

Duck Season Will Open Friday, Nov. 3 At Noon

Coastal Waterfowl Population Reported Normal for This Season of Year

When the migratory waterfowl season opens Friday at noon, the Texas coast will harbor about the same amount of ducks and geese to shoot at as they had last year. The Texas Gulf Coast will receive and harbor about 2,000,000 birds, according to J. R. Singleton, project leader of the Coastal Waterfowl survey.

Singleton Issues Goose Warning

The recent outbreak of mortality among the geese in the Tivoli-Austwell area of Aransas County is due to fungus growth known as Aspergillus. Aspergillosis of poultry, pigeon and other domestic birds is not uncommon. Aspergillus itself, is the blue-green mold found on bread, old damp grain, and other similar materials. These molds are highly pathogenic for birds and also for humans occasionally.

These geese probably picked up molded grain somewhere in their flight to the Texas coast. Whether or not the infection can be transmitted from one bird to another is not definitely known, but there is evidence that the infection can be transmitted from a bird to a human being.

The infection is most severe among young birds. It attacks the lungs, air sacs, and the entire body cavity.

J. R. Singleton, project leader of the State Coastal Waterfowl Survey, said his recommendation is that the birds should not be handled or eaten, as this infection is communicable through handling of infected birds.

An aerial census or inventory is made on the 15th of each month, from October through February of each year. Each census takes about four days of flying. The areas covered are estimated at 2,300 square miles on each monthly census.

The first inventory for this year was conducted on Oct. 16, 17, and 18. The population was found to be about normal for that period of the year. Since that time large numbers of ducks and geese have been observed flying south.

The local concentrations in the area of Rockport at the time the census was made this month were poor. Very few birds in the area of Port Bay, St. Charles Bay and Hynes Bay have been reported. Most of the ducks seen in the immediate area are pintails.

With a good rain and norther, the waterfowl population should build up rapidly by Nov. 15, Mr. Singleton said. The area from Port Lavaca to Port Isabel is very dry due to lack of rain, most ponds being dried up.

All duck hunters are urged to return duck bands if they find any, to the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service at Laurel, Maryland, with information as to place bird was found, date and species of bird. Approximately 3,000 ducks have been banded here on the coast, and plans are to start banding again as soon as the hunting season is over.

The hunting season opens at 12 noon, Friday, Nov. 3 to Dec. 14, both days inclusive. On the opening day of the season, no persons may possess any game bird in excess of the daily bag limit. No person may possess more than five ducks per day, 10 in possession, including not more than one wood duck.

On Nov. 3, the shooting hours will be from 12 noon to one hour before sunset; all other days of the season, one-half hour before sunrise to one hour before sunset.

World Community Day To Be Observed Friday

World Community Day will be observed by the women of Rockport and vicinity at the First Presbyterian Church at 4 p. m. Friday, Nov. 3. The theme this year is "Love Thy Neighbor." Last year's meeting was held at the First Methodist Church with the theme "Pieces for Peace." Several bundles of piece goods and sewing materials were wrapped for overseas during the social hour.

It is hoped that a large crowd will attend this year. The offering will be divided among the work by the different churches overseas for the refugees and the continued work for peace.

The devotional program will be led by Mrs. Harry Mills. Following this short devotional, Mrs. Hugh Morrison, president of the Presbyterian Women, will lead a discussion on the organization of a Local Council for Rockport. Eight women from Rockport attended the district meeting of the State Council of Church Women in Alice on Oct. 25, and it is hoped by many that a Local Council might be organized here in Rockport.

A social hour will follow with refreshments being served by the Presbyterian Women. All women of the community are invited and urged to attend.

Cancer educational work in this section will receive added impetus Nov. 10 when the first annual meeting of District 6, Texas Division, American Cancer Society, is held in Corpus Christi. Mrs. H. E. Butt of Corpus Christi and Dr. Ernest H. Poteet of Kingsville, district lay directors, issued an announcement of plans for the meeting.

Workers from 19 South Texas counties are invited. Emphasis will be placed on the need for public education to create a greater awareness of the fact that cancers must be treated early if they are to be cured.

Among the state leaders to speak during the day-long program are Frank C. Smith of Houston, president; Mrs. Joseph M. Perkins of Eastland, state women's leader; and J. Louis Neff, Houston, executive director. Laymen and women from this section will present their experiences during discussion periods. Texas Coast Fishermen Take Holiday

Overproduction and Market Glut Are Cause

Fishermen along the Texas coast are taking a voluntary holiday. The action started Saturday morning at Galveston and has extended to Brownsville and Port Isabel.

Constant fishing, freezer blocking-out, good weather and large catches have contributed to a situation making a fishing holiday necessary for the shrimpers.

Present plans call for a period of 10 days, but it may be extended. The action was a voluntary one taken by the fishermen and dealers in an effort to allow the freezers to catch up with the production. At the present time freezers are 72 hours behind, causing the shrimp to deteriorate and rather than have the quality of shrimp suffer the holiday was deemed necessary.

Pirates Start Preparation for Basketball Season

Preparation for basketball gets underway with the organization of District 90-B, which consists of Gregory, Ingleside, Refugio, Taft, Woodshoro and Rockport. Superintendent Blaskey of Ingleside, was elected chairman of the committee.

The committee has decided on district play this year instead of the double round robin schedule that was played last year, according to Coach Charles Roe, Jr.

The meet will be held the weekend of Feb. 10 in Ingleside. It will be a double elimination tournament.

Tatton Test Gets Oil at 9,000 Feet

The third test in the deep Virginia Field area in the northeast part of Aransas County blew the water cushion when coming out of the hole after a drillstem test around 9,000 feet, and Friday was coring ahead below 9,009 feet.

Union Producing Co. No. 3 Virginia Tatton, on 15-minute drillstem test at 8,998 1/2-9,002 feet, 3/4-inch chokes; 2,000-foot water cushion, recovered 650 feet of oil and 100 feet of muddy fresh water.

Meanwhile, Union Producing No. 1 Tatton, which was the Virginia Field high-gravity oil discovery last January, but which later died and is being reworked, was at 11,050 feet Friday, still reaming in its third hole (the second sidetracked one). The discovery was in vertical hole at 10,005-20 feet, and it had tested 60.7 gravity condensate at 11,000-08 feet.

Both these wells are in John Durst Survey, A-51, about 4 miles north of Lamar Field and the same distance southwest of St. Charles field.

Atlantic is rigging up Friday for an 8,000-foot Salt Lake Field test at No. 1 William Johnson. It is in the center of Lot 75, Coleman Fulton Pasture Co. Subdivision, Anselmo Margera Survey, A-14, and scales about 1,405 feet southwest of Atlantic No. 1 Stansbury Unit, oil well in Lot 52.

Renwar Oil Corp. No. 2 State Tract 105 (Copano Bay) also was rigging up yesterday for a Salt Lake Field test.

In Copano Bay Field, Phillips Petroleum Co. No. D-1 Pano, State Tract 43, spudded Oct. 21, set 148 feet of 13 1/2-inch conductor pipe and 1,025 feet of surface casing and Friday was drilling at 3,800 feet.

Sun Oil Co. No. 3 Copano-State, Fulton Beach Field oil well in State Tract 68 (Copano Bay) flowed 137.76 barrels of 42 gravity oil on potential test through 3/4-inch choke, under 925 pounds pressure on tubing, with casing sealed. Sixteen-shot perforations were in the B-4 Sand, at 7,158-62 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 895 to 1. Total depth was 7,154 feet and 5 1/2-inch casing was set at 7,162 feet.

Sun has made location for another 7,300-foot test at No. 5 Copano-State 69. This test is 467 feet out of the northwest corner of State Tract 69 (Copano Bay), is 1,513 feet north of No. 3-69 and scales about 3,525 feet west and slightly south of the tip of Fish Point, Live Oak Peninsula.

State Dept. of Health Urges Fluoridization Of Municipal Water

The Texas State Department of Health has undertaken a program to promote the fluoridization of municipal water supplies wherever necessary, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer.

It has been proved that where drinking water contains 1.0 to 1.5 parts per million of sodium fluoride that less dental decay occurs, especially among those that have used the water since birth. Excessive amounts of fluoride causes mottling of the enamel.

The city water supply at Marshall has been treated for four and one half years. This has resulted in a reduction of 47 per cent in the decay rate among the age group 6 and 7 years. The younger groups receive the earliest benefits from such a program but all ages have shown some improvement. Other cities adopting fluoridization of their water supplies are Austin and Corpus Christi. Ft. Worth, Iowa Park and Brecken-

ridge and some forty other Texas cities are seriously considering the measure.

The Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce in cooperation with the State Health Department and the State Dental Society has made this program its main health objective for this year for control of tooth decay.

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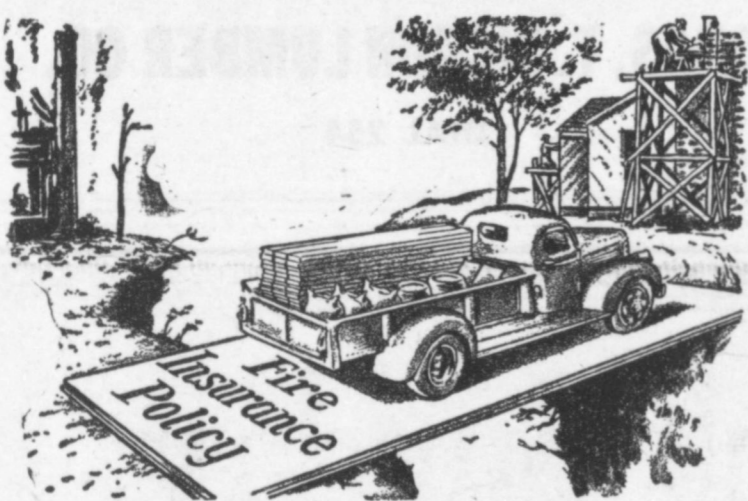
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Tickets—Information

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Health Talks

If you get a poor connection on your telephone, it's likely to make you pretty mad. But when your doctor gets a mumbled sound of your voice over his stethoscope, he's glad he can't distinguish what you're saying. If "Ninety-nine" comes ringing through loud and clear over his stethoscope, in fact, he might take hold of your shoulders and shake you a bit. Because "Ninety-nine" or "E" or whatever sound he's asking you to make are not supposed to be distinguished; if they are, and if he hears a splashing sound in your chest when he shakes you, then he's got a wrong number as far as your good health is concerned.

Your doctor thumps your chest and listens to your breath sounds through the stethoscope to check on the job your lungs are doing. If he hears things he didn't expect to hear or didn't want to hear, then he may also have you start talking and use your voice sounds as a double-check on the breath sounds. Sometimes he'll check your voice sounds, anyway. When you breathe in, your lungs inflate, your ribs stick out to make more room for the balloon-like lungs, and the muscle called the diaphragm which separates the chest and abdomen moves down to give the lungs more room. The oxygen you breathe in through your nose or mouth rushes down the windpipe, splitting the two directions at the bronchial tubes and fills up the expanded portion of the lungs.

The lungs are lined with little holes that look like a honeycomb and the oxygen pushes into these holes where it meets up with blood vessels which carry the oxygen to all parts of the body. Since the blood stream is spreading oxygen all those places, it is losing oxygen and picking up the waste products of air known as carbon dioxide. By the time the oxygen starts its round trip through the veins, there's not much left so it hurries back to the lungs where the carbon dioxide rushes out those holes and back up the windpipe and out the nose or mouth.

When you exhale, you are getting rid of the carbon dioxide which the body didn't use and your diaphragm jumps back up closer to your chest, your ribs relax and your lungs deflate.

When those lungs expand, they make a swishing sound and when they deflate, they make a swoosh sound. If the swish is too loud, too much longer than the swoosh, or too much shorter than the swoosh, your doctor hears it on his stethoscope. He also hears any rattling sounds that may go on in your chest during the process of breathing in or out. Rattles are usually called rales and they're not supposed to be there. Scraping sounds are called friction rubs and there are other sounds which have distinctive names but aren't supposed to be heard.

Asthma and bronchitis usually produce the kind of rales you can hear yourself, rattling in your chest. Rales accompany a number of different diseases, some slight and some serious, but their presence is always an indication that things aren't right. It means a thorough check of the chest is in order.

The scraping sounds which your doctor may hear in your chest also can arise from different parts of the chest. One of the most common of the scraping sounds or friction rubs comes with pleurisy, however. The thin skin-like tissue which forms a sac around the lungs is called the pleura. The same kind of tissue lines the whole chest cavity. Between these tissues is a fluid which serves as a lubricant for these pleura as they rub together during the expansion and deflation of the lungs in breathing. Normally, this goes on smoothly and quietly. But if anything happens to either that fluid or the tissue, such as swelling or irritation or hardening, then that tissue doesn't rub smoothly or quietly against the other pleura. It's a sort of internal chafing which hurts every time you expand and deflate your lungs and creates a scraping noise that can be heard through the stethoscope.

A complete examination of the lungs will nearly always include an x-ray. If the sounds through the stethoscope or the looks of the chest as you breathe or the sounds of the chest in thumping, if any of these deviate from the realms considered "normal," however, your doctor may advise more than one x-ray picture to give him more information as to the discordance in your chest.

The 65-piece orchestra presenting its second concert of the 1950-51 season, will be conducted by C. Burdette Wolfe, chairman of the Del Mar College school of music.

Menuhin has been engaged this season as soloist with such leading orchestras as the New York Philharmonic, the Philadelphia Orchestra, the Boston Symphony Orches-

tra, the San Antonio Symphony Orchestra and the Montreal Symphony Orchestra.

Other concerts to be presented in Corpus Christi will be a Christmas concert on Dec. 11 and 12; an opera in miniature Feb. 4 and 5; Luigi Silva, March 5 and 6, and Miss Margaret Truman, soloist, will appear as guest star with the orchestra on April 9 and 10.

Whitewing Kill Reported by Commission

AUSTIN—Texas sportsmen participating in the 1950 whitewing hunt in the lower Rio Grande Valley bagged an average of 7.1 birds during the three-day open season, according to the Executive Secretary of the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission.

Excellent cooperation on the part of the hunters in collecting whitewing information enabled Game Department technicians to add much valuable information to their knowledge of this species. Few violations were reported and the Executive Secretary commended hunters for their cooperation.

The combined efforts of hunters and Game Department personnel on the ground and in the air pro-

duced data showing that 9,948 cars bearing 28,721 hunters were concentrated in the hunting area.

The Executive Secretary said that out of an estimated population of 900,000 whitewings, gunners bagged a total of 203,440 birds during the seven hour and thirty-nine minutes of shooting time. During 1949 hunters bagged an average of 7.6 birds of a total of 14,925 more than the number killed in 1950. Unfavorable weather conditions were responsible for the lower bags in 1950.

The overall crippling loss was 49,687 or enough birds to supply an average bag for 6,997 additional hunters. High winds were believed responsible for this increase over the 33,936 whitewings lost in 1949.

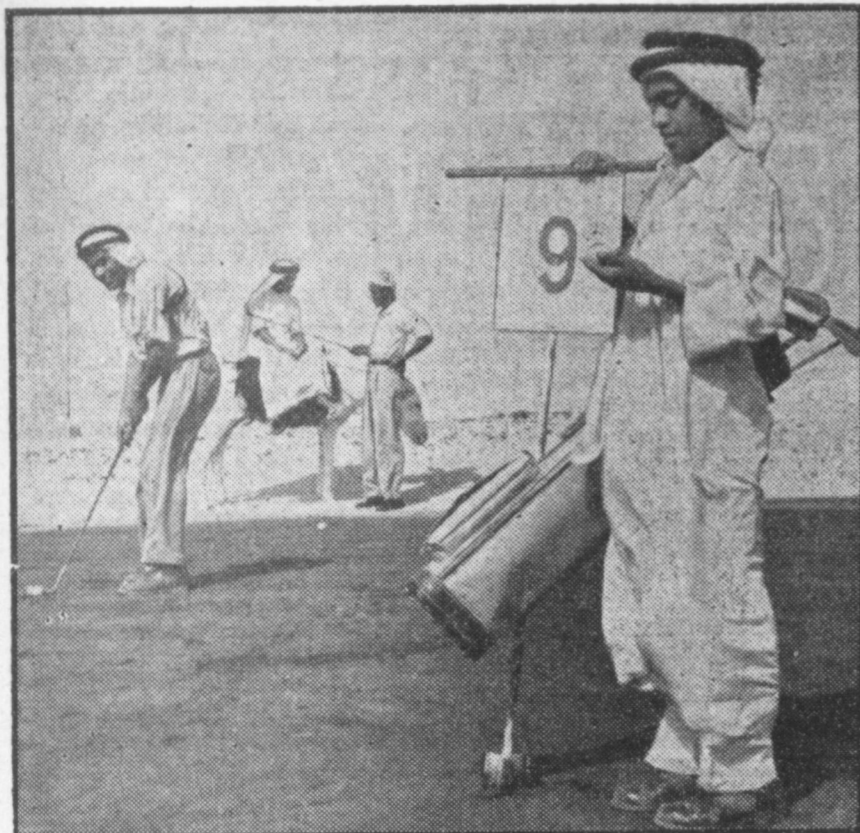

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Texas Landings Show Decrease for September

Landings of fishery products at

Texas ports during the month of September, which is the beginning of the fiscal year 1950-1951, amounted to 9,101,557 pounds, compared with 12,563,248 pounds for the same month the previous year. Reduced catches of menhaden, which amounted to only 3,366,720 pounds compared with 7,352,000 pounds in September, 1949, were responsible for the decrease. Landings of shrimp, which amounted to 5,523,506 pounds, were more than 6,000,000 pounds greater than September, 1949.

The catch of fish and shellfish from the year 1880 to the year 1948 increased from 3,516,000 pounds, valued at \$128,000 to 55,580,000 pounds, valued at \$6,145,000.

These figures were released by the U. S. Department of the Interior, Fish and Wildlife Service in cooperation with the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission, Austin.

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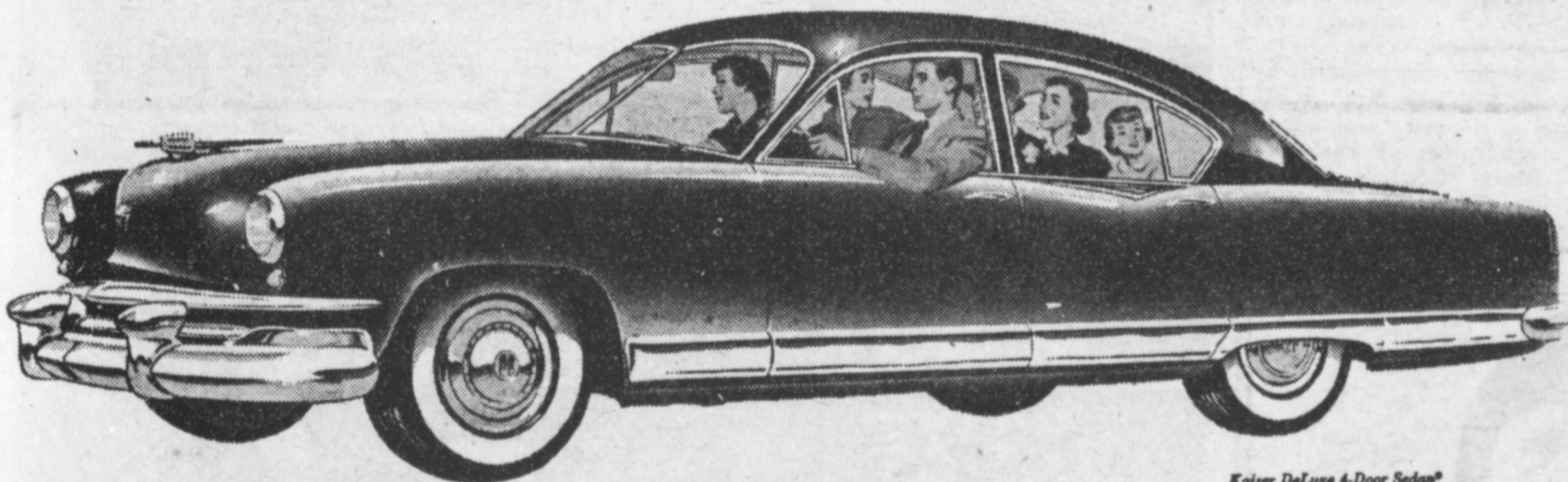

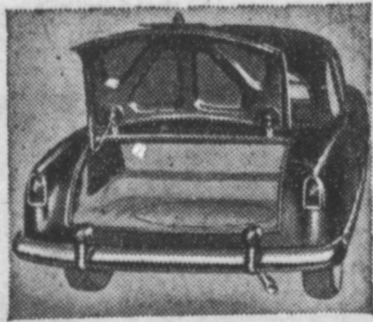

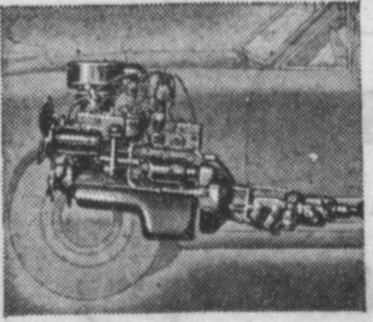
