WATERFRONT—In spite of the week-end norther, there were a few fish caught in this area in the past week. Mr. Cloyd from West Texas caught a string of trout at Perry's Bait Stand last week.

Mr. and Mrs. C. M. Spires from Sharon Springs, Kansas, caught 24 trout last Wednesday over at the island in front of Floyd's Boat House.

One party caught 16 trout off the wharf at Jolly Roger Hunting and Fishing Camp last week and there were a few caught from boats in front of the camp.

Deep Lamar Wildcat Plugs Back, Tests

George W. Graham, Ryan, Hays and Burke No. 1 Mrs. E. G. Brown, wildcat about half a mile south of Mud Flats Field production, started coring Friday at 9,105 feet and was expected to reach contract depth Saturday afternoon.

This test cored some distillate show at 8,940-55 feet, but 3 drill-stem test attempts in that interval failed. A salt water sand was cored at 8,989 feet. The Brown is in Lot 6, Section 51, Sixth Addition, Taft Farm Lands.

Union Producing Co. No. 4 Virginia Taton, northwest Aransas County wildcat, has plugged back to test a deep sand which had kicked slightly.

The wildcat, with protective casing set at 9,820 feet, drilled on to 10,496 feet with no shows below the pipe, ran log to bottom, and set plug at the base of the casing. This test, in John M. Shreve Survey, A-186, is 500-odd feet off the Refugio County line and is about 7 miles northwest of the deep, high gravity, oil pay in Union's 3-well Virginia Field.

To the northeast of this well, another deep wildcat still was plagued with a fishing job. The county also had 2 other wildcats running, one near contract depth, and last week had chalked up a dry wildcat. Three bay wildcats were pending.

Western Natural Gas Co. No. 13 St. Charles Ranch Co., wildcat 4 miles northeast of St. Charles Field production, continued to fish and Saturday was washing over stuck pipe at 9,350 feet. Total depth is 11,276 feet, and the crew was preparing to set casing when the drillpipe was stuck a couple of weeks ago.

Goldston Oil Corp. No. 1 H. E. Dickinson, wildcat in J. Fessenden Survey, A-65, a mile north of Rockport, had been plugged the middle of the week after running electrical log to 8,020 feet, total depth. Cores at 7,517-79 feet had recovered shale, except at 7,542-47 feet, where there were sand streaks with no show.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 9 Copano Bay State, wildcat 7 miles northwest of Rockport, and in State Tract 67, was drilling at 636 feet Friday, on an 8,000-foot contract, after setting 20-inch conductor pipe at 161 feet.

Dock was completed for Humble Oil and Refining Co. No. 1 Aransas Bay State Tract 118, about 1 1/2 miles south of the northeast end of the Copano Bay Causeway. This will be a 10,000-foot wildcat.

Sun Oil Co. is waiting on permits for its No. 1 St. Charles State 387, 2 miles southeast of Lamar, and its No. 1 Aransas State 67, 1 1/2 miles southeast of Lamar, both to be deep projects.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 7 Copano Bay State Tract 33, Copano Bay Field, flowed 166.6 barrels of 41.9 gravity oil on potential test through 1/8-inch choke, under 1,050 pounds pressure on tubing, with casing sealed. Perforations with 24 shots, were at 7,134-40 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 625 to 1.

Pure Oil Co. has scheduled a seismicographic surveying program in Corpus Christi, Redfish, Aransas and Copano Bays.

The Corpus Christi-Redfish project will be in an area central to a point about 1 1/2 miles east of Corpus Christi, while Aransas-Copano survey will center around a point 5 miles north of Rockport.

Fulton Lions Club Sponsors Clean-up Campaign

Mrs. S. F. Jackson, commander of the American Cancer Society of Aransas County, had a film from the Memorial Fund Laboratory of the American Cancer Society shown which was followed by a very interesting talk by Dr. N. E. Graham on cancers.

Program chairman Gibson then presented two actual combat pictures, one of World War II and the other one of the present war in Korea. Lion Gibson got these pictures through the courtesy of the 4th Army.

O.P.S. Investigators Will Begin Check Apr. 9

Investigators of the San Antonio district Office of Price Stabilization Monday, April 9, will begin a district-wide systematic check of manufacturers, jobbers and wholesalers to make sure they are keeping complete price schedules and records as required under price control.

Bert W. Thompson, San Antonio OPS district enforcement director, said the record-keeping survey will determine degree of compliance with the record-keeping provisions of the General Ceiling Price Regulation.

Base period (Dec. 19, 1950, through Jan. 25, 1951 and current records as outlined in the regulation are those affected, Thompson said.

A similar survey covering retailers will be conducted later, he added.

Marshall Says Dogs May Now Be Unleashed

Heads of three dogs suspected of being infected with rabies have been sent to Austin, but the last one reported was negative, City Marshall Lester Bashaw reported Wednesday.

Bashaw, who has been advising people to keep their dogs tied up during the rabies scare, said the negative report indicates that there is little danger of rabies now and he has been advised that dogs can now be turned loose.—Palacios Beacon.

Backers Of Natural Gas Tax Win Test

Backers of a natural gas tax proposal won a test of strength today by a narrow four-vote margin in the House of Representatives. The measure would boost the tax on natural gas one per cent per 1,000 cubic feet, allocating revenue from the levy principally for farm roads.—The Gonzales Inquirer.

Higher Utility Rates Forecast

About \$1,000 per month would be added to the city's coffers by the revised utility rate schedule that will be presented to the council at its Monday night meeting, Alderman Karl Wickham, chairman of the water, lights and sewerage committee, says. "Everybody's utility bill would be at least 25 cents higher."

Increased cost of operation was given as the reason higher utility rates are necessary. Mr. Wickham pointed out that the schedule now in effect was initiated years ago when expenses were much lighter.—Palacios Beacon.

Civil Air Patrol Now In Operation

"Walker Flying Service or the CAA weather station at the airport should be contacted in the event an air search is desired for a missing or over due boat or other reasons," Ralph Newsom, who is in charge of operations for Palacios' new Civil Air Patrol Flight, announced.

Walker Flying Service or the CAA will contact local CAP personnel, who will initiate a search at the earliest possible moment.—Palacios Beacon.

Rotary Plans Program For Sinton Youth

Tentative plans for a 1951 summer youth program for Sinton were launched Wednesday following the Sinton Rotary Club luncheon in the J & A Clubroom. Tom Ivy, chairman of the Rotary youth committee, appointed school superintendent E. Merle Smith, L. T.

Kolb and W. T. West as a committee to study plans for financing the program.

Ivy and Olin Chafin, assistant high school coach, estimated that the 1951 project would cost \$2,500 for ten weeks.—The Sinton Enterprise.

Relief May Stop Here By April 15

County Judge William E. Nicholas and J. H. Curlee, administrator for the San Patricio County Emergency Relief Agency, predicted Thursday that the current relief program will end by April 15—the end of the sixty day period for which it was set up. They estimated however, that more than 4,500 were on relief rolls this week.—The Sinton Enterprise.

Ten Candidates File For Trustee Posts In Gregory

Ten men have filed for a place on the ballot in the Gregory-Portland Independent School District, according to Supt. W. C. Andrews. Seven men are to be elected out of the ten. This unusually large number of trustees to be elected is brought about by the fact that the Gregory and Portland school district consolidated some time back, making it necessary at this time to choose a board from over the entire area.—The Taft Tribune.

San Patricio May Get New Congressman

San Patricio and 18 other counties will probably have a wideopen congressional race next year if the congressional redistricting bill that passed the house redistricting committee becomes law. The bill as written in committee takes San Patricio out of Congressman John Lyle's district and makes a new one composed of McMullen, Live Oak, Bee, Refugio, Aransas Calhoun, Victoria, Goliad, DeWitt, Karnes, Gonzales, Wilson, Guadalupe, Comal, Atascosa, Frio, Lavaca, Jackson and San Patricio counties. There is no incumbent congressman in this district.—The Taft Tribune.

\$35,000 Water Bonds To Be Sold

The sale of these bonds was authorized by a vote of the citizens of Taft in 1946, but the bonds have never been sold.

The need for additional water has been brought to a head recently by the decision of the board to sell water to the Reynolds Metal Company for its construction work. Reynolds tied on to the Taft water system on March 23, when they connected to the ten-inch line about half way between Gregory and Ingleside.—The Taft Tribune.

County Cotton Crop Expected To Reach 150,000 Acre Total

The biggest cotton acreage in San Patricio's history will be planted within the next two weeks if planting conditions are favorable, County Agent R. R. Gibbs said this week.

The 1951 crop in this area will probably total 150,000 acres and Gibbs said he expected between 75,000 and 80,000 acres of grain sorghum to be planted in the county. The only vegetable crop expected this year, other than home gardens, will be in the Ingleside area where cucumbers and tomatoes are produced, and these

crops are expected to be light.—The Sinton Enterprise.

Port Aransas Voters Approve Causeway Bonds

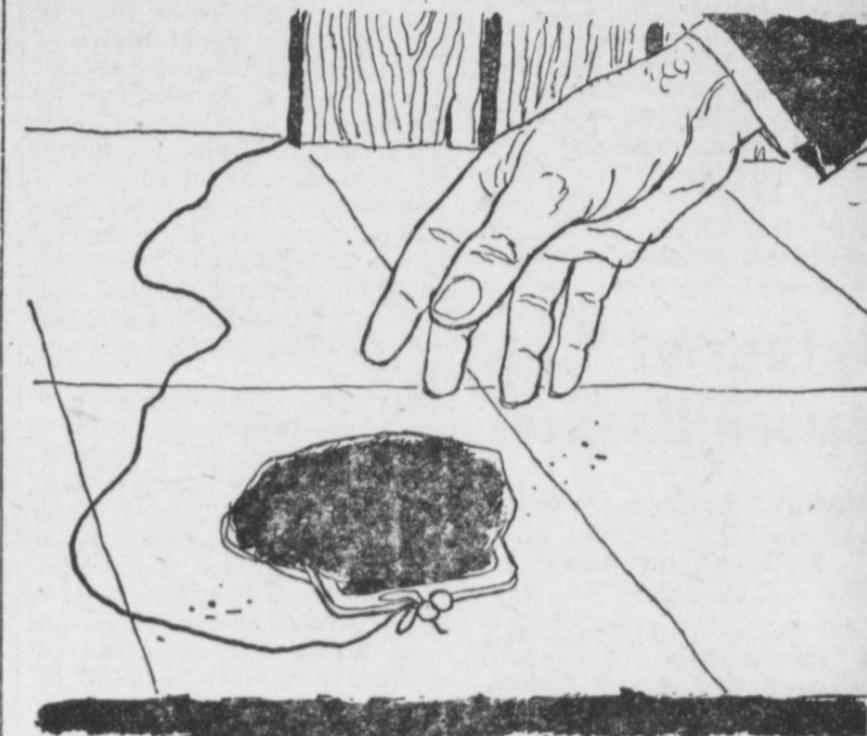

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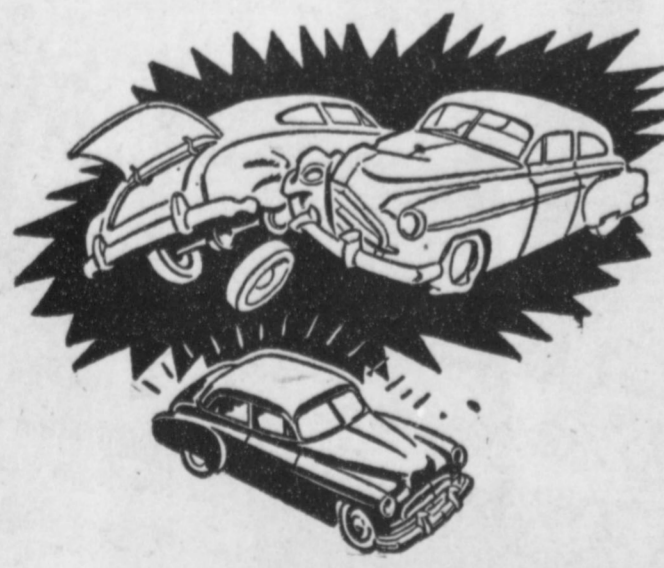

More Than 17,800 Truck Arrests Made On Texas Highways

Austin, Tex. — More than 17,800 truck arrests were made on Texas highways for overloading and other violations for the year ending Aug. 31, 1950, according to a recent report released by Kent Odom, chief of the License and Weights Division of the Department of Public Safety.

8,447 cases were filed in Justice Courts throughout the state, charging the operation of vehicles with loads in excess of the 48,000 pound gross load limit and over 18,000 pounds of weight on each truck axle; 3,801 cases charging operation in excess of registered gross weight of the truck and 5,582 cases were filed for miscellaneous offenses, such as overlength, overwidth, driving while intoxicated and operating without permits.

According to the report, nine trucking companies were arrested more than 100 times last year. One Dallas firm with 265 arrests, was fined over \$5,000 for hauling more than a million pounds excessive weight.

The License and Weights Division of the Department of Public Safety is composed of only 33 inspectors, who must work in pairs patrolling the 36,840 miles of the Texas highway system. During the period covered by Chief Odom's report, these guardians of the state roads checked more than 72,000 trucks and found one out of every four were violating the law.

The January monthly report just released by the Public Safety Department indicates an increase in highway truck law violations. It shows a total of 2,051 arrests.

Many states have found the only effective way to prevent these constant violations of overloading trucks to reduce the excessive weight to the legal limits before proceeding over the roads.

Texas has no such unloading on the spot law. A bill is now pending in the Senate, known as H. B. 11, designed to stop the practice of overloading trucks continuing on their way after paying a small Justice Court fine. The proposal would also give authority to the Department of Public Safety, the County Sheriff or his deputy to make such arrests.

CIVIL SERVICE ANNOUNCES EXAMINATIONS

The U. S. Civil Service Commission announces examinations for filling vacancies in the positions of Aircraft Instrument Mechanic, Aircraft Mechanic general, and Aircraft Mechanic Motor at entrance salaries of \$15.20 per day for employment at naval establishments in the vicinity of Corpus Christi, Texas. Social Security Explanation Concerns Household Work

A small envelope form will be used by household employers to report the wages of domestic workers in private homes, according to H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Social Security Administration in Corpus Christi.

In shape and in size, the form resembles those in use by private insurance companies, magazine circulation departments, and other commercial firms. It is a one-piece, pre-addressed return envelope. There is space on the inner flap for the essential information about the employee's wages, and there is a pocket for transmitting the social security tax.

Under the new social security law, household workers who are paid as much as \$50 by one employer in a calendar quarter and who have worked for that one employer on some part of at least 24 days in the three month period, will have wage credits toward old-age and survivor's insurance.

The tax to be remitted in the envelope form will be 3% of the worker's cash wages for the three-month period, beginning January, 1951. The housewives may deduct one-half of this or 1½% from her employee's wages. One and one-half percent is her share of the tax.

To illustrate how the envelope report system will work, Cleveland took the case of a housewife who employs one maid on two days a week during January, February and March. At any time during April, the housewife, he explained, should fill out the envelope form which she will receive from the Collector of Internal Revenue. The inner flap of the envelope will be imprinted with the employer's name and address. On one side she will enter the worker's name and social security number, together with the total amount of cash wages paid during the three months. If the wages were \$10 per week, and since there are 13 weeks in the three-month period, the total would be \$130. In that case, the 3% social security tax would amount to \$3.90. One-half of this (\$1.95) is the worker's share. The employer will match this amount. The total tax of \$3.90 is entered on the last line of the form. A check or money order in that amount is put in the pocket of the envelope. With the envelope sealed, stamped, and dropped in the mailbox, the housewife's social security report work is completed until July. No other report will be required.

Every regularly employed household worker should have a social security account-number card. Those who have not yet secured their cards can get them through the Social Security Administration, 424 Taylor Street, Corpus Christi. The applications for the numbers can also be secured from Post Offices, Offices of the Bureau of Internal Revenue and the Texas Employment Commission. The social security office is the place to get it.

Household employers should read the booklet, "Do You Have a Maid?" The back page of this informative booklet is a postage-free post card addressed to the collector of internal revenue. When mailed, it will place her on the list to receive the envelope report form.

Cleveland feels that the protection provided by the Social Security Act will promote a more stable and lasting employer-employee relationship, and he believes that the provisions of the new law for the housemaid, the cook, the hired man, and the laundress is an important step in encouraging domestic employment.

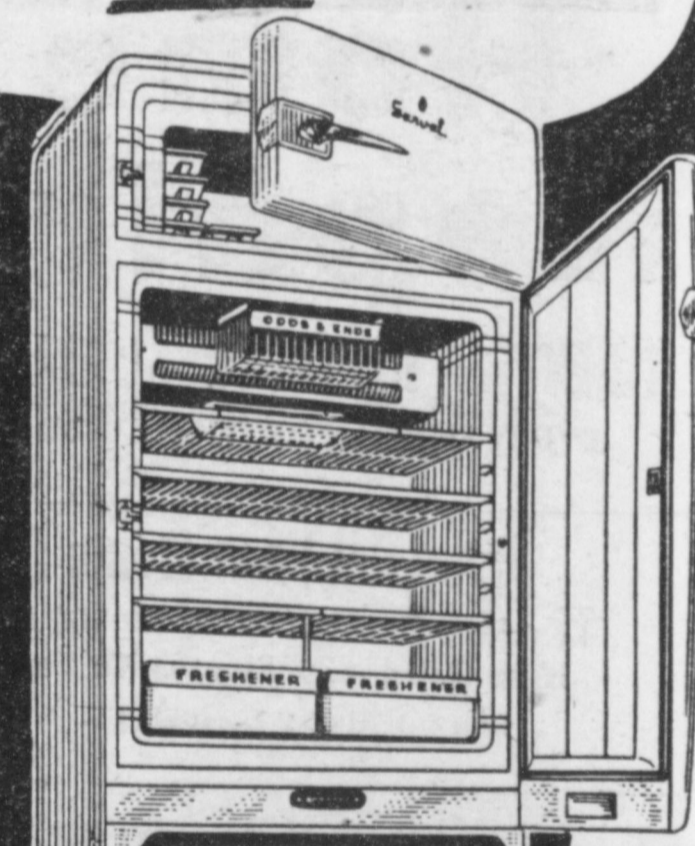

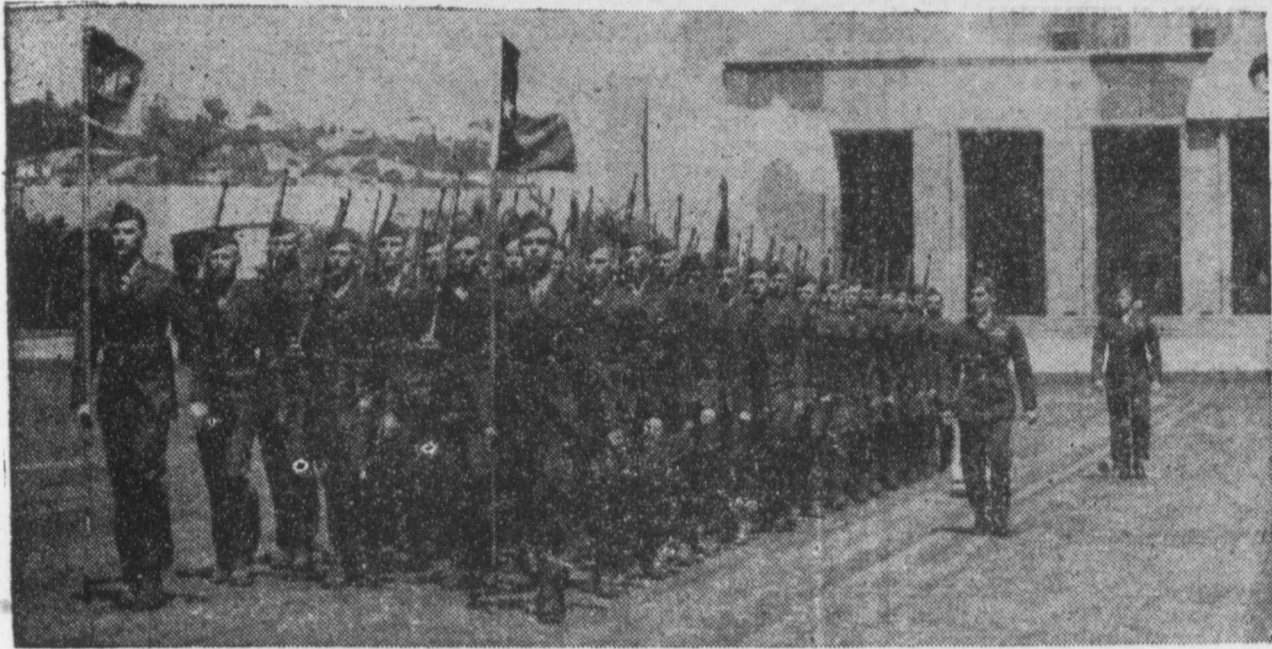

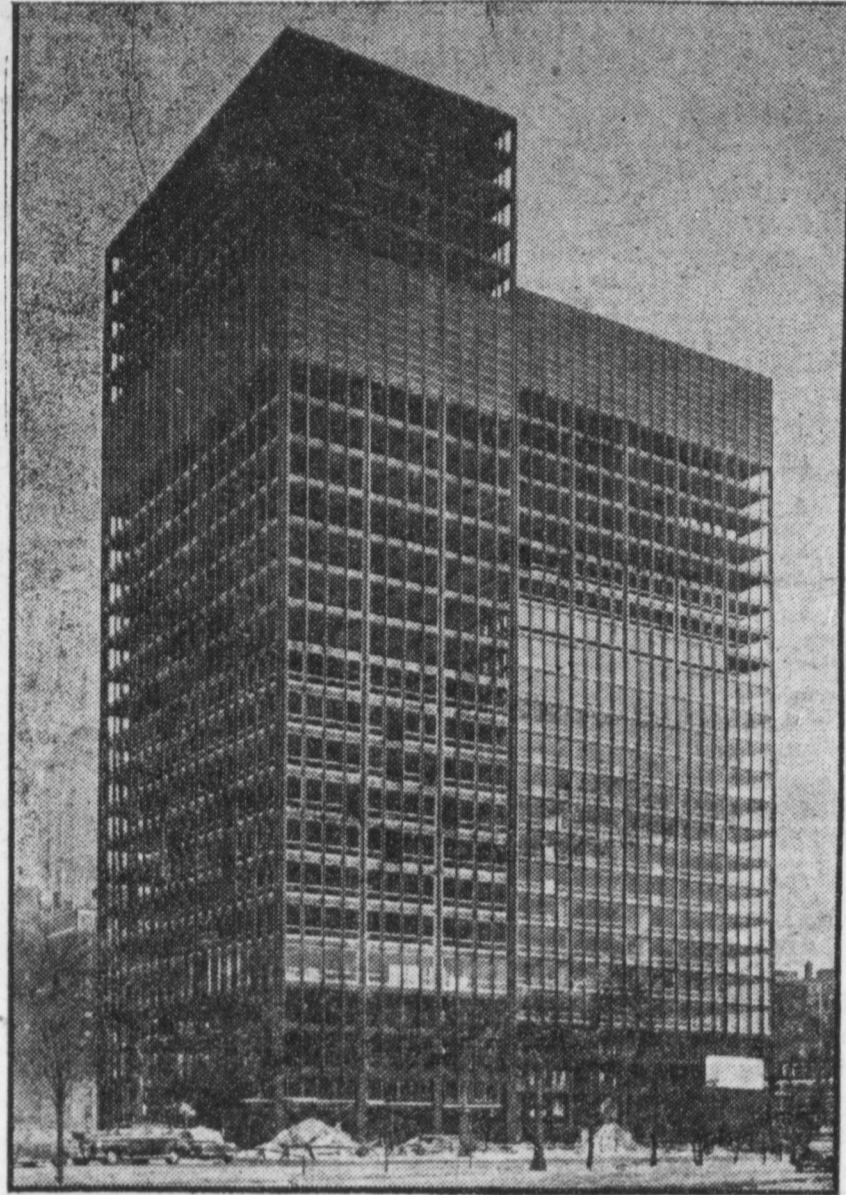

Over 6,500 Food Outlets Affected By Regulations

More than 6,500 retail and wholesale food outlets in the 55-county San Antonio district, Office of Price Stabilization, are affected by the new ceiling price regulations for these businesses. The three companion pricing regulation, known as CPR 14 for wholesalers of foods and CPR 15 and 16 for food stores, are effective April 5, according to P. Fielding Breeden, district OPS commodity food branch chief. "This new system of price control, modeled after the most successful war-time regulations in the food field, will result in a great many price changes affecting the home food baskets, with decreases expected to considerably exceed any increases," Breeden said. About 60 per cent of food purchases in the retail food stores are covered by the new regulations which established the highest price that can be charged legally. The regulations fix controlled percentage margins that retailers and wholesalers must use in pricing a wide variety of market basket foods, Breeden explained. The new orders permit them to add only a certain percentage of their net cost to the price of an item. If their cost goes up, due to agricultural parity, they can raise their prices. Major food items covered include butter, packaged cheese, baby foods, cocoa, breakfast cereals, coffee and tea, flour, flour mixes, canned and frozen fruits and vegetables, jams and jellies, lard, mayonnaise and salad dressings, shortenings, canned meats and canned fish. Among major grocery items not covered are fresh milk and cream, fresh meats, bread, fresh fruits and vegetables, sugar, ice cream, soft drinks and candy, beers,

Crime In Texas Is Up 10 Percent

Austin—The Texas Crime Report for 1950, just released by the Texas Department of Public Safety, indicates that crime in general over the State is up 10.9% over 1949. Among seven major crimes tabulated in the report: Murder and Homicide, Rape, Robbery, Burglary, Aggravated Assault, Theft and Auto Theft, the greatest increase was reflected in the category of Auto Theft. To stem the rise in the number of stolen motor vehicles and to assist you in protecting your investment in an increasingly hard-to-get commodity, Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, passes along these tips to car owners: 1. Keep unattended cars off streets, particularly at night. 2. If you use your auto at night, do not park on poorly lighted or little-used streets. 3. Lock car at all times—ignition, doors and rear deck. 4. When car is parked or stored in public garages or on parking lots, insist upon a claim check. Don't yield when attendant says, "You do not need a ticket as I will know you." Also, insist upon locking ignition, doors and all compartments when fire rules do not prohibit such measures. 5. If auto is kept in a private garage, see that locks are strong and that door hasps cannot be taken off with a screw driver, or hinges removed from the outside. 6. Do not leave car registration or driver's license in car as thieves frequently escape arrest by presenting documents of the rightful owner when stopped by police officers. They may also submit the registration card and driver's license to prove ownership in successfully selling stolen vehicles. 7. Report suspicious tampering with autos to your local police. The securing of license numbers of cars near the scene of such activities may prove of value to the police in the event of theft.

wines and liquors. Except for fresh fruits and vegetables and sugar, which are exempt from price control, prices of all excluded items listed above remain frozen under the general ceiling price regulation or restaurants regulation No. 11. Breeden said the wholesalers and retailers will recalculate their ceilings weekly (each Monday) to take account of changes in the cost of foods they buy from suppliers. This is permitted because prices of basic agricultural products may move up or down under parity. Wholesalers are divided into four classes, and retailers into four groups according to dollar volume of sales. Thirty-six categories of food are listed, and for each food category the retailer of each group is told what percentage markup he can apply to his net cost to arrive at allowable ceiling. Between April 5 and April 30 the retailer may put each ceiling price in effect as he figures it. He must put ceilings into effect on all items by April 30. By April 30 each retailer must post a sign in his store showing his store classification. By April 28, each retailer and wholesaler must notify in writing his OPS district office (128 South Flores Street, San Antonio) of the group or class in which his business falls. Both wholesalers and retailers are required to preserve certain records, Breeden said. He urged businessmen desiring additional information to contact the San Antonio district OPS office.
