New Copano Oil Discovery Flows 15 Barrels An Hour

C. G. Glasscock and Pontiac Refining Co. No. 1 State Tract 48, new Copano Bay oil discovery in Aransas County, had flowed through 10/64-inch choke, under 1,010 pounds pressure, at the rate of about 15 barrels of oil an hour from perforations at 6,398-404 feet, and Tuesday was running productively.

This new discovery is about 1 1/2 miles west and across a fault from Fulton Beach Field production in Copano Bay. It is bottomed at 8-30 feet and has casing set at 6,650 feet. Earlier, two tests around 6,300 feet had made salt water and a little oil, and the sand there showed little permeability.

Sun Oil Co. No. 8 State Tract 76, wildcat in the Salt Lake area, Copano Bay, continued to test in a gas sand perforated at 9,799-821 feet, and on Friday was being swabbed after acidation with 1,000 gallons.

In Aransas Bay, off Mills' Wharf, Sun No. 1-67, wildcat 1,500 feet south of Lamar Peninsula, was boring at 7,913 feet Friday. Drill-test No. 6 at 7,868-73 feet, had recovered salt water with a slight show of gas.

Union Producing Co. No. 5 Virginia Taton, wildcat 4 miles north of Lamar and about 6,150 feet northwest of Virginia Field, ran electrical log to 10,340 feet, total depth, and was abandoned.

Union No. 6 Taton, 1,500 feet northwest of the dry hole and 7,750 feet northwest of the No. 2 Virginia Field oiler, was slated to spud Saturday or Sunday on a proposed 8,000-footer. J & C Drilling Co. of Refugio is contractor.

Up in the new Blackjack Field Western Natural Gas Co. No. 17 St. Charles Ranch Co. was at 8,981 feet Friday, running 9 1/2-inch protective casing. Contract depth is 1,500 feet.

Western Natural No. 15. St. Charles, St. Charles Field, was completing as a gas-distillate well in perforations at 8,114-38 feet. It had flowed gas and distillate through 3/4-inch choke, under 2,350 pounds pressure. Gas-oil ratio was 3,000 to 1.

A 13,000-foot Aransas Bay wildcat had been scheduled yesterday. Also coming up were new tests in Salt Lake Field. Richardson and Bass of Fort Worth will drill the Aransas Bay wildcat, which is 7 miles southeast of Rockport and just off St. Joseph Island.

Richardson and Bass No. 1 State Tract 264, due to start about the middle of the month, is 660 feet out of the northeast corner of the 80-acre tract and scales about 2,200 feet due north of the shoreline of the island. This firm holds leases on all offsetting state tracts in the St. Joseph Island offsetting crease.

Atlantic Refining Co. No. 1 Adams-Gwynn Unit, the new Salt Lake Field test, is in Lot 54, Coleman Fulton Pasture Co. Subdivision, E. Kilpatrick Survey, A-93. Location for the proposed 8,250-footer is 594 feet from the east line (east line of Lot 55) and 700 feet from the south line (south line of Lot 54) of the 40-acre unit lease, which includes Lots 53, 54 and 55. It scales about 1,040 feet east and slightly north of Atlantic No. 1 C. H. Adams, oil well.

Anderson-Prichard Oil Corp. No. 1 J. F. Brundrett, Aransas County wildcat south of Copano Bay, was boring ahead below 8,860 feet yesterday, after coring from 8,828 feet. Fine grain sand and shaly sand, with salt water, were recovered on cores at 8,828-46 feet, and hard shaly sand and streaks to 3,860 feet.

Trustees of the Aransas County Independent School District voted to observe Nov. 29 as the annual Thanksgiving Day for the Aransas County schools, in 1951. A majority of the merchants in both Fulton and Rockport also wanted the 29th as the holiday. A few will probably take both days, but the postoffice will observe Nov. 22.

Amendment Vote Slated Nov. 13

A regular election will be held in Texas on November 13, 1951, when Texas voters will vote on constitutional amendments. The amendments deal with financial matters and all seek to confer upon the state and its political subdivisions powers which they do not possess now.

Voters of Texas may vote either for or against the amendments, which are:

1. The Constitutional Amendment authorizing a state-wide system for retirement and disability pension for appointive officials and employees.

2. The Constitutional Amendment, providing for the investment of the permanent University Funds in additional securities to those not enumerated in Section II of Article VII of the Constitution.

3. The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the levy of an ad valorem tax not to exceed fifty (50c) cents on the one hundred (100.00) dollars valuation for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts.

4. The amendment to Section 40-b, Constitution of Texas, for increasing Veterans' Land Fund for the purchasing of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, to Texas Veterans of service in the armed forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945.

5. The Amendment to the Constitution giving the legislature power to set up a system of payments of assistance to needy persons over sixty-five (65) years of age; to needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years; to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; removing the Thirty-five Million Dollar (\$35,000,000) limitation upon the amount of state expenditures for such purposes; disqualifying persons who dispose of property under certain conditions; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from state funds for old age assistance; providing for the acceptance and expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; providing that the expenditures from state funds shall not exceed the expenditure from Federal Funds with respect to any individual; and providing conditions as to residence within the state in order to be eligible to receive assistance; and providing a limitation of forty-two million (\$42,000,000) dollars per year on state fund expenditures for such purpose each year.

Rockport V.F.W. Sponsors Turkey Shoot Nov. 18

The first annual turkey shoot sponsored by Stewart-Wendell Post No. 3904, Veterans of Foreign Wars, will be held on Highway 35 between Rockport and Aransas Pass, three miles south of Rockport, on Sunday, Nov. 18, beginning at 2 p.m.

Patrons are requested to bring their own .22 caliber rifle, if they so desire; or rifles will be furnished.

No telescopic sights are to be allowed, and all shots are to be from the standing position and without rest. Either pistol or rifle may be used provided they are .22 caliber.

There will be plenty of turkeys, but in order that equal distribution will be effected, each shooter will be limited to two birds.

Mr. Baughman's subject was "Legislation Pertaining to Married Life."

Port Baughman also appeared on this program, playing two piano solos.

About 130 members and guests attended the meeting.

80% SCHOOL TAX COLLECTED

Bob Ayers, tax assessor-collector for Aransas County Independent School District, has reported that 80 per cent of the school tax on the rendered and unrendered tax roll for 1951 has been paid, which, in round figures, amounts to \$132,000 in tax dollars. The tax roll increased from a total valuation of \$9,259,549 in 1950 to \$11,270,722 this year. Of this amount \$83,495 valuation is unknown.

Total taxes collected last year, including all delinquent collections to present date, represents 92 per cent of the 1950 school tax, which is a very good percentage on a total tax roll. Eighty percent paid by Nov. 1, is also very good.

County Tax Assessor-collector Shivers reports that approximately \$173,317.39 in county taxes has been received in his office as of Nov. 7, and that he will make a final report later.

Local camps have been making preparations for the best hunting season in recent years. They report plenty of guides and blinds available.

Violators will be prosecuted unless they possess a pass signed by the property owner.

Raymond Herrera Killed In Wreck

On Saturday night, Nov. 3, Raymond Herrera, driving north on Highway 35, just north of the city limits, in a 1939 Ford sedan collided head-on with a 1951 GMC panel truck traveling south, according to officers investigating the accident, the truck was on the right side of the road. The front end of the truck was knocked from under it and it dropped where it was hit, but the sedan bounced back and turned over two or three times and was completely demolished.

Herrera, apparently, was killed instantly. His body was taken to Cage Funeral Home in Aransas Pass.

Occupants of the truck were Ferrell Walraven of Corpus Christi and Darrell Cockrell of Fort Worth. Both men received cuts and bruises. Cockrell was given a ticket for driving without a license.

Area Fishing Sweepstakes Started November 1

The Area Fishing Sweepstakes opened Thursday, Nov. 1, and the first weeks prizes for the biggest fish will be announced next Tuesday.

Weekly prizes will be given for the longest redfish, trout, drum and sheepshead.

Prizes to be awarded this week are: One year's supply of white shirts from Penny's; a \$35 electric percolator from Nau's Hardware; one week's stay in the Tarpon Inn at Port Aransas; one year's fishing pass on the Sallie D or Sportsman (owned by Wilson and Clark of Corpus Christi) every day except Sunday.

All fishermen are invited to enter the contest and win a prize.

The past week many business men have been seen hauling material for blind making to their favorite spot staked out where they know the largest concentration of ducks will be on Friday at noon.

In order to avoid a run-in with the game warden, it may be well to remember the following regulations issued by the Texas Game and Fish Commission:

Open season; Nov. 9 to Dec. 28, both dates inclusive. Exception: no open season on black-bellied tree duck.

Shooting hours: On Nov. 9, from 12:00 o'clock noon to one hour before sunset; all other days of season, one-half hour before sunrise to one hour before sunset.

Bag and Possession Limits: Coot: 10 per day or in possession. Ducks: 5 per day, 10 in possession, including not more than one wood duck. Exception: American and Redbreasted Mergansers: 25 singly or in the aggregate per day. No possession limit. Geese and Brandt: 5 in the aggregate per day or in possession, including in such limit not more than either 2 Canada geese, or 2 White-fronted geese, or one of both. A few other regulations to remember are:

On the opening day no person may possess any migratory game birds in excess of the daily bag limit.

Birds may be possessed for only 90 days after close of season.

Baiting or live decoys prohibited. Use of auto or airplane prohibited. No shotgun may be used that holds more than three shells, including those in the magazine and chamber. Only shotguns may be used.

Game may not be taken from power-driven boat or boat under sail. Sinkbox prohibited.

No person over the age of 16 may hunt migratory waterfowl without a Federal stamp (procurable at Post Office.)

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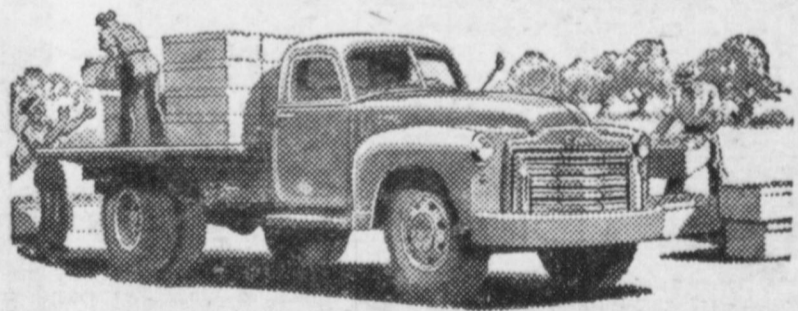

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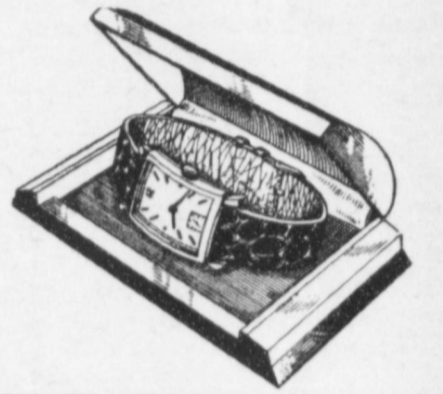

OLEANDERS

How to root oleanders from cuttings without failure. (By W. J. Moss, as told to C. O. Bailey):

1. Plant oleanders in the fall from cuttings 10 to 12 inches long and medium, old wood.
2. Cut from parent stock with quick blow of sharp knife. Do not use clippers and do not bruise.
3. Make soil friable but do not fertilize until well rooted and then mulch on top of ground.
4. Place eight inches of cutting below ground and about four inches above; wet thoroughly with hose to expel air and pack; then keep moist but not soaked.
5. Allow only three or four leaves to remain on plant above ground and cut these in half. Do not cut any leaf close to the stalk, cut them off where stem joins the leaf, both above and below the ground.
6. Plant three or four cuttings, three inches apart in line, then space three feet and duplicate for entire length of hedge desired.
7. Water thoroughly once a week during dry weather. Plant cuttings immediately after trimming.

All plants or cuttings being moved are in a state of shock and must be handled gently if they are to live and thrive. If treated as above very few will die.

U. S. Trumpeter Swans Hit New High

Unless the restoration program hits a snag within the next few years, people can stop using the customary adjectives "disappearing," "rare," and "almost extinct," in referring to the largest waterfowl in the United States, according to the Wildlife Management Institute. The annual census reveals a national population of 535 trumpeter swans, 159 more than last year and 462 more than in the low year of 1935 when no more than 73 of these magnificent birds could be found.

The history of the trumpeter swan offers a perfect example of what modern wildlife management can do when given the funds and resources with which to work. Efforts in preserving the big trumpeter have been geared around the Red Rock Lakes Wildlife Refuge in Montana which is the population center of the swan in this country. The refuge was established in 1935 near Yellowstone National Park to save the dwindling remnants from extermination. Since then, birds have been transplanted to other refuges in Oregon and Nevada and to the National Elk Refuge in Wyoming. Increases were reported in all of these transplanted flocks this year.

The trumpeter, like the buffalo, was a victim of encroaching civilization into its wilderness habitat. With the destruction of its nesting, resting, and feeding grounds, it declined rapidly, and the restoration program which began in 1935 came just in time to save the birds from destruction.

Canada, simultaneously was active north of the border in preserving this spectacular bird. In the early 1930's the species was making what appeared to be a last stand in British Columbia and Alaska. Aggressive activity by the Canadian Wildlife Service and its departmental predecessor was responsible for keeping the numbers above the danger point. Dr. Ian McTaggart Cowan of the University of British Columbia estimates that numbers wintering in that province have never fallen much below four or five hundred birds. From this low the population has been built to around nine hundred. The trumpeter is a rugged bird spending the rigorous Canadian winters in areas where the only open water is that created by the swiftest rapids.

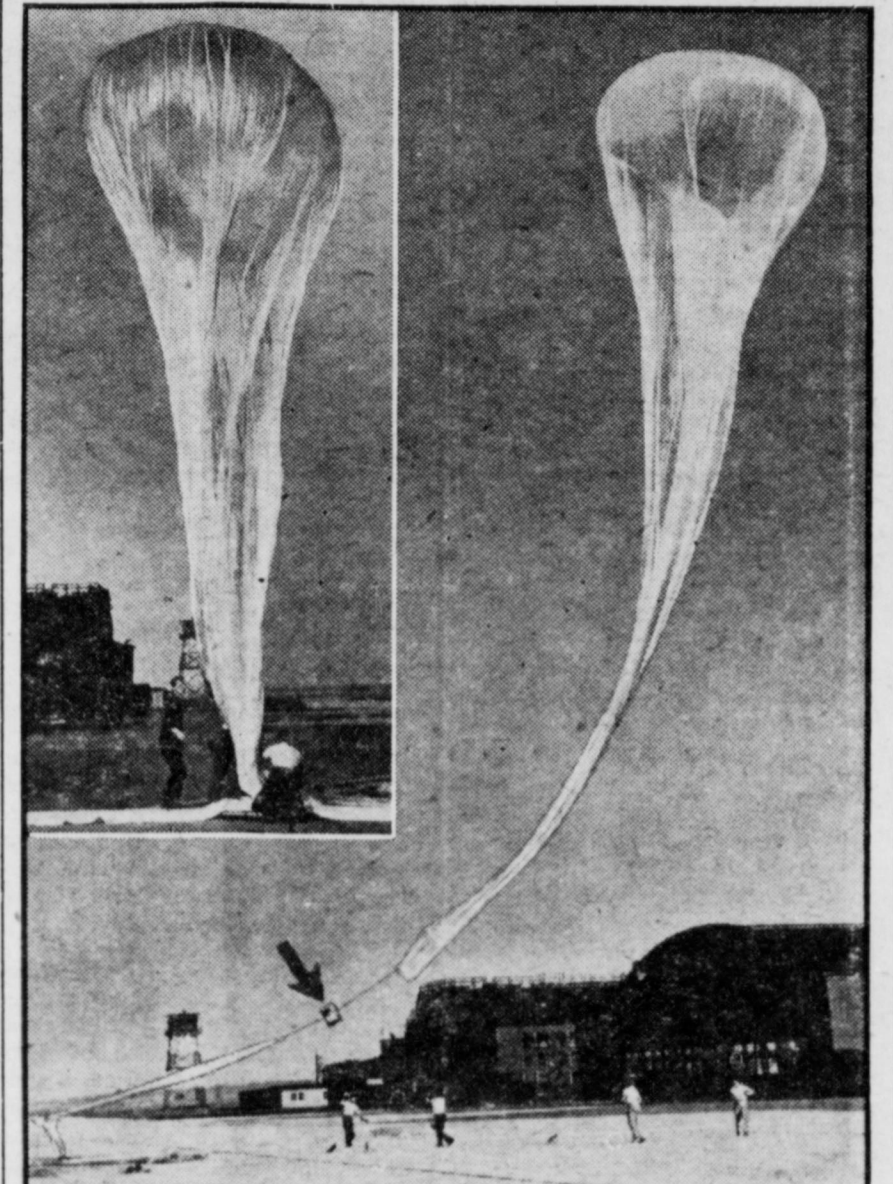

HERE'S WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT THE NEW TEXAS "SAFETY RESPONSIBILITY LAW"

- 1 **Enforcement Begins January 1, 1952.** On this date, the new Safety Responsibility Law, as passed by the Legislature, goes into effect. This law was designed to protect you against financially irresponsible drivers and owners of motor vehicles involved in accidents. It affects all drivers and motor vehicle owners (except Federal, State, County and City-owned cars).
- 2 **What Must You Do After An Accident?** Under existing laws, you must file a written report to the Department of Public Safety if your car is involved in an accident where there is a death, an injury or property damage in excess of \$25. Under the new law, a written report must be filed *within ten days* if your car is in an accident resulting in death, injury or property damage in excess of \$100.
- 3 **You Don't Have to Carry Liability Insurance, But . . .** If you are not insured against bodily injury and property damage liability, you must be able to deposit with the Department of Public Safety security equal to the estimated damage, not exceeding \$15,000.00, to cover all claims growing out of an accident anywhere in Texas in which you or your motor vehicle were involved. If you cannot establish financial responsibility for the future, your driver's license and your motor vehicle license plates are automatically suspended.
- 4 **It's Easy to Establish Financial Responsibility** with a motor vehicle liability insurance policy. If you do not now have such a policy, call your local insurance agent today. He is a qualified insurance counselor who will be happy to advise you concerning your needs.
- 5 **What is the Minimum of Your Liability?** The law permits each driver to establish the following minimum limits of liability: up to \$5,000.00 for injuries sustained by one person; up to \$10,000.00 for all personal injuries resulting from one accident, and up to \$5,000.00 for property damage. You do not have to establish such liability but it is the easiest way.
