Rockort to Have Survey of Sanitary Conditions

Plans are being laid for a thorough survey of sanitary conditions in the city of Rockport. Vic Ehler, state sanitary engineer, visited in Rockport Wednesday and in conference with Mayor Travis Bailey has assured him that state aid can be obtained in making this survey and in organizing teams for correcting unsanitary

Local assistance will be needed rom various civic clubs and other organizations as well as the general interest of the public.

This program should appeal particularly to those parents who have small children who might become the victims of polio.

Announcement will be made next veek of a public meeting at which time state sanitary engineers will speak and movies will be shown conveying the idea of what is necessary to keep our city as free from disease as possible.

Prevention at this time is much better than waiting until the disease is upon us.
