Aransas Gets Deep Gas-Distillate Production

Aransas County, which for years had oil only in the Aransas Pass area, but which has turned up 6 new fields since the war, was back in the hot news columns this week.

The north part of the county had a deep gas-distillate discovery, 4 miles from nearest production, and down in Copano Bay, 2 wells had cut faults indicating the possibility of production separate from lusty Fulton Beach.

The deep gas distillate discovery is at Western Natural Gas Co. No. 13 St. Charles Ranch, 11 miles northeast of Lamar and on the edge of Mesquite Bay.

On drillstem test on perforations at 10,320-60 feet 3/4-inch chokes, working pressure was 5,150 pounds and the well flowed distillate and gas at the rate of 7,608,000 cubic feet daily. Gas-oil ratio was 54,000 to 1. Bottomhole pressures were 7,765 and 8,180 pounds.

Other sands up the hole will be tested before the discovery is completed. The well, is about 4 miles northeast of the No. 12 St. Charles Field gasser at 10,750-96 feet. Pipe is set at 10,377 feet on the No. 13, which went to total depth of 11,276 feet.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 9 Copano Bay-State, Tract 67 wildcat a mile west of Fulton Beach production, had cut a big fault, and had several shows. Oil sand had been cored at 6,640-700 feet, and several other sands had shows but hadn't been analyzed. Electrical log was run to 7,103 feet and sidewall cores were cut from that depth. On Friday, the well was drilling ahead at 7,529 feet, and the mud logger had indicated several shows below the 7,100-foot zone.

Sun Oil Co. reportedly also had cut a fault in its No. 1 Copano State Tract 76, Fulton Beach proper, but was releasing few details, pending completion of the well.

However, it was understood that the Phillips well cut the fault higher.

Sun's well was at 7,443 feet Friday, taking sidewall cores. Reportedly, it had cored gas sand, 7,045-98 feet, sand with good oil odor and fluorescence at 7,118-32 feet, and sand, slight odor, 7,200-05 feet.

Sun No. 1 Copano 74 was complete on perforations at 7,166-71 feet, after acidizing with 500 gallons. It made 68.04 barrels of oil and 81.96 barrels of salt water on 24-hour test on 7/32-inch choke. Tubing pressure was 175-200 pounds, and gas-oil ratio was 977 to 1. Rig from this test was moved to the No. 2-41 on Friday.

Down in the Mud Flats area, Sun's No. 2 Milton Babriel, wildcat near the San Patricio County line was drilling at 4,210 feet in shale, on a 10,500-foot project. Union Producing Co. had given up its No. 4 Tatton, wildcat 7 miles northwest of the Virginia Field, after using the hydrafac treatment on perforations at 8,757-63 feet, but recovering only 240 feet of distillate on 35-hour test when top pressure dropped from 910 to 95 pounds, and bottomhole flowing pressure from 2,075 to 500 pounds.

This wildcat had made a little oil on perforations at 9,810-14 feet, under low pressures, and there also failed to respond to the hydrafac process. Gas cut mud was recovered at 9,638-50 feet. Total depth was 10,496 feet, and the well had kicked around 9,800 feet, before protective pipe was set.

Evangelistic Meeting At The Presbyterian Church

The pastor, Rev. T. H. Pollard, reports that the evangelistic services at the Presbyterian Church are progressing in a very satisfactory manner. The attendance has been good and increases with each service. Rev. Chauncey Acree, of Corpus Christi, who is doing the preaching, has endeared himself to those who have come to know him, both by his sermons and his private contacts. Several have indicated their intention to unite with the church.

A covered dish supper is planned for Thursday (today) at 6:30 p.m. for the purpose of giving the people of the church and community an opportunity to meet Mr. Acree personally and to enjoy fellowship with each other.

Mr. Acree will preach each evening this week (except Saturday evening) at 8:00 o'clock and at both services next Sunday. Everyone is cordially invited to these services.

Mosquito Control Board Clarifies Insect Problem and Control

To The Citizens of Aransas County:

In view of some of the recent happenings, such as the Letter to the Editor published in the Pilot two weeks ago and also numerous complaining phone calls, the need is apparent for some explanation relative to our mosquito problem and its control.

The Aransas County Mosquito Control Board met with the County Commissioners Court on Monday morning, April 30th, for the purpose of formulating policy and reaching agreement on all phases of the mosquito control work. The purpose of this article is to enlighten the general public as to our decisions, and to the ultimate functions of the control program, so that all may cooperate with full understanding of our problems and how we propose to cope with them.

First of all, the Mosquito Control Board is by law an Advisory Board. Its members are appointed, one from each precinct by the County Commissioners of that precinct; and the Chairman for the Control Board by the County Judge. They serve without compensation.

Every angle of mosquito control work is studied out and the advice of State men and others with more experience is taken into serious consideration. That is why at present we are working with a ground fogging machine instead of plane spraying—because with what funds we have we were told in this way the most good could be accomplished. And the funds we have are limited, especially this year. Next year there will be a little more with which to do the work.

Since this is a county wide tax supported program, all areas of the county will be sprayed each time any one area is sprayed, so as to keep it on a fair and impartial basis. The time for these sprayings will be decided by the Commissioners Court or on advice from the Mosquito Control Board.

No individual spraying of private property will be permitted, nor will the machine be loaned or rented out to any individual for any purpose whatever.

Because of limited finances the number of sprayings per year are likewise limited. That is why the proper time for spraying must be left to the judgment of the Commissioners Court, and not have the machine sent out every time a few mosquitoes bite someone. It may be needed much worse three months from now.

Reports of numerous mosquitoes should be made to the Commissioners Court. Such reports are welcomed if made in the spirit of cooperation and not in the spirit of malicious complaint. And you may be sure that if the necessity is there the spraying will begin as soon as possible. But you must remember that the weather is an important factor in determining the proper time for spraying. Spraying cannot, for example, be carried on during high winds, and for the most part must be done at night.

The program at present, again because of insufficient funds, is based on trying to control and kill the adult mosquito. To try and eliminate the mosquito by killing all larvae would truly be an expensive undertaking on a county wide basis. That, however, may come later.

As tolerant citizens, and in the light of information furnished you above, we earnestly solicit your understanding cooperation. Nothing does quite so much harm to harmony and achievement as a "popping off" by uninformed persons.

No Slot Machines Or Gaming Devices In County

County Attorney Weldon Cabanis received a letter from Price Daniel, Attorney General of the State of Texas and Hon. John Miller, District Attorney, part of which follows:

"The Conference of Prosecuting Attorneys on March 30 and 31 voted unanimously to request the state office to mail to each County Attorney a list of the parties who paid the 1950-51 Federal tax on slot machines and gambling devices in his county. Due to the absence of payments of the \$150 per machine tax it may be assumed that your county is free of these gambling devices, since it is very seldom that any one would display such a machine in violation of the federal tax statutes.

"I appreciate the cooperation of County and District attorneys of our state in waging such a vigorous campaign against organized crime that present violators will close shop and outside hoodlums and racketeers will know that Texas is no place for their business."

Marine Laboratory Holds Open House Sunday, May 6

The Marine Laboratory of the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission will hold an open house for the folks of the area on Sunday, May 6, between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. There will be a free program of movies at the school auditorium the same evening at 7:30 p.m. Everyone is cordially invited according to Jack Baughman, Chief Marine Biologist.

There will be guided tours of the laboratory for visitors, and the entire staff will be on hand in order to explain the work now under way and the results which it is hoped can be attained.

Mr. Baughman went on to

point out that, at the present time, the laboratory is engaged in five principal lines of research. Briefly, these are: Oyster research, in charge of Robert Parker, shrimp exploration, in charge of E. D. McRae, experimental work on crabs, in charge of F. M. Daugherty, Jr., a cooperative program on trout, redfish and flounder being carried on by the Copano Research Foundation's biologist, Dewey Miles, and the work at the Cedar Bayou fish trap in charge of Ernest Simmons.

Perhaps the most interesting of these programs is that under the direct charge of Mr. Simmons, he said. Primarily the fish trap was set up to study the effects of a natural, unjettied pass on the movements of fish between the bays and the Gulf. By facing one part of the trap towards the Gulf and the other portion towards the bay, it has been possible to determine the number of inbound fish and the number of outbound fish, and to slow them down long enough to tag numbers of them and to collect data on the others. The periods of the greatest intensity of movements can be determined; the place of a natural pass in the repopulation of coastal bay areas can be worked out; and the degree of movement of all species both from coastal and Gulf areas can be arrived at.

Moreover, it is possible to attain a better understanding of the dates and direction of migration, the spawning periods, and rates of growth of the various fishes, the type of food they consume and many other pieces of knowledge necessary to the proper understanding of fish populations so that they may be correctly managed. An especially valuable feature of the trap has been the possibility of determining the general spawning areas of the various fishes and much data have been accumulated upon the dates and localities in which this takes place. An interesting by-product has been the determination of the same information with reference to crabs and other crustaceans.

Mr. Baughman also pointed out that the data gained from the operation of this fish trap would be very helpful in determining benefits of possible additional passes between the Gulf and bays, as provided for in a bill now before the Texas Legislature.

Another exceedingly interesting experiment which apparently has a good chance of succeeding has been under the direction of Mr. Daugherty. This is pointed at the production of soft shell crabs to order and while the experiment has not been carried on long enough to give definite results, apparently it will be possible to work this out.

Mr. McRae, who is in charge of offshore exploration, with the boat Carey, has also been working on a probable method of preserving live bait shrimp over long periods of time, without excessive losses.

Mr. Miles of the Copano Research Foundation has discovered many of the requirements for management of speckled trout in the area, and is continuing and expanding his program during 1951. In the oyster department, considerable routine work has been carried on, and Mr. Parker has a number of very interesting projects working at this time, some of which will be demonstrated at the open house.

Work carried on in the laboratory itself is in charge of Sam Nichols, who is responsible for the aquaria and for routine determinations of various types of data. In addition to this, he has been carrying forward research on the breeding cycle of some of our common fishes.

These men, said Mr. Baughman, will all be on hand Sunday, May 6 to explain to the visitors the work of the laboratory and their various projects, and to answer questions.

The chief biologist emphasized that everyone in the area is cordially invited, both to the open house and to the movies.

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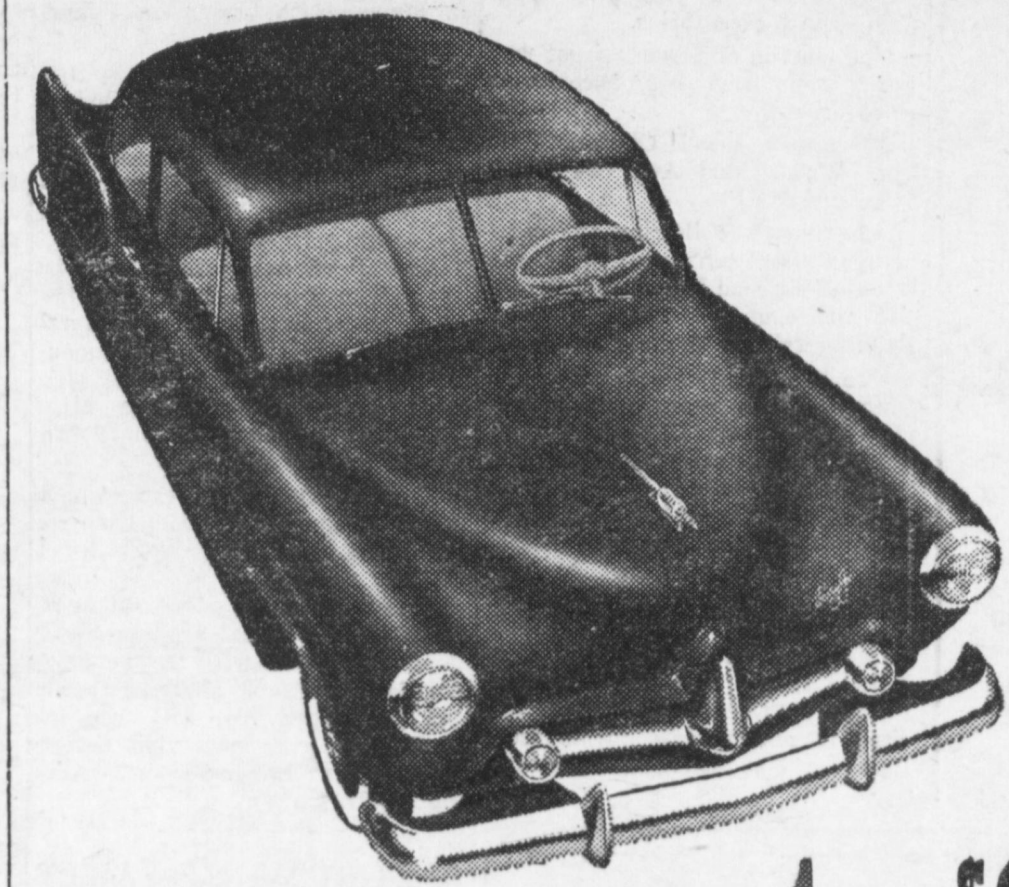
