### St. Charles Bay Wildcat Logs Gas Show at 9,006

Sun Oil Co. No. 1 St. Charles State 387, Aransas County wildcat 2 miles southeast of Lamar and in St. Charles Bay Friday was at 9,008 feet in sand, circulating after mud logger showed 20 units of gas in mud and 6 units of gas in cuttings at 9,066 feet. Shale had been cored at 8,974-89 feet.

Humble Oil and Refining Co. No. 1 Aransas Bay State Tract 118, about 1 1/2 miles south of Lamar, was drilling at 7,515 feet Friday on a possible 10,000-foot test.

Up on Blackjack Peninsula, Natural Gas Co. No. 14 St. Charles Ranch Co., wildcat half a mile southwest of No. 13, gas-distillate discovery at 10,320-360 feet, ran electrical log to 2,581 feet and yesterday was setting 13 1/2-inch surface pipe for an 11,500-foot project.

In Copano Bay Field, Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 10 Copano Bay State, in Tract 16, tested salt water on perforations at 7,145-48 feet, squeezed, perforated at 7,042-48 feet and was testing there.

Stanolind Oil and Gas Co. had run potential test on 2 new Fulton Beach Field wells and had a new test underway.

Stanolind No. 6 State Tract 70, Copano Bay, flowed 158.02 barrels of 41 gravity oil on test through 3/4-inch choke, under 1,175 pounds pressure on tubing, with casing sealed, from B-6 Sand perforations at 7,130-40 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 915 to 1.

Stanolind No. 5-70 flowed 168 barrels of oil through 3/4-inch choke, under 1,200 pounds tubing pressure, from perforations at 7,122-27 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 818 to 1. Stanolind No. 4-70 spudded June 29 and was drilling at 600 feet. A Cotton Dickson barge is drilling this test.

In Salt Lake Field, Atlantic Refining Co. No. 5 V. G. Gwynn, on 30-minute drillstem test at 7,274-49 feet, showed 130-pound working pressure, unloaded 120 feet of oil, then recovered 750 feet of pipe line oil.

Crew then drilled to 7,705 feet, cored to 7,749 feet, finding oil shows at 7,741-59 feet, and Friday was coring at 7,805 feet. Earlier, oil shows were cored at 7,167-71 feet and electrical log was run on 7,300 feet.

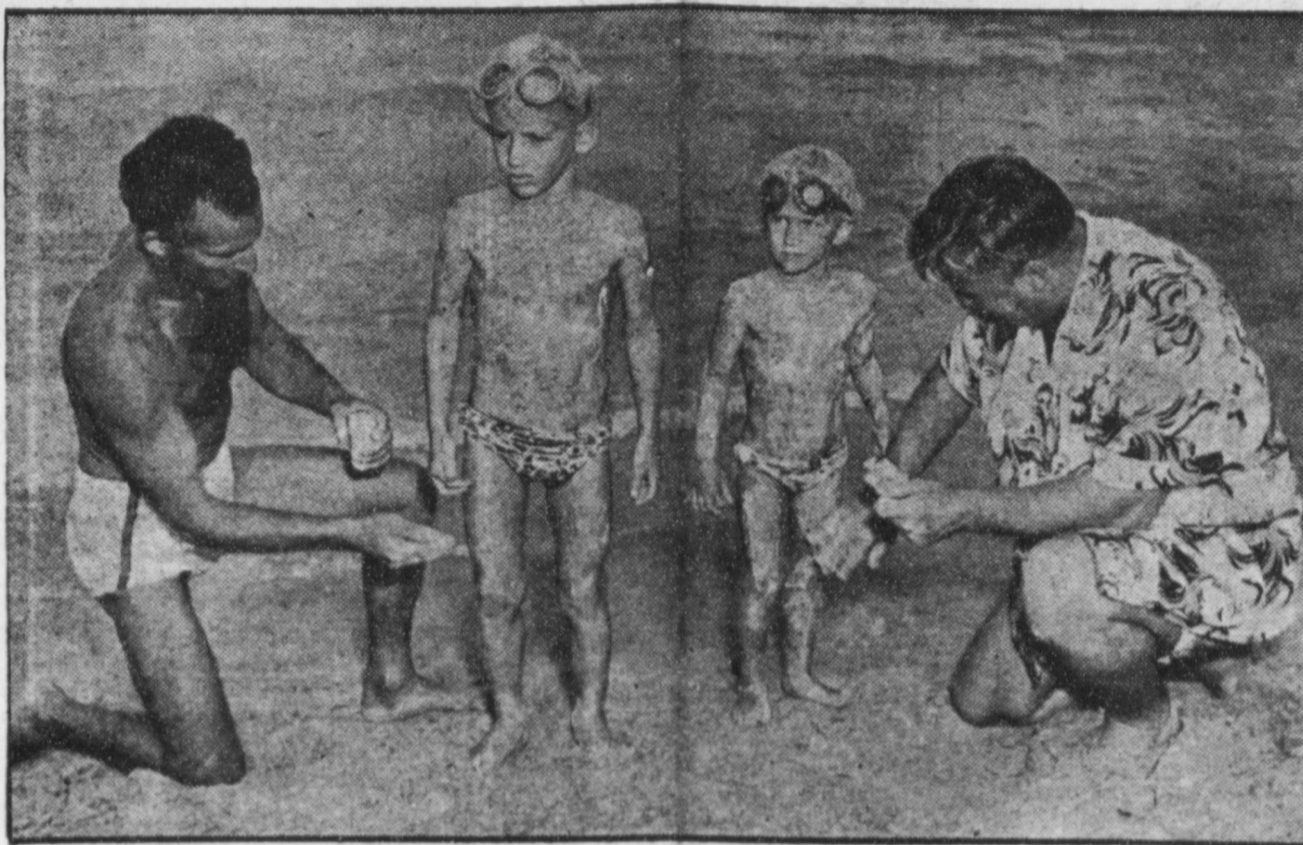
Western Natural Gas Co. No. 13 St. Charles, new discovery on Aransas County's Blackjack Peninsula, made 86 million cubic feet of gas on open flow potential test from perforations at 10,320-60 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 52,900 cubic feet of gas to a barrel of 47.4 gravity distillate. Shut-in pressure was 6,865 to 1. Total depth was 11,276 feet and 5 1/2-inch casing was set at 10,378 feet.

Wednesday, July 11, marks the first day of the third annual Aransas County Chest X-ray Survey which will be held at the Rockport fire station.

The survey will continue two full days, Wednesday and Thursday, July 11 and 12, from 9:00 a. m. until 5:30 p. m. A mobile X-ray unit will arrive in Rockport some time Tuesday to be ready to start X-rays Wednesday morning and chest X-rays will be made of every person, 15 years of age and older.

Sheriff Arley Shivers, general chairman, reports that there will be a meeting Friday night at the courthouse to make final arrangements and urges everyone interested or who has any part at all in helping with the survey to be present.

There will be no charge for making the X-ray. Every person will receive a notice of the findings of the X-ray. Not only will the X-ray reveal the condition of a person in regards to tuberculosis, but will show the condition of the person in regards to 27 other chest conditions.

This unit is operated by the Texas State Health Department from state tax money.

## Aransas County Residents Receive Social Security Insurance Payments

In March of this year, 119 Aransas County residents received \$3,353 in monthly old age and survivors insurance payments, according to H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Corpus Christi office of the Social Security Administration.

For the seventeen county area which is served by the Corpus Christi office, 4,274 persons received \$121,29 in March.

"For this area of South Texas, that is the equivalent of an annual payroll of about one and a half million dollars," Cleveland mentioned. "Surveys which we have made show that nearly all of this money goes into trade channels almost immediately."

This compilation was made after six months of operations under the 1950 amendments to the Social Security Act which became effective in September of last year.

"These payments are made to those who qualify for them," Cleveland said. "They are earned by workers and paid for by employees, employers, and the self employed."

"The insurance is paid to workers over age 65 and their families, and to the families of deceased workers," he continued. "Monthly payments to a family range from \$15 to \$150. The amount depends upon the average monthly wage of each worker and the members of his family."

The tabulation which Cleveland furnished shows that 110,572 Texans received retirement and family insurance amounting to \$3,446,440 in March. For the entire United States \$134,090,837 was paid to 3,706,586 persons.

ner as other insurance protects against loss. Only land titles which are clear and sound from the State Patent down through the years and through the various conveyances into present owners are acceptable for title insurance, and the premium charged for the title policies is that fixed by state law based upon the value to be insured. John A. Ballou Serving On Minesweeper In Korea

Aboard USS Incredible in Far Eastern Waters—if you are one of those people who have claustrophobia, fear of being trapped in close places, you don't want to trade jobs with Fireman John A. Ballou, US Navy, of Rockport, Texas. Chances are you wouldn't want to anyway.

Down in the throbbing engine-room of a minesweeper, ploughing back and forth through a Communist minefield, with only one small escape hatch above you and only a million-to-one chance of getting out alive if the ship hits a mine—that's where Ballou earns his Navy pay.

As a fireman aboard the minesweeper USS Incredible, the Rockport sailor was on watch in the engine-room on the morning of Oct. 12, 1950, when his ship, with two other sweepers, USS Pirate and USS Pledge, made the first sweep into what Rear Admiral A. E. Smith called "one of the largest minefields in history," at Wonsan, North Korea.

That morning the Pledge and Pirate both struck mines and went to the bottom under a barrage of shells from Communist shore batteries.

"Sure, I was scared," Ballou said afterward, "all of us down there were scared. We could hear the explosions above the noise of the engines. Then our own 3-inch gun started firing and tools began falling off the overhead.

"Then we ran out of matches to light our cigarettes. Nobody had a match. The electrician had his Bible out reading.

"We were kept busy switching the engines from forward to reverse and back to forward as the skipper tried to maneuver the ship out of danger. Finally the strain on the engine made them conk out. We thought that was the end of the line for us."

But the sturdy little Incredible, true to her name, came through Wonsan without a scratch. Later she swept for mines at trouble-spots on the Korean east coast like Pohang-dong (where the sweeper Partridge was mined and sank), Hungnam, and Songjin.

At Hungnam she swept out the channel for the epochal redeployment of United Nations forces from the Red-impaled beachhead. Near Songjin she cleared the way for the surprise raid of British Commandos on Communist rail installations last March.

After nine months of minesweeping operations in Korean waters, the Incredible holds the record for number of enemy mines cut by a UN vessel—38 all told.

Fireman Ballou attended Rockport High School before entering the regular Navy in December 1948. Before reporting aboard the Incredible he had duty on a Navy tank-landing ship in the Pacific. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas A. Ballou of Rockport.

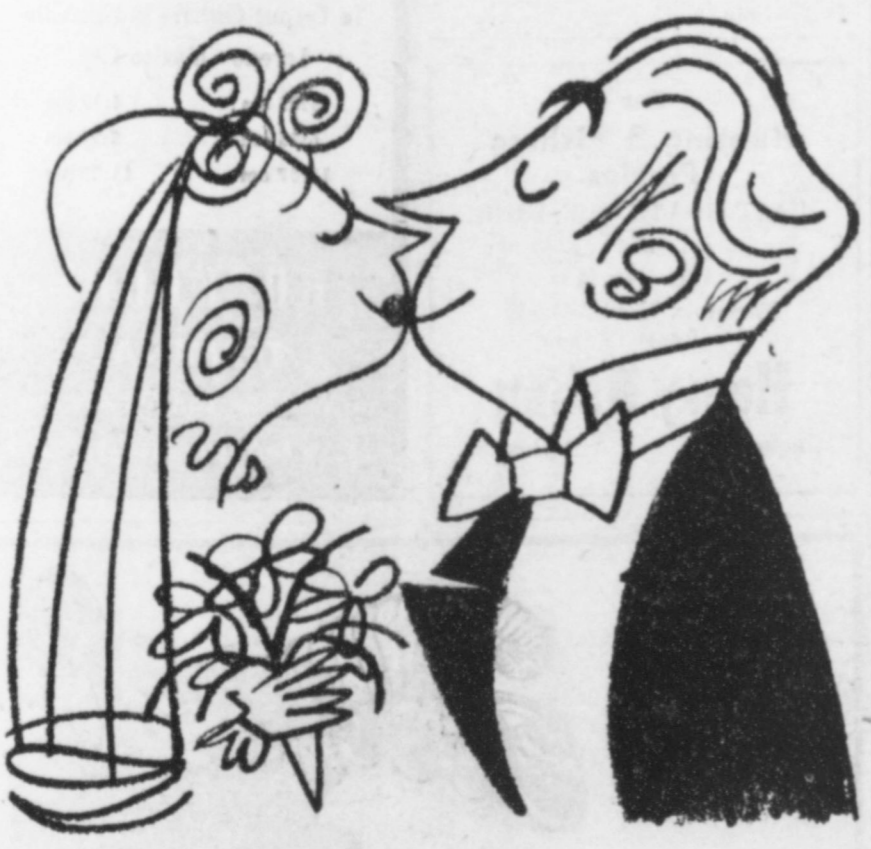
