Citing earnings of only two cents on every dollar's worth of property in Rockport during 1950, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company today asked city authorities for an increase in rates on local

"Approval of new rates is needed to help bring earnings up to a reasonable level and improve the financial condition of the Rockport telephone exchange," Stan Bell, district manager of Southwestern Bell said.

"There has been a tremendous demand for telephone service here during the last five years," Bell said. "And the telephone company has spent more than \$150,000 to meet this demand. "Actually, the telephone system

s more than twice as big as it was at the beginning of 1946," he explained. "There now are 821 telephones in service here, while in 1946 the total was 327. "This expansion has been accomplished in the face of the

high levels of postwar costs-for materials, for equipment, and for labor," the manager pointed out. The telephone company was granted an increase in rates in November, 1948. "This increase, together with the addition of more telephones to the system here,

"But costs of furnishing service here have been climbing much faster than revenues," he continued, "and earnings continue to

New rates requested by the company for main services are \$7 a month for a business telephone; \$4.00 monthly for individual-line residence telephones; and \$3.25 for two-party lines.





New Workers Rush To Get Social Security Numbers

During the past three months the Social Security Administration issued more than 4950 new numbers to individuals in the seventeen counties in the Corpus Christi service area, according to H. M. Cleveland, manager.

Last year during the same period less than 1,725 new numbers were assigned. Along with the new account numbers, the office also issued about 3,050 duplicate cards to replace original cards which had been lost or worn out.

This heavy increase in demand for account number cards is largely due to recent amendments to the Social Security Act, Cleveland explained. Under these changes, several kinds of work not covered before under the Federal old age and survivors insurance program were brought under the law Jan. 1, 1951. Nationally about 10 million more workers have been added to the system, including an estimated 35 thousand persons in the Corpus Christi area.

These newly covered groups include self employed individuals, (except farm owners and operators, and certain professional groups like lawyers and doctors), regular domestic workers in private homes, and regular farm


