## Co. Commissioners Name Candidates For Nav. Board

The Commissioners Court voted at their meeting Monday to place the following names on the ballot at the general election in November as candidates for commissioners of the Aransas County Navigation District: Jas. A. Jarboe, Henry Camehl and Jas. Sorenson, Jr.

This measure was taken to insure that there would be at least three names on the ballot, Judge D. R. Simmons reported. All have indicated their willingness to serve if elected. Other persons, including the present members of the board, can file their candidacy for the board if they so desire.

In the past the Navigation Commissioners have been appointed by the Commissioners Court to serve for a two year period. According to the Civil Statutes of Texas these Commissioners must be elected.

The law provides that all navigation commissioners now holding office by appointment of any Commissioners' Court or navigation board as the case may be, or by virtue of an election held within such district under the provision of any local and special Act are hereby declared to be legally constituted qualified and acting navigation and canal commissioners of such district, and shall hold office until their successors are elected and qualify; and on the first Tuesday in December, 1932, and on the first Tuesday in December of each even year thereafter, there shall be held in all the districts coming within the purview of this Act, a general election for the election of navigation and canal commissioners, at which time there shall be elected three navigation and canal commissioners for such district who shall hold office for a term of two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified, which election shall be held in accordance with the General Election Laws of this state, except a sherein otherwise provided.

### Six Year Term Optional

The Board of Navigation and Canal Commissioners of any Navigation District, according to an amendment passed by the legislature in 1949, may by resolution duly adopted by such Board provide for six-year terms of office; provided that the terms of office of the Commissioners shall be so arranged that one will expire every two years. At the first general election for the election of Navigation and Canal Commissioners next succeeding the adoption of the aforesaid resolution and held in any District coming within the purview of this Act and availing itself of the provisions of this Section by the adoption of such resolution, there shall be elected three Commissioners for such District which shall hold office for terms of two, four and six years respectively. The respective term of office of the three Commissioners shall be determined by lot. Upon expiration of the respective terms of said Commissioners the successor to each of them shall be elected thereafter for a term of six years at a general election held in such District at the time and in the manner specified by this Act.

### Election of Officers

The board of navigation and canal commissioners shall name the polling place, and if more than one is required, divide the district into election precincts which may be changed from time to time as required, and shall appoint the officers to hold such election.

The notice of election shall be signed by the president and secretary of the board and shall contain a copy of the order of election, and shall be published once each week for three consecutive weeks in some newspaper in said district. The first publication shall be had not less than 21 days prior to the election and not more than 35 days prior thereto.

The officers holding the election shall make and deliver the returns in triplicate, one copy being retained by the presiding judge, one delivered to the chairman of the board of navigation commissioners of the district and one delivered to the secretary. The navigation and canal commissioners shall meet and canvass the returns of the election at any time not less than 5 full days thereafter.

## Copano Bay Test Nears Completion

Sun Oil Co. No. 2 Copano State 68, Fulton Beach Field, flowed 176.94 barrels of 42 gravity oil on potential test through 1/8 inch choke, under 1,240 pounds tubing pressure, with casing sealed. Twenty-shot perforations were at 7,144-49 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 790 to 1. Total depth was 7,161 feet and 5 1/2 inch casing was set on bottom. The well is in State Tract 68, Copano Bay.

In the Salt Lake Field, Atlantic Refining Co. No. 3 V. G. Gwynn, on four hour test through 1/64 inch choke, flowed at the rate of 116 barrels of oil daily, no water, under 250 pounds pressure on tubing, with casing sealed. Gas-oil ratio was 989 to 1. Perforations were with 117 shots at 7,216-36 feet. Total depth was 8,003 feet. 5 1/2 inch casing was set at 7,970 feet, and plugged back depth was 7,935 feet on the test which is in Joseph Hollis Survey, A-76.

Hewitt and Dougherty No. 2 F. G. Gabriel, Mud Flats Field was coring in shale Wednesday morning at 9,076 feet. The test, in Lot 8, Section 48, Sixth addition, Taft Farm lands, has 7-inch protective casing set at 8,950 feet.

## Boys Teams Schedule Games Twice A Week

Four boys teams play softball regularly at the ball park each Monday and Saturday night, Fred Bracht, park board chairman, reported this week. The boys started out early in the season with Saturday night set aside for their games but the number of boys that desired to play grew so large that an extra night was required.

Besides the games played here between the various local teams, visiting teams from surrounding towns have come here for games throughout the summer and the local teams have gone out of town for several games. The boys hold practice regularly each week and are working up some fine ball clubs.

The boys have received little publicity—they play for the fun of the game. At the same time, it is reported that they draw large crowds when they play out of town and cannot understand why few people, if any, turn out for the games here.

At one time during the summer it looked like the boys would have to cease playing due to the fact that the crowds were so small that collections would not pay for the lights. The boys and interested parties have dug down in their pockets to provide funds to purchase equipment but did not feel that they could do so to pay for the cost of the lights too.

The park manager told the teams to go ahead with their games on schedule and that the lights would be paid, believing that it is a worthwhile project and the matter of paying for lights should not keep the boys off the field.

## Mosquito Control Recommends Spraying Machine

Members of the Aransas County Mosquito Control Board met Monday night and recommended the purchase of a spraying machine as soon as possible. The board also recommended that a definite plan be mapped out by routes through uninhabited areas where mosquitoes are found and wherever the machine can travel, and that this route be followed each time that spraying is necessary so as to give each precinct its rightful share of spraying.

In view of the unsettled world situation, the board recommended that a spraying machine be purchased immediately from the best manufacturer who will deliver now and accept payment not earlier than December, 1950, after the tax collections are in. Funds for the mosquito control program will not be available until October, it was pointed out.

Members of this advisory commission were appointed by the Commissioners Court. They are Ed Barnard, chairman, Leonard LeBlanc, Alex Scott, Green Fleming and Jim Barber.

The commission is set up to investigate the mosquito menace, set up a program and make recommendations to the Commissioners Court.

## Absentee Ballots Can Be Cast August 6

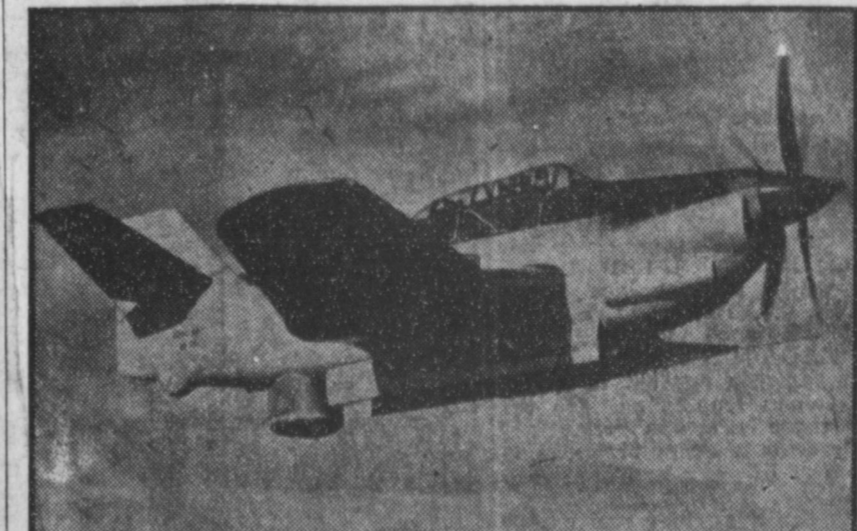

## Board Releases Location of Site for New High School

### School Plant Would Be Located North Of Rockport City Limits, West of Highway 35

The school board of the Aransas County Independent School District announced this week that the proposed \$350,000 high school plant would be located just north of the Rockport city limits west of Highway 35.

The site for the plant would comprise about 30 acres in the southwest part of a tract known as the Denver Heights addition, which is located a few hundred feet north of the Rockport city limits.

### Coastal Fishing Pact Is Studied

AUSTIN—A study designed to break down barriers between states, as concerns management of the commercial fisheries, has been authorized by the Gulf States Marine Fisheries Commission.

The proposal was approved at a meeting in Mobile, Alabama, on recommendation of the Executive Secretary Howard Dodgen, of the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission.

The next step will be taken at a conference called for August 17 and 18 at New Orleans to be attended by biologists and representatives of the legal department of the five interested states and of the Federal Fish and Wildlife Service. The states are Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama and Florida.

The Executive Secretary said the recommendation was based on the belief that special reprisal state laws aimed at commercial fishermen from other states have worked to the detriment of the entire coastal fishing industry.

He told the Mobile conference that the new Gulf States Marine Fisheries Commission, which has just observed its first anniversary, is the logical medium "to break down these needless and harmful state barriers." He suggested that the study be undertaken from "biological management as well as from legal procedure."

The Fisheries Commission already has launched exploratory and research projects for the betterment of commercial fishing in the Gulf States. A noteworthy development at the Mobile conference was the decision to cancel study of sharks because of the collapse of the market for shark liver oil and to concentrate on shrimp and other varieties. One large ocean going ship already has begun the coastal studies to spot new fishing grounds. Another is being rigged up.

## State Tax Board Sets 30-Cent Rate

Austin, Texas.—The Automatic Tax Board Tuesday for the last time set the state property tax rate for general revenue purposes on a statewide basis.

A maximum rate of 30 cents on the \$100 valuation was set by board, comprised of Gov. Allan Shivers, chairman, Comptroller Robert S. Calvert and Treasurer Jesse James.

The action was automatic, final collection of the tax on a statewide basis having been ordered by the 51st Legislature after adoption of a constitutional amendment to that effect in 1948.

The state school property tax was set at the maximum rate of 35 cents a \$100 valuation, the college building tax at 5 cents and the confederate pension tax at 2 cents. This means a total of 72 cents on the \$100 property valuation will be levied by the state this year. Property owners paid the same amount last year. Collection begins Oct. 1.

After this year, the 30-cent tax will be levied by the state only in counties receiving tax remissions. It can also be applied in other counties if the people vote such a levy for construction and repair of rural roads or for flood control.

Calvert figured discontinuance of the tax for general revenue purposes will deprive the state of approximately \$10 million a year.

### This tract takes in blocks 17 through 31. About two-thirds of this property is owned by the county. The school board hopes to acquire the balance of the property by exchange for other lots in the Denver Heights addition, which are also owned by the county. The county has given the board a 120 day option to purchase this property to be used to exchange for the desired lots.

Last week the school board ordered a bond election in the amount of \$425,000 to be held Saturday, August 12. The board asked for the bond issue for the purpose of voting bonds for the construction of a new high school plant and for repairs and additions to the present school plant.

Of this \$425,000, approximately \$350,000 would be used for the new high school plant. An additional \$35,000 would be earmarked to purchase equipment for the plant. Included in the bond issue is about \$35,000 to be used for repairs and additions to the present school plant. It is estimated that about \$7,500 would be required for site acquisition and clearing and grading of the site.

The bond issue is set up to be paid back over a 30 year period. Based on an 85 percent collection of taxes on the basis of the 1949 valuation, the bond issue can be handled, the board reported.

School Board President Hugh Morrison said this week that there is no need for any increase in taxes or assessment rates to take care of the issue. All present bond funds have substantial surpluses in the bond interest and sinking funds, he said. It was pointed out that 50 cents out of each \$1.50, the maximum levy per \$100 valuation which is in effect here, is required by law to go into the bond sinking fund and cannot be used for other purposes. As a result there is a great deal more money in the sinking funds now than is required for current payment.

An architect's drawing of the proposed high school plant is on display at Johnson's Drug Store. The plans were submitted by DeWees, Phelps and Simmonds, architectural firm of San Antonio. The plans call for a gymnasium, auditorium, cafeteria, facilities for shop and science laboratories as well as classrooms to accommodate 250 students. The present enrollment is 150. The plans were drawn about a year ago and owing to increased building costs, portions of the plans may have to be deleted, Morrison said.

Attention is called to the fact that Wednesday, August 9, is the last day for voting absentee. Persons desiring absentee ballots may secure them from Miss Iris Sorenson at the school.

### Shrimp Boat Sinks, Men Swim Ashore

C. H. Ritz, Jr. of Matagorda and Norman Plant of Bay City swam 12 miles to shore last Thursday when their shrimp boat sank in the Gulf and they were forced to abandon it.

The men notified the Coast Guard by radio that their boat was filling with water about 5 a.m. Then they put on life jackets and left the sinking boat, a 36 foot shrimper, "Sylvia". They made it to Cedar Bayou about 12:50 p.m.

A party from Refugio, fishing at the Bayou, picked up the men and brought them into Mills' Wharf where the Coast Guard was notified that the men had been picked up.

The men received a bad sunburn but were reported to be in good physical condition otherwise.

## Unreported Marriages Slowing Up Drafting

AUSTIN—State selective service headquarters have sharply criticized men classified as 1-A in the draft who have not reported marriage and other changes in their circumstances to their local boards.

Such failures, said Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state director, is jeopardizing the filling of the Texas draft quota of 2,613 men for September.

"If we fail to furnish the number of men desired from this state, this failure on the part of many men will be the chief factor in that failure," Wakefield said.

Wakefield reminded such registrants that local boards are not legally bound to change classifications of men who wait until they are ordered to report for physicals before they report changes in their circumstances.

"Selective service wants to be reasonable about this situation but we know that the patience of our local board members are wearing thin," he said. Unless boards declare such men delinquent, they must lose time getting out more orders for other men to report for physicals.

"All this takes time, and our local boards have a short deadline to meet," he said, adding:

"Such men who fail to report change of status, such as marriage, or a change of address, legally are eligible to be declared delinquent for failing to comply with the law. A delinquent can be inducted immediately ahead of all others under this law, and if we are forced to do so in order to meet our calls, we will comply with the law to the letter."

AUSTIN—Expectant mothers have positive control of whether or not their babies will be born with congenital syphilis.

This is from State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox, who characterizes the condition of a baby being born with syphilis as "negligent, unnecessary and entirely preventable."

"All that's necessary is for the expectant mother to place herself under the care of a competent physician as soon as her pregnancy has been confirmed," the health official said.

He believes all too many Texas babies are being born with the affliction, passed to them by an infected mother during the prenatal period. Early prenatal care, he explained, would include a blood test of the mother to determine the presence or absence of syphilitic infection.

Dr. Cox charged that many times the mother-to-be delays her visit to the doctor until a few weeks, or days, before she expects the infant. Then, he says, it may be too late to prevent the birth of a syphilitic child.

Almost 2600 cases of congenital syphilis were reported last year. Dr. Cox says he sees little indication that there will be any appreciable reduction in case reports this year. Incidence of congenital infection will probably remain at fairly constant levels, he pre-

"Advances in medical therapy for syphilis have progressed to the point where it is now possible to effectively prevent congenital infection—but not without the mother's complete cooperation," Cox warned.

The explanation is that even though a mother contracts syphilis just prior to pregnancy, she can be restored to health and the baby can be born sound and healthy, provided treatments are started within the first three prenatal months.

**Home Loan Cut  
May Be Felt Here**

A recent Veterans Administration order limiting GI home loans may cut the local home building market in half, according to Curtis Bell, managing director of American General Contractors.

The order, aimed at breaking rising costs of construction, states that VA will not approve loans on homes priced above the general level of July 19.

In a companion move, the government limited loan guarantees to 60 percent of sales price, compared to 100 percent guarantees made previously. And veterans are required to make a 5 percent down payment to obtain a loan guarantee, compared to no down payment previously.

Sanders Completes Section Of Shore Protection Wall

L. E. Sanders has completed a section of shore protection wall which extends 250 feet along the waterfront in front of his home on the Fulton beach road. This section provides a perfect example of what the proposed beach project would look like if extended all along the shore.

The wall, which extends three feet above average low tide, is erected 200 feet out from the road. Dirt was hauled in to provide the fill. A 700 foot pier will be erected 7 feet above the water on 20 foot piling. The walk of the pier will be constructed in sections which would enable it to float off in time of storm.

Legal opinion has been obtained that land owners along the shore have a right to reclaim the land which was washed away by wave action. It is their privilege to re-fill this area where land was washed off the front of their property during the last several years.

If the county were to carry out such a shore protection project, they would need to furnish 120 feet of right of way which would leave the property owners 100 feet beyond the right of way for a road. These details are outlined in the plans recommended by the committee of which Sanders is a member.

It is obvious that such shore protection, in both Fulton and Rockport, would provide a beautiful beach drive as well as prevent erosion. It would be possible to build one way roads separated by a parkway.

The committee recommended that property owners be responsible for the development with the thought in mind that federal or state assistance might be available for the project.

Menhaden And Shrimp Account For 98% Of June Fishery Production

The catch of menhaden (12,790,800 pounds), and shrimp (2,876,476 pounds) accounted for 98 percent of the Texas production during June. Receipts of menhaden were 1.5 million pounds more than in June 1949, while those of shrimp were 1.2 million pounds greater.

Landings from Gulf waters accounted for 98 percent of the Texas catch during June. Menhaden accounted for 82 percent and shrimp 17 percent of the catch taken in the Gulf.

During the first ten months of the state fiscal year (beginning Sept. 1), landings at Texas ports totaled 54,932,476 pounds—10 percent more than the poundage received during the same period the previous year. Landings of finfish, which amounted to 23,443,270 pounds during the period from Sept. 1, 1949 to June 30, 1950, were 9.4 million pounds less than in the previous year. However, receipts of shellfish, which amounted to \$1,489,206 pounds were 14.4 million pounds greater.

Car Kills Cow Crossing Highway

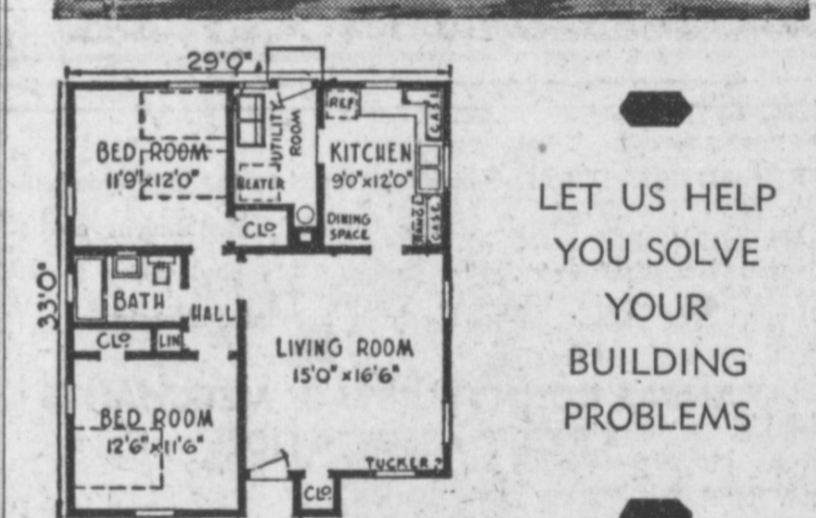
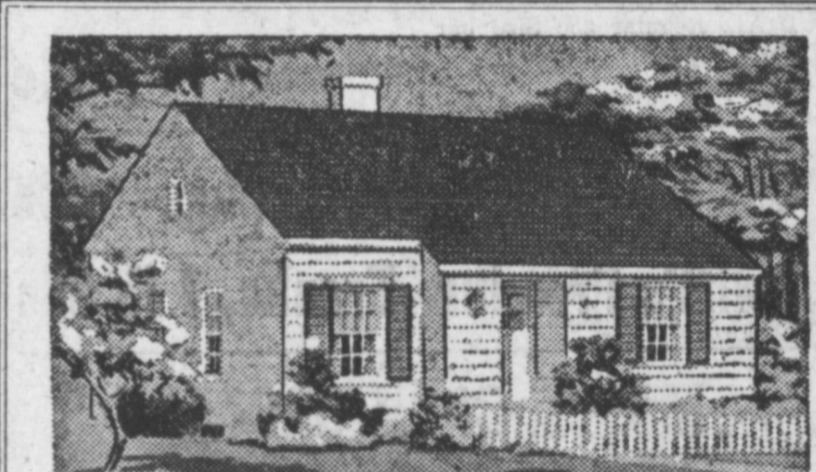
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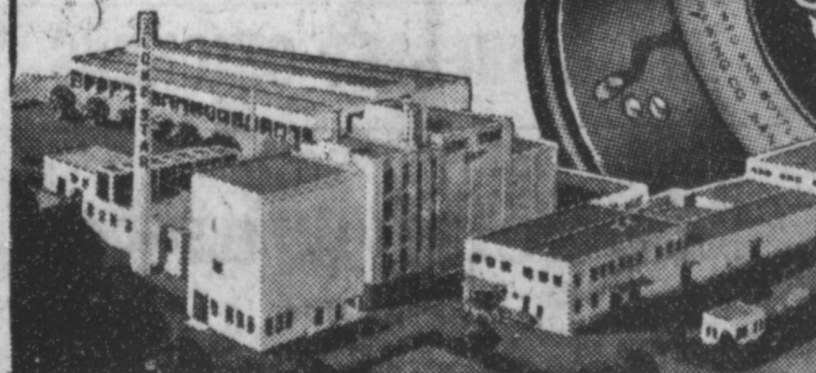

**Licenses Required To Sell Wild Game**

AUSTIN—More than 500 Texans have taken out game breeders licenses this year, the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission reported recently. The 531 figure for 1950 is almost double the 284 total for 1949.

The licenses cost \$2 and are required for all persons dealing in wild game. The same fee is necessary for persons obtaining a permit to keep wild game. The permits have to be renewed by August 31 of this year.

The Chief Clerk estimated that about 90 per cent of the residents obtaining the game breeding licenses raise pheasants. This is the only species which may be sold as food.

A few Texans raise migratory waterfowl which come under Federal regulations. Game breeders who raise them are required to have a permit from the United States Department of the Interior, Fish and Wildlife Service, Washington, D. C. as well as the regular \$2 state license.

The law stipulates: "Such a license does NOT entitle the holder to capture any of the wild game birds or wild animals of this state. He must procure his primary stock either from a game breeder in this state or from a game breeder in some other state or from the Republic of Mexico or from some other country."

Enclosures for "wild squirrels, wild prairie chickens, wild quail, wild chachalacas or wild pheasants shall not contain more than forty acres. For deer, antelope, turkey or any wild migratory bird, the enclosure shall not exceed three hundred twenty acres."

**Workers In Small Businesses Covered By Social Security**

All employers in business and industry, regardless of the size of the organization, come under the old-age and survivors insurance section of the Social Security Act. H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Corpus Christi office of the Social Security Administration, says that where there is only one employee, he has the same right to qualify for the retirement and family insurance as do workers in large manufacturing plants, provided, of course, that his employment is covered by the law.

There have been several instances in which older workers appeared not to have enough employment to qualify for the retirement benefits. "Sometimes they recall having worked for an employer who thought he did not need to report wages since he had only one or two employees," Cleveland said. "It is not always possible for such workers to get credit for unreported earnings as far back as the beginning of the Social Security Act. However, if the employer files proper returns for such past employment, or if the services have been performed within the past four years, the

after not more than 7 days thereafter.

**Vacancies In Office**

All vacancies in the office of navigation and canal commissioners for such districts shall be filled by appointment by the board itself for the unexpired term. In the event two vacancies occur at the same time, the remaining navigation and canal commissioners shall call a special election to fill such vacancies, and if he fails to do so within 15 days after such vacancies occur, or if the third place be vacant also, the judge of the District Court or Courts of the Judicial Districts in which such navigation district lies, upon the petition of any voter or creditor thereof, may order the holding of such election, fixing the date thereof and order the publication of notice of such election by the County Clerk of the county, and name the officers to hold such election. In any such election held by order of the district judge, the returns of election shall be made and filed in the office of the Clerk of the District Court, and he shall declare the result thereof.

The Navigation and Canal Commissioners of such districts shall each make and furnish a good and sufficient bond in the sum of \$10,000, payable to the district, conditioned upon the faithful performance of their duties as such navigation and canal commissioners.

A complete book of all accounts and records shall be kept by the district and annually in January of each year the County Auditor shall be employed to make a complete audit of such books and records and make a report thereon.

The report of such auditor shall be in triplicate, one copy to be filed in the office of the district, one with the depository of the district and one copy at the office of the County Auditor.
