Fall seeding of grassed waterways and establishing permanent winter pastures is now underway in the Haskell area, according to Hinds A. Mc-Gowen, Jr., Soil Conservationist. Soil Conservation Service,

Norman Nanny, Cooperator with the California Creek Soil and Water Conservation District, has recently drilled an overflow field to Western Wheatgrass. He plans to use this field as spring grazing to relieve his native pastures.

"Western Wheatgrass will establish itself the first year," McGowen said, "providing normal growing conditions exist. Otherwise, it may take two

A. H. "Johnny" Becker, Co-operator with the Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District, has just completed sowing Western Wheatgrass in a grassed waterway. Beckers waterway will be used to dis-pose of outside water and will provide a safe outlet for terraces after the grass is well established.

Western Wheatgrass should drilled before November first," McGowen said, "if satisfactory stand of grass is to be obtained. A grain drill can be used to plant this grass. The recommended seeding rate is five pounds of pure live seed per acre on waterways and three pounds on cropland being returned to pasture.

'At the present time, Western Wheatgrass is the only permanent growing cool season grass recommended in Haskell County to be grown under dryland con-ditions," McGowen said.

Others that have recently seeded waterways to Western Wheatgrass are E. C. Smith of and Clyde Mayfield of Weinert. Both men cooperate with the Wichita-Brazos Soil and A. C. Richardson Water Conservation District.





> In his book, 'The Come When Called," Tinsley, outdoor editor for the Austin American-Statesman. points out that the tape recorder has replaced the portable phonograph as the best device for calling predators. Thanks to transsistors, tape recorders today are small and compact in size, and some actually can be carried in the Coat pocket.

However, the small recorder lacks the necessary volume for calling nature's killers from any great distance. To overcome this obstacle, the Burnham Brothers of Marble Falls, Texas, an amplifier-speaker system that plugs into a recorder to more than triple its output of sound.

All a person needs to do is wander in the woods, thenswitch on the machine and let the tape do the calling for him. he'd better be watching with gun ready.

Newest calling recorder is a cartridge-type job that plays continuously. No rewinding is necessary. Four different tapes are enclosed in a plastic hol-der that the hunter inserts into machine. Caller simply chooses the distress sound he wants, by pushing a button, then switches the machine on and prepares for action.

But the recorder is just part of the story. Equally as important are the tapes them-

When electronic calling was in its infancy the available records were simply recordings of someone using a mouth-blown call. But today the records and tapes carry authentic distress sounds of animals and birds. These recordings are made

by capturing creatures alive, getting their distress cries on tape, then releasing them uns One very effective tape is the shrill of a woodpecker in trouble. The Burnham Brothers

trouble. The Burnham Brothers made this particular calling tape by placing a net over a hole pecked in the wood siding of a house and tapping on the plank until the bird flew out and into the cord mesh.


When so held, the bird shrieked piteously. A very sensitive tape recorder captured its distress cries. Then the woodness.




