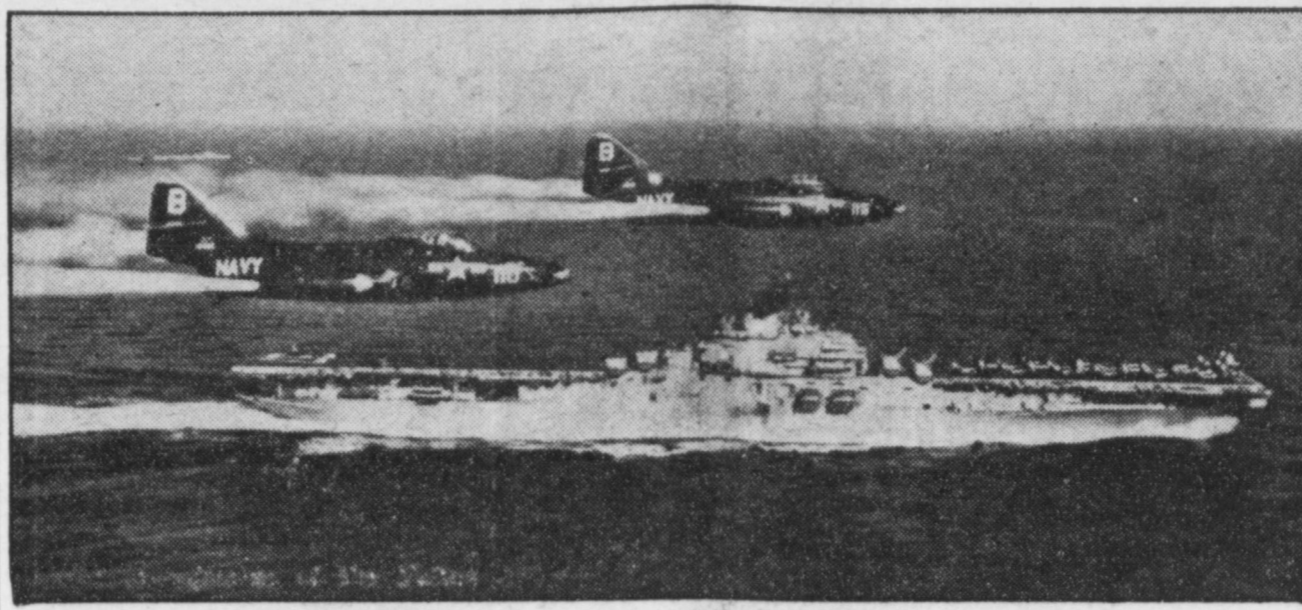
Stamp Club to Meet At Marine Laboratory

Highway 35 Scene of Two Auto Wrecks

On June 14, Daniel Whittaker from Corpus Christi, driving a 1950 Dodge, going south on Highway 35, about six miles out from Lamar, apparently went to sleep while driving and ran into the back of a 1937 Chevrolet, driven by Roger Caraway, a hotel clerk from Temple, and knocked Caraway's car across the ditch and broke off two fence posts. Caraway's car turned and came back on the highway and Whittaker's car hit him on the bumper and shoved him 50 feet down the ditch.

Caraway's wife was riding with him and neither of them were injured, but Whittaker received a bruise on the head.

Whittaker paid Caraway \$200 damage on the Chevrolet; his own car received about \$300 damage. Charges were filed against him for reckless driving and he plead guilty in Judge Davis' court and paid his fine. Deputy Sheriff Mundine and Haynes investigated this week.

On June 15, Elbert B. Graham from Magnolia, Ark., was driving a 1940 Plymouth sedan west of Lamar on Highway 35 and collided with a truck of ranch hands, working on the Salt Creek Ranch. It is reported the truck driver, Alfredo Cruz, gave the hand signal that he was going to turn into the ranch road, but the sun shining in Graham's eyes blinded him and he did not see the signal to turn. Graham's Plymouth received \$400 damage and the truck was put into the ditch. Sheriff Shivers and Deputy Mundine investigated the wreck and no charges were filed, as it appeared to be an unavoidable accident.

Eight Guests at Rotary Luncheon

The Rockport Rotary Club enjoyed their weekly dinner meeting at the Methodist annex Wednesday noon. There were eight guests present: Oscar Koepke, president of the Corpus Christi Rotary Club; L. D. Garrison and Mrs. Helen Jackson, also from Corpus Christi; Bill Lions and Napier Rogers from San Antonio; R. W. Celglazer from Alamo Heights, and Ben Swett of Rockport.

Shelley Roaten had charge of the program and presented D. W. Miles from the Rockport Marine Laboratory as guest speaker, who spoke on the trout and redfish. The Marine Laboratory began studying these fish in local bays but have extended their research from Port O'Connor to Laguna Madre, but find that most of the trout are produced in Copano, St. Charles and San Antonio bays, moving into Aransas Bay when about one year old. A year old trout is from 6 to 8 inches long and a 12 to 14 inch trout is about three years old.

The grass which is best for trout to feed on grows in this area, and the main spawning months are June and July and Mr. Miles is in favor of closing the spawning area during this period. He says that commercial fishermen do not injure small fish and that there are certain chemicals that can be placed in the water causing the fish to develop more rapidly. One of the largest trout killed in the freeze was 48 inches long and was about 18 years old.

The redfish spawn in the gulf, about five miles from shore. They hide in the grass there, and grow faster than trout, measuring 14 inches long when one year old.

Mr. Miles does not think that the oil wells in the bay harm the fish as the men from the Marine Lab have watched schools of fish feeding near a well for several months with no ill effects. The slick washes to shore instead of sinking and the trout feed on the bottom of the bay.

Mr. Miles told of catching a tagged drum that had traveled 40 miles from where it was tagged and had doubled in weight.

Aransas Pass Test Dry; Wildcat Drills In Sand

Shallow bay wildcats in the north part of Aransas County yesterday were supplying the most closely-watched activity, with several exploratory tests underway.

In St. Charles Bay, Sun Oil Co. No. 1 St. Charles State 387, wildcat about 2 miles southeast of Lamar, was drilling in sand and shale at 8,028 feet Friday, on a possible 10,500-foot venture.

Out in Aransas Bay, Humble Oil and Refining Co. No. 1 Aransas Bay State Tract 118, 3 miles south of Lamar, set 10 1/4-inch surface casing at 3,098 feet and was drilling at 3,303 feet. Contract depth is 10,000 feet.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 10 Copano Bay State, in State Tract 16, was drilling in sidetracked hole at 6,866 feet.

To the south Sun No. 1 Copano State 75 was at 8,105 feet in sand preparing to core. Sun No. 3-69 was waiting on the Brewster and Bartle rig from the No. 1-75.

Stanolind Oil and Gas Co. had a pair of Fulton Beach Field tests running in Copano Bay. The No. 5 State Tract 70 was drilling at 5,984 feet, and the No. 6-70 was drilling at 6,213 feet. Cotton Dickson and C. G. Glasscock barges were digging these tests.

In Salt Lake Field, Atlantic Refining Co. No. 5 V. G. Gwynn, J. Hollis Survey, A-76, set 10 1/4-inch surface casing at 1,513 feet and was drilling at 5,660 feet.

North of St. Charles Field, Western Natural Gas Co. No. 13 St. Charles Ranch Co., gas-distillate discovery continued to test yesterday on perforations at 10,320-60 feet.

Down in the Aransas Pass area, F. William Carr No. 1 McCampbell Estate, drilled to 8,420 feet in sidetracked hole and was abandoned. This test was whipstocked around 4,000 feet out of an old Tom Graham dry hole drilled in 1938.

CAP Meeting at Refugio Friday, June 22

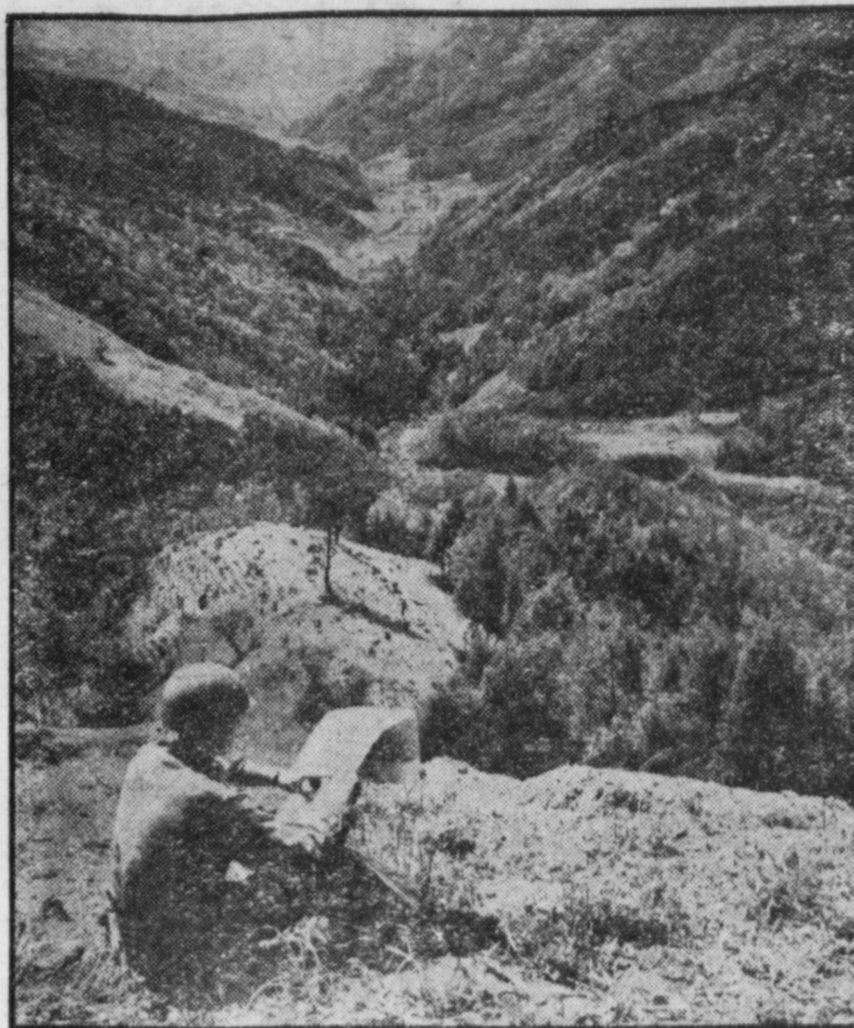

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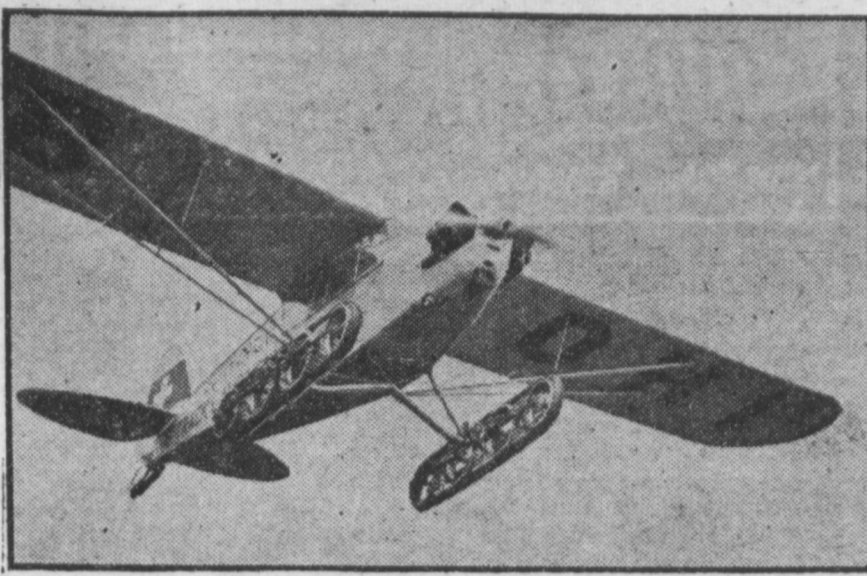

Known Range of Oak Wilt Extended in 1950

Oak wilt, a fungus disease which is causing grave concern in forestry and wildlife circles, has been discovered in six new states as a result of the joint survey made by the individual states and the Division of Forest Pathology of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the Wildlife Management Institute reports.

Freshly discovered points of infection were mapped last year in Pennsylvania, Ohio, Arkansas, Nebraska and Kansas. The disease also was found to be spreading actively in southern Missouri. Many infected trees were found in otherwise healthy stands and, at one infected location first surveyed in 1949, nine separate infection areas were found last year in a 160-acre tract around the original center. Trees in 19 additional counties were found to be diseased in 1950, although many of these represent previously undiscovered infestations of earlier origin.

Neither the agent which spreads the disease nor its cure has yet been discovered by scientists, although many of them are working overtime on these jobs. Until the manner by which the fungus spores are spread is discovered, there is little that can be done to control the disease. It is known that local spreading takes place through natural root grafts between neighboring trees, but this does not account for the broad leaps from western Indiana to central Ohio to central Pennsylvania which are indicated on the distribution map of the blight. Neither does the pattern of spread hint at windborne spores. Many believe that some insect, bird, or rodent may be the host. To date only the prompt cutting and removal of diseased trees can be recommended. Where valuable shade trees are involved, ditching to sever the interlocking root systems between infected and healthy trees has been used.

Fortunately, there is no indication to date that oak wilt is developing anything like the whirlwind momentum attained by the chestnut blight that swept like a forest fire through every stand of chestnut in the United States during the second decade of the century. The more gradual and sporadic spread of the disease, coupled with advances in forest research, give substantial hope that a control method may yet be devised. Much depends, however, upon the funds and manpower made available to the still under-financed and understaffed forest research laboratories at both state and federal levels which, together, share a monumental task.

Retirement Insurance Is Paid To Employed Workers Over Age 75

Under the new Social Security Act, workers may continue in regular full time employment after they reach age 75 and receive their old age insurance at the same time, according to H. M. Cleveland, Manager of the Corpus Christi office of the Social Security Administration.

"We believe that some of those affected by this provision may not be familiar with it," Cleveland said. "If they will file their applications, we can start their payments now."

Before the new social security law went into effect last September, payments could not be made to any insured worker over 65 who continued in a job covered by social security if he earned more than \$14.99 in a month. Under the new law, an insured person may earn up to \$50 a month in work covered by social security. After a worker reaches age 75, he may engage in any kind of employment or self-employment and receive benefit payments regardless of the amount of his earnings.

Cleveland says that his experience has been that most people are reluctant to stop working at any age if they are still in good health. He further points out that this new provision for insured people over age 75 will be an incentive to continue in gainful work.

He urges all insured workers aged 75 or older, who have not yet applied for their insurance payments to do so without delay. Back payments can be made for as many as six months, but failure to make application promptly, may result in the loss of one or more months payments to the worker and his dependents. Applications should be filed with the Social Security Administration, 424 Taylor Street, Corpus Christi, Texas.

VACATION CODE GIVEN PARENTS

Austin, Texas. — A vacation formula to carry on into the fall some of the joys from summer play was offered Texas parents this week.

The designer was Mrs. R. O. Pearson of Abilene, director of state women's activities for the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

In a bulletin to NFIP Chapters, Mrs. Pearson admonished parents to convert between-school relaxation into "a vehicle for future strength" by supervising youngsters' activities during the hot weather.

She cautioned that childish enthusiasm oftentimes prompts excessive play and extreme fatigue, thereby inviting polio to strike.

"Many families find themselves compromised after school lets out for the summer," Mrs. Pearson said. "They have become accustomed to depending on the schools as the major factor in supervision."

"By now accepting their full responsibility and by realizing their obligations extend beyond feeding, clothing and housing their children, parents may help extend the gaiety of summer into the fall. Above all they will have helped prevent the vacation period from proving detrimental."

"This is simple logic because polio is more prevalent during the summer months. The record Texas incidence during the last three summers should stimulate interest in these safeguards."

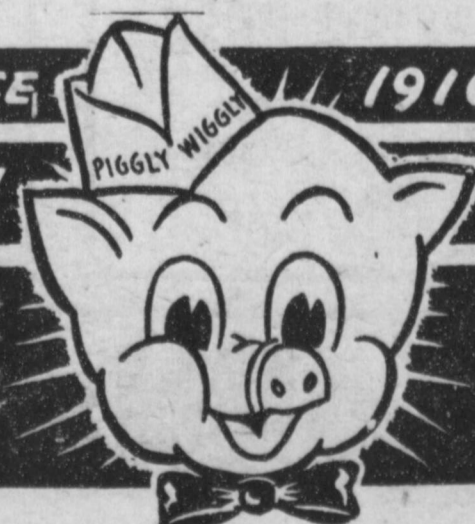

56 Wildlife Bills Are Passed

Austin—Fifty-six bills bearing on wildlife were passed by the recent Legislature.

A tentative check on the measures enacted indicates that only a few have a state-wide effect. Most of them were local bills.

The major acts, according to the Executive Secretary, were those to:

Increase the Game and Fish Commission from six to nine members.

Provide one hunting license at a cost of \$2.15 instead of the old small game license of \$2.00 and the big game license of \$2.15.

Authorize the Commission to accept the state's share of the new

federal tax on sporting fishing equipment.

Require boat-for-hire operators to furnish life preservers for each person using a rented boat, with game wardens empowered to enforce the law.

Give local courts power to revoke hunting and fishing privileges after game or fish law violations.

Some of the more important "local" bills passed were to:

Set up a new wildlife regulatory area in the counties of Jack, Young, Stephens, Palo Pinto, Erath and Hood, with the Commission authorized to open and close seasons and determine bag limits.

Authorize the Commission to cooperate with federal authorities

in managing wildlife in the National Forests in Houston and Trinity Counties.

Permit commercial fishing of menhaden with purse seines in a restricted Gulf area since scientists have found that game fish do NOT use these rough fish species for food.

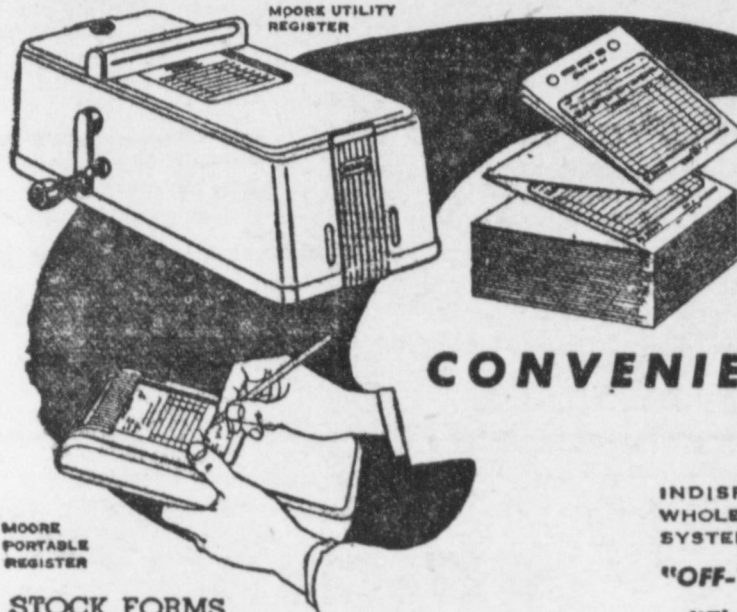

U. S. Army Invites 2300 Civilians To Accept Employment

Fort Sam Houston—The United States Army is inviting 2300 civilians to accept employment at Army installations in Austria, Germany, Alaska, Okinawa and Japan.

At salaries which range from \$2650 to \$7600 per year, the Army urgently needs construction and maintenance personnel; communication engineers and technicians; automotive engineers and mechanics; safety engineers, engineering and survey aides; draftsmen; typists and stenographers; librarians, industrial and cost accountants; auditors, storekeepers and warehousemen; property and supply clerks; tabulating machine operators; economists, and public health physicians. Civilian personnel in Alaska and Okinawa receive an additional 25% allowance in pay; and in Japan it is 10%.

Transportation will be provided both ways to successful applicants and, in addition, all Army facilities available to military personnel will be furnished to civilian employees who take advantage of the offer.

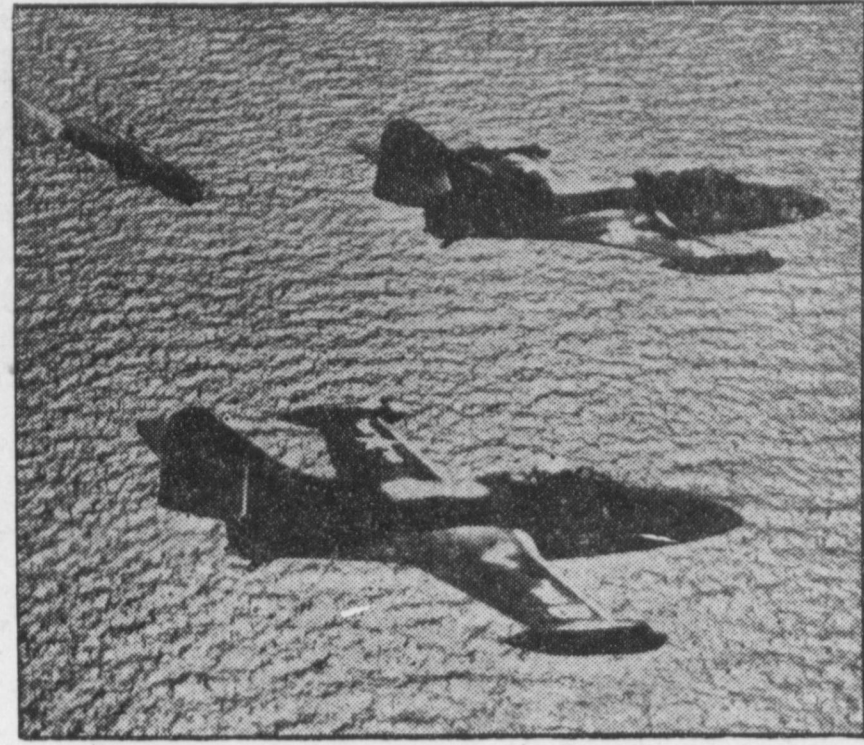
The approximate cost of living for a civilian employee overseas compares most favorably with the cost of living at home. In Alaska subsistence will cost the single worker \$75 per month, in Austria and Germany, \$60; in Okinawa \$45 monthly and in Japan only \$35. 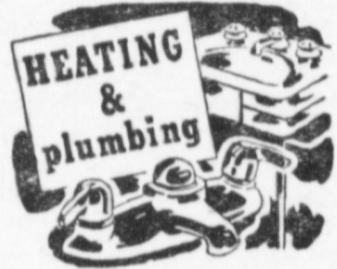

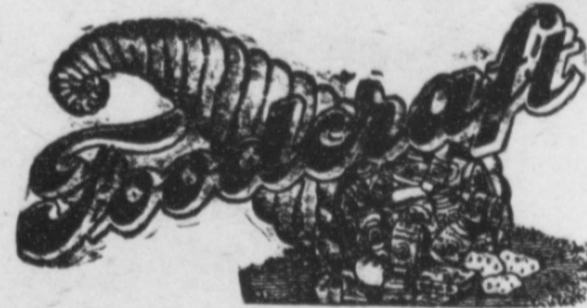
