Mass Meeting Held To Discuss South Texas Water Supply Problems

Major Jas. Jarboe and B. W. Hamblin were among 60 Chamber of Commerce, city officials and representatives from 11 towns that attended a mass meeting in Sinton last Thursday night to discuss the South Texas water supply problems.

Harry P. Burleigh, Austin, Bureau of Reclamation engineer, and Dr. Stanley Arbingast of the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research, were principal speakers at the meeting sponsored by the Sinton Chamber of Commerce.

Burleigh told the group that the Neceus River is capable of providing most acceptable water in vast quantities. His address placed emphasis on the Oakville damsite in Three Rivers, which, if constructed, would inundate the town of Three Rivers.

The engineer emphasized that local interest must decide whether or not to proceed with the project in Live Oak County, which is under consideration by the Lower Neceus River Water District.

Dr. Arbingast, speaking on the past and the expected population increase in South Texas, stressed that the Texas Gulf Coast is still a frontier area so far as industry is concerned. He added that industry will come if an adequate supply of fresh water is provided.

An open forum discussion followed the address. Representatives from Taft, Aransas Pass, Refugio, Beeville, Robstown, Odem, Alice, Rockport, Ingleside, Sinton, and Three Rivers were present.

Jackson's Launch 45 Ft. Shrimper

Jackson Seafood Co. added the "Irene J" to their fleet of 11 shrimpers Wednesday when the 45 foot boat was launched in the Rockport yacht basin.

The shrimper is 15 1/2 feet wide with a 6 foot draft. It will be powered with a 165 h.p. General Motors diesel engine and will have fuel capacity to make four to five day Gulf trips. Owners of the boat expect to have it fishing in about two weeks.

The boat was built by Dick Simpson Jr. and Jim Barber at the fish house.

High Winds Sink Boat In Aransas Bay, 17 Are Rescued By Local Shrimp Boats

Four shrimp boats rescued 13 Pasadena High School seniors, their faculty sponsor, three chaperones and skipper early Saturday afternoon after the excursion boat in which they were passengers sank in a 55 mile an hour wind squall in Aransas Bay. Bill Gray, skipper of the ill-fated 35 foot craft, "Rambler," assisted the passengers from the sinking boat into the water with life jackets. He put a rope into the water near the craft and tied it in a circle so that the passengers could hold on to the rope and stay together while they awaited rescue.

The water was approximately 10 feet deep where the accident occurred. It was about 3/4 of a mile to wading ground and more than a mile from shore.

Four shrimp boats arrived at the scene a short time later and extended ropes to assist the party onto their boats. Assisting in the rescue were the shrimp boats "Teet M," captained by Elva Mullinax, "Lillian," captained by Rufus Casterline and the "J. E." captained by Laria Solis. Henry Madden in the "Jack of Diamonds" also stopped to lend assistance but his motor died and he was forced to weigh anchor.

Two of the chaperones and one student were rendered first aid on the boats and all members of the party walked ashore here unassisted and left the waterfront in private cars for the Oleander Courts where they were quartered. Gray reported that the boat had been broken off underwater and pulled out 25 feet from the

Commissioners Court Names Mosquito Control Board

Advisory Board to Make Investigations And Recommendations to County Court

The Commissioners Court met Wednesday morning and appointed the Advisory Board to serve the Mosquito Control District which was recently voted in Aransas County.

According to the Act under which the District was set up, each Commissioner was to name a member of the board who is a qualified tax-paying voter in the county and the County Judge was to appoint one from the County at large.

Seek Building For Athletic Club

Dr. R. S. Blackburn is making every attempt to organize a Boys Club for athletic activities in the area. Dr. Blackburn has been active with boys groups since coming to Rockport recently and realizing the need for sponsored activities for boys, has agreed to devote his efforts toward organizing such a group.

He reports that 40 boys have indicated interest in joining an organization where they would have supervised instruction in all types of sports and gymnastics. Such an organization would provide a permanent meeting place with equipment available for boxing, wrestling, ping pong, and gymnastics. Baseball and football teams would be organized from the group in season with equipment provided by the club. Swimming lessons would also be arranged.

The present plan would call for an initial membership fee of one dollar with a small monthly fee to be used to provide the equipment needed for the above mentioned activities. The needs of the club and the finances would be supervised by a governing board from a sponsoring civic organization.

The immediate handicap in the plans for organization is lack of a place to meet. Dr. Blackburn said. Anyone having a vacant building which they would not mind turning over to a supervised group of boys are asked to contact Dr. Blackburn or the Pilot office.

"The lack of supervised activity for boys, especially during the summer months, is readily apparent. Dr. Blackburn is receiving enthusiastic support in his plan and he hopes that anyone with a building which would suffice as quarters for the boys' activities will lend their support so that the supervised activity can get underway immediately.

Sun Oil Potential Test Makes Oil

Sun Oil Co. No. 1 State Tract 68, Copano Bay, north extension of the Fulton Beach Field, made 182.73 barrels of oil on potential test through 1/8 inch choke, under 1,200 pounds pressure on tubing, with casing sealed. Sixteen shot perforations were at 7,142-52 feet. Gravity was 42 degrees and gas-oil ratio was 832 to 1. Casing is set at 7,158 feet, total depth. The well extends Fulton Beach Field a mile into the bay, leaving wide acreage between a few Sun and Hunt Oil Co. wells and the main part of the field which lies to the west. The new well is 1,320 feet north of Sun No. 5 State Tract 73, earlier extension.

Hewitt and Dougherty No. 1 K. E. Werland, Mud Flats Field, Wednesday ran electrical log to 9,100 feet, total depth and probably will run casing in a few days to drill a sand at 8,600 feet. On test stem test at 8,600-06 feet, the well had flowed oil and had recovered 7 thribbles of oil under 2,700 pounds flowing pressure. The test is in Lot 3, block 51, Fifth Addition, Taft Farm Lands.

George W. Graham and Ryan, Hays and Burke No. A-1 K. E. Werland, Mud Flats test in Lot 2, Wednesday was testing for completion as a dual oil-gas well. On perforations at 8,606-12 feet, the well made an estimated 100 barrels of oil daily through 1/8 inch choke under 1,600 pounds pressure. Perforations at 8,574-78 feet flowed gas and water white distillate under 3,450 pounds flowing pressure on tubing. Total depth is 9,914 feet, and 7 inch casing is set at 9,160 feet.

Graham, Ryan, Hays and Burke No. B-1 F. G. Gabriel in lot 6, block 48, was drilling at 1,850 feet yesterday.

Hunt Oil Co. has requested permission from the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers to build a 4,000 foot, 2 1/2 inch pipe line in Copano Bay from Hunt No. 3, State Tract 72, Fulton Beach Field, oil well to the shore of Live Oak Peninsula.

Hunt Oil Co. is drilling Well No. 3 in Copano Bay, State Tract 72, located approximately 5,000 feet north from the northwest shore of Live Oak Peninsula. The work consists of the sinking of a drilling barge, the erection of a derrick thereon, the driving of eight single piles and four 3 pile dolphins and the construction of a protective structure at the well if the well is productive. The derrick has a top elevation of 132 feet above mean low tide. Application has been made by the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers for approval of the structure.

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Time to Think About Water Safety

School is out and summer vacations are just around the corner. Local children and adults as well as thousands of visitors will flock to the Aransas County beaches this summer to enjoy their favorite pastime—swimming.

So that the pleasures offered by the cool bay waters will not be marred, it is time to think about water safety.

Children that don their bathing suits for a splash in the bay should know how to swim. They should be familiar with rules of water safety. Boy Scouts and many other youngsters in the community are familiar with the art of swimming. For those who are not, they should go to their parents and to these persons for instructions.

Those who know how to swim should not make a habit of going swimming alone. Should you become ill or an accident occur, it is advisable to have someone along who can seek assistance.

Picnickers will do well to remember to enjoy their bathing before eating rather than afterwards. This may be a time-worn policy but still holds true.

Youngsters should be taught to regard the water with a great deal of respect. With proper instruction in regard to swimming and safety, all will be able to enjoy the surrounding waters to the fullest extent without mishap.

Removal Of Barge Wrecks Authorized

Removal of two old barge wrecks from navigable waters near Port Aransas has been authorized by the Corps of Engineers, U. S. Army. Contracts for disposal are to be let at the Engineers' district office in Galveston, probably next week. Bids on the work will be received until that date.

One, a former oil barge, has been stranded in Lydia Ann Channel, about two miles north of Port Aransas and near open waters of Aransas Bay, for at least 18 years. No one remembers when the craft sank but it was known to have been there in October of 1932. The Engineers have been maintaining a lighted buoy near it. The other is almost within the village of Port Aransas, lying outside the ship channel on a bank. It is only a skeleton of a one-time wooden utility barge. It has been there several years.

Both barges constitute obstructions and menaces to navigation, H. L. Sisson, resident engineer for the U. S. Army here, explained.

A heavy wind might blow the skeleton into the Port Aransas basin or wash the barge from Lydia Ann Channel back into more frequently used waterways.

Contractors will be required to remove the wrecks entirely from navigable waters, Sisson said.

The government advertised for owners but was unable to locate them, the engineer said.

State Health Department Waging War Against Venereal Diseases In Tex.

Austin.—Texas' private war on venereal diseases among indigents is proceeding in wholesale fashion, with over 95,000 patients having passes through State Health Department rapid treatment centers since the first center was opened in 1943.

This was the word from State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox, who Thursday described the 95,000 as "unlucky enough to have VD, but lucky enough to have gotten attention."

"Unattended syphilis can cause heart disease, mental illness, blindness, and other severe physical disabilities," the health official asserted. He asked pointedly, "See why they're lucky?"

Two state supported rapid treatment centers—Rock Mount Hospital in Overton, and the Mission Medical Center in San Antonio—are maintained by the State Health Department for handling cases of venereal diseases in people unable to pay for private care, Cox said.

Gonorrhea, is handled in the VD clinics of local health units, rather than sending the indigents to the RTC's Cox said.

"State Health Department policy calls for local health unit VD clinics as diagnostic centers," he said. "However, a good many rapid treatment center patients are referred there by private physicians."

Rapid treatment center personnel conduct patient education via conferences pamphlets, and motion pictures, which is, Cox said, "one of our most valuable educational processes."

"We learned long ago that educating patients while they are undergoing treatment has more retentive value than any other device we could use.

Jack Sanders Named Maintenance Supt. For Padre Is. Causeway And Park

Jack Sanders was recently appointed superintendent in charge of maintenance for the Padre Island Causeway and Park and Louis Anderson, Corpus Christi Caller Sports Editor, took this occasion to pay tribute to Sanders in his column, Two Bit Pieces.

Anderson's remarks appear here in full: The other day came a brief announcement from the County Courthouse: "Jack Sanders today was appointed superintendent in charge of maintenance for the Padre Island Causeway and park."

To a lot of people the name Jack Sanders is just 11 letters of the alphabet. Time does that to a name. The story of Sanders begins back in the early 1930s in Corpus Christi.

A skinny youngster whose father, L. E. Sanders, operated a Mesquite street hotel, now known as the Majestic, started playing junior high football. He played a year at Senior High under Coach Bobby Cannon, then the family moved to San Antonio and Jack finished at Harlandale High.

The next Corpus Christians heard of Jack he was starring, along with brother George, at Southern Methodist University. Jack was a guard for Matty Bell, but so was George and there was great confusion because both were regulars.

Jack became better known than George because of his educated toe and extra points. He played at SMU from 1935 to 1939, including the team that went to the Rose Bowl.

Jack missed one extra point try during his college career and that one lost a ball game and brought him more publicity than anything else he did for the Mustangs.

It was in 1939 and the Ponies were playing Notre Dame. The score was 20-19 and Jack got back to kick the game-tying extra point. He hadn't missed one in years but this time the ball veered off and missed by six inches.

"They talk about the great SMU showing against Notre Dame last December," Jack will tell you. "We played the Irish a greater game than the 1949 Mustangs because we had a lot less to work with in 1939."

Sanders' story should just about end there but the greatest thrill of all was yet to come.

After SMU Jack played three years for the Pittsburgh Steelers. In 1942 he was captain of the Steelers and the club tied Washington for the Eastern Division pro title. Playing with him was Bill Dudley, one of the finest football performers of all times.

When war broke out Jack and Dudley joined up, Sanders with the Marines. He won a commission. During a training period at Camp LeJeune, a demolition explosion ripped his left hand to bits and the hand was amputated just above the wrist.

Like Pete Gray in Baseball, Sanders wasn't licked by the loss of a limb.

He, the Marine Corps and the Philadelphia Eagles, worked out a proposition with two-fold intent: (1) to give inspiration to other amputees in the service and (2) to give Sanders a chance to have another try at his beloved game of football.

The Eagles invented a special rawhide guard for his left hand and Jack played the entire season with the Eagles and Steve Van Buren. The club won 11 and lost two and was just shaded for the Eastern Division title by the New York Giants.

"The greatest thrill of my life was during those games with the Eagles," he recalls proudly. "I couldn't leave or go on the field without the fans giving me a great ovation."

"I'll never forget the game attended by more than 100,000 people that year. More than 30,000 of them were wounded servicemen brought in specially to see me play with what looked like such a great physical handicap."

"Players were introduced individually by spotlight and when I was introduced those 30,000 servicemen cheered me for more than 15 minutes. There wasn't a spot outside or inside me that didn't have goosebumps. It was the greatest night of my life and the memory will never dim, I hope I gave most of those wounded veterans an inspiration that night."

In 1946 Jack went to Trinity U. at San Antonio as coach and stayed there two years. The second year Trinity lost only two games.

He dropped out of coaching the next year to take a job with the Bauer-Smith Dredging Co. of Port Lavaca. He has been living at Rockport close to his parents but intends to move to Corpus Christi pretty soon to take over his new job with the causeway.
