Hunt Oil Company Has 3 New Tests

Hunt Oil Co. has made a trio of 7,500-foot tests on State Tract 72, Copano Bay, Fulton Beach Field.

The No. 6-72 is 1,400 feet from the west line and 1,787 feet from the south line of the tract and 533 feet east of the No. 5. The No. 7-72 is 1,400 feet from the west line and 2,173 feet from the north line of the tract, 933 feet east of the No. 3, oiler, and 1,320 feet north of the No. 6. The No. 8-72 is 467 feet from the north line and 1,400 feet from the west line of the tract, 933 feet east of the No. 4, oiler, and 1,706 feet north of the No. 7. The 320-acre tract is about a mile north of Copano Village.

Hewitt and Dougherty No. 2, F. G. Gabriel, Lot 8, Section 48, Sixth Addition, Taft Farm Lands, Mud Flats Field was coring ahead at 9,755 feet. Coring has been almost continuous since 9,000 feet.

George W. Graham and Ryan, Hays and Burke No. A-2 F. G. Gabriel, Lot 6, Block 48, Fifth Addition, was drilling at 8,369 feet on a 9,700 foot contract. The same operators of No. 2 Margaret E. Davis, Lot 7, was drilling at 7,290 feet on a 8,600-foot test.

Quintana Petroleum Corp. No. 1 Bankers Mortgage Co. was coring ahead at 8,950 feet at last report. This test, in Lot 5, Block 49, Sixth Addition, Taft Farm Lands, is contracted to 12,000 feet. It has 10½-inch surface casing set at 2,764 feet.

In the Virginia Field area northeast of Lamar, Union Producing Co. continued to test its No. 2 Virginia Taton. Operators Saturday were coming out of the hole with test tool after drill stem test which was begun over two weeks ago on perforations at 11,040-71 feet.

The well had made an average of three barrels of fresh water, plus a tract of oil, hourly during the test. Total depth is 11,135 feet, and 5½ inch casing is set at 11,122 feet. The No. 1 Taton was drilling around 10,500 feet in a side tracked hole.

Atlantic Refining Co. was rigging up the No. 1 Stansbury Unit Friday for a new Salt Lake Field test in the center of Lot 52, Coleman-Fulton Pasture Co. Land Subdivision, Anselmo Begara Survey, A-14. It is south of Atlantic No. 1 V. G. Gwynn, field discovery.

In the Fulton Beach Field, Atlantic Refining Co. No. 6 State Tract 71, Copano Bay, was at 7,021 feet Friday, preparing to core ahead.

Western Natural Gas Co. No. 12 St. Charles Ranch Co., St. Charles Field test contracted to 12,000 feet. Friday was waiting on cement after setting 13 3/8 inch surface casing at 2,498 feet. It also had set 18-inch conductor pipe at 120 feet. The test is in the R. D. Blossman Survey 199, A-31, and is 2,000 feet northeast of No. 9 gas well.

Phillips Petroleum Co. Proposes To Dredge A Channel And Basin

The Phillips Petroleum Company of Houston has made an application to the Corps of Engineers for a permit to dredge a channel and basin to a depth 7 feet below mean low water in Copano Bay, in State Tract No. 15, central to a point approximately ½ mile northwest from Newcom Point and 10 miles north from Rockport.

The proposed basin, 200 feet by 200 feet, would be located at the site of applicant's proposed well No. Pano B-1, and the proposed channel would extend northward from the basin. The dredged material would be placed in the bay adjacent to the channel and basin.

Duck Bag Limit Raised To Five

President Truman signed the annual duck hunting regulations Wednesday. One of the changes this year was in the central flyway, where more waterfowl are expected, and the hunting bag limits increased.

The season on ducks will last 45 consecutive days, Nov. 3 to Dec. 17.

Bag limit is increased from four to five a day; possession limit from eight to ten. Bag and possession limits on geese remain essentially the same as last year.

In Texas, the season has been closed on black-bellied tree ducks. In Texas and Oklahoma, five geese may be taken, including not more than two Canada geese or two white-fronted geese or one Canada goose and one white-fronted goose.

Texas, New Mexico, and Oklahoma have a daily bag limit of 10 coots with possession limits the same.

Mourning or turtle doves—the bag and possession limit is 10. The season on these doves is as follows:

New Mexico, Sept. 1-Oct. 12; Oklahoma, Sept. 1-30; Texas, Valverde, Kinney, Uvalde, Medina, Bexar, Comal, Hays, Travis, Williamson, Milam, Robertson, Leon, Houston, Cherokee, Nacogdoches and Shelby counties and all counties north and west thereof, Sept. 1 to Oct. 15; in the rest of the state (but not including Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr, Zapata, Webb, Maverick, Dimmitt, La Salle, Jim Hogg, Brooks, Kennedy and Willacy counties), Oct. 20 to Dec. 3. From one half hour before sunrise to sunset; in these latter counties, Sept. 15, 17 and 19 from four p.m. until sunset and from Oct. 20 to Nov. 30 from one half hour before sunrise to sunset.

White-winged doves in Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr, Zapata, Webb, Maverick, Kennedy, Dimmitt, La Salle, Jim Hogg, Brooks, Kenney, Willacy, Valverde, Terrell, Brewster, Presidio, Jeff Davis, Culberson, Hudspeth and El Paso counties, Sept. 15, 17 and 19 from 4 p.m. until sunset; daily bag and possession for white-winged or mourning doves is not more than 10 singly or in the aggregate of both kinds; no open season in the rest of the state.

C. of C. to Make Counter-Protest Over Canal Route

The directors of the Chamber of Commerce met with the city and county officials Tuesday afternoon at the City Hall to discuss the protest that the National Audubon Society has filed against the proposed re-routing of the Intracoastal Canal along the Aransas Bay shore.

A letter from the president of the National Audubon Society suggests the re-routing of the canal approximately through Trout Bay to a point near the carbon black plant and then parallel to the shore. The route approved by the Corps of Engineers goes through Turtle Cove and along the shore of Aransas Bay behind the chain of islands.

The Chamber of Commerce and other civic groups favor the approved route, because Aransas County would derive almost no benefits from the other route, and would be almost completely missed by such a route.

Weldon Cabaniss, president of the Chamber, was authorized to contact the district engineer in Galveston to get more information on the protest, so that the Chamber of Commerce may make a counter-protest.

The Chamber of Commerce was joined by the county officials and unofficially by the city officials in this action.

Construction of a new high school and for the repair and additions to the present school plant.

The proposed new high school plant would be just north of the Rockport city limits west of highway 35. The site for the plant would comprise about 30 acres in the southwest part of a tract known as the Denver Heights Addition, which is located a few hundred feet north of the Rockport city limits. This tract takes in blocks 17 through 23 and blocks 28 through 31. About two-thirds of this property is owned by the county. The school board hopes to acquire the balance of the property by exchange for other lots in the Denver Heights Addition, which are also owned by the county. The county has given the board a 120-day option to purchase this property to be used to exchange for the desired lots.

Of the \$425,000 bond issue, approximately \$350,000 would be used for the new high school plant. An additional \$35,000 would be earmarked to purchase equipment for the plant. Included in the bond issue is about \$35,000 to be used for repairs and additions to the present plant. It is estimated that about \$7,500 would be required for site acquisition and clearing and grading of the site.

The plans for the new school call for a gymnasium, auditorium, cafeteria, facilities for shop and science laboratories, as well as classrooms to accommodate 250 students.

Expansion of the school plant is deemed necessary by the board due to increased enrollment, which has more than doubled during the last two years. In order to provide adequate educational facilities for the students, it is deemed imperative that additional classrooms be made available for these children.

If adequate facilities are to be provided for the increased enrollment Aransas County voters have no alternative but to vote for the issue. Any person who has rendered real or personal property and has paid his poll tax is qualified to vote in this election.

Persons desiring absentee ballots may secure them from Miss Iris Sorenson at the school, according to the board. The last day for voting absentee will be Sept. 12.

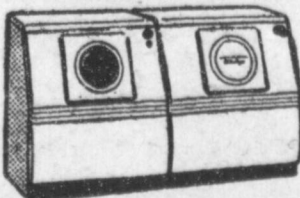

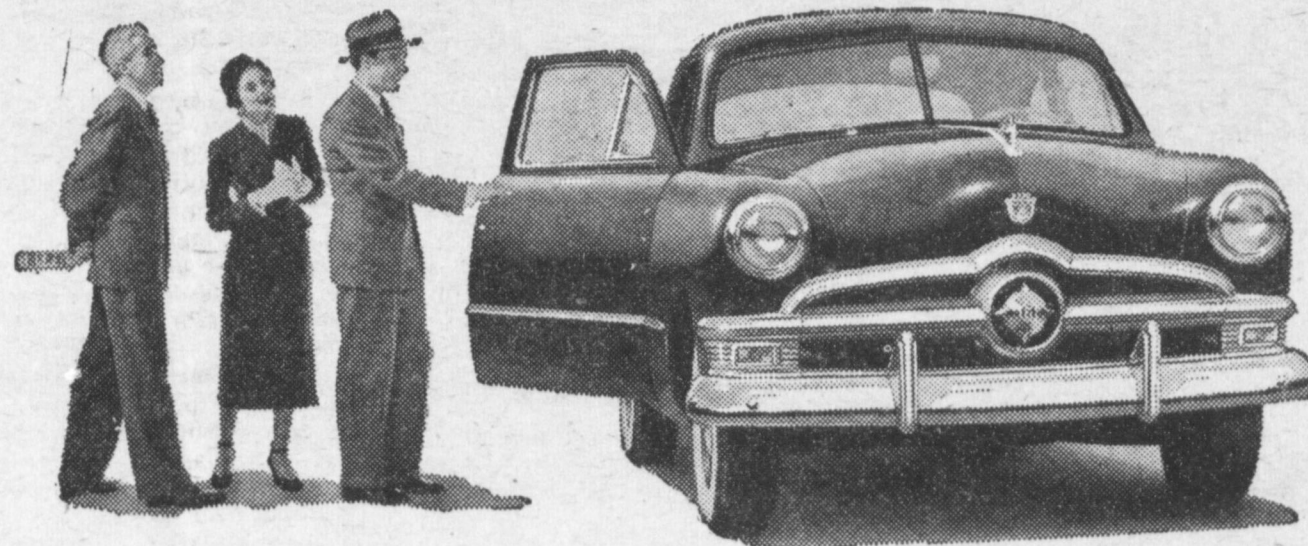

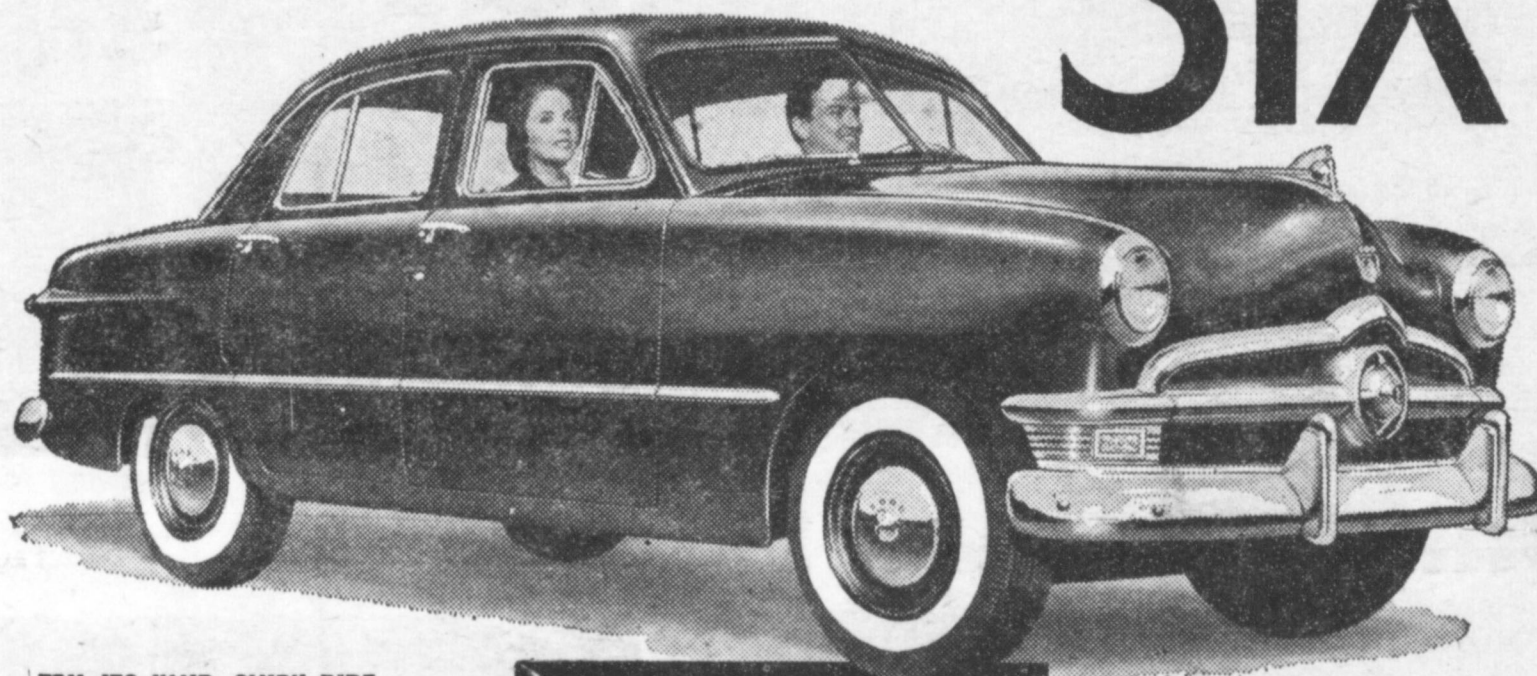

Floyd Huffman To Join In Grass Experiment

F. G. Huffman has indicated that he will try as an experiment one or more acres of a new pangola grass either this fall or spring, reports show coming from the agriculture department of the Houston Chamber of Commerce. Pangola grass is being brought to Texas by members of the agriculture committee of the Houston Chamber of Commerce and the Houston Farm and Ranch Club, who sponsored a tour to Florida recently by 40 agricultural workers from East Texas to see the grass growing on thousands of

acres throughout central Florida. Coming from South Africa, the grass has done well on the sandy wet soils typical of central Florida and had been carrying as much as one head per acre in many instances. Orders for enough grass to plant one acre for an experiment are being taken by the agricultural department of the Chamber of Commerce, P. O. Box 2371, Houston, Texas. Orders will be filled for both fall and spring delivery; fall delivery will be made about October 1 and spring delivery during May. Deadline for fall orders is September 15.

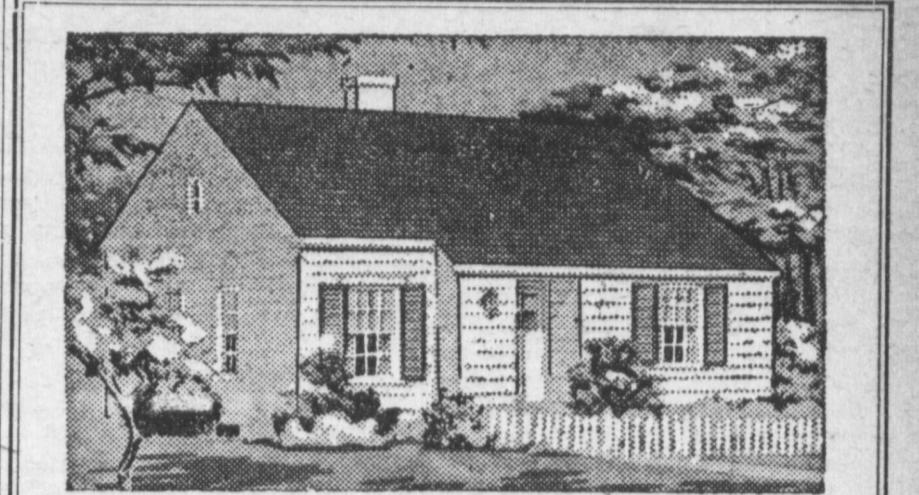

AUSTIN—Manufacture of dairy products in Texas slid 2 per cent from June to 81,505 ponds of milk equivalent in July, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

In comparison with July 1949, manufacture of dairy products stepped up 1 per cent in July 1950.

Production of creamery butter was up 4 per cent in July from June, while American cheese and ice cream production rose 9 and 7 per cent, respectively.

Mrs. Jack Hagar Noted As Authority On Texas Bird Life

Mrs. Jack Hagar, an authority on bird life in the Gulf Coast area, is the subject of a magazine article by Fred D. Thompson in the August issue of the Texas Game and Fish publication.

Mrs. Hagar, a native of Corsicana, has studied the wide variety of birds in the Rockport area for the past 16 years, and her articles in various publications on that subject have gained for her considerable recognition in this field.

Mr. and Mrs. Hagar are the owners of the Rockport Cottages, which are frequented mainly by ornithologists from all parts of the United States.

Mrs. Hagar's observations have overturned several pet theories of migration routes held by men high in the field of ornithology, the article says. She has added six birds to the Texas state list: the shearwater, the Lucy warbler, the great white heron, Wurdemann's heron, American scoter, and the harlequin duck.

Navy Announces Plans For Calling Reservists

Orders are still orders in the Navy. When you get 'em, you've got to go; even though some hard-hit naval reservists may get temporary delays in reporting for active duty.

That is the word from Eighth Naval District headquarters in New Orleans, which controls naval reserve affairs in Arkansas, Louisiana, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas.

Ten days, including travel, are usually allowed for recalled reservists to report, Rear Admiral W. K. Phillips, USN, district commandant, said.

In exceptional cases longer periods are being granted, but each case is carefully considered by a board of senior officers and no delays are granted for more than six months. The average is much less, the Admiral said.

Requests for deferment must be submitted in writing within 48 hours after orders are received, he warned. Department of Defense policy, announced in Washington several weeks ago, is close-

Fishery Landings At Texas Ports Show Increase

Landings of fishery products at Texas ports during July amounted to 13,390,294 pounds compared with 7,646,856 pounds for the same month the previous year, according to figures released by the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission and the Department of Interior.

The catch of menhaden (10,997,280 pounds), and shrimp (2,176,349 pounds) accounted for 98 per cent of the Texas production during July. Receipts of menhaden were 4.9 million pounds more than in July, 1949, and those of shrimp were .9 million pounds greater.

During the first eleven months of the fiscal year (beginning September 1), landings at Texas ports totaled 68,322,770 pounds, 12 per cent greater than the poundage received during the same period the previous year. Landings of finfish, which amounted to 34,657,215 pounds during the period September 1, 1949, to July 31, 1950, were 4.5 million pounds less than in the previous year. However, receipts of shellfish, which amounted to 33,665,555 pounds were 15.2 million pounds greater.

The decline in receipts of finfish resulted from reduced landings of menhaden which amounted to 31.7 million pounds compared with 36.1 million pounds during the first eleven months of the previous year. The gain in the production of shellfish was caused by record landings of shrimp, during the period from September to July inclusive, which amounted to 33.6 million pounds compared with 18.3 million pounds in the same period the previous year.

Landings from Gulf waters accounted for 99 per cent of the Texas catch during July. The remaining 1 per cent was taken from the bays of the state. Menhaden accounted for 83 per cent and shrimp 16 per cent of the catch taken in the Gulf waters.

The policy covers extreme hardship cases, key personnel in essential industry, scientific graduate students and research technicians and students who may be, depending on the merits of each case, deferred until the end of a school term.

"Don't rest easy because you've requested a deferment," Rear Admiral Phillips counseled. Reservists whose requests are denied or who fail to receive replies in time must comply with orders, he said.

Procedure has been set up, he added, to release eligibles to inactive duty if they appeal their cases after reporting for duty.

Written requests for deferment of recall should be sent via the same chain of command through which they were issued, it was announced.
