## Aransas Wildcat Complete On Perfs At 10,320-60 Ft.

Western Natural Gas Co., is slated to start a new Aransas County wildcat today near its new deep gas-distillate discovery on a Longhorn Drilling Co. rig had Blackjack Peninsula.

A Longhorn Drilling Co. rig had Blackjack Peninsula. The wildcat is half a mile southwest of the No. 13 St. Charles, gas-distillate discovery on perforations at 10,320-360 feet. The well was shut in, no gauge, yesterday, waiting on potential test. Shut-in pressure was 6,850 pounds and estimated gas-oil ratio was 40,000 to 50,000 to 1.

Sun Oil Co. No. 1 St Charles State 387, wildcat in St. Charles Bay, 2 miles southeast of Lamar, was drilling ahead at 8,717 feet yesterday on a 10,500-foot contract.

Humble Oil and Refining Co. No. 1, Aransas Bay State Tract 118, a mile south of Mills Wharf was drilling Friday at 5,790 feet on a possible 10,000-foot test.

Atlantic Refining Co. No. 5 V. G. Wynne, Salt Lake Field, on drill-test at 7,140-45 feet, recovered water cushion and 540 feet of oil cut with gas and was straightening hole. Electrical log was to 3,954 feet, and the well was cored 3,980-7,090-145 feet, finding gas show at 6,987-7,000 and 7,237-39 feet and oil shows at 7,139-44 1/2 feet.

## Telephone Co. Petitions City For Rate Increase

Citing earnings of only two cents on every dollar's worth of property in Rockport during 1950, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company today asked city authorities for an increase in rates on local telephone service in this city.

"Approval of new rates is needed to help bring earnings up to a reasonable level and improve the financial condition of the Rockport telephone exchange," Stan Bell, district manager of Southwestern Bell said.

"There has been a tremendous demand for telephone service here during the last five years," Bell said. "And the telephone company has spent more than \$150,000 to meet this demand.

"Actually, the telephone system is more than twice as big as it was at the beginning of 1946," he explained. "There now are 821 telephones in service here, while in 1946 the total was 327."

"This expansion has been accomplished in the face of the high levels of postwar costs—for materials, for equipment, and for labor," the manager pointed out.

The telephone company was granted an increase in rates in November, 1948. "This increase, together with the addition of more telephones to the system here, brought in more revenue," Bell said.

"But costs of furnishing service here have been climbing much faster than revenues," he continued, "and earnings continue to lag."

New rates requested by the company for main services are \$7 a month for a business telephone; \$4.00 monthly for individual-line residence telephones; and \$3.25 for two-party lines.

Bell emphasized that the \$150,000 which has been spent to expand the telephone plant in Rockport did not come from rates telephone users pay for service.

"This money came from thousands of men and women throughout the country who have put their savings in the telephone business. They expect the management of the business to invest their money where it will earn a fair return."

His wife, the former Mildred Wilkinson, Rockport, resides with him in Selma, Ala.—The Aransas Progress.

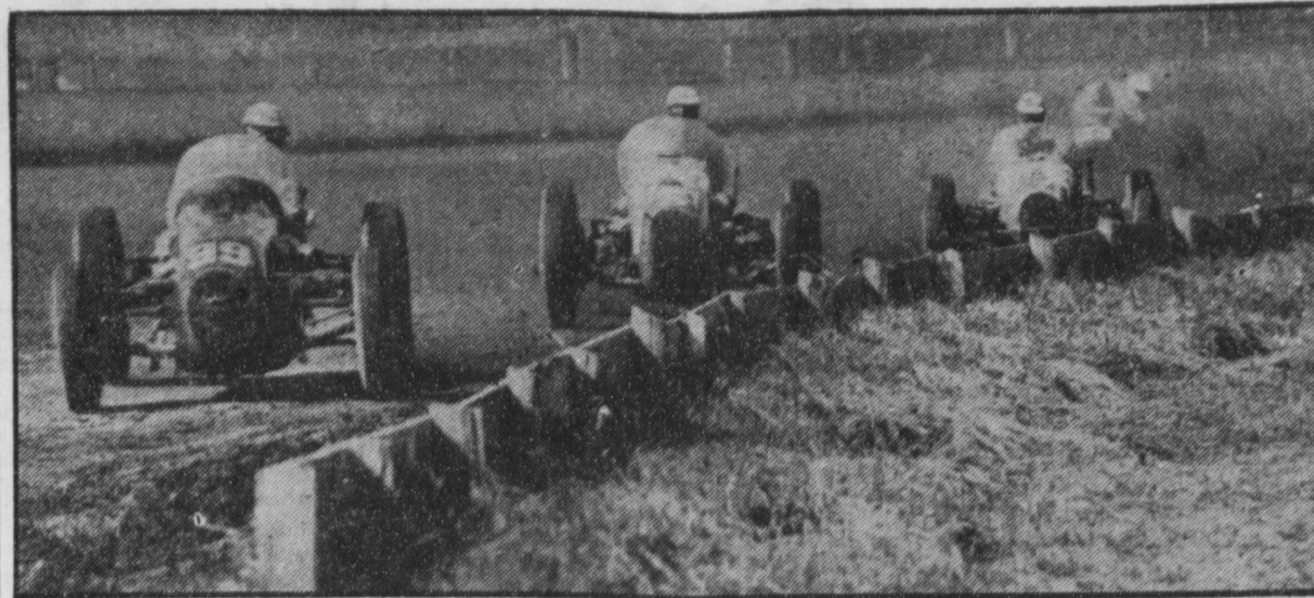
### Cleanup Drive Termed Success By Committee

### Polio Pointers for 1951

Allow children to play with friends they have been with right along. Keep them away from new people, especially in the close daily living of a home.

Wash hands carefully before eating and always after using the toilet—especially important when polio is around. Always keep food clean and covered.

Watch for signs of sickness,

such as headache, fever, sore throat, sore muscles, upset stomach, stiff neck or back, extreme tiredness or nervousness, trouble in breathing or swallowing.

Put a sick person to bed at once, away from others and call the doctor. Quick action may lessen crippling.

Telephone your local chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, if you need help. Locate through telephone book or health department. No patient need go without care for lack of money. Your chapter will pay what you cannot afford.

Remember—at least half of all polio patients get well without any crippling.

Don't—Get over tired by hard play, exercise, work or travel. This means men, women or children. Get chilled, bathe or swim long in cold water, or sit around in wet clothes. Have mouth or throat operation during a polio outbreak. Use another person's towel, dishes, tableware or the like. Take children to places where there is polio. Ask your Health Department. Take your child out of camp or play ground, where there is not good health supervision.—The Taft Tribune.

**Beef Posting Delayed by OPS**

Posting of beef ceiling prices by retailers has been postponed to August 1, San Antonio district OPS officers announced. However, OPS beef regulations require retailers to display their beef selling prices on each tray in which different cuts of the meat are shown.

**Meat Quotas Upped for Military**

OPS announced today that federally-inspected slaughterers will be permitted to increase their regular monthly quotas of cattle and swine to the extent of which they require animals to produce meat for military services.

This can be done beginning with the accounting period which started June 3. The increases are limited to 15 per cent and may be made without making application to OPS, but detailed reports must be made to OPS at the end of each accounting period.

**Veal Remains Under "Freeze"**

Ceiling prices on veal currently remain under the OPS general freeze order of Jan. 26, but a new regulation affecting it is being prepared in Washington, district OPS officials said.

Meanwhile, slaughterers, wholesalers and retailers are required not to sell veal at prices higher than their highest prices of the base period, Dec. 19, 1950, through Jan. 25, 1951, to the same class of customers.

**Rule 4 Change Help Retailers**

An amendment to rule 4 of CPR 7 has been approved by OPS to bring some retailers of consumer goods out of service "squeezes" on seasonal merchandise.

The regulation as amended now permits the retailer pricing his merchandise under CPR 7 to apply the average percentage markup resulting from use of the next higher and next lower net costs of items in the same category

**New Workers Rush To Get Social Security Numbers**

During the past three months the Social Security Administration issued more than 4950 new numbers to individuals in the seven-county area in the Corpus Christi service area, according to H. M. Cleveland, manager.

Last year during the same period less than 1,725 new numbers were assigned. Along with the new account numbers, the office also issued about 3,050 duplicate cards to replace original cards which had been lost or worn out.

This heavy increase in demand for account number cards is largely due to recent amendments to the Social Security Act, Cleveland explained. Under these changes, several kinds of work not covered before under the Federal old age and survivors insurance program were brought under the law Jan. 1, 1951. Nationally about 10 million more workers have been added to the system, including an estimated 35 thousand persons in the Corpus Christi area.

These newly covered groups include self employed individuals, (except farm owners and operators, and certain professional groups like lawyers and doctors), regular domestic workers in private homes, and regular farm workers.

"A great many of these newly covered workers, particularly household and farm employees, have never had any connection with the social security system before," Cleveland said. "They will need to get account number cards for the first time. Some of these farm and home workers may have

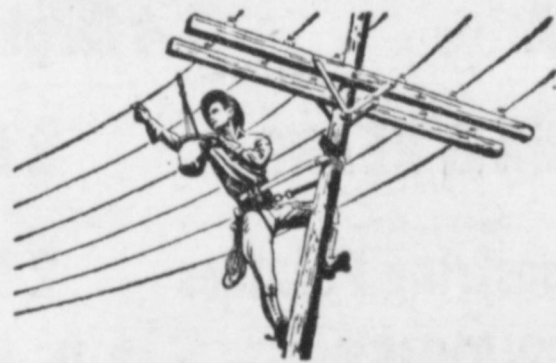

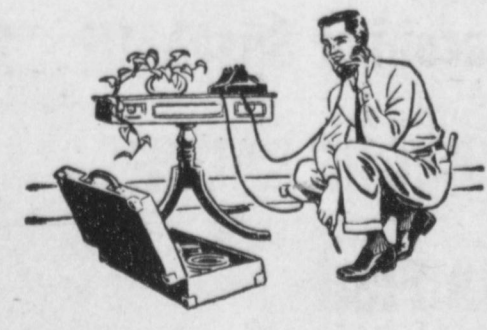
