Mr. and Mrs. Rudolph Brunner and Mr. and Mrs. Bob Spake of Dallas fished with Bill Crist Saturday. They brought in 179 fish which included trout, redfish, one pompano and one large sheepshead.

H. C. Floyd and Mr. Nichols fished at Mud Island Tuesday and landed 39 trout.

Slight Increase Shown in Aransas School Enrollment

Enrollment for schools in the Aransas County Independent School District totaled 668 at the close of registration Tuesday.

A slight increase in enrollment at the Rockport grade school was reported. The enrollment this year is 445 compared to 437 at the close of the school term last year. There was a slight decrease in the enrollment at the high school. Figures show 143 high school students registered as compared with 148 at the close of the 1949-50 school term. Last year's figures will be equalled if not passed in the next few days, however, as it was reported that several students are known not to have registered Tuesday that intend to enter high school here this term. Eighty students enrolled in the Fulton grade school Tuesday.

A steady increase in enrollment has been recorded during the last ten years. The increase has not been great for any one year but figures show that during the past 10 years enrollment has doubled.

Shop work will be set up in the school this year and the commercial department is being expanded. Supt. J. F. Harbin said. The vocational program is planned to give the best training possible, Harbin explained, and the school board is working on plans to offer a complete four year shop course to the students. This work will be under the supervision of Phillip Baldwin, who holds a Smith-Hughes certificate.

Bookkeeping and second year typing have been added to the commercial courses offered at the high school. Chas. Roe Jr. will teach these courses. A wider range of mathematics courses is also being offered, Mr. Harbin said.

Two types of diplomas are offered in the high school program. Approximately 55 per cent of the students plan to continue their studies in college and pursue regular academic courses throughout. The vocational program of the school is planned to take care of the remaining 45 per cent who plan to work upon graduation. The vocational diploma is available to members of this group who desire it, Harbin reported.

Two cars were damaged in an accident which occurred at the intersection of Austin and Laurel Streets in North Rockport Monday afternoon about 3 p. m.

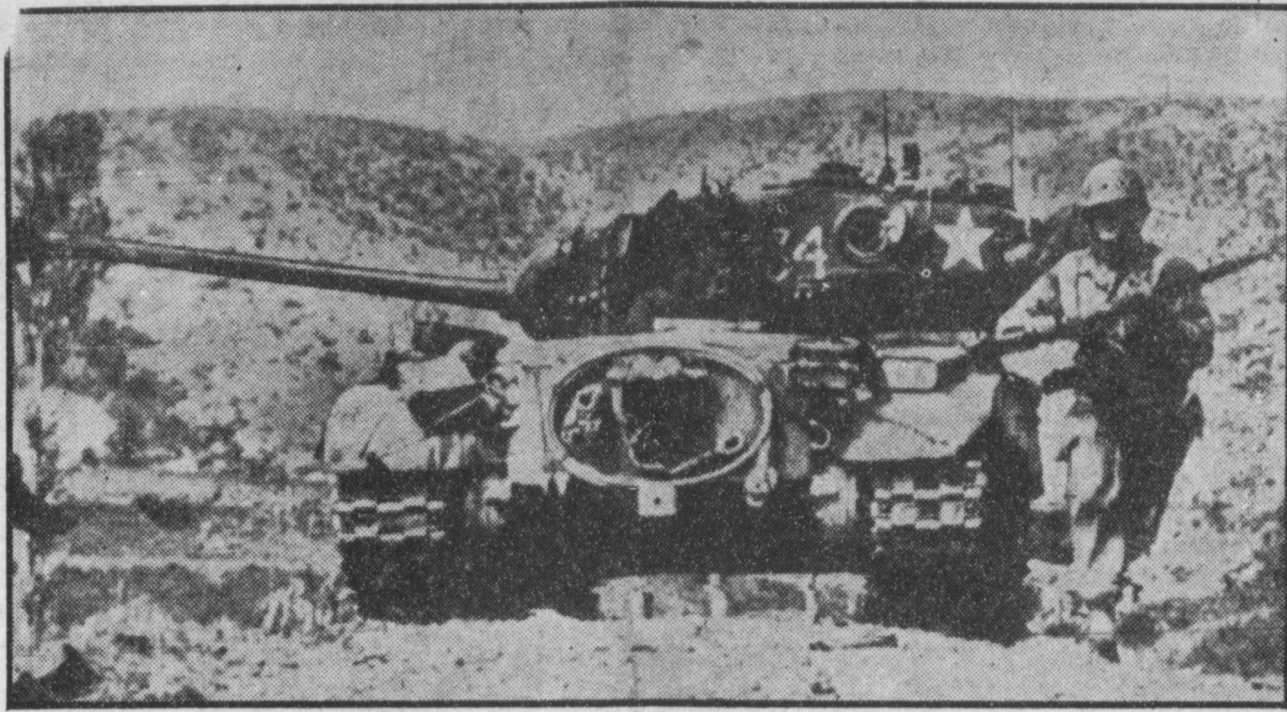

Landscaping Details Get Underway at Woman's Club Building

Val Flint Buried in Arizona Wednesday

Funeral services were held at the Sacred Heart Church in Tombstone, Arizona, Wednesday, Aug. 30, for Valentine W. Flint, 59, who died early in the week.

Death ended many months of suffering for Mr. Flint who had been ill for several years.

Born in St. Paul, Minn., in 1891, Mr. Flint went to Tombstone three years ago. Prior to that he had resided in Rockport for a period of ten years.

He was a disabled war veteran from World War I. After his discharge from the armed service in 1919, he worked as a police investigator for several firms. During later years his health prohibited him from working much of the time.

Burial was in Tombstone Cemetery.

Survivors include his widow, Mary of that city; a daughter, Margaret of Chicago; and a sister, Gertrude Hoffman, Racine, Wis.

Judge Gayle Hears Criminal Cases

The grand jury for the September term of 36th District Court which convened Monday morning, returned three true bills Tuesday morning.

Indicted were Boyd A. Rogers on a charge of passing a \$6,000 worthless check; Ray Giles, charged with passing a forged instrument; and James Lloyd Moore, Bill Allen Cade and one other, not yet arrested, charged with burglary with intent to commit theft.

Moore and Cade plead guilty to the charge against them Tuesday and were given three-year terms in the penitentiary. Judge Gayle released the men on probation on condition that they make restitution, remain gainfully employed, support their dependents and pay the cost of their prosecution. They were paroled in the custody of Sheriff A. R. Curry.

Wednesday morning E. A. Nichols plead guilty to charges of assault with intent to murder. He was found guilty and assessed at five years in the penitentiary with sentence suspended.

Rogers plead guilty to the charge of defrauding by giving a worthless check. He was found guilty by the court and Judge Gayle assessed penalty of five years confinement in the penitentiary. Sentence was held in abeyance.

Ray Giles plead guilty to charges of passing a forged instrument in writing as true in court Wednesday afternoon. He was found guilty by the court and punishment was assessed by Judge Gayle at two years in the penitentiary.

Two cases are scheduled on the civil docket for next week. To be heard Monday morning, Sept. 11, is the damage suit of Hannah Lucille Smith and Dorothy Ellen Smith, minors by guardian Tom W. Smith, legally appointed, vs. Continental Bus System, Inc. and Edgar N. Dotson.

Another damage suit scheduled for Monday is that of L. L. Stargis vs. Carl Mahler.

Civil suits tried this week included a trespass to try title suit of Floy Mossman Cron vs. Rosa McCamey. Judgment was rendered in favor of the plaintiff against the defendants who answered by default and against the defendants cited by publication for the title over possession of the land described in the plaintiffs petition. Judgment is to be rendered Sept. 8, in the damage suit of A. L. Bracht vs. F. A. Johnson, Sr., et al. A plea of privilege was overruled and ruling excepted to and notice of appeal was given in open court.

Other civil suits scheduled for next week are those of Wm. J. Collins vs. A. G. Collin, trespass to try title; and E. G. Wentworth vs. Wm. Seipel et al, trespass to try title. The damage suit of W. P. Morrison vs. Glenn Ellis was set for Sept. 7, on Monday.

Mud Flats Test Makes Oil and Gas

Hewitt and Dougherty No. 2 F. G. Gabriel in the Mud Flats Field has made oil on two tests and gas on a third, on perforations made over the weekend and the first of the week. Tuesday the well was flowing at the rate of 130 odd barrels of oil daily, through the test tool, from perforations at 8,866-76 feet, and had flowed in 28 minutes under 795 pounds pressure.

Monday, the Hewitt and Dougherty well on drill stem test on perforations at 8,806-14 feet, recovered 100 feet of distillate. Bottom hole pressures were 3,820 and 4,175 pounds. Earlier, on perforations at 8,473-82 feet, top pressure was 1,525 pounds and the well made 95 barrels of oil in 12 hours. Bottom hole pressures were 3,750 and 3,870 pounds. The test is in Lot 8, Section 48, Sixth Addition, Taft Farm lands. Total depth is 9,800 feet and casing is set at 8,950 feet.

Atlantic Refining Co. has made another new location in Copano Bay, State Tract 71, about one mile south from Fish Point. Location is about 650 feet from the west line and 3,350 feet from the south line of State Tract 71.

Difficulties continued to plague Union Producing Company's No. 2 Virginia Tattin, deep wildcat four miles north of the Lamar Field, last week. Operators fished for tubing during the week after losing about half of it in the hole while pulling test tool after a long drill stem test on perforations at 11,040-71 feet. The No. 1 Tattin, discovery oiler now being reworked, was drilling at 10,886 feet Friday in sidetracked hole.

Hunt Oil Co. proposes to place 2 1/2 inch pipe lines from their new locations in Copano Bay to their tank batteries on Live Oak Peninsula. The lines would be buried two feet below the bed of the bay and would lead to Wells No. 6, 7, and 8, which are located in State Tract No. 71 and 72.

A deep wildcat northeast of production in the Mud Flats Field is scheduled. George W. Graham and Ryan, Hays and Burke, who discovered the Mud Flats Field, will drill the wildcat for that area at their No. 1 George Easley, which probably will go to around 10,000 feet. Location is 1,700 feet west of the Bayside Highway in Section 47, Fifth Subdivision, Taft Farm Lands, 5,081 feet north of the most southerly section line, and 660 feet from the Copano Bay shoreline. It is about 1 1/2 miles northeast of production.

Pirate Coach Discusses 1950 Squad Prospects

Coach Chas. Roe, Jr., sounded a pessimistic note in regard to the prospects for the Rockport football team this year, when he spoke to members of the Rotary Club at their luncheon meeting Wednesday.

Roe said that the nucleus of the club will be the four returning lettermen: Gene Sprinkle, Max Keller, Bob Little and Ozzie Williams. The six squadmen returning will probably see a lot of action in this year's games as well as several newcomers.

Chas. Garrett was mentioned as a freshman who will probably see action in the backfield this year and the coach expressed an opinion that he may be another "Woody" Hunt by the time he is a senior. John Silberisen was listed as another newcomer to the Pirate squad who would possibly see a great deal of action this year.

Coach Roe said that the support received from the towns people last year was appreciated and that it is hoped the support will continue this year. The first game scheduled for the year will be with Port Lavaca Sept. 15.

Roe also outlined changes in the rules of the game which have been established since last year.

Mr. Wheeler resigned his post in Beeville on June 1 to make the race for county school superintendent. After losing the contest, he contacted the directors of the Kerrville body where the managership was open.

Details for New Ship Channel Discussed at Meet

Rasmuer Miller, attorney with the Army Corps of Engineers at the Galveston office, was in Rockport last week to work out preliminary details for securing right of way titles for the Rockport-Aransas Pass cut-off channel.

He met with Fred Percival, abstractor and surveyor; Weldon Cabaniss, attorney and president of the chamber of commerce; Emory Spencer, attorney, and R. D. Hatch, city attorney of Aransas Pass.

Miller brought a map to the meeting showing all areas above mean low tide on the proposed route that will be needed for the channel and for disposal of spoils.

Fred Percival will correlate the engineer's map with an ownership map to provide information necessary to secure deeds and easement to the property.

Information available at this time indicates that securing deeds and easements on the land above mean high tide is all that stands in the way of a "go ahead" order on the proposed channel.

As mapped by the engineers, the cut-off channel will enter Aransas Bay near Turtle Bayou at Rockport and parallel the shoreline, joining the Corpus Christi ship channel.

The channel will be standardized with the Intracoastal Canal system, dredged to a depth of 12 feet with a bottom width of 125 feet. It will be approximately 17 miles long.

Proponents of the new channel say it will cut three miles off the route of ships coming to Corpus Christi from eastern ports and will help relieve congestion at Port Aransas.

The sum borrowed from the Chamber of Commerce early in the season to install the lights was repaid last month.

Park Board Shows Balance in Treasury At Close of Season

Figures at the close of the softball season here reveal that 50 games were played at the ball park and that there is a balance of \$130.97 in the treasury, Fred Bracht, park chairman, reported this week.

Receipts for the 50 games amounted to \$501.22, he said. In addition to this \$275.00 was borrowed from the Chamber of Commerce to get the field ready for play early in the season. Expenses for the season, including the borrowed sum, amounted to \$645.25.

Many of the expenditures required to get the field in shape this year will not be necessary next year, such as installation of the lighting system. It is planned to install bleachers at the park at the beginning of the 1951 season, Mr. Bracht said.

The ball park, which the city and county officials cooperated to provide, was in operation for the first time this year. Fred Bracht was named to head the park board.

The board has carried out its original plan of using the revenue derived from use of the park to pay for expenses incurred and improvements.

State Safety Director Urges Inspection of Motor Vehicles

The international crisis has a direct bearing on this country's traffic safety record. That was the opinion expressed today by Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, in appealing to Texas motorists for an immediate check on the mechanical condition of their vehicles.

"It is imperative," said Garrison, "that each Texan do his utmost toward helping to maintain and conserve the resources of this nation." An important portion of those resources, he indicated, is the thousands of motor vehicles which are operated daily in this state. He urged all car owners to have their vehicles inspected regularly for mechanical defects.

"Worn out and defective automobiles," the director emphasized, "are conducive to increased traffic mishaps. By periodic inspections we are serving a dual purpose. First, we assure ourselves of continued transportation in case controls or restrictions are placed on motoring, and, second, we make a decided contribution toward greater traffic safety, thus assisting in the conservation of our human resources."

Corsicana Offers Bid to Fame in Ornithology World

(Editors note: Corsicana recently claimed a bid to fame in the ornithology world through Mrs. Jack Hagar. The following article paying tribute to Mrs. Hagar appeared in the Corsicana, Tex., Daily Sun Saturday):

Corsicana's bid to fame in the world of ornithology, Mrs. Jack Hagar of Rockport, is still receiving the plaudits of her many friends upon the outstanding tribute paid to her in a recent issue of "Texas Game and Fish," a monthly magazine devoted to the protection and conservation of native game and fish. Mention of the article in these columns recently revealed that leading ornithologists of the United States, as well as many in-between students and rank amateurs have beaten a path to "Miss Connie's" door—all because of the intelligent interest she has shown in bird life of the Rockport area.

The popularity of the Rockport Cottages, which are owned by Mr. and Mrs. Hagar and which are visited by Corsicana vacationists each season, was mentioned in the article by Fred D. Thompson who declared that "Rockport's bird festival—wave upon wave of land, shore and water birds going or coming to their seasonal nesting or wintering grounds—is a year-round show in Rockport."

Bird Capital of World

Continuing his tribute to the former Corsicanan, Mr. Thompson says "Connie Hagar is a tiny, dainty but not prissy individual of 93 pounds with a sharp, well-trained mind. She impresses beginning birders with the necessity of thoroughness and accuracy. Every morning and every evening for about 16 years she has been observing and studying birds along the Rockport beaches, in the grove of 252 beautiful hurricane-swept live oak trees in the really spacious backyard of their 11 acre tract, and on the wet prairies of the surrounding area.

"In those years she has identified 477 species and sub-species of birds, more than ever have been reported from any Texas locality by an yone individual. Her observations have overturned several pet theories of migration routes held by men high in the field of ornithology. Some of her discoveries were of birds that "didn't belong there" under any circumstances. But her reports were so

persistent and well-authenticated that finally some of the high ornithological brass had to make personal trips to Rockport to investigate. That is how the year-round "migration wave" of ornithologists to Connie Hagar's place started. There may be other spots along the Texas coast just as rich in bird life, or richer. But until they produce a Connie Hagar to make that fact known, Rockport will remain not only the bird capital of Texas, but one of the bird capitals of the entire world."

The writer reports that mid-April found eighteen ornithologists from Purdue, the University of Illinois and Kansas State, housed in the Hagar Cottages.

In a discussion of Mrs. Hagar's educational background, the writer of the recent article declared that she has used her formal education not as a retreat to self-satisfaction but as a doormat to further maturity. Any bird con-

versation one has with her might at any moment branch off into philosophy, literature, music, politics (rarely), trees, flowers and other vegetation and even seashells, of which she is said to have a remarkable knowledge. Every Sunday she plays the organ at the Christian Science church at Aransas Pass, but she does not belong to that or any other church. She says Nature, not men, preaches the best sermons.

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Parents at Rockport School Will Have Opportunity to Judge New System of Grading This Year

A new system of reporting to parents will be initiated in one of the grades of the Rockport school this year, Supt. J. F. Harbin reported this week.

A new system of reporting to parents will be tried in addition to the A, B, C, report card which parents will continue to receive.

The new conference system will be carried out in cooperation with the parents. At the close of the school term parents will be asked to determine the method of marking which they deem best for their child.

It is every parent's privilege and responsibility to know the progress his child is making in school. Hence it becomes necessary for a school to make definite plans for reporting to parents. It is felt that the social adjustments of a child can best be reported in

conferences with the parents where appeal can be made for co-operation and causes for weaknesses can be determined jointly. The new conference method is an effort to report individual pupil progress, other than social and emotional, with elimination of the comparative marking system.

The teacher of the grade chosen to use both systems of reporting to parents will schedule conferences with parents of all children in that section on an individual basis twice each year. At this time the teacher will indicate to the parent social and emotional progress, academic growth, and other factors about which parents need to be advised. The teacher will have specimens of children's work in the various subject fields for showing to parents as concrete

evidence of growth in these areas. The conference system of grading provides a closer relationship between parent-teacher and student.

The following points can be listed as advantages of the conference method over the A, B, C, report card system which is used throughout the system at the present time:

1. The teacher provides samples of the child's work which have been accumulated over a period of time in order to show progress.
2. The teacher is prepared to discuss in detail any marked deficiency in the child's work. For example, lack of muscular coordination, very slow reading, etc.
3. The teacher is prepared to emphasize sincerely the child's assets.
4. The teacher is prepared to indicate orally to the parents the general achievement of each child, indicating whether it is better than, consistent with, or less than could be expected in light of what the school knows about the child.

It gives the teacher and parent an opportunity to give each other information regarding the child's emotional and social problems at home and at school.

Parents will be given an opportunity to acquaint themselves with this method of reporting and at the same time receive the report card with the A, B, C method at the close of each six weeks. At the close of the school term they will be requested to indicate the method of grading which they believe to be best for the child.



Last night Squint dropped by the house. Over a friendly glass of beer, he tells me what he's done. "I put a couple of empty oil drums

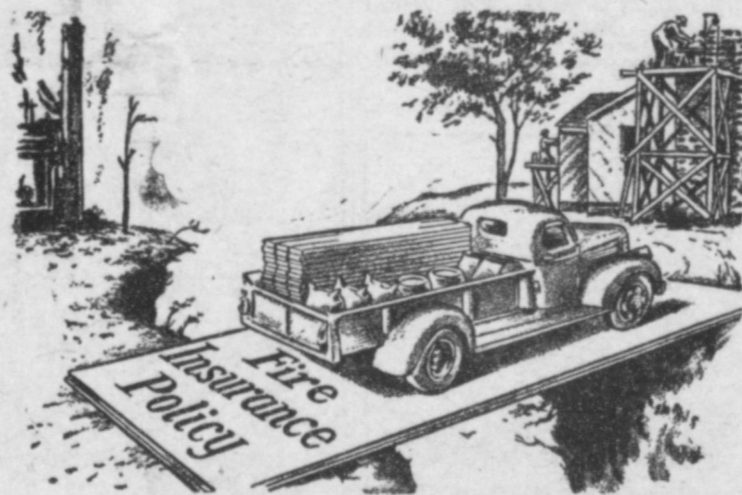
