Sun Oil Co. No. 6 Copano State 68, Copano Bay well in Fulton Beach Field (Sand B-2), Aransas County, flowed 135.06 barrels of 41 gravity oil on potential test through 3/8-inch choke under 850 pounds pressure on tubing, with casing sealed. Perforations were at 7,145-50 feet with 20 shots. Gas-oil ratio was 888 to 1.

Placid Oil Co. No. 1 Fulton Out Lot Unit 4, Fulton Beach Field, Aransas County, was complete as a pumper on perforations in the E-1 Sand at 7,699-707 feet. A TG&M rig dug this well, which is in William Carper Survey, A-47.

F. William Carr No. 1 T. P. McCampbell Estate, Aransas County wildcat just north of Aransas Pass, was coring at 7,765 feet yesterday. This is a sidetrack job, around 4,000 feet, from an old Tom Graham dry hole drilled more than a decade ago.

County-wide Chest X-ray July 11 and 12

County Health Officer Dr. H. F. Elliot and other interested citizens of Aransas County, met Tuesday morning with Chas. H. Hoover, field representative of the Tuberculosis Division of the State Health Department, in the Rockport school cafeteria and named Sheriff Arley Shivers as general chairman of the free chest X-ray examination which will be held here July 11 and 12 from 9 a. m. until 5:30 p. m.

On this date everyone in the county who is over 15 years of age is urged to have their chest X-rayed. Visitors in Rockport at that time are urged to be X-rayed. This free X-ray is not charity, but is paid for with taxes of the people the same as other state and county improvements and in taking these examinations you help your doctor, your county and your state. It will take only 30 seconds to five minutes of your time.

In 1949 there were 1,450 persons X-rayed in Aransas County. Of this number 60 cases of tuberculosis were detected and 18 other chest pathology cases were found. In 1950 there were 928 who were X-rayed with only 38 cases showing up.

This examination is not compulsory in Aransas County, but the State Health Department urges everyone handling food in any form to submit to an X-ray.

Aransas Schools Will Be Crowded Next Year

Following is a list of the number of school children in the public schools of Aransas County, according to grade and the number of teachers employed to teach each grade, and the number of rooms available for classrooms in each school building.

In the Rockport Elementary School there are 50 pupils to be in the first grade next year; 52 in the second grade, 68 in the third grade, 55 in the fourth grade, 50 in the fifth. There will be 60 pupils in the sixth grade, 61 in the seventh grade and 37 in the eighth grade, not allowing for any increase in the scholastic population during the summer.

At the present time every available room in both of the elementary buildings is utilized and there is one class room in the Home Making cottage with a total of 14 teachers now employed. According to the number of pupils in the grade there should be two first grade teachers, three third grade teachers, two in the fourth, two in the fifth, two in the sixth, and two in the seventh, and one in the eighth grade, making a total of 16 teachers in this school.

In the Fulton Elementary School there are 14 pupils in the first grade, 19 in the second, 18 in the third grade, 14 in the fourth, and nine in the fifth grade; 17 in the sixth grade and eight pupils in the seventh grade. These classes are small and four teachers are taking care of them, but one class meets in the auditorium and one in a building on the campus which does not even have a rest room.

In Aransas County High School next fall there will be 41 students in the freshman class, 31 in the sophomore, 46 in the junior class and 25 seniors. With the use of the study hall in the gymnasium and the science room the students can be taken care of fairly satisfactorily.

These figures are based on the number of students in school last year and there have been new families with at least 12 children of scholastic age moved in within the last three weeks.

Thompson was severely cut by a power saw about 7:30 a. m. at the Aransas Pass Progress. The cause of the accident is not definitely known, since Thompson was alone in the printing shop at the time, and was found shortly afterward. He had been employed by the newspaper throughout the time he lived here.

OPS Price Chart Filing Explained

Some apparel and consumer goods retailers still must file pricing charts with the district Office of Price Stabilization.

San Antonio district OPS reminded today that the only retailers who need NOT file such charts, and who will continue to price under the general ceiling price regulation, are the following:

1. Those whose annual sales are under \$20,000 in all merchandise covered by CPR 7 (clothing, furniture and other consumer durable goods).

2. Those whose sales of all retail goods are less than \$100,000 a year may price only housewares, notions, sporting goods, silverware, china, glassware, jewelry, watches and clocks under GPCR and need NOT file a price chart on those items, but must file a chart on other items covered by CPR 7.

3. Those whose sales of the items listed above are under \$60,000 per year may also price those items only under GPCR and need NOT file charts on those items; however, they still are under ceiling price regulation 7 as far as clothing, furniture and certain other consumer durable goods are concerned.

Heldenfels Bros. Awarded Contract For Blacktopping

The City of Rockport has awarded the street blacktopping contract to Heldenfels Bros. for a price of 53 cents per linear foot, 20 feet wide. The contract calls for blacktopping some 27 blocks in the city and work will start within two weeks.

The shell base for this work was laid through the cooperation of county and city officials. The county furnished their grader and truck, while the city paid for the shell and furnished a truck also.

Individual property owners who desire that additional blacktopping be done in front of their property should contact Heldenfels Bros. immediately as they are making a special price for this work if it is done while their equipment is working on the street. Additional blacktopping will be done on a basis of \$1.45 per cubic yard for shell and 25 cents per square yard for the topping.

The city street project for this year adds greatly to their goal of providing good streets for the residents of the city. However, some streets around the waterfront are in dire need of repairs at this time. Since this property does not belong to the city, any improvement will have to come from other governmental bodies.

OPS Issues Interim Orders

Some wholesalers and retailers have been allowed interim action by OPS to permit adjustments in prices under the general freeze order of Jan. 26.

San Antonio district OPS officials today said supplemental regulation 29 was issued to meet two urgent needs: 1. Provide for follow through on upward or downward changes in prices resulting from operation of manufacturers' OPS regulations; 2. Take wholesalers and retailers out of "squeezes" under the freeze order.

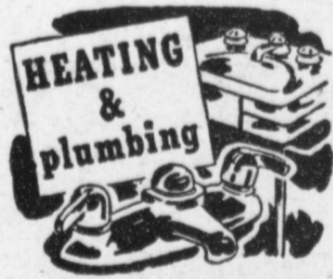

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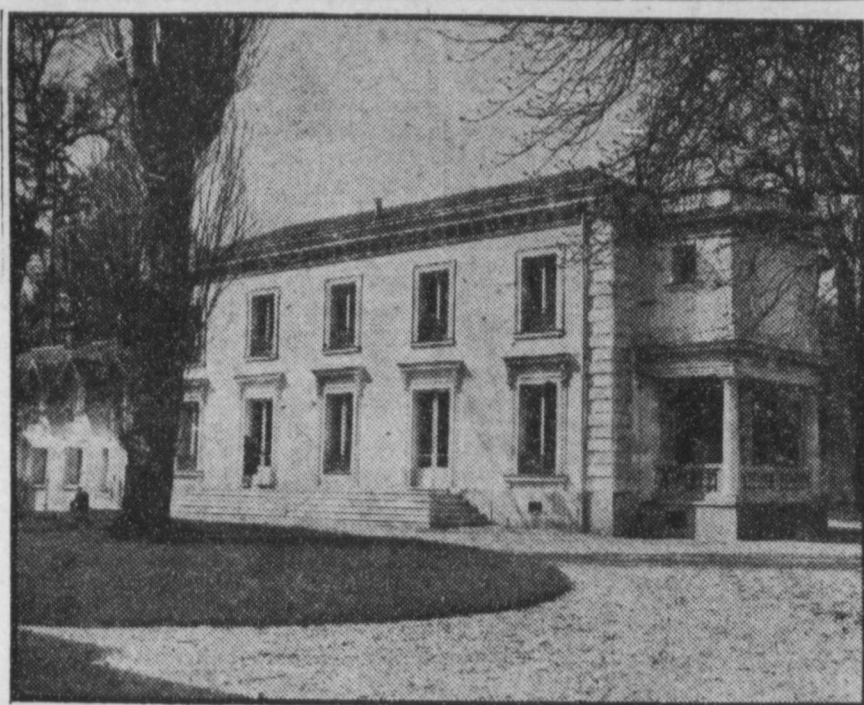

Radiological Health Hazards Will Be Studied In Austin Short Course

Radiological health hazards involved in civil defense will come under five days of intensive study at a short course to be conducted at the State Department of Health in Austin beginning June 11. State Health Officer George W. Cox has announced.

Radiological hazards result from atomic bombing, being one of the bomb's most dangerous aspects.

Designed primarily to indoctrinate supervisory personnel in the essentials of radiation defense so they can conduct training programs in their own communities, Dr. Cox said the course would be held each month during the summer for a different class of participants.

The health officer said the study is open to:

Representatives of counties or cities where radiological defense is not vested in local health departments; supervisory or professional personnel of local health departments; representatives of state departments engaged in civil defense work; fire and police training officers or instructors; and members of industrial medical or safety departments contemplating in-plant programs.

Dr. Cox, chief of Texas health and emergency medical services, summarized the course as covering:

Where radiological defense fits into overall defense activities; definition of radiation language and units; radiation physics; theory and application of instruments; atomic bomb phenomena; area and personnel monitoring (checking for radioactivity); uses of radiation and radioisotopes; radiation protection and decontamination; psychology of disasters; and organization protection and decontamination; psychology of disaster; and organization of local communities for radiological defense.

Lectures will be supplemented by laboratory exercises and demonstration, Dr. Cox said, and time will be spent on review of physics, chemistry, and the mathematics required for calculations.

"We're going to put on a really worthwhile course," he indicated. "The army is going to help us."

He said additional courses would be held as "necessity demanded."

No tuition will be charged. Application should be submitted to Dr. Cox at the State Department of Health in Austin, and include education and background of applicants. Trainees are expected to arrange their own travel and living conditions while attending the course.

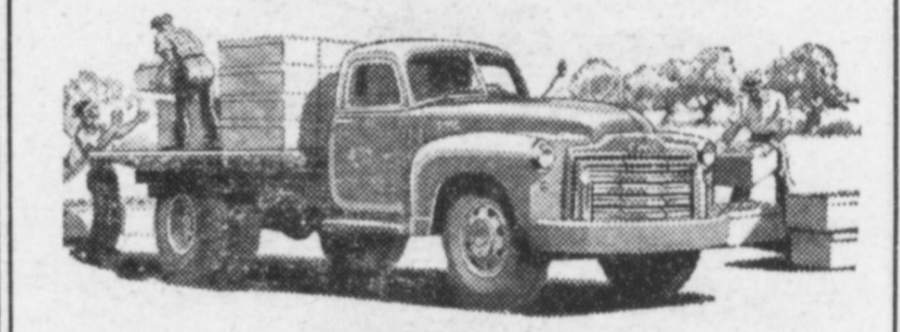

Poison Ivy Infection Varies Says Dr. Cox

Austin, Texas.—Poison ivy infection varies according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Sometimes there is only a slight redness of the skin, at other times there will be aggravated swelling and blisters covering large areas of your skin. In mild cases the skin is covered with numerous small blisters.

Poison ivy flourishes in the woods or in the open, in dry or moist locations, and it is particularly abundant along fence rows, paths, and roadways, often climbing posts and trees to considerable heights. While there are a great many plants which may irritate the skin of susceptible persons most of the cases of plant dermatitis in Texas are caused by poison ivy.

It is impossible for the average person to learn to recognize all the plants which are known to be skin irritants but, many cases of plant poisoning could be prevented if the public would learn to recognize and avoid contact with poison ivy.

Dr. Cox gives these points to remember about poison ivy: (1) you can recognize it by its leaves, which are grouped in threes—two of the dark green leaves are on short stems and the center one is on a longer stem; (2) The plant appears as a low shrub, a vine hanging over fences or trees, or in a heavy thicket; (3) When you have come into contact with poison ivy, be sure to wash the spots with soap and water several times, as the soapy water removes most of the poisonous material; and (4) If the infection causes much discomfort, see your family doctor.

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TAGGED FISH AID STUDIES

Austin, Tex. — A poor man's fishing contest designed to ultimately improve coastal fishing is being conducted by the Texas Game, Fish & Oyster Commission, according to the executive secretary.

Commission scientists hope, through reports on tagged fish caught, to gather needed data on such prized species as the salt water trout, the drum, redfish and flounders.

The winners, or the anglers catching a tagged fish and turning in the tag, will be rewarded with a year's subscription to "Texas Game and Fish," Commission magazine. The tags should be forwarded to Game, Fish & Oyster Commission, Rockport, Texas.

Ernest G. Simmons, of the Rockport laboratory staff, tells about the contest in the coming June issue of the magazine.

He writes that posters about reporting the tags have been placed along the coastal area, and adds that anglers should look for the tags which have been placed either on the tail or the gill cover of the fish.

To date, approximately 1,650 fish have been tagged and released. The ultimate goal of the project, Simmons reports, is the tagging of 10,000 fish in the area between Port Isabel and Port O'Connor.

"Cooperation of the sports fishermen and commercial fishermen will help up get the complete story on the migrations of these fish," Simmons states in his article. "Data already has been obtained on their spawning habits. The place of spawning is known. The growth rate to some extent is known, food preferences and feeding habits have been thoroughly investigated. Little, however, is known of the movements and migrations of these species."

The executive secretary pointed out that the magazine subscription reward for fishermen reporting the tags is "a mere token acknowledgment." "The main reward will be the knowledge of the fishermen sending in the tags that they are a vital part of an effort to provide better fishing."

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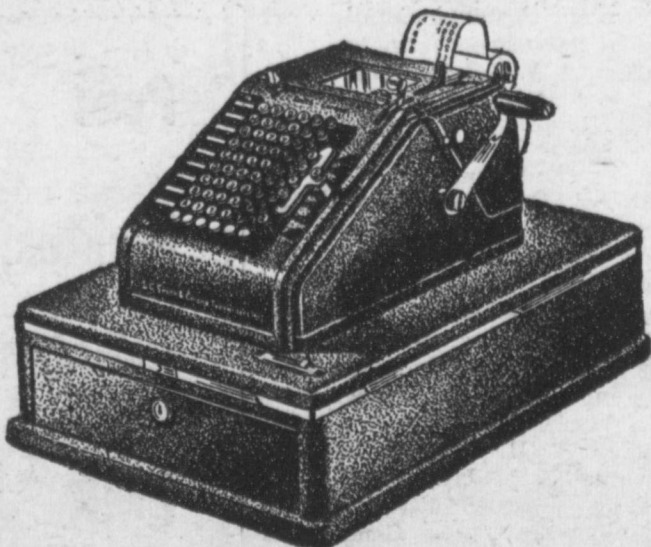

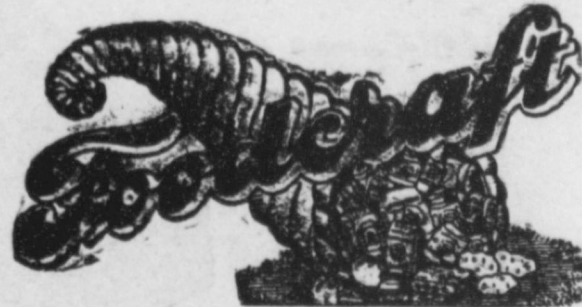
