Oil Activity In Area Continues

Aransas County Mud Flats Field chalked up a dry hole and a new start last week and has a deep hole coring.

Hewit and Dougherty No. 2 F. G. Gabriel was coring ahead at 9,427 feet Tuesday. Operators have cored almost continually for the past two weeks, but no tests have been made since an attempt at 9,123-38 feet failed. Location is in Lot 8, Section 48, Sixth Addition, Taft Farm Lands.

George W. Graham and Ryan, Hays and Burke who opened the Mud Flats Field late last year, had the new test and the dry hole.

The new test is the No. A-2 F. G. Gabriel, Block 48, Fifth Addition, set surface casing at 2,900 feet, drilled out Thursday night and was drilling ahead on a 9,000 foot contract.

These operators gave up their second try for production in their No. 2 D. W. Grant, after drilling to 8,703 feet in a sidetracked hole.

Earlier this year, the original hole at the No. 2 Grant drilled to a 9,504 feet and 5 1/2-inch casing was set at 9,050 feet, but numerous production attempts failed. Last month, the old hole was reentered and sidetracked to the south east toward the No. 1 Grant, Mud Flats oil discovery in the 6,700-foot zone. The No. 1 Grant also had been abandoned before it was drilled directionally for the oil discovery.

In the Virginia Field north of Lamar, Union Producing Co. still was trying to complete its second test, the No. 2 Virginia Taton, and had sidetracked its No. 1, deep oil discovery, for a directional hunt for production.

The No. 2 Taton was preparing to perforate an additional section, from 11,040-71 feet. Operators have swabbed oil and fresh water on perforations at 11,058-70 feet, but have been unable to make the well flow. The No. 1 Taton was drilling at 10,074 feet in sidetracked hole.

In the St. Charles Field, about four miles northeast of the Virginia Field, Western Natural Gas Co. was rigging up Friday for a 12,000-foot test at its No. 12 St. Charles Ranch, in the R. D. Blossman Survey, A-31.

Atlantic Refining Co. No. 6 State Tract 71, Copano Bay test in Fulton Beach Field, was at 1,550 feet, running 10 1/2-inch surface casing. The test spudded Aug. 8, and has a 16-inch conductor pipe set at 124 feet and is being drilled from the new barge owned by C. G. Glascock Drilling Co. of Corpus Christi.

Atlantic Refining Co. No. 3 V. G. Gwynn, Joseph Hollis Survey, A-76, Salt Lake Field, Aransas County, flowed 106.24 barrels of oil on potential test through 3-16-inch choke, under 300 pounds pressure on tubing, with casing sealed. Perforations were at 7,216-36 feet with 114 shots. Gravity was 41.4 degrees and gas-oil ratio was 1,100 to 1. Total depth was 8,003 feet, 5 1/2-inch casing was set at 7,954 feet and plug back depth was 7,933 feet.

Hunt Oil Co. No. 5 State Tract 72, Copano Bay, Fulton Beach Field, is 467 feet from the west line and 1,787 feet from the south line of State Tract 72, and is 1,320 feet south of No. 3 oil well. Contract depth is 7,500 feet.

William Herbert Hunt Trust Estate No. 6 F. G. Huffman, Fulton Beach Field, flowed 171.75 barrels of 41.8 gravity oil on potential test through 9-64 inch choke, under 950 pounds pressure on tubing with casing sealed. Twenty shot perforations were at 4,175-80 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 771-1. Total depth was 7,182 feet, and 5 1/2 inch casing was set on bottom.

The well is in the David Lockhard Survey, A-97.

In the Salt Lake Field, Phillips Petroleum Co. has scheduled an 8,000 foot test at No. 1 Huff (F. G. Huffman), 330 feet from the north and west lines of a 200-acre lease in the Joseph Hollis Survey, A-76. It scales about 300 feet north and slightly west of Nueve Oil Co. No. 1 F. G. Huffman, oil well producing through perforations at 7,168-78 feet, and 660 feet south southwest of William Herbert Hunt Trust Estate No. 1 Copano Unit No. 3, oil well which topped the sand at 7,942 feet.

Hunt Oil Co. Files Application For Pipeline

The Hunt Oil Company of Dallas has made an application to the Corps of Engineers to place a pipe line from their proposed well No. 5 in the southwest quarter of State Tract 72 southeastward to their tank batteries on Live Oak Peninsula.

The proposed line would be approximately 3,000 feet long and would be buried two feet below the bed of the bay.

The Atlantic Refining Co. and the Hunt Oil Co. have applied to the Corps of Engineers for a permit to drill oil wells on State Tracts 71 and 72, respectively.

The work would consist of the sinking of a drilling barge and the erection of a derrick thereon, the driving of eight single piles and four 3-pile dolphins, and the construction of a protective structure if the wells are productive. The derrick would have a top elevation of 132 feet above mean low tide.

\$425,000 School Bond Issue Fails By Four Vote Margin

Petition Calling For New Election Is Being Circulated In Rockport

A proposed bond issue of \$425,000 to construct a new high school for the Aransas County Independent School District was defeated Saturday by four votes. The vote was 171 against and 167 for the proposition.

The issue was defeated in the Rockport box where the count was 155 to 108 against the issuance of the bonds. Voters in the Fulton area favored the issue 45 to 12 and the vote at Lamar was 14 for and 4 against.

Roy Hinton May Run For Sheriff

With two-year-old charges of illegal poll tax payments against him dropped from the books, Roy Hinton strongly indicated Tuesday that he may be an independent candidate for county office in the November general election.

District Judge W. G. Gayle a week ago ordered eight 1948 cases charging illegal payment of poll taxes dropped. The cases included three styled the State of Texas vs. Jess Akers and Fred James, and five styled the State of Texas vs. Roy Hinton and Fred James.

Reason stated for dropping each case was that "it is no longer practicable to prosecute this case because necessary witnesses have disappeared and are no longer available to the state."

Hinton was a candidate for sheriff of Aransas County in 1948 and was defeated by Sheriff A. R. Curry by a margin of 80 votes. Hinton charged at the time that the poll tax fraud cases against him were aimed at wrecking his candidacy for sheriff.

Commenting on the cases Tuesday Hinton said:

"I think this (the dropping of the cases) completely exonerates me of all charges, and proves my contention that the whole proceedings were nothing but local politics to discourage and discredit my candidacy for sheriff."

Hinton said he did pay about 100 poll taxes for other people in 1948, but did so as "agent" in each case, and had written authorization to make each payment. Many of those he paid, Hinton recalled, were for fishermen who "thought they might be out fishing when the deadline for payment came around."

Hinton added that he paid quite a few poll taxes under similar circumstances this year. As in 1948, he said, he used a standard form headed "Application of Payment of Poll Tax by Appointment of Agent If Applicant Lives Outside of City of 10,000 inhabitants."

The one-time sheriff candidate brought up the subject of further political activity in Aransas County without definitely committing himself, but indications were that he might toss his hat in the ring come November.

Hinton said he did not vote in the July Democratic primary and planned to cast no vote in the second party primary Aug. 26.

"I have been asked," he said, "if I have any plans for running for a county office on an independent ticket in the general election. My answer is that I have no definite plans at this time."

"However," Hinton quickly added, "I'm not voting in the Democratic primaries, if that is any indication."

Hinton told the Pilot reporter today that he still insists that the poll tax charges were county politics and that the truthful law was withheld from the grand jury at the indictment.

P.-T.A. Plans Welcoming Party For Faculty

The Rockport P.-T.A. held its regular monthly meeting at the school auditorium Wednesday afternoon. Mrs. Harry Mills, president, presided.

The Executive Board reported their selection of standing committee chairmen and recommended giving a welcoming party on Sept. 5 for the Aransas County school faculty. Mrs. Chas. A. Roe, Sr., social chairman, will be in charge of the party.

The members voted not to back a petition calling for another bond election, because of its controversial nature.

The treasurer reported a balance of \$421.16. The next meeting will be held Sept. 20.

At a meeting of the school board Tuesday night the board canvassed the returns. The board stated that they were keenly disappointed over the returns in the Rockport precinct. The board had asked for the bond issue for the purpose of voting bonds for the construction of a new high school and for repair and additions to the present school plant.

Of the \$425,000 bond issue, approximately \$350,000 would have been used for the new high school plant. An additional \$35,000 would have gone for the purchase of equipment for the plant. Included in this bond issue was about \$35,000 to be used for repairs and additions to the present school plant. It was estimated that about \$7,500 would have been required for site acquisition and clearing and grading of the site.

The plans for the new school called for a gymnasium, auditorium, cafeteria, facilities for shop and science laboratories, as well as classrooms to accommodate 250 students.

Expansion of the school plant was deemed necessary by the board due to increased enrollment, which has more than doubled during the last two years.

In order to provide adequate educational facilities for the students, it was deemed imperative that additional classrooms be made available for these children.

The addition of a new high school would have made the Rockport elementary school available for the first six grades. Junior high school students would have occupied classrooms now being used by the high school. At the present they must hold their classes in the elementary school building.

At the Fulton school conditions are equally crowded. Funds in the bond issue were earmarked to provide two extra classrooms and a principal's office for this elementary school. Increased enrollment in this area demands that school facilities be enlarged.

A lack of equipment is as much in evidence throughout the school system as the lack of space. Needed facilities include better lighting, more film and reading material, and more desks.

Petition For New Election

A group of citizens of Rockport, realizing the necessity of improved facilities and believing that too many people did not vote, are circulating a petition asking for the purchase, construction, equipment or repair of the public free school buildings of material other than wood, and the necessary sites thereof, within the limits of the Aransas County District.

This petition asks that the school board call another bond issue election within 30 days. As the Pilot goes to press, such a petition has not been presented to the school board, therefore, no positive action has been taken on this matter.






