Fishing is not quite so good this week, due to the high wind and muddy water, after a calm week and clear water when the fish bit freely.

However there are a few fish being caught at different points along the beach. Out at Perry's Wharf, there are a few trout and nice croakers biting and out at Rattlesnake Point some drum and gafftop are being caught.

Mrs. Rattisseau at the Jolly Roger Camp says that those going out in boats, get a few trout but up at Red Fish Point some fishermen waded out and got some nice redfish, one of them weighing 5 pounds and there are a few redfish being caught at Smitty's Bait Stand.

School Trustees Award Painting Contract To Bruce Mayes

Bruce Mayes, local painting contractor, submitted the low bid to Aransas County Independent District trustees at a meeting on Tuesday night, July 24, and was awarded the contract to paint the interior of the Rockport elementary school building and the high school building.

The painting will be done in strict accordance with the state approved scheme for lighting in school classrooms.

It is planned to complete this work in time for the opening of the school term in the first week of September, school board officials have announced.

ALDERMEN PICTON AND HUNT TAKE OATH OF OFFICE

The City Council held their regular meeting Tuesday night and canvassed the ballots of the city election, held Saturday July 14.

Thomas (Dick) Picton was declared elected alderman to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of A. C. Shivers in Ward No. 2, and James W. Hunt was declared elected alderman to fill the vacancy in Ward 1 created by Dick Picton moving from that ward. Both men were sworn into office Tuesday night.

An ordinance is being prepared to eliminate blinker lights in the city which are visible on the bay, as they are a hazard to boat operators and have caused a few boats to run aground recently.

Stan Bell, district manager of Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. of Corpus Christi, met with the council again, and asked the council members to act on his proposed raise of telephone rates. The council declined to take action on this matter without a public hearing on the subject. This public discussion of the proposed telephone rate increase has been set for Tuesday, July 31 at 7:30 p. m. at the city hall. All interested citizens are urged to attend.

This morning, District Manager Stan Bell said he would be glad to meet with the people of Rockport next Tuesday night to discuss the telephone earning problem. Bell stated that the company's earnings here last year on exchange service was only 2.06% and that the rates applied for would produce about 4.01%. The proposed rates are: Business \$7.00, residence one-party \$4.00, residence two-party \$3.25. The present rates are: Business \$5.75, residence one-party \$2.75, residence two-party \$2.50.

Mr. Bell went on to say that since 1945, the number of telephones here has increased from 303 to 850, and the new telephones were installed at almost double the pre-war cost of providing service. In addition to this, Bell added, salaries have increased five times since 1945. Also, federal income taxes have increased to 47% and the outlook is for the 47% to be increased to 52%.

Rockport to Have Survey of Sanitary Conditions

Plans are being laid for a thorough survey of sanitary conditions in the city of Rockport. Vic Ehler, state sanitary engineer, visited in Rockport Wednesday and in conference with Mayor Travis Bailey has assured him that state aid can be obtained in making this survey and in organizing teams for correcting unsanitary conditions.

Local assistance will be needed from various civic clubs and other organizations as well as the general interest of the public.

This program should appeal particularly to those parents who have small children who might become the victims of polio.

Announcement will be made next week of a public meeting at which time state sanitary engineers will speak and movies will be shown conveying the idea of what is necessary to keep our city as free from disease as possible.

Prevention at this time is much better than waiting until the disease is upon us.

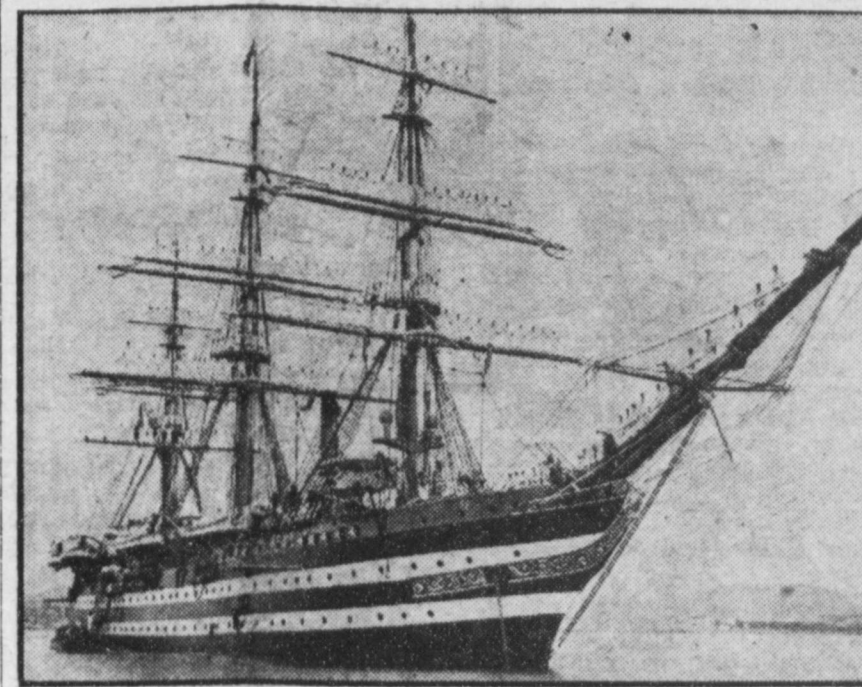

Vic Ehlers Speaks To Rotary Club

The Rockport Rotary Club met in regular weekly dinner meeting Wednesday noon in the Methodist annex. There were thirteen guests present, including the speaker, Joe Higgins, McAlistier, Okla.; Louis Harting, San Antonio; L. C. Liston, Seguin; Jess Neely, Houston; D. R. Simmons, Rockport; Robert W. Colglazier, Alamo Heights; Frank Wallace, Oklahoma City; Larry Dunn, Corpus Christi; Mrs. Vic Ehler, Austin; Nathan White, Plano, Tex.; J. B. Groen, Houston; Bob Matchett, Nacogdoches, and the speaker, Vic Ehler of Austin.

Travis Bailey was in charge of the program and presented Vic Ehler, state sanitary engineer from Austin, who spoke on polio.

Mr. Ehler stated that a small town should be kept clean and then commercialize on the advertising of the larger neighboring cities. He said that the word polio scared everyone, but you cannot isolate yourself or run from the disease. Polio is a virus disease and the virus is found in the nose, throat and intestinal tract and that the secretions containing the virus from these tracts are carried by the mosquito, the fly, cock roach, and the rat and the best way to rid the community of the disease is to get rid of the breeding places of these pests.

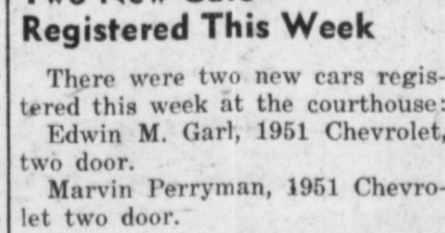
Sand, lime, ashes, borax or BHC powder sprinkled on these body secretions will kill the virus and by keeping garbage cans dry, the breeding places of insects and rodents will be eliminated.

School Board Calls Bond Election For Tuesday, Aug. 7

Architects Plans and Sketch of Proposed Plant On Display at Rockport and Fulton Drug Stores

Trustees of Aransas County Independent School District, acting after holding a public meeting on the subject and after receiving a petition from local taxpayers and qualified voters, ordered a bond election to be held on Tuesday, August 7, 1951. The question on that date will be whether or not the school trustees shall be authorized to issue bonds to the amount of \$325,000.

Body of Sergeant Solis Will Arrive Here Saturday

Mrs. Julia Solis Benavides received word Wednesday that the body of her son, Sgt. Raymond C. Solis, who was killed in action in Korea, was shipped from California on Tuesday, July 24, escorted by Pfc. Chester E. Kistler, to the Cage Funeral Home.

Sergeant Solis' body will arrive in Rockport on Saturday, July 28, and Caged Funeral Home will have charge of the funeral arrangements, which are not yet complete.

Sergeant Solis will have a military funeral under auspices of the Stewart-Wendell Post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, of Rockport.

Lamar Wildcat Cores Sar'd With Oil Odor

Hamble Oil and Refining Co. No. 1 Aransas Bay State Tract 118, Aransas County wildcat south of Lamar, cored sand with oil odor at 8,046-53 feet and Friday were drillstem testing.

Earlier, packer had failed on attempted test at 8,019-46 feet, and on test at 7,882-901 feet, packers leaked and recovery was 200 feet of gas cut mud, no oil.

Bottomhole flowing pressures were 2,855 pounds, initial and 2,625 pounds, final.

Sun Oil Co. No. 1 St. Charles State 387, wildcat southeast of Lamar, was at 9,744 feet, fishing for the second time in a week.

Core bit lost at 9,665 feet had been recovered and drilling was resumed until drillpipe became stuck at 9,744 feet.

In the new West Fulton Beach Field, Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 11 Copano Bay State, 1,320 feet north of No. 9, oil discovery, cored 8,435-513, finding some shows at 8,506-13 feet. Copano State was drilling at 5,156 feet.

In Fulton Beach Field, Sun No. 3 Copano State 69, with 5 1/2-inch casing set at 7,161 feet, total depth, was completing on perforations at 7,154-58 feet. The No. 8-76 set 13 1/2-inch conductor pipe at 111 feet and was waiting on cement. Sun No. 1-75 had installed Christmas tree and was temporarily abandoned, leaving perforations at 7,214-18 feet in the A-3 Sand open.

Atlantic Refining Co. No. 6 V. G. Gwynn, Salt Lake Field, set 9 1/2-inch surface casing at 1,508 feet and was drilling at 3,364 feet on a possible 8,200-foot test.

On Blackjack Peninsula, Western Natural Gas Co. No. 14 St. Charles Ranch, second test in this new deep gas-distillate area, was drilling at 7,731 feet with mud-logger attached, slated to run correlation log between 8,000 and 8,500 feet. The No. 16 probably will get underway this week.

The Fulton School of Painting To Close Friday

The Fulton School of Painting will close their second session Friday afternoon, July 27, and will have produced approximately 150 paintings with twenty students working.

The school was opened here three years ago and has grown each year until this year more work room was needed. Simon Michael is the founder of this school and continues to conduct the classes.

The condition of the several school district interest and sinking funds set up to retire present bond indebtedness is excellent. J. B. Jackson, board secretary reported. It is anticipated that over half of the present bonded indebtedness will be paid off this year before maturity date. The remainder of the outstanding bonds cannot be retired until they mature but there is a surplus in the interest and sinking funds today over the amount needed on maturity date.

The soundness of their situation should provide a very favorable interest rate on the proposed bonds, the secretary continued.

These bonds would be payable over a period of ten years and would be used to construct a new high school plant, and to make additions to and repair present properties.

Those present at the public meeting held at the school auditorium on July 17, saw the architect's plans for a complete high school plant which included six class rooms, a science room, a library and study hall, a cafeteria, restrooms, workshop, a large auditorium, band room and administration offices. Architects floor plan and sketch of the proposed plant will be available for inspection at both local drug store windows and at the drug store in Fulton (one copy of the sketch being alternated between the two communities.)

School board officials pointed out that the figure of \$325,000 would not only construct the plant outlined above, but would equip it completely, would add two class rooms and a principal's office on the Fulton Elementary school, allow for clearing the site, and remodel the Home Economics cottage, construct a bus garage, at the new site, repair the present high school building, provide water and sewage, pay architects fees and etc. Purchase of the new site in Denver Heights subdivision is now being accomplished through other funds, as is the painting program now in progress, they report.

Calves, Swine Quotas Increased

The Office of Price Stabilization has authorized an increase in July slaughter quotas for calves and swine, San Antonio district OPS said.

Marketing of calves and swine have increased above the expected numbers indicated at the time slaughter quotas were established for July, OPS officials said, and the quota percentage of the comparable 1950 quota is therefore increased from 85 per cent to 100 per cent on calves and from 105 per cent to 110 per cent on swine. These increases apply to accounting periods beginning on or after July 1, 1951.

The monthly slaughter quotas are established to utilize all the available supply of meat coming to market, and at the same time to insure that it flows through established slaughterers to make certain there is no disruption of normal distribution channels.
