**State Health Officer Scoffs at Idea of Mexican Rabid Bats**

Austin, Tex. — Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, today took mild exception to recent reports that South Texas faces an invasion from rabid vampire bats. The health official referred to a widely circulated newspaper story quoting a Mexican government rabies specialist, Dr. Aurelio Malaga-Alba, that pig-faced vampire bats carrying the dread disease had been discovered 100 miles southwest of Presidio County in the Big Bend country.

"I think it's a remote, fantastic interpretation," Dr. Cox said. "This whole problem was discussed at the U. S.-Mexican Border Public Health Conference in Chihuahua two years ago.

He said he was sure Dr. Malaga-Alba is "entirely competent," and that the State Health Department would take every advantage of his warning.

"But the story didn't mention several pertinent facts about the situation. Vampire bats require a

tropical environment. The story didn't mention that. And it didn't mention that vampire bats are relatively rare even in tropical countries."

The newspaper story, originating in the Austin American, was "interesting," the long-time health officer said. But he believes it might make all bats vampire bats "in the eyes of the public."

"And for the most part, bats are beneficial. Only the vampire is a blood sucker. The rest feed on harmful insects, including mosquitoes," Dr. Cox warned.

San Antonio has an ordinance which makes it unlawful to kill bats of familiar species. The State Bureau of Laboratories said they had never found bats positive for rabies.

Dr. Cox's statement: "The invasion of Texas by this vampire bat is a remote, fantastic interpretation (of Dr. Malaga-Alba's report). This bat is known to inhabit only certain southern geographical locations. Vampire bat history was discussed last year at the U. S.-Mexican Border Public Health Association in Chihuahua. Its limited

migrations are to be expected. "Isolated rabies infections caused by the bat have been reported from time to time in animals and man; however, there is no reason to expect bats to visit over the Rio Grande."

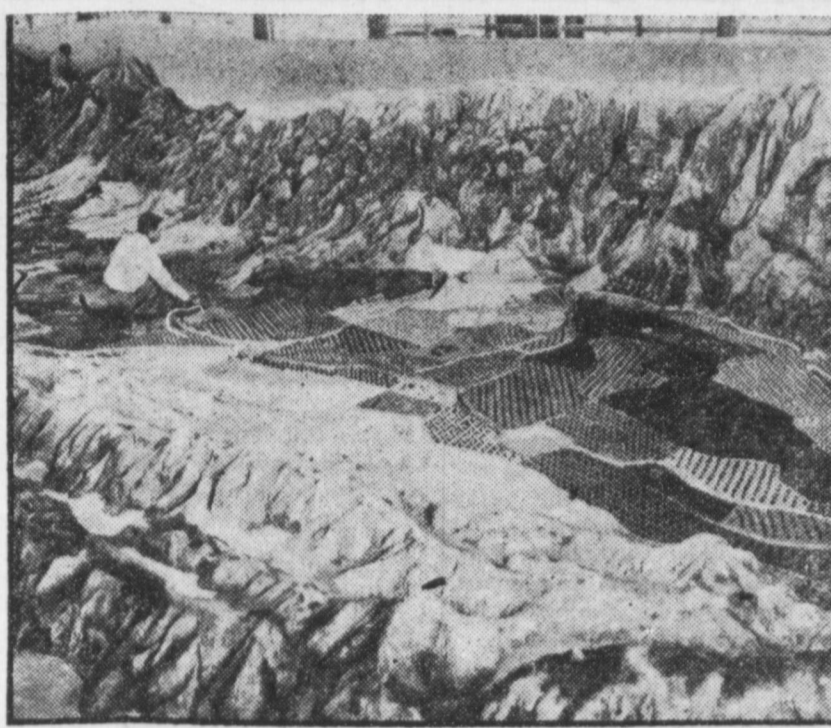

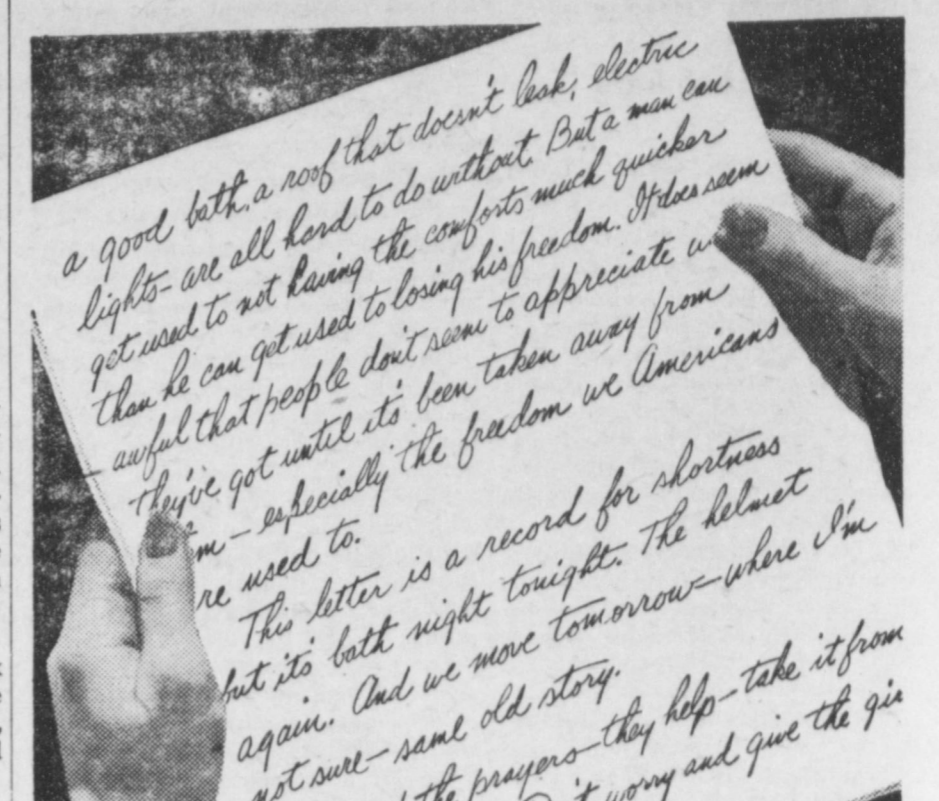

*Don't worry and give the gas*

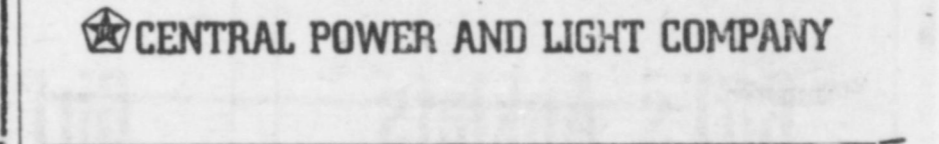

THE STATE OF TEXAS  
COUNTY OF ARANSAS

To the Resident Qualified Property Taxpaying Voters of Aransas County, Texas:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held on the 15th day of September, 1951, in said County, in obedience to an order duly entered by the Commissioners Court on the 13th day of August, 1951, which is as follows:

On this the 13th day of August, 1951, the Commissioners Court of Aransas County, Texas, convened in regular session, at the regular meeting place thereof in the Court-house at Rockport, Texas, with the following members of the Court, to-wit:

John D. Wendell, County Judge,  
W. B. Allen, Commissioner, Precinct No. 1,  
J. M. Sparks, Jr., Commissioner, Precinct No. 2,  
A. L. Davis, Commissioner, Precinct No. 3,  
J. H. Mills, Commissioner, Precinct No. 4,

being present, and, among other proceedings had by the Court were the following:

Commissioner Mills introduced an order and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Allen. The motion, carrying with it the adoption of the order, prevailed by the following vote:

AYES: Commissioners Allen, Sparks, Davis, Mills;  
NOES: Commissioners None;

The order is as follows:

WHEREAS, at the general election held throughout the State of Texas on November 7, 1944, the qualified electors of the State, voting on the proposition, approved the amendment to Section 9, of Article 8, of the Texas Constitution, which amendment provides that the Commissioners Court in any county may re-allocate the county tax levies authorized in said Section 9 of Article 8, by changing the rates provided for any of the purposes authorized in said Section by either increasing or decreasing the same, but in no event shall the total of such taxes exceed Eighty (80) Cents on the one hundred dollars' valuation for any one year, provided that before the Commissioners Court may make such re-allocations and changes in such levies the same shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county at a general or special election; and in event such re-allocations and

changes are approved by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of any such county, such re-allocations and changes shall remain in force and effect for a period of six (6) years from the date of the election at which time same shall have been approved, unless the same again shall have been changed by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county, voting on the proposition; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court of Aransas County, Texas, deems it advisable and to the best interest of said County to re-allocate the county taxes authorized to be levied annually by Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, by changing the rates in respect to certain county taxes as herein provided;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF ARANSAS COUNTY, TEXAS:

That a special election be held in said County on the 15th day of September, 1951, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying voters, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

"Shall the Commissioners Court of Aransas County, Texas, be authorized to levy and collect in each year for a period of six (6) years from the date of said election, county taxes as follows:

Not exceeding Forty Cents (40c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for County purposes;

Not exceeding Twenty-five Cents (25c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for roads and bridges;

Not exceeding Two Cents (2c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, to supplement the jury fund of the County; and

Not exceeding Thirteen Cents (13c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for the erection of public buildings and other permanent improvements."

In the event that the annual levy of a tax not exceeding fifteen (15c) cents on the one hundred dollars' valuation for the further maintenance of the public roads of said County has heretofore been, or shall hereafter be, authorized by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of the County, voting at an election held for that purpose, nothing herein shall be construed as rescinding or in any manner affecting the power and authority of the Commissioners Court to levy and to continue to levy said tax.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly amended Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution, and Section 3a, Article 6, of the Constitution, and all persons who are legally qualified voters of said County, and who are resident property taxpayers who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"FOR RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES."  
"AGAINST RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES."

Each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote.

The polling places and presiding officers of said election shall be respectively as follows:

Precinct No. 1, Box 1; Voting Place, City Fire Station; Presiding Officer, Mrs. Fay Brundrett.

Precinct No. 1, Box 1A; Voting Place, Holiday Courts in Aransas Pass, Texas; Presiding Officer, Glenn Ellis.

Precinct No. 2, Box 1; Voting Place, Court House; Presiding Officer, Mrs. Alma Ratliff.

Precinct No. 3, Box 1; Voting Place, Fulton School Hous; Presiding Officer, W. J. Moss.

Precinct No. 4, Box 1; Voting Place, Concession Hall; Presiding Officer, Otto Key.

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the County Judge of said County, and certified to by the County Clerk of said County shall serve as proper and sufficient notice of said election.

Notice of said election shall be given by posting a copy of this order at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE RE-ALLOCATION OF COUNTY TAXES," at the Courthouse door of said County, and in each of the election precincts of said County for thirty (30) days prior to the election, which notices shall be posted by the Sheriff or a constable, who shall make return on a copy of such notice, how and when he executed the same.

Notice of said election shall also be given by publication thereof in a newspaper published in Aransas

County, once each week for three consecutive weeks, the date of first publication being not less than twenty-one (21) full days prior to the date of said election.

**Family Insurance Is Paid When Workers Die**

Many people think of social security as something to expect only when they get old, but one of the most important features of this government insurance system is the protection it provides for the family of a worker who dies, according to H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Corpus Christi office of the Social Security Administration.

Where there are children under 18, the family insurance provides monthly payments for them and to the widow who is caring for them. The widow may be entitled to monthly benefits for life after she reaches 65. If there is no child or widow, the worker's parents may qualify for monthly payments

at 65 if they were dependent on him for their support. A lump-sum death payment is also made when an insured worker dies.

There are two important factors that affect the payment of these benefits; first, the worker must have been employed on social security jobs long enough to be insured; and second, a claim for the payments must be filed with the social security office.

Anyone who believes he may be eligible for old age and survivors insurance is advised to get in touch with the office promptly. The address is: Social Security Administration, 424 Taylor Street, Corpus Christi, Texas.

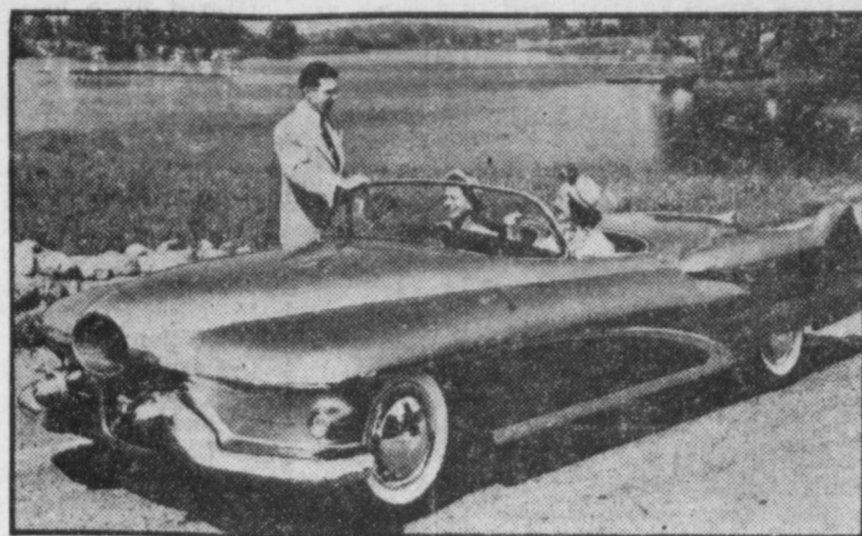

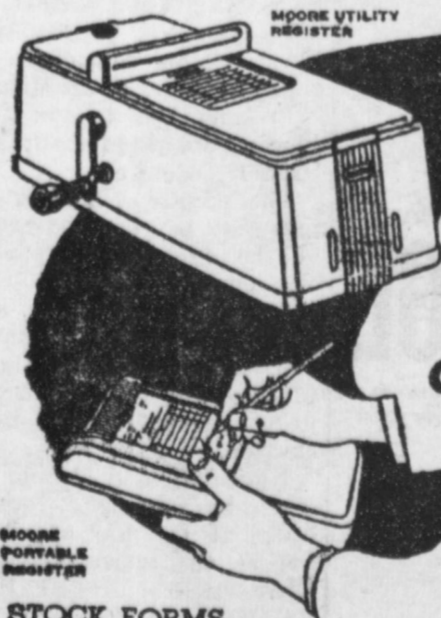
