New Wildcat For Aransas Rigging Up

Aransas County wildcat activity has been limited to the Virginia Field area this week.

Up on the Refugio County line, Union Producing Co. No. 4 Virginia Taton, wildcat in John M. Shreve Survey, A-186, had derrick up and part of the rig on the location and was preparing to rig up for a 10,000 foot contract, held by James O. Ruhl Drilling Co. of Houston.

About seven miles to the southeast, in Virginia Field, another Ruhl rig was drilling at 10,968 feet on Union Producing No. 3 Taton, John Durst Survey, A-51, third test for the deep Taton field. Contract depth is 12,000 feet.

In Salt Lake field, one test had shut down to repair rig and another had set casing.

Renwar Oil Corp. No. 2 State Tract 105, Copano Bay, which was drilled from a surface location ashore in Joseph Hollis Survey, A-76, set 5 1/2 inch casing at 7-360 feet, three feet off bottom, and was waiting on cement.

Atlantic Refining Co. No. 1 Adams Unit, which is in Salt Lake and E. Kirkpatrick Survey, A-93, was at 7,144 feet Friday, shut down to repair burned out rotary bearings. This test had run electrical log to 7,081 feet, but did no sidewall coring. Conventional cores were taken from 5,115-25 feet. Contract depth is 8,000 feet.

In Fulton Beach Field, north of Salt Lake, Stanolind Oil and Gas Co. has made location for a new test at No. 3 State Tract 70, in Copano Bay.

Phillips Petroleum Co. has consolidated 7,648 acres of State of Texas leases in Copano Bay, renumbering existing wells and location in Copano Bay Field. The No. E-1 Pano has been redesignated No. 6 Copano Bay State. This test is 467 feet out of the southeast corner of State Tract 14 and 934 feet west of No. 5, formerly the No. D-1, in Tract 13. The No. 6 is contracted to 7-5300 feet.

War-Caused Selling Waves Knock Down Stock Prices

New York. — Korean war reverses brought on two severe selling waves Monday in the stock market and knocked down prices by \$1 to around \$4 a share.

In the first hour there was a jam-up of over-night selling orders that put the tape a minute behind floor transactions. That was attributed to the bleak outlook for retreating United Nations forces in Korea.

A number of rallies were attempted from time to time but got no place. In the final hour another selling wave battered away interim gains and forced prices down to a new low on the day.

The final drive had its Genesis in reports from Washington of new and tighter controls over the civilian economy and of higher taxes on business.

Rails, utilities and oils, mentioned as probably benefiting more than other types of industry under the new excess profits tax proposal, went down with the others.

The Associated Press average of sixty stocks lost \$2.20 at \$81.50. The industrial component of the average lost \$2.90, rails \$2.10, and utilities 60.

The volume of trading came to 2,510,000 shares.

The market broadened out appreciably to 1,208 individual issues, only slightly less than the big break of the previous Tuesday. Some 1,039 issues declined and sixty advanced.

Curb market stocks suffered severely by \$1 to around \$4 a share. The volume was 470,000 shares.

Today the medical profession realizes that many childhood diseases are now under control and that our present problem must center about the adult, encouraging periodic check-ups. Is semi-annual consultation with your physician too great a premium to pay for many years of additional life, freedom from suffering and consequently short periods of hospitalization?

Good Deeds Put Woman Behind Bars

Jonesboro, Ark. — Charity and other good deeds beyond her means put a 64-year-old Sunday School teacher in jail Monday.

Mrs. Emily Meiser was sentenced to six months in the women's federal prison in Alderson, W. Va., when she pleaded guilty to embezzlement of approximately \$25,000.

Her home town of Paragould, Ark., sorrowed at the sentence. Even officers of the Paragould Security Bank and Trust Company, from which the money was taken, said they regretted the outcome of the case. Federal Judge Thomas Trimble, who sentenced the woman, called it "the hardest case I ever tried."

Only Mrs. Meiser expressed no regret. "Justice has been done," she told Lee Ward, her attorney.

Mrs. Meiser said she took the money from the bank, where she had worked over a period of eighteen years, in sums ranging from \$50 to \$200. It was distributed for graduation dresses, wedding gifts and charities.

Mrs. Meiser said her salary at the bank was "enough to live on—but I wanted to do something for the young folks."

Wage, Price Curb Need Forseen By Officials

Washington, D. C. — Two top administration officials said this week wage and price controls almost certainly will have to be imposed soon because of mounting inflationary pressures.

Economic Stabilizer Alan Valentine said the country is "near" the economic level "at which we should stabilize."

Secretary of the Treasury John W. Snyder said he believed "these controls (wage and price) will have to be imposed" to avoid "damaging inflation" in the light of current economic trends.

Their statements amounted to an administration about-face on the question of clamping price and wage ceilings on the economy.

Up until the Chinese Communist intervention in Korea, most of President Truman's top advisers had hoped to hold the line against inflation through use of "secondary" curbs such as higher taxes and strict credit controls.
