New System of Grading Used in Rockport Second Grade This Year

Parents of students enrolled in Mrs. Edna Hollis' second grade will be notified in the near future that "A report of the progress of your child in the second grade will be given in a conference in the classroom. The time schedule for you is given below. Unless we hear from you, we will expect you at the stated time. Please do not ask for a change in time unless it is absolutely necessary."

This notice is to schedule the first of two conferences to be held during the year under the new system of reporting to parents.

One conference will be held each semester plus any additional conferences which may be requested by parent or teacher.

Mrs. Hollis has 29 youngsters in her second grade. Last month parents of 20 of the children met with Mrs. Hollis and discussed the new system of reporting to parents. All agreed that it would be a worthwhile system to try and expressed desire to cooperate.

With samples of the child's work at hand for the conference period parent and teacher will discuss the progress in regard to readi-

ness, industry, accuracy, organization, comprehension, retention, initiative, clear thinking, expression, promptness, cooperation, respect of authority, responsibility, thrift habits, health habits, courtesy, respect for property and attendance.

This new system of reporting is based on the belief that it is every parent's privilege and responsibility to know the progress his child is making in school, above and beyond that which the ABC report card reveals to parents. It is felt that the social adjustments of a child can best be reported in conferences with the parents where appeal can be made for cooperation and causes for weaknesses can be determined jointly. The new conference method is an effort to report individual pupil progress, other than social and emotional, with elimination of the comparative marking system.

The following points can be listed as advantages of the conference method over the ABC report card method which is used throughout the system at the present time:

1. The teacher provides samples of the child's work which have been accumulated over a period of time in order to show progress.

2. The teacher is prepared to discuss in detail any marked deficiency in the child's work. For example, lack of muscular coordination, very slow reading, etc.

3. The teacher is prepared to emphasize clearly and sincerely the child's assets.

4. The teacher is prepared to indicate orally to the parents the general achievement of each child, indicating whether it is better than, consistent with, or less than could be expected in light of what the school knows about the child.

It gives the teacher and parent an opportunity to give each other information regarding the child's emotional and social problems at home and at school.

Members of the faculty and of the P.-T.A. will attend a meeting in Corpus Christi Thursday, Oct. 26, at which the Parent-Teacher Association there, with the city council, will hold an open forum on this new system of grading.

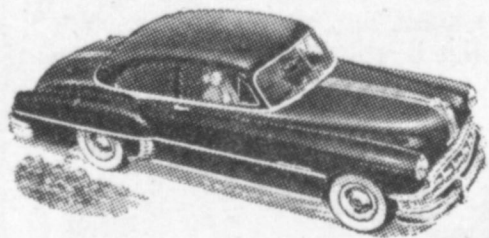

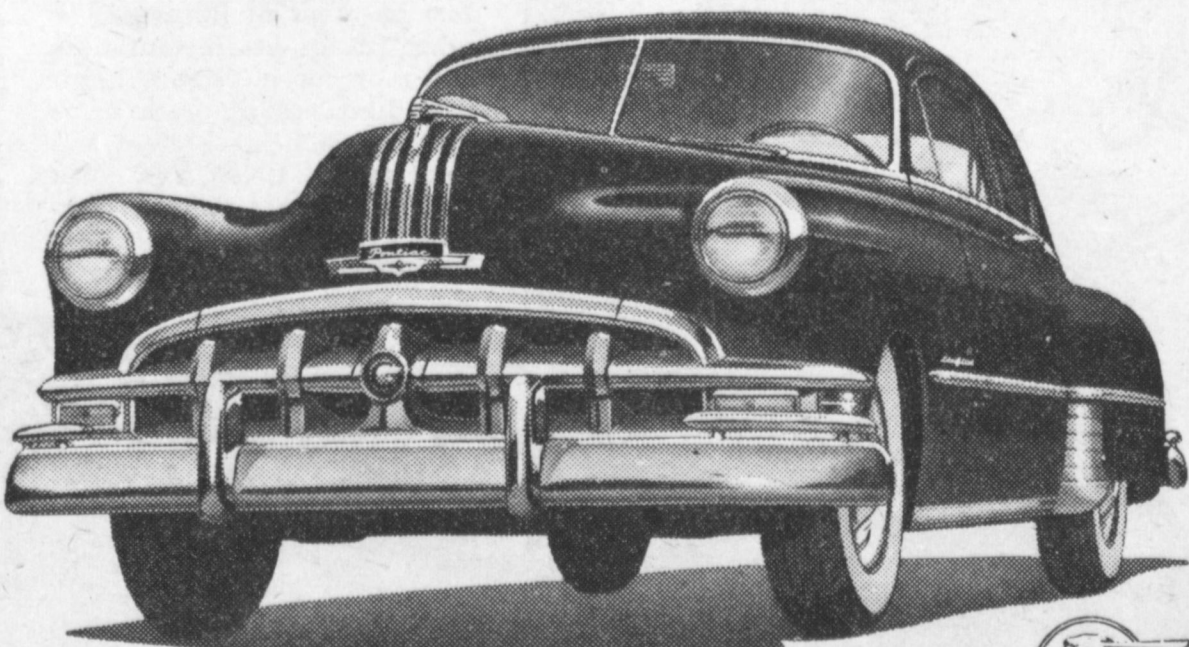

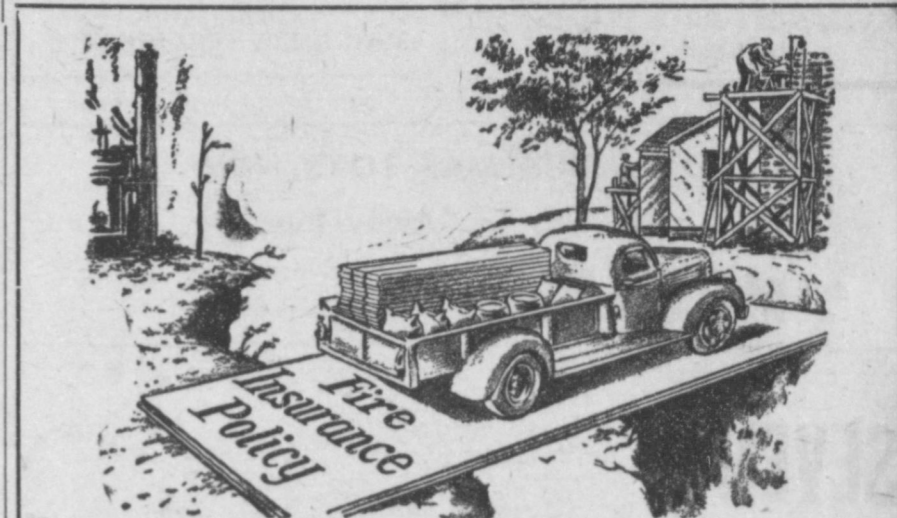
