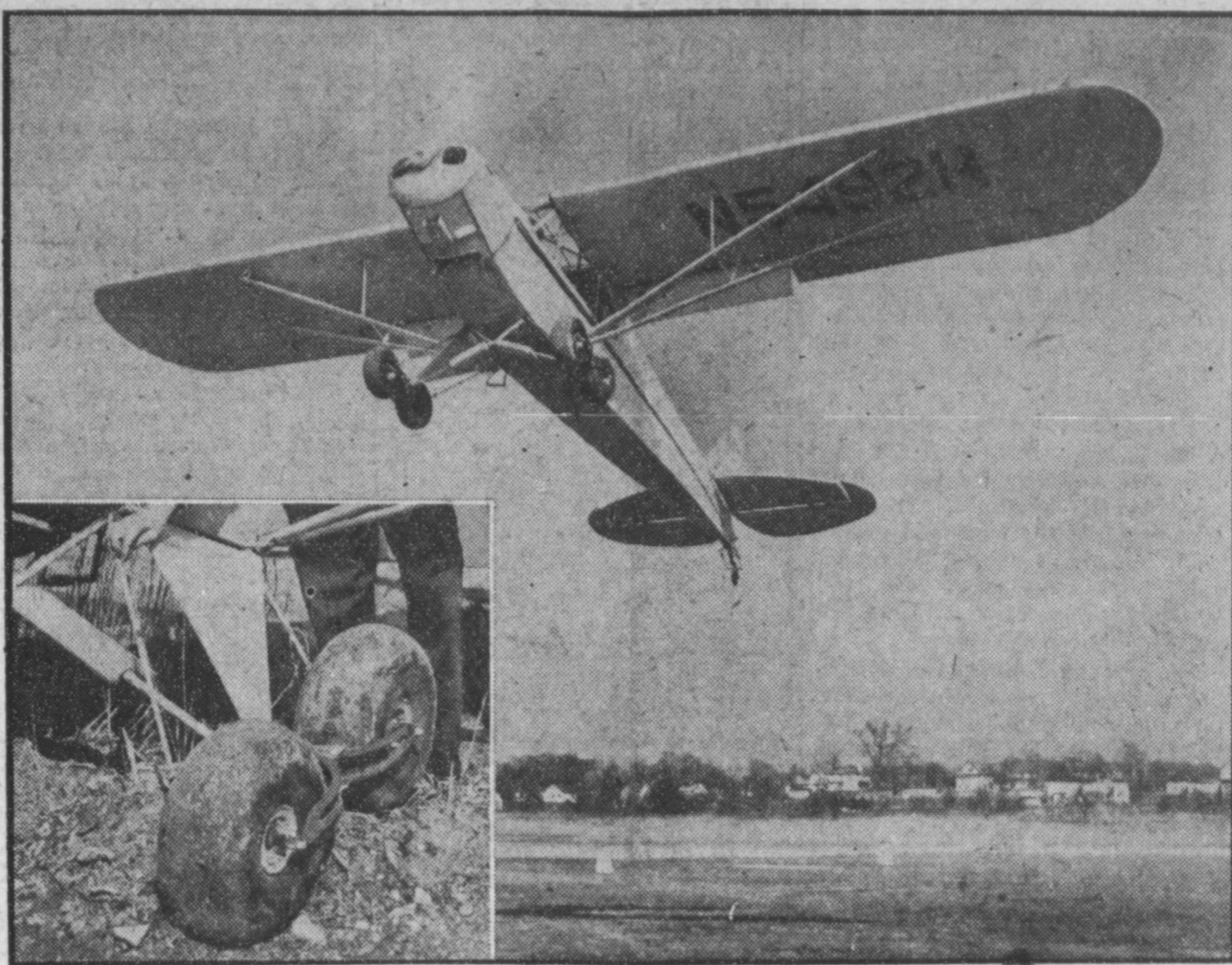
Ramsey began his political career in 1930 when he was elected to the House from San Augustine County. He served in the House four years and in 1940 was elected to the Texas Senate, where he served eight years.

The East Texas Senator has always been held in high regard by his fellow members of the Legislature, regardless of differences in voting, and the Senate demonstrated this in 1947 by electing him President Pro-Tempore of the Senate.

Ramsey, born and reared in San Augustine County, has been a leader in the advancement of rural electrification in the state. For the past ten years he has been attorney for the Deep East Texas Electric Corp., and during this time this pioneering rural utility has grown into one of the largest and most financially sound in Texas.

Ramsey attended the San Augustine public schools and the University of Texas. After leaving the University in 1931, he began practicing law in San Augustine, and immediately became interested in the serious East Texas problem of soil and forest conservation. The Ramsey farm there now is considered a model from a soil improvement standpoint.

After leaving the Secretary of State's office in Austin, Ramsey and his wife returned to San Augustine where he resumed his law practice. He has been active

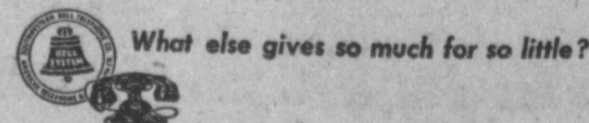

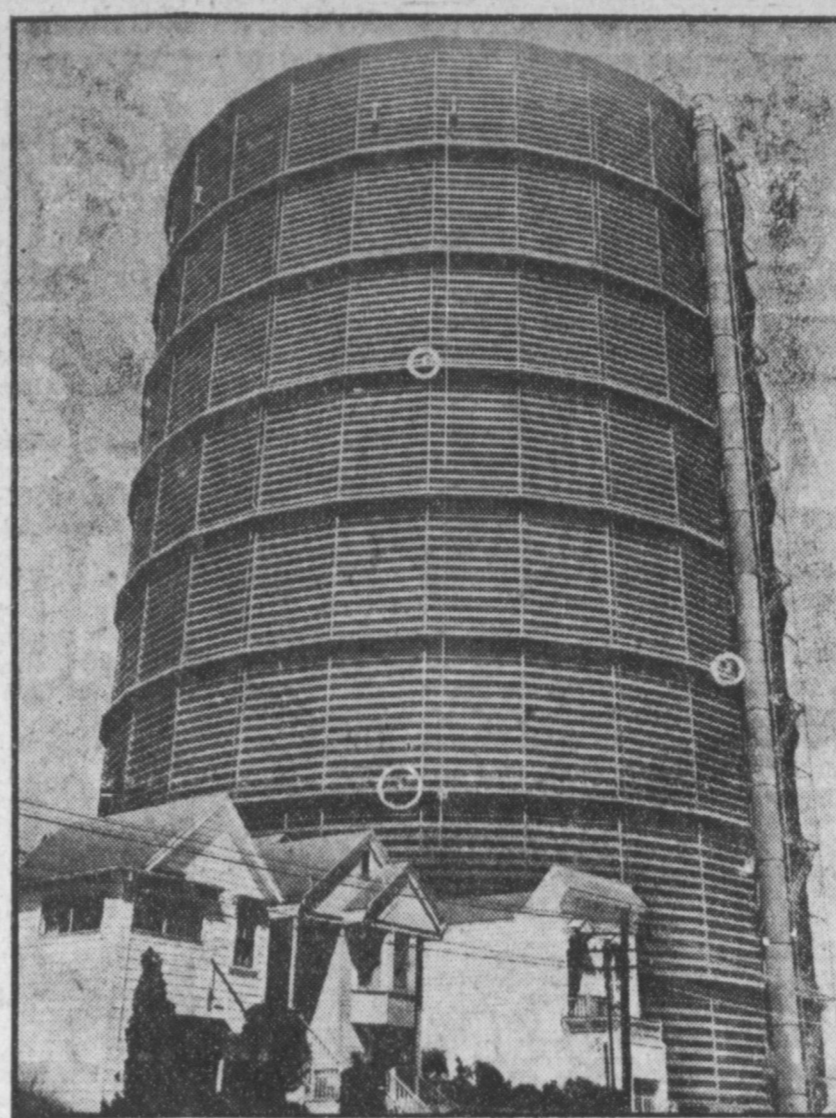
Amateur Radio Operators To Hold Annual Hamfest In Cuero Next Week

Amateur radio operators of the South Texas Emergency Net are having their fifth annual convention in Cuero, Texas May 27 and 28. All amateur radio operators and those interested in amateur radio activities are invited to attend. Registration will begin at 9:00 a.m. Saturday, May 27 at Legion Hall in Cuero. A very interesting program is planned including lectures, a transmitter hunt, and a barbecue. Each year the convention has become a more important event, with attendance last year numbering between 400 and 500. It is a real hamfest with emphasis on emergency and net operation.

Rockport stations active in this emergency work during the past year include Thomas Crossman, W5MUY; Robert Crossman, W5OUA, and James P. Hanway, W5MWN.

The South Texas Emergency Net is made up of over 100 active amateur radio operators divided into four zones and a CW net. The net has participated time after time during emergencies such as the hurricanes, ice storms, and the Texas City disaster. It is active all through the year and holds weekly practice drills. Many members have emergency power plants and portable transmitting and receiving equipment which can be moved swiftly to the scene of the disaster. Innumerable emergency messages have been handled during these emergencies when power and telephone lines are down and no other means of communication is available, not mentioning the many welfare messages which are handled daily. The net is a non-profit organization and receives its revenue solely from the annual convention to be held again this year May 27 and 28. Members receive no pay for their services at any time. They furnish their equipment and services in time of need willingly for the welfare of the public. They cooperate closely with the Red Cross and law enforcement departments in emergencies.

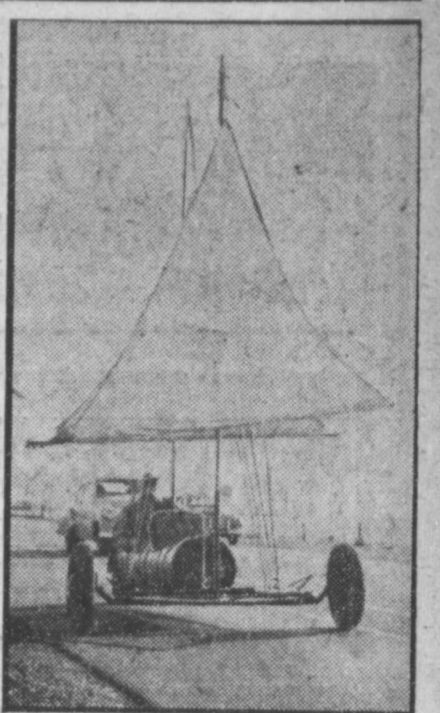

Gonzales Foundation Studies Plans for Future Progress

Austin, Texas.—Rapid growth of the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation for Crippled Children and an increasing need for its services were cited here following a meeting of the foundation's development committee to study plans for future progress.

The development and long-range planning committee was asked by the foundation's governing board to make an extensive study of the possibilities of establishing the first reconstructive hospital built upon physical medicine and rehabilitation in Texas, Hulon W. Black, chairman, announced. The committee also was asked to secure the services of competent hospital consultants to make a complete study of the organizational structure of the foundation, to recommend any changes or additions to carry on the treatment program at the hospital.

It was pointed out to the development committee that Texas has adequate facilities for orthopedic surgery in all of its major centers, and that the treatment center at Gonzales in its present composition would provide the basis for an expanding treatment center in physical medicine that could be outstanding not only in Texas, but in the United States. At present, the foundation is devoting its facilities to physical medicine and rehabilitation, with a doctor of physical medicine in charge. Concentrated at Gonzales now are 10 physical therapists, three occupational therapists, plus nursing services, equipment and physical plant. More than 400 in-and-out patients were treated there during the past year.

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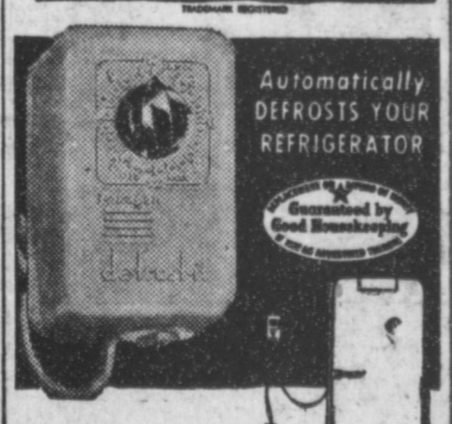


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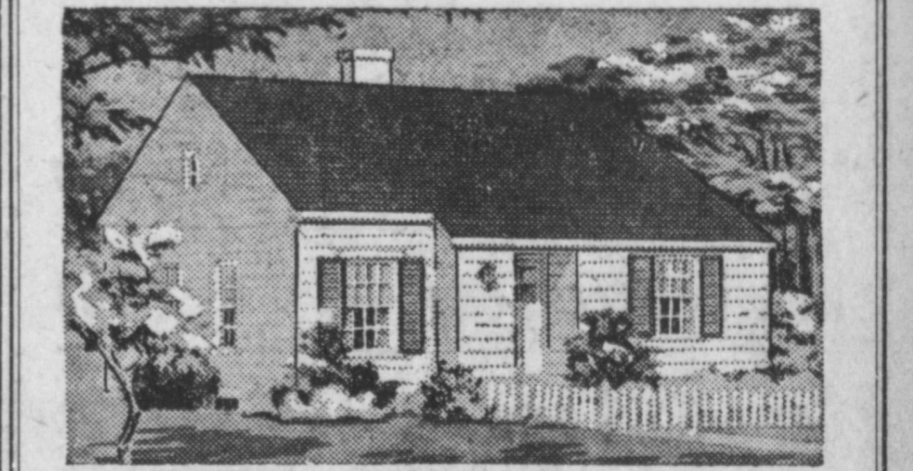
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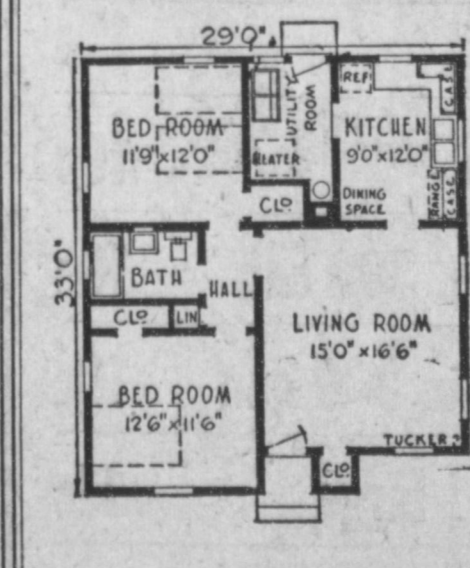

Salt Lake Field Outpost Makes Oil

Atlantic Refining Co. No. 1 C. H. Adams, southwest outpost to the Salt Lake Field, is complete on perforations at 7,222-44 feet.

On 2-hour test, the well flowed through 1/8 choke at the rate of 101 barrels of 40 gravity oil a day, under 720 pounds pressure on tubing, with casing sealed. Gas-oil ratio was 690 to 1. Total depth is 7,999 feet and 5 inch casing is set at 7,310 feet. The well was waiting on storage Friday before taking potential. It is in the Coleman-Fulton Pasture Subdivision, 3,100 feet south-southwest of the Salt Lake Field discovery well, Atlantic's No. 1 Gwynn.

George W. Graham and Ryan, Hays and Burke have found another pay in the Mud Flats Field which they opened in northwest Aransas County just before Christmas. The new pay is at the No. A-1 K. E. Werland, which was perforated at 8,874-78 feet, and on 10/64 inch top choke flowed gas and water white distillate under 3,450 pounds flowing tubing pressure. Today this well will be perforated at 8,938-44 feet, in a sand which had shows on side wall cores and which has not previously been tested in the field. The well is in lot 2, block 51, Fifth Subdivision, Taft Farm Lands. Plugged back depth is 9,160 feet.

Hewitt and Dougherty No. 1 K. E. Werland, lot 3, block 51, Mud Flats Field, was coring at 8,803 feet yesterday, after flowing oil on drill stem test at 8,600-06 feet Saturday. On 20 minute drill stem test through 1/4 inch choke, the well flowed water cushion and oil, and recovery was seven thribbles of oil. Flowing pressure was 2,700 feet.
