At Rattlesnake Point they are catching gaff tops and some nice drum and a few trout were landed Wednesday.

Bill Bardwell and friend got six nice trout on the flats in front of Smitty's Bait Stand Tuesday and a few trout were taken off the point south of there last Tuesday. Smitty says it is rough out from shore now.

At Mills' Wharf they are still catching gaff tops and a few trout.

Fishing is better near Floyd's Boat and Sales. Robert Lee went out from there Thursday to Beacon 60 and got 17 trout and Denny caught 22 right out on the flats the same day. Leo Barrow caught a 4-pound red on the flats south of Floyd's and Mr. and Mrs. C. M. Spires came in with 24 trout which they caught there the same day.

A fisherman caught a 9-pound drum at Perry's Wharf yesterday and Bill Turner and family from San Antonio, fished out there Saturday and Sunday, catching 51 gaff tops and 3 nice reds.

## Gus Glasscock To Drill Soon In Copano Bay

C. G. Glasscock, Corpus Christi independent operator and contractor whose 3 drilling barges have played a major role in development of the Mustang Island Field of Corpus Christi Bay, soon will start operating on his own leases in Copano Bay in the new West Fulton Beach play.

Glasscock has applied for a Department of the Army blanket permit for development of his leases in State Tracts 5, 21, 27, 28, 29, 48, 49, 62 and 63, central to a point about 8 miles northwest of Rockport.

While Glasscock, who heads the only South Texas firm which owns drilling barges, has had plenty of shallow-water drilling experience, this will be his first water venture on his own lease.

In the Mud Flats area, Aransas County, Sun Oil Co. No. 2 Milton Gabriel was plugged after going to 9,545 feet, with no shows of value. Mud logger was attached during drilling, and electrical log was bottom. This test was about 420 feet off the San Patricio County line, and about 3,960 feet southeast of Sun No. 1 Gabriel, San Pat well which made 11 1/2 barrels of oil plus 85 percent water on pump from F-1 Sand perforations at 9,018-28 feet.

In Copano Bay Field, Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 10 Copano Bay-State, Tract 16 was drilling Friday at 7,152 feet on a test permitted to 7,350 feet.

In Fulton Beach Field Placid Oil Co. No. 1 Fulton Outlot Unit 4 was preparing to perforate the E-1 Sand at 7,698-706 feet where cores showed sand with good shows. Casing was set at 7,737 feet in this well which was drilled by a TG&M Drilling Co. rig.

Western Natural Gas Co. No. 13 St. Charles Ranch Co. wildcat which had tested several zones below 9,000 feet was testing on perforations at 8,842-48 feet.

Several productive gas-distillate sand had been tested but details had been released only on a test run some time ago at 10,320-60 feet where gas flowed at the rate of 7,608,000 cubic feet a day through 1/4-inch choke under 5,150 pounds working pressure and where gas-oil ration was 54,000 to 1.

**Insurance For Newly Covered Workers Explained**

"Just what is old-age and survivors insurance?" That question is frequently asked since the Social Security Act was recently amended to include the self-employed and regular farm and household workers, according to H. M. Cleveland, Manager of the Corpus Christi office of the Social Security Administration.

In answer to the question, Cleveland said, "It is a plan under which families have a regular monthly income when their earnings are cut off by retirement or death.

"The insurance paid as a matter of right because it is earned and paid for by workers, (including the self-employed), and employers," Cleveland explained.

"This family insurance partially replaces the earned income of each retired worker after he is 65 and to the close survivors of a deceased worker.

"The payments range from \$15.00 to \$150.00 a month depending upon the members of the family and the average earnings of the worker," Cleveland explained.

"The insurance is paid to eligible applicants whether the money is needed or not, but an application must be filed with an office of the Social Security Administration before the payments can begin.

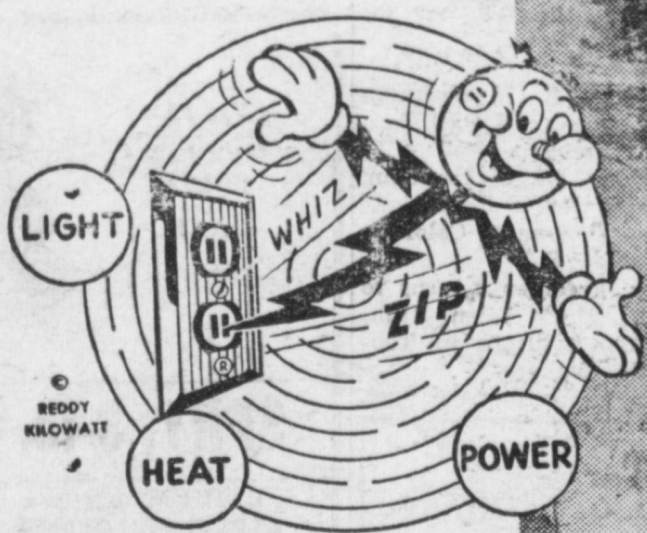

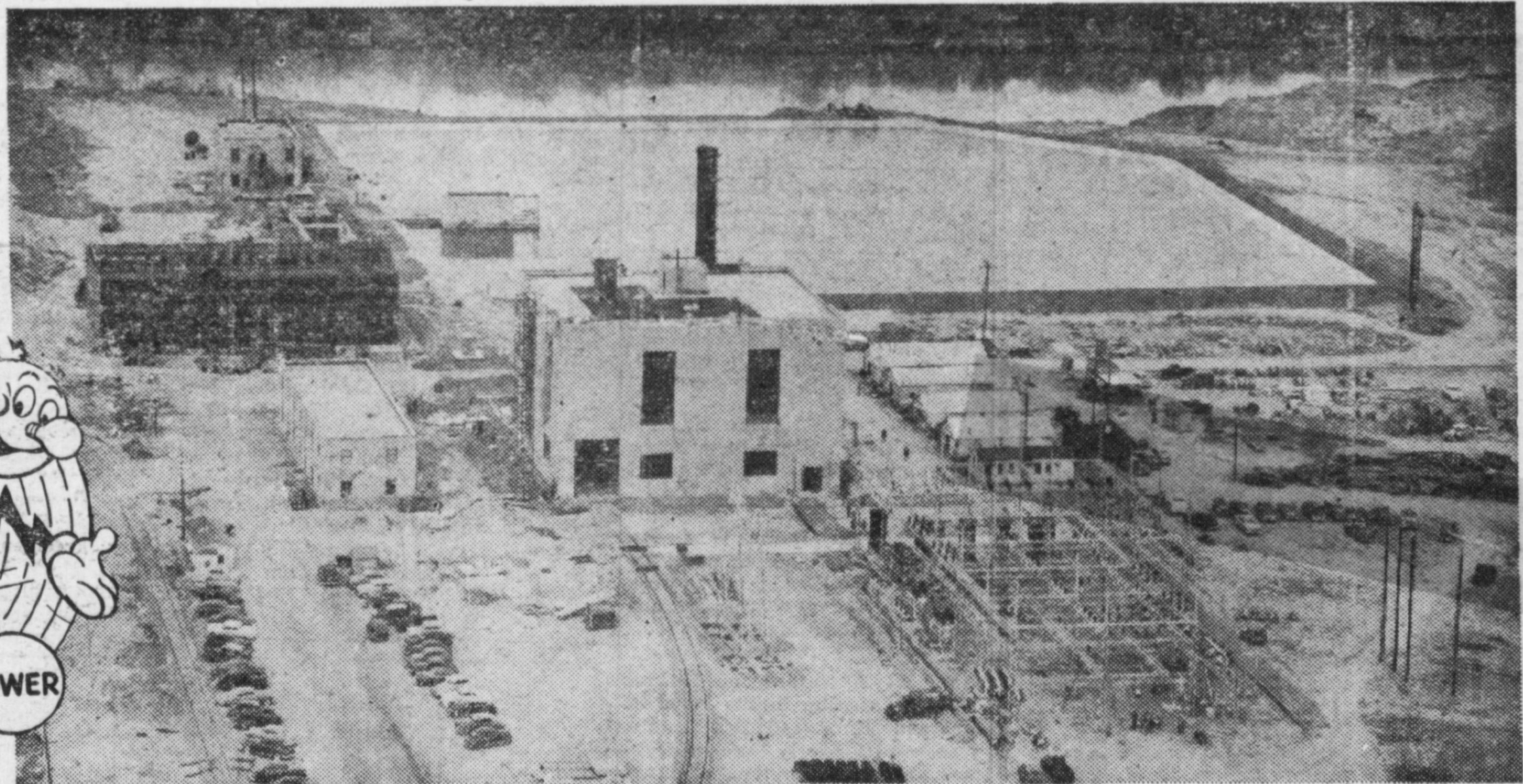
