John Albert Ratliff, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. H. Ratliff, volunteered Jan. 2 in the Air Force and reported Tuesday to NAS in Corpus Christi for physical examination and written test. He called back to report there were 70 others taking the examination and that had had made the third highest grade.

North Aransas Deep Wildcats Underway

A pair of new wildcats started last week in the northern part of Aransas County and preliminary preparations were underway for an Aransas Bay exploratory test off Copano Causeway.

Just south of the Refugio County line and about 6 2-3 miles northwest of deep production in the new Virginia Field, Union Producing Co. No. 4 Virginia H. Tatton, wildcat in John M. Shreve Survey, A-186, was drilling at 1,170 feet on a 10,000 foot contract.

In Virginia Field itself, Union No. 3 Tatton, John Durst Survey, A-51, made 176.26 barrels of 50.4 gravity oil on potential test through 1/8-inch choke, under 2,650 pounds pressure on tubing, with casing sealed. Perforations, with 84 shots, were at 10,998-11,012 feet in the same sand from which the Nos. 1 and 2 are producing. Gas-oil ratio was 4,270 to 1. Total depth was 11,498 feet, 7-inch casing was set at 10,147 feet and 5-inch liner was set on bottom.

Near Mesquite Bay

Western Natural Gas Co. No. 13 St. Charles Ranch Co., wildcat a little more than 3 miles northeast of gas production in St. Charles Field and 10.8 miles northeast of Lamar, set 200 feet of conductor pipe Friday and Saturday was waiting on cement.

This wildcat is in Isaac Downess Survey, A-31, and is 18,000 feet northwest of Mesquite Bay. Longhorn Drilling Co. of Three Rivers is contractor on this test which is contracted to 12,000 feet.

Humble Oil and Refining Co. has requested U. S. Army Corps of Engineers permission to erect drilling structures and lay a 4-inch pipe line from the location of a proposed 10,000 foot Aransas Bay wildcat to Lamar Peninsula, 18,100 feet to the north.

Humble No. 1 Aransas Bay State Tract 118 is 1¼ miles south of the northeast end of Copano Bay Causeway and 4 miles northeast of Fulton, Army hearing on Humble's request is set for Jan. 8 in Galveston.

Fulton Beach Field

In Fulton Beach Field, Phillips Petroleum Co. has a test drilling below 5,300 feet and Sun Oil Co. has started a new test and taken potential test on a new well.

Phillips No. 6 Copano Bay-State (formerly No. E-1 Pano and designated as in Copano Bay Field) was drilling Friday at 5,315 feet on a 7,500-foot contract. It is in the southeast corner of State Tract 44.

Sun No. 5 Copano State 69, total depth 1,035 feet, set 9 5/8 inch surface casing at 1,029 feet and Friday was waiting on cement.

Sun No. 4-69 flowed 197.19 barrels of oil on potential test through 1/8-inch choke, under 1,200 pounds pressure on tubing, with casing sealed. Sixteen-shot perforations were at 7,151-55 feet. Gravity was 42 degrees and gas-oil ratio was 849 to 1. Total depth was 7,169 feet and 5½-inch casing was cemented on bottom.

GENE NAVA STRUCK BY CAR

Gene Nava, one of Rockport's oldest citizens, was hit by a car on Highway 35 about 7 o'clock Wednesday evening and is confined in the hospital in a critical condition. He is suffering from a broken leg and a fractured skull.

It is reported that the automobile which struck Nava was driven by H. I. Cogwell of Houston. Cogwell was driving south on Highway 35 about 200 feet north of Smith's filling station, and there were other cars traveling north, which Mr. Cogwell said blinded him so he did not see Nava until nearly on him. Nava was walking across the street, and Cogwell said he tried to stop as soon as he saw something in the road. His car was barely moving but Nava was knocked to the ground and injured.

New Navigation Commission Holds First Meeting

The retiring navigation commissioners met with the incoming commissioners at a joint meeting at 7:30 p. m. Jan. 2 at the Navigation District office on the waterfront in Rockport. Those present for the retiring navigation board were Ted R. Little and Ernest Jones. Floyd Huffman was absent.

Incoming commissioners present were Clyde Townsend, Henry Camehl and James A. Jarboe. Ted Little appointed Jarboe temporary chairman for the new commission. The new commission passed a resolution commending the retiring members for a job well done. It was pointed out that at the time they took office there were only a few slips available at the west side of the basin. Through the efforts of the navigation commissioners the basin now has 140 slips, which with other leases, bring in a gross revenue of over \$10,000 per year.

Jarboe called for nominations for chairman of the Navigation Commission. Clyde Townsend nominated Jarboe; Camehl seconded the nomination. Jarboe nominated Clyde Townsend, seconded by Camehl. On ballot Townsend was elected chairman by a vote of two to one. Jarboe nominated Camehl for secretary, seconded by Townsend. Camehl was elected by a vote of 3 to 0. After a discussion of navigation office affairs for about an hour the meeting was adjourned.

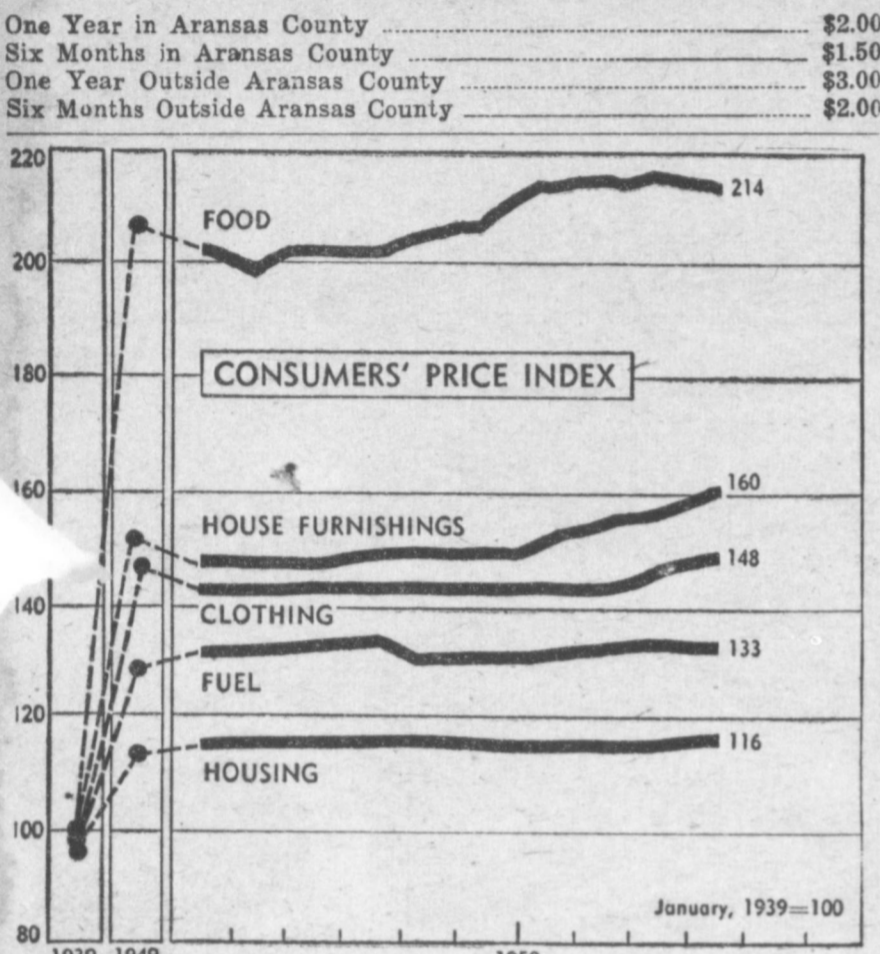

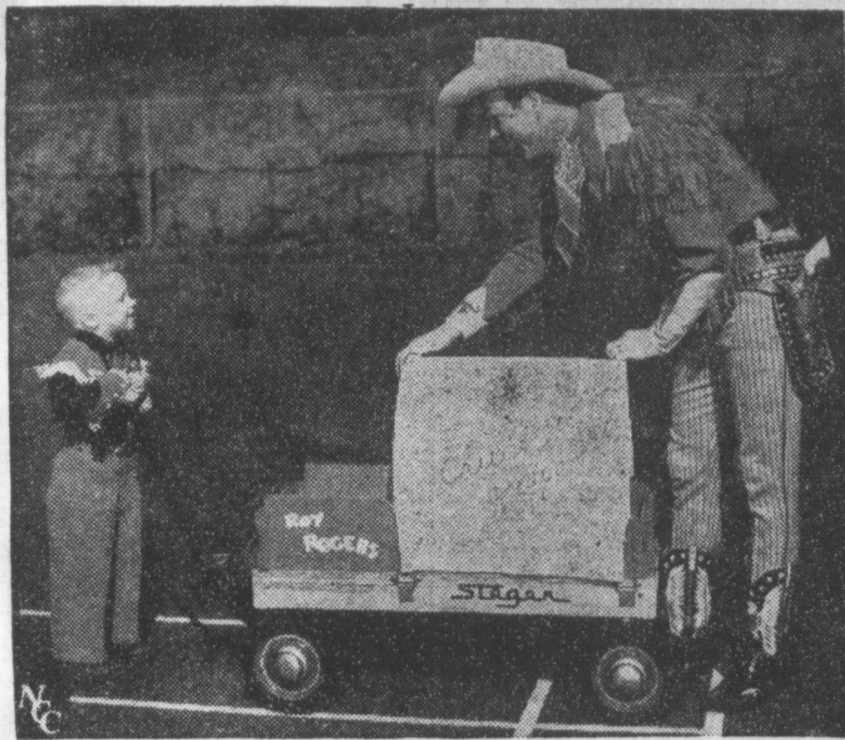

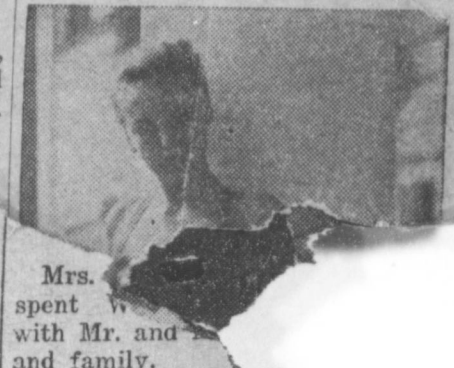

However, the disease is not confined to children. "In World War II, about 40,000 men in the American forces developed attacks of rheumatic fever." This disease may damage the heart valves and muscle. Any child who has rheumatic fever should have the best of medical care, plenty of rest, a special diet, and be free from anxiety or worry. Just because a person has rheumatic fever, is no sign he will have rheumatic heart trouble. But it's important to keep in close check with the family physician.

Coronary heart disease strikes those from middle age groups and up, more than other forms of heart trouble. And, it strikes men more often than women. Moderation in daily living is very important, for if a person worries too much, works too hard, exercises too frequently and hard, and eats too much his heart is overworked. Yes, one of the best checks against overburdening the heart . . . is moderation in all things—and plenty of rest.

High blood pressure is another important cause of death. Naturally, the heart has to work harder to pump the blood, when blood pressure is high. An over-worked heart needs the care of a physician. Sometimes symptoms of heart trouble aren't so noticeable; that is why a regular physical examination is so important.

Heart disease caused by syphilis, congenital heart disease, and heart trouble resulting from an over-active thyroid gland, are few other forms of heart disease.

Stop and think about it for a moment. Do you give your heart enough rest?

Alessandro Will Guest Conduct S. A. Symphony Jan. 6

San Antonio.—Victor Alessandro brilliant young conductor of Oklahoma State Symphony, will guest conduct the San Antonio Symphony in the seventh subscription concert at Municipal Auditorium Saturday night, Jan. 6, when Hans Hotter, great new basso of the Metropolitan Opera, will be guest soloist.

Alessandro will be the first in a series of guest conductors engaged by the Symphony Society to replace the late Max Reiter for the remainder of the season. He will also conduct the Jan. 13 concert, Symphony President Jesse H. Oppenheimer announced.

Alessandro, a native of Waco, has been a conductor for 32 of his 35 years. He began the study of serious music at the age of three, and the same year was engaged as conductor of a children's band—a position he held until the age of seven.

At 16, he won his first national acclaim when Cesare Sodero, conductor of the NBC Symphony, performed a chamber music work of Alessandro's over NBC.

As a result of his outstanding work at the University of Rochester, where he received his Bachelor of Music degree, the young conductor was awarded a fellowship in conducting at the Mozarteum in Salzburg. In rapid succession

he was awarded a fellowship at the Royal Santa Cecilia Academy in Rome, a Fellowship to study the music of the Prix di Rome winners at the American Academy in Rome.

While Alessandro was en route back to the United States, he was offered the position of conductor of the Oklahoma State Symphony and within four years brought the orchestra up to a major standing in the country.

Alessandro has guest conducted the Minneapolis Symphony, Rochester-Eastman Symphony, New York Civic Symphony, Boston Pops Orchestra, San Francisco Philharmonic, Chicago Symphony, the Milwaukee Symphony and the Dallas Symphony.

His Saturday night program here will include "Ave Marie" (Arcadelt), the Sixth Symphony of Tchaikowsky and excerpts from "Die Meistersinger", by Wagner.

Hotter, in this country for the first time this season, made his debut at the Metropolitan last month, an event hailed by the New York critic as a "sensation."

Olin Wownes described the handsome young basso as "a first class musician and tragedian of exceptional powers. He has a voice of remarkable range and power. Hotter is a figure out of legend and a consummate vocal interpreter."

His program with the Symphony will include "Praise be to Thee," Handel; and arias from "Don Car-

los" (Verdi), "The Flying Dutchman" and "Die Meistersinger" (Wagner).

Season subscribers should use tickets marked "Christoff" (Boris Christoff, whose place Hotter is taking) for the Saturday night concert. Single tickets are available at the Symphony's auditorium box office.

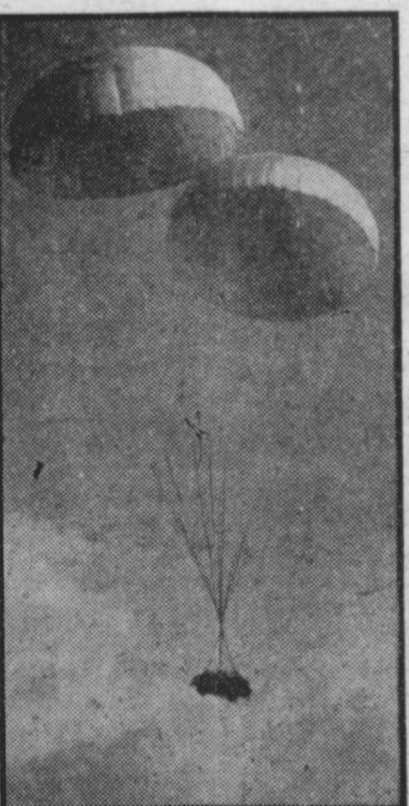

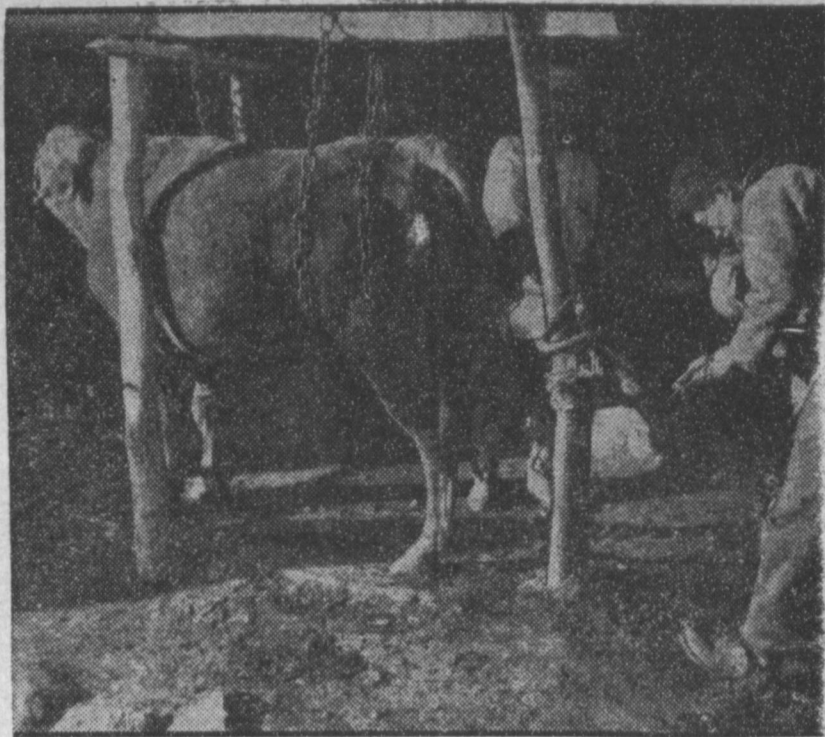
