## Rotary Speaker Discussed Vocational Rehabilitation

D. D. Steele, vocational rehabilitation counselor of the Corpus Christi district, State Board of Education, discussed the training program designed to restore handicapped individuals to useful and profitable employments at the Rotary luncheon Wednesday.

Mr. Steele also presented a film which showed that many physical or mental handicaps can be removed through vocational rehabilitation services. Many others can be reduced to the point where they do not interfere with the work demands of a properly selected job. When the disability has been properly treated and the person properly trained for and placed in the right job, he can do that job as well as anybody. Production records of thousands of physically and mentally handicapped persons in wartime industry prove this.

Mr. Steele outlined the steps in vocational rehabilitation. There are 307 cases receiving assistance and training under the program in the nine county area at the present time. It is strictly a civilian program for the people of the State of Texas.

It is first necessary for the counselor to determine what the individual can do. Then training for clients is purchased or obtained from colleges, trade schools, correspondence courses and tutors. ## Construction of Channel and Wharf Near Copano Causeway Proposed

Travis Bailey has made application to dredge an L-shaped channel in Aransas Bay, adjacent to the southeast side of the southwest end of the Texas Highway 35 causeway between Live Oak and Lamar Peninsulas.

The channel would be dredged to a depth of 6 feet below mean low tide and six mooring piles would be driven to construct a wharf. The proposed channel, 1000 feet long and 60 to 80 feet wide, would be located approximately 350 feet from and parallel to Texas Highway 35 for a distance of 700 feet.

The short leg of the channel would be located approximately 75 feet from and parallel to the shell road that intersects the highway 1,600 feet southwest from the southwest end of the causeway. The dredged material would be placed on shore.

The proposed wharf, 50 feet long and 20 feet wide, would be located at the shoreward end of the slip adjacent to the shell road and would be located at the shoreward end of the slip adjacent to the shell road and would have a deck elevation of 5 feet above mean low tide. The proposed mooring piles would be located in line with the channelward face of the wharf and would have a top elevation of 9 feet above mean low tide.

Alex Scott and Jack Horton, representing the Tourist Bureau of the Chamber of Commerce, met with the Woman's Club board of directors Wednesday night and discussed plans for entertaining winter tourists this year.

A plan was devised whereby the Woman's Club would take over the responsibility of giving the parties and the Tourist Bureau would continue to finance them. In former years the bureau has taken the entire responsibility for the affairs which have become customary during the winter months.

A tentative schedule was set up which would insure one afternoon card party per week for the ladies and one evening party per week for both the visiting ladies and their husbands. These parties will be held at the Woman's Club building during the months of December, January and February.

Members of the Tourist Bureau will continue to be on hand to assist with the parties, though all arrangements for them will be taken over by the Woman's Club.

## School Bond Issue Defeated In Second Election by 47 Vote Margin

School Board Seeks to Determine Will of Majority Before Making Future Plans

The proposed bond issue of \$425,000 to construct a new high school as well as make repairs and additions to the present plant for the Aransas County Independent School District suffered defeat by a 47 vote margin in the second election which was held last Saturday.

In Rockport 215 votes were cast for the issue and 274 votes against. At the Fulton box 57 persons cast their vote

for the issuance of bonds with 44 against. Nine persons at Lamar were against the issue and eight favored it.

In the first election, which was held Aug. 12 on the same proposal, the issue was defeated by four votes.

The school board had offered the \$425,000 bond issue as a solution to the problem of providing adequate facilities for the increasing enrollment which has doubled during the past 10 years.

Hugh Morrison, president of the board, said this week that the same problem still faces the board but that future plans will be held in abeyance until the board has determined what the majority of the people desire. Letters from persons who have changes to suggest in the plan proposed by the board will be welcome, he said. It still may be possible to work out a solution to the problem and have construction on the needed facilities completed by the next school term, Morrison believed. In the meantime, however, needed repairs will have to be made to the present school plant. Funds to make these repairs were included in the bond issue, but since they will not be available from this source, will have to be arranged for elsewhere.

The school board met Tuesday night to canvas the election returns and discuss the problem which faces them.

## Construction On Hospital Addition Gets Underway

Construction started last weekend on a three room addition to the Rockport hospital. Plans also call for the erection of a two car garage with an apartment upstairs. The addition will be separate from the present building.

The annex will be constructed of concrete masonry and block. The apartment, which Dr. and Mrs. L. G. Wood will occupy as living quarters, will consist of a large living room, kitchen, two bedrooms, bath, and porch overlooking the bay. M. W. Cochran is the contractor.

K. Theodore announced this week that he will open a grill in the new 25 by 40 foot concrete block building which is now under construction on Austin Street. Mr. Theodore said that the small grill will be located at the front of the building, the interior of which will be finished with knotty pine wainscoting. He will do the cooking for the eating establishment and hopes to be open for business in about a month. The north side of the new building, 10 by 25 feet, will be available for shop space, he said.

Thomas Blackwell was issued a permit at the city hall this week to make a 10 by 22 foot frame addition to the south side of his present dwelling located on lots 9 and 10, block 29, Smith and Wood.

Ran Wilde obtained a building permit Sept. 1 to erect a four unit building. The 78 by 20 foot frame-stucco building will be located on outlot 7, Doughty and Mathis.

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### IS IT STILL HONORABLE TO WORK

Most people who have attained the age of fifty were reared in homes by hard-working, God-fearing parents who believed that it was honorable and noble to work. Just to have a job or to operate a small business out of which they could gain a livelihood and provide for the necessities—and perhaps a few of the small hazards of life—that was considered a privilege.

Those parents didn't know much about such modern social and political trends as the Welfare State, and Social Security was a state of being which a man created for himself by dint of hard work, thrift and due diligence.

They didn't know much about Free Enterprise, either. But their philosophy of life was expressed in the belief that men were entitled only to that which they earned—that a man's home is his castle—that virtue was its own reward.

It was a wise philosopher who said "an idle mind is the devil's workshop," and he might have gone farther and said something about idle hands. Idleness and leisure is not our American heritage and many wise heads today are wondering if too much stress has not been placed on leisure and not enough on industry.

We are faced with troublesome times ahead—times in which we are told that America must tighten its belt. Times which call for more taxes to support a defense program. Times which call for extended efforts in production of food and oil and steel and all those elements with which we must defend ourselves in case of the breaking out of yet a third world war.

We must think more of the foundation principles on which our freedom is founded and less of the new trends which point us to that false Utopia which can wind us up in a world in which man has lost his most precious birthright—the right to work and worship and speak as his conscience dictates.

Work can make us strong and free and rich—idleness and leisure will make us weak and dependent and, in the final analysis, poor.—San Marcos Record.

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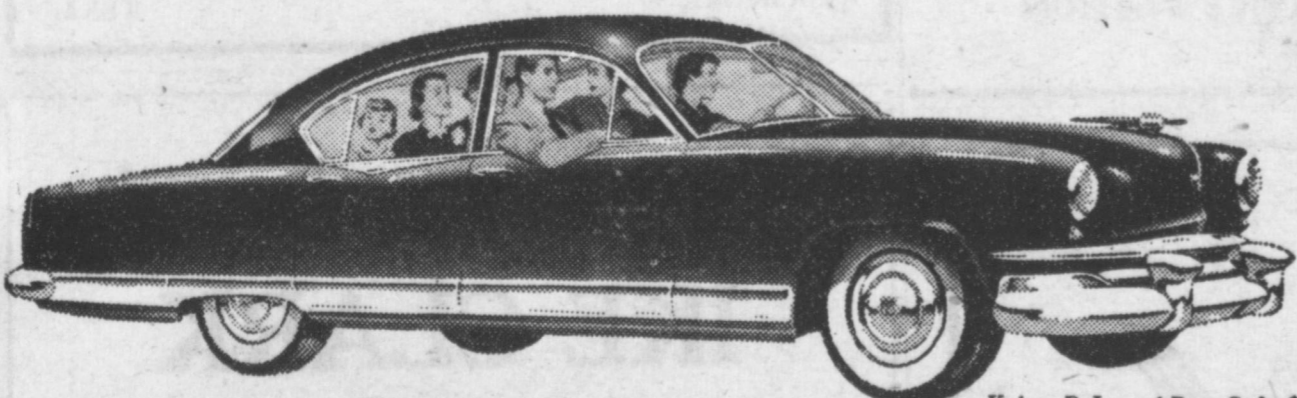

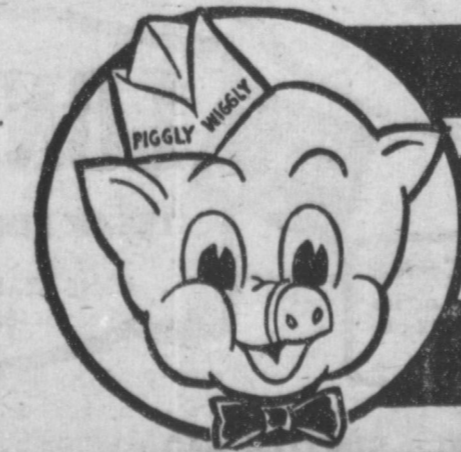

The No. 1 well, which went to 11,515 feet, had recovered fresh water and oil on perforations at 11,397-408 feet; got 810 feet of 60.7 gravity condensate plus fresh water on perforations at 11,000-08 feet, and on test at 10,005-20, recovered 600 feet of oil plus oil and mud. Both the Tatton tests are in John Durst Survey and are about 4 miles north of the Lamar Field and the same distance southwest of the St. Charles pool.

The Copano Bay Field has its third oil well at Phillips Petroleum Co. No. A-1 Pano, which flowed 188 barrels of pipe line oil, no water, on drill stem test on 28 shot perforations at 7,125-32 feet. Test was through 1/2 inch bottom and 1/8 inch top chokes, and showed gas-oil ratio of 840 to 1. The new well is in State Tract 33, about 2,900 feet southeast of the No. 1 Copano, oiler in Tract 34. Barbe is being repaired preparatory to starting the No. B-1 Pano, in the southeast corner of Tract 15, about 875 feet northeast of the No. 1 Aransas, also an oiler, and in Tract 35.

In the Salt Lake Field, Phillips No. 1 Huff was shut in Tuesday waiting on tank storage. It was perforated at 7,960-64 feet, swabbed to 3,000 feet, and then came in on natural flow, making an estimated 6 barrels of pipe line oil hourly on 3/16 inch choke under 800 pounds pressure on tubing, with casing sealed. This test is in Joseph Hollis Survey, A-76, about 965 feet west and slightly north of Nueve Oil Co. No. 1 F. G. Huffman, oiler in the 7,140-50 foot zone.

Hunt Oil Co. No. 5 State Tract 72, Copano Bay, Fulton Beach Field, flowed 127 barrels of 41.8 gravity oil on potential test from 20-shot perforations at 7,132-37 feet. Test was through 1/8 inch choke under 1,350 pounds pressure on tubing, with casing sealed. Gas-oil ratio was 895 to 1. Total depth was 7,200 feet and 7 inch casing was set on bottom.

Hewitt and Dougherty No. 2T F. G. Gabriel, Mud Flats Field, flowed 174-99 barrels of oil on potential test through 14/64 inch choke, under 450 pounds pressure on tubing. Perforations, with 48 shots, were at 8,866-76 feet, gravity was 38.4 degrees, and gas-oil ratio was 1,520 to one. Total depth was 9,800 feet and 7 inch casing was set at 8,950 feet. The No. 2C Gabriel, perforated at 8,472-82 feet, was preparing to take potential.

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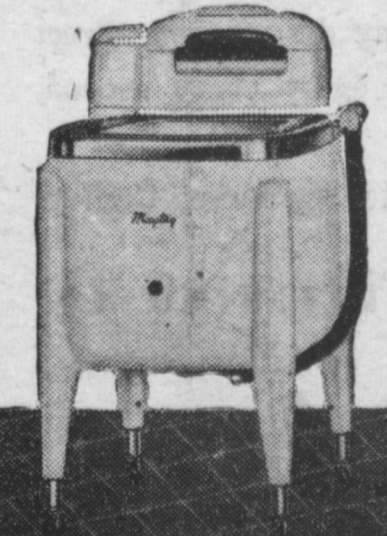

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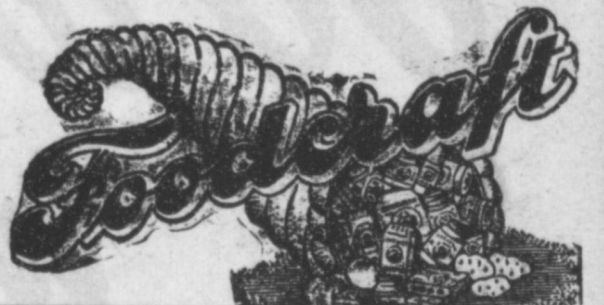
