Rockport Schools Have Beautiful Interior

Bruce Mayes, local painting contractor, is giving the interior of the Rockport Elementary and High School buildings each a fresh coat of paint, greatly improving the comfort and beauty of the rooms.

The hall in the elementary building has a white ceiling, the white extending a few feet down on the walls, which are pastel green, and the rooms in that building with east and west openings have a two-foot drop white ceiling, with pastel green walls and a deeper green chalk rail at the bottom.

The rooms with the north and south openings also have the white ceilings with the white extending down on the walls two feet, but these walls are painted a light buff with a deeper buff chalk rail and the white ceiling extends to the window sill on each side of the windows in all of the classrooms in this building.

The ceiling, two side walls and front of the auditorium are white with the back wall and trimming eye-rest green.

The rooms in the high school building have the white drop ceilings with eye-rest green walls and ivory doors and window casings.

Mr. Mayes was delayed because of lack of material and he had to wait for the plasterers to mend the walls where needed, but he expects to finish all the work next week.

Special Ruling Requested For Aransas Gas

United Carbon Co., Inc., which operates a carbon black plant near Rockport has asked the Railroad Commission for a decision on the possibility of the plant's utilization of casinghead gas from several Aransas County fields.

United Carbon asked for a ruling on whether it is uneconomical to extract gasoline from casinghead gas, prior to utilization of the gas in carbon black manufacture. Casinghead gas involved is produced in Fulton Beach, West Fulton Beach, Copano Bay and Salt Lake Fields. Hearing is set in Austin on Sept. 25.

Tests of the casinghead indicate it will produce about 1.5 gallons plus of propane from each thousand cubic feet. The Rockport plant produces more than the statutory minimum of 5 pounds of carbon black for each 1000 cubic feet of gas. The public hearing is required for allowance of less than 5 pounds a thousand.

Mills' Wharf Wildcat Coring Below 9,000 Ft.

Humble Oil and Refining Co. No. 1, State Tract 118, Aransas Bay wildcat just south of Mills' Wharf, was coring ahead at 9,040 feet on Friday.

Sandy shale with slight gas odor had been cored at 9,015-35 feet, and drillstem test at 8,981-95 feet had showed slight surface blow, recovering 100 feet of oil and slightly gas cut mud. Bottomhole pressures on the test were 1,475 and 3,375 pounds.

Sun Oil Co. No. 1 State Tract 387, St. Charles Bay wildcat 2 miles southeast of Lamar, was drilling at 10,331 feet in sand with no shows.

In the new West Fulton Beach Field, Phillips Petroleum Co. had completed a D-Sand oiler, and had 2 more tests underway there.

Phillips No. 11 Copano Bay State, in Tract 45, flowed 148.61 barrels of 46.3 gravity oil on potential test on 3/4-inch choke under 1,050 pounds pressure on tubing. Gas-oil ratio was 744 to 1 and the D-Sand perforations were at 6,506-11 feet with 30 shots.

Phillips No. 16 Copano, 2,640 feet north of the new oiler, ran electrical log to 6,216 feet Friday, took sidwell cores and was preparing to wire line core. The No. 13, 1,320 feet west of the No. 9, an F-2 Sand discovery, had set 16-inch conductor pipe at 140 feet and was preparing to set surface casing.

Atlantic Refining Co. has completed the No. 6 V. G. Gwynn, Salt Lake test on the south shore of Copano Bay for a potential of 72 barrels of oil a day and no water, on 3/4-inch choke.

Tubing pressure was 125 pounds, gas-oil ratio was 1,120 to 1. Perforations 7,198-210.

Sun was drilling at 8,423 feet after coring with no shows on the No. 8 Copano State 76, Salt Lake test.

THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF ARANSAS To the Resident Qualified Property Taxpaying Voters of Aransas County, Texas: TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held on the 15th day of September, 1951, in said County, in obedience to an order duly entered by the Commissioners Court on the 13th day of August, 1951, which is as follows: On this the 13th day of August, 1951, the Commissioners Court of Aransas County, Texas, convened in regular session, at the regular meeting place thereof in the Court-house at Rockport, Texas, with the following members of the Court, to-wit: John D. Wendell, County Judge, W. B. Allen, Commissioner, Precinct No. 1, J. M. Sparks, Jr., Commissioner, Precinct No. 2, A. L. Davis, Commissioner, Precinct No. 3, J. H. Mills, Commissioner, Precinct No. 4, being present, and, among other proceedings had by the Court were the following: Commissioner Mills introduced an order and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Allen. The motion, carrying with it the adoption of the order, prevailed by the following vote: AYES: Commissioners Allen, Sparks, Davis, Mills; NOES: Commissioners None; The order is as follows: WHEREAS, at the general election held throughout the State of Texas on November 7, 1944, the qualified electors of the State, voting on the proposition, approved the amendment to Section 9, of Article 8, of the Texas Constitution, which amendment provides that the Commissioners Court in any county may re-allocate the county tax levies authorized in said Section 9 of Article 8, by changing the rates provided for any of the purposes authorized in said Section by either increasing or decreasing the same, but in no event shall the total of such taxes exceed Eighty (80) Cents on the one hundred dollars' valuation for any one year, provided that before the Commissioners Court may make such re-allocations and changes in such levies the same shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county at a general or special election; and in event such re-allocations and changes are approved by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of any such county, such re-allocations and changes shall remain in force and effect for a period of six (6) years from the date of the election at which time same shall have been approved, unless the same again shall have been changed by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county, voting on the proposition; and WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court of Aransas County, Texas, deems it advisable and to the best interest of said County to re-allocate the county taxes authorized to be levied annually by Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, by changing the rates in respect to certain county taxes as herein provided; THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF ARANSAS COUNTY, TEXAS: That a special election be held in said County on the 15th day of September, 1951, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying voters, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon: "Shall the Commissioners Court of Aransas County, Texas, be authorized to levy and collect in each year for a period of six (6) years from the date of said election, county taxes as follows: Not exceeding Forty Cents (40c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for County purposes; Not exceeding Twenty-five Cents (25c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for roads and bridges; Not exceeding Two Cents (02c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, to supplement the jury fund of the County; and Not exceeding Thirteen Cents (13c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for the erection of public buildings and other permanent improvements." In the event that the annual levy of a tax not exceeding fifteen (15c) cents on the one hundred dollars' valuation for the further maintenance of the public roads of said County has heretofore been, or shall hereafter be, authorized by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of the County, voting at an election held for that purpose, nothing herein shall be construed as rescinding or in any manner affecting the power and authority of the Commissioners Court to

levy and to continue to levy said tax.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly amended Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution, and Section 3a, Article 6, of the Constitution, and all persons who are legally qualified voters of said County, and who are resident property taxpayers who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election. Precinct No. 3, Box 1; Voting Place, Fulton School Hous; Presiding Officer, W. J. Moss. Precinct No. 4, Box 1; Voting Place, Concession Hall; Presiding Officer, Otto Key. The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections. 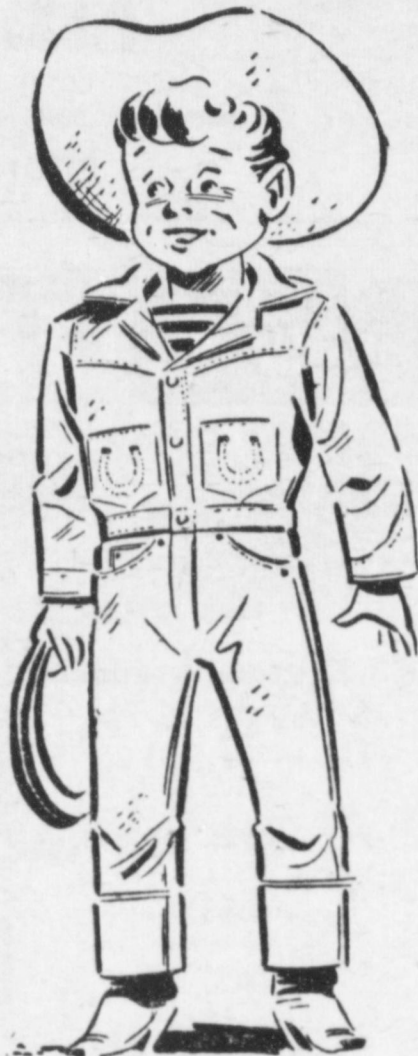

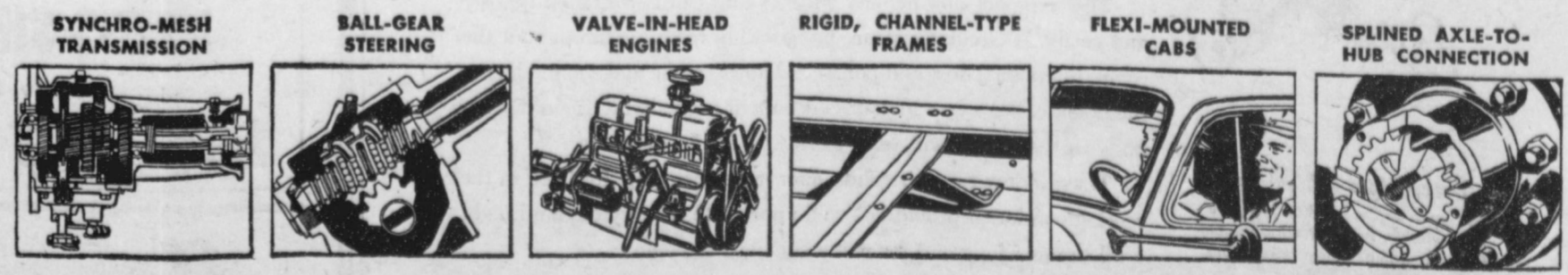

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6

Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas amending Article III, Section 51a, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to residents of the State of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years; needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; removing the Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) limitation upon expenditures for such purposes and providing for a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) upon such expenditures; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; prohibiting payment of assistance after disposition of property under certain conditions; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States of America for such assistance; providing that the payment of such from State funds shall never exceed the payments from Federal funds; providing for the necessary election, and providing for the form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so that the same shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions, and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

(1) Needy aged persons who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State-supported institution, while such inmate; and provided that any resident of the State for five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance including the one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the filing of such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds shall not be more than Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month.

"Any applicant for or recipient of assistance, including the spouse in each instance, who shall dispose of any property after June 1, 1952, and any person who initially applies for assistance after June 1, 1957, who has disposed of any property within five (5) years prior to the date of application, shall be ineligible to receive assistance; provided, that if such property was disposed of by bona fide sale and conveyance, and for value commensurate with the actual market value thereof, such disposition shall not affect eligibility for assistance if it be shown that all proceeds from such sale have been used by such person and spouse for normal living expenses, or for the purchase of other real property of like value. If any recipient of assistance or spouse shall sell any real property, neither such recipient nor spouse shall thereafter receive assistance until all net proceeds of said sale have been expended for normal living expenses; and in case of disposition of such property by gifts or for an amount less than its actual market value, such person and spouse shall not thereafter receive assistance until the expiration of the period of time during which the net proceeds of said sale would have paid their normal living expenses had their actual market value been realized therefrom.

"(2) Needy blind persons who are over the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State-supported institution, while such inmate; and provided that any resident of the State, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance including the one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the filing of such application.

"(3) Needy children who are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that any child, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for one (1) year immediately preceding the filing of such assistance, or, if said child is under the age of one (1) year, whose parent or other relative with whom the child is living has resided in the State for one (1) year immediately preceding the birth of such child.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children

as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided, however, that the amount of such assistance out of State funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds; and provided further that the total amount of money to be expended out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws and provide an additional appropriation hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at the Election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the Second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature power to set up a system of payments of assistance to needy persons over sixty-five (65) years of age; to needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years; to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; removing the Thirty-five Million Dollar (\$35,000,000) limitation upon amount of State expenditures for such purposes; disqualifying persons who dispose of property under certain conditions; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; providing for the acceptance and expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; providing that expenditures from State funds shall not exceed the expenditure from Federal funds with respect to any individual; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to be eligible to receive assistance; and providing a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year on State fund expenditures for such purpose each year.

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature power to set up a system of payments of assistance to needy persons over sixty-five (65) years of age; to needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years; to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age, removing the Thirty-five Million Dollar (\$35,000,000) limitation upon amount of State expenditures for such purposes; disqualifying persons who dispose of property under certain conditions; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; providing for the acceptance and expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; providing that expenditures from State funds shall not exceed the expenditure from Federal Funds with respect to any individual; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to be eligible to receive assistance; and providing a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year on State Fund expenditures for such purpose each year."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be numbered 63, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county; providing the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits authorized herein; and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 51f of Article III; providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary and shall first be authorized by

vote of the qualified voters of such county; provided further that the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits authorized herein. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51f of Article III."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees."

Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed Amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. If at said election, a majority of the votes are "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees" the foregoing proposed Amendment shall become Section 63 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof.
