Aransas Pass Voters Adopt City Charter

Aransas Pass, Tex.—Home rule was reapproved here by a vote of 128 to 25 Tuesday when a city charter was adopted.

Home rule was first approved several months ago when the voters decided to change over from the mayor-commission form of government.

The charter provides for a council-manager government form.

The council will be made up of a mayor, elected by majority vote, and four councilmen, all to serve concurrently for two-year terms. City Secretary Ted Bigelow said Tuesday night that the city commission will canvass the election returns next Tuesday and call an election to nominate two additional councilmen.

Present members of the commission are Mayor E. F. Falgout, J. M. Attaway, Jr., and Glen Ellis. All three will serve on the council until their present terms expire in April, 1953.

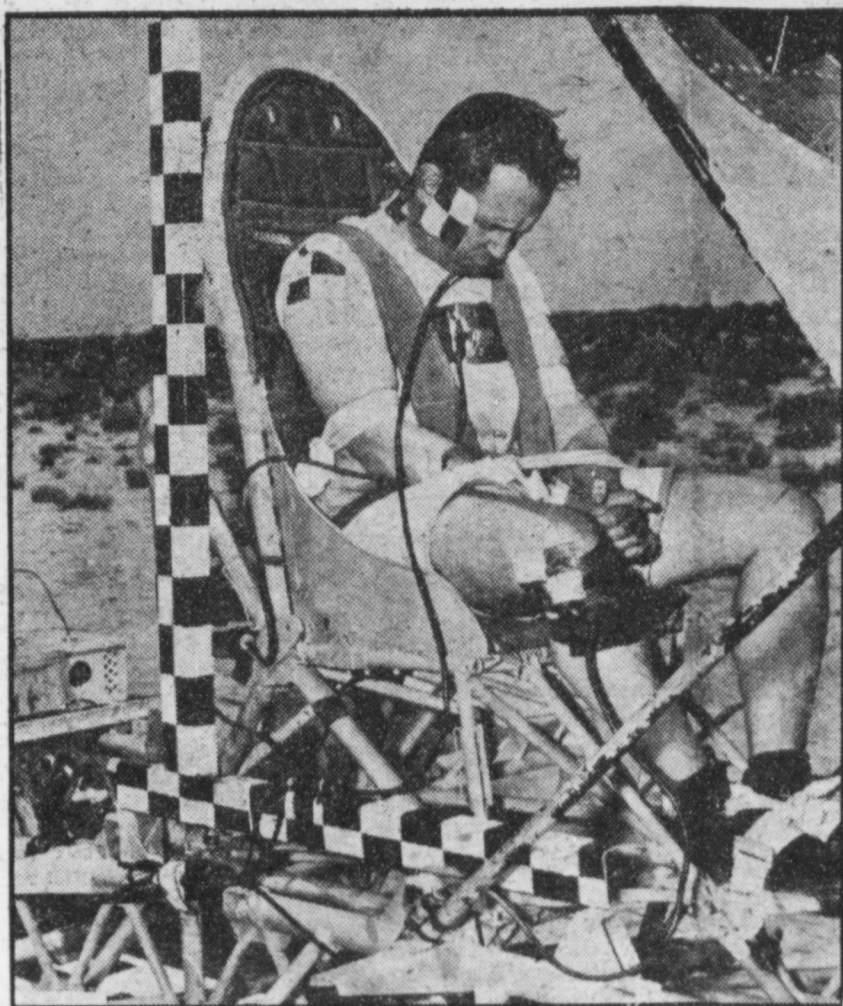

Aransas Bay Well Testing Gas Shows

Sun Oil Co. No. 1 State Tract 67, Aransas Bay wildcat 1½ miles southeast of Lamar, was at 8,407 feet Friday, running drillstem test in a zone where slight gas shows had been cored. This venture is contracted to 9,000 feet.

Down in the Salt Lake Field area, Sun Oil Co. No. 8 Copano State 76 was complete and shut-in as a gas well on perforations at 9,644-64 feet, where production was estimated at about 14 million cubic feet of gas a day, open flow. This test also was perforated at 9,799-821 feet, but this section was plugged off. Total depth is 11,023 feet and 5-inch liner is set at 9,897 feet.

Sun No. 3 Copano State 75, in the same area, was drilling Friday at 2,789 feet.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 22 Copano Bay State, West Fulton Beach Field in State Tract 66, was drilling Friday at 6,050 feet on an 8,000-foot contract, and the No. 14, in Tract 46, was drilling at 4,550 feet.

Union Producing Co. No. 6 Virginia Taton, wildcat just off State Highway 35, 11 miles north of Lamar, started coring at 6,813 feet and Friday was coring at 6,844 feet on an 8,000-foot venture. This test is 1,500 feet northwest of the No. 5, 10,340-foot dry hole.

Hunt Oil Co. No. 1 Travis Bailey, Aransas County wildcat in Joseph Peddenden Survey, A-65, 4 miles northwest of Rockport, was moving in TG&M rig last week for a proposed 10,000-foot test.

Up in Blackjack Field, Western Natural Gas Co. No. 17 St. Charles Ranch Co. was drilling Friday at 10,400 feet on an 11,500-foot try. This is the fourth test for this field, which has two gas pays and an oil sand, the first on this big lease.

Western Natural No. 15 St. Charles, in St. Charles Field, made 34 million cubic feet of gas on open flow test from perforations at 8,114-38 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 23,000 to 1 and shut-in pressure was 2,950 pounds.

C. G. Glascock and Pontiac Refining Co. No. 1 State Tract 48, 1½ miles west of end of West Fulton Beach Field in Copano Bay, flowed 104.7 barrels of 40.5 gravity oil on potential test through ¾-inch choke, under 1,310 pounds tubing pressure. Perforations, with 22 shots, were at 6,259-303 feet. Total depth was 8,194 feet and 5½-inch casing was set at 9,662 feet.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 24 Copano Bay State, near Fulton Beach Field test contracted to 7,225 feet, is 660 feet from the east line and 1,980 feet from the south line of Copano Bay State Tract 48 and 1,320 feet south of the No. 18.

Two Missing In Plane Enroute To Matagorda Island Tues.

R. N. "Bob" Eubanks and Willie Hawkins Feared Lost In Crash Over Aransas Bay

A four-place, single engine Cessna 170, piloted by R. N. "Bob" Eubanks, enroute to Matagorda Island, apparently crashed Tuesday night. Wing tanks, landing gear, and scattered wreckage had been found Wednesday. Eubanks, foreman for the Star Brand Cattle Co., on Matagorda Island, was accompanied by Willie Hawkins, Negro cook for the ranch. Neither men have been found as The Pilot goes to press.

The time of the crash was set at about 7 p. m. Tuesday by M. G. Taylor, manager of the local airport. Taylor said Eubanks took off from the airport at about dusk in a low ceiling. Before he left, Eubanks told Taylor he doubted he could land on Matagorda and that he might come back to Rockport.

C. L. Taylor, local Magnolia consignee, discovered the plane was missing and overdue early Wednesday when he flew to the island to superintend the unloading of a barge load of gasoline at ranch headquarters. When he learned that Eubanks didn't return to the ranch Tuesday night, Taylor returned to the airport, found that the foreman had taken off late Tuesday, and began searching for the plane.

Francis Rouquette of Fulton, found a half-filled wing tank, a landing wheel and strut off the plane floating on top of the water about 9:30 a. m. Wednesday. The spot was about two and a half miles southeast of Mills Wharf. Rouquette was quoted as saying there were loaves of bread and milk cartons floating on the surface also. Taylor said Eubanks and Hawkins had bought groceries for the ranch before leaving.

The spot where the plane parts were found is about three miles east-northeast of the airport, on a line with the route Eubanks would have flown to go to ranch headquarters.

The airport manager estimated 50 planes took part in the search Wednesday. He said they flew search sorties over the entire area until dusk. Both the Navy and Coast Guard sent planes to the area and private planes from Rockport, Corpus Christi, Victoria and Refugio took part in the search.

The U. S. Coast Guard station at Port Aransas sent a powered skiff and grappling equipment to the scene late Wednesday. Personnel at the station last night had no information when grappling operations would start in an effort to locate the plane and the bodies.

Earl W. Harding, Corpus Christi, commercial pilot for Fitzpatrick Drilling Co., sighted wreckage in Aransas Bay yesterday afternoon and landed his seaplane twice for a closer search.

Harding said the water was rough and that it was hard to mark the exact spot he spied the wreckage in order to land nearby. He believed he saw parts of a chair from the plane, possibly parts of the landing gear and a floor mat. Joe Dryden, Corpus Christi, also flew a search plane over the area Wednesday afternoon.

Eubanks was a foreman at ranch headquarters for the cattle company that is owned by Toddie Lee Winn, Dallas rancher and oilman. He was a Marine flyer in World War II, about 27 years of age, and described as "a fine pilot" by Taylor at the airport. He had been employed by the cattle company for the past six months and had previously worked there for about a year. Taylor said the missing pilot had also given flying instructions and had done extensive chartered flying.

Eubanks lived at ranch headquarters on the island with his wife and 2½ year-old daughter.

OPS CEILING PRICE REGULATIONS EFFECTIVE AFTER NOVEMBER 20

The sale of used passenger automobiles will be governed by a new dollars and cents OPS regulation after November 20, OPS officials announced.

The new regulation, CPR 94, provides for a set price on each body style, line or series, of each make of used passenger car for the years 1940 through 1951.

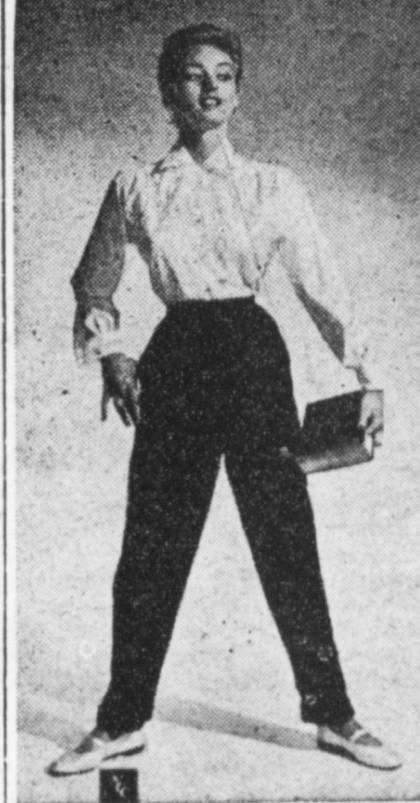
These ceiling prices are to be reduced 2 per cent every calendar quarter beginning on Jan. 1, 1952.

The new order differs from the old regulations in that it establishes a uniform price level for all sellers and provides for the depreciation percentage.

Private owners of used automobiles are also restricted from selling above the ceiling price, but the new regulation permits, as did the old, a trade-in at above ceiling prices.

Aransas Residents Pulled Wry Tricks Years Ago

It's no new thing for people to "view with alarm the acts of governmental officials where they appear to overstep the powers granted them by the Constitution and laws."

Citizens of the City of Aransas were doing just that 112 years ago. They not only viewed with alarm. They held public meetings and passed a resolution charging the acts of President Mirabeau Lamar of the Republic of Texas were "against the best interest of the people and subversion of their rights of freedom."

The ire of the pioneer citizens of the little town was aroused at the President when he issued an order moving the customhouse from their community across the bay to Lamar. The City of Aransas was founded in 1838 on the shore of Copano Bay near the present south entrance to Copano causeway. All traces of its existence have long since disappeared but it served as the first port of entry and the first customhouse on the Texas coast was established here.

On Ox Wagons

Cargo ships entered at Aransas Pass, now Port Aransas, and stopped at the City of Aransas to get their required clearance papers, then proceeded to old Copano where their cargoes were discharged, loaded on ox wagons and freighted to San Antonio, Galia, Gonzales and to Mexico.

Harry Traylor of Rockport has done extensive research on the almost forgotten city and the early history of the coast through accounts found in the letters of Mirabeau Lamar in the San Antonio Library.

Traylor's research shows that the residents of Point Lookout across the Copano from Aransas coveted the customhouse and snatched it from under the noses of their neighbors by changing the name of their community to Lamar and informing the President of their action. This action so pleased the chief executive of the republic that he ordered their wish granted and the customhouse removed.

Citizens of Aransas were notified of the action in June, 1839. Dignitaries of the city gathered at the Council House Saturday evening, June 15, 1839 to protest the action. H. L. Kinney, president of the council, appointed Col. James Power, George W. Fulton, Edward Fitz Gerald, Joel T. Case and himself as a committee to draft resolutions expressing their opinions of the President's action. Adopted unanimously on June 17, 1839, the resolution read:

Unapproachable

"Whereas, the Custom House for the entry of goods in the bay of Aransas has been recently removed as it is understood by the authority of the present executive from the City of Aransas, on Live Oak Point, to a place opposite, called Lamar, a place unapproachable by vessels drawing seven feet of water within 1/4 of a mile from the shore, and more over affording an insecure anchorage to vessels during a stress of weather from any point of the compass, except the north, to a place located on land previously titled to another person and entirely aside from the natural channel of trade now about to be opened with the Mexicans and settlers in the county.

"Whereas, for the last 12 months the City of Aransas on Live Oak Point has been known and acknowledged as the Port of Entry on this bay, and as such many of us, the oldest citizens and the earliest settlers of Texas have stood ready in times of threatened danger to defend it and the revenues of the county with our lives and our humble fortune in our hands, and

"Whereas, this point has the advantage of an excellent harbor, and anchorage sheltered from the force of winds in every direction, with 7 feet of water within 100 yards off shore, and the place having a direct communication with the western portion of Texas and the Mexican frontier without the interposition of improbable storms and comparatively secure from molestation by the hostile Indians that range through the region of country between this bay and the

mountains. The place seeming to be destined by a natural train of events up at this time to become at no distant period the great commercial emporium of western Texas without having recourse to the miserable shifts of modern puffing and without calling to its aid the affiliation of dignitaries or a lengthened vocabulary of agencies in foreign lands, therefore:

"Resolved in our opinion the removal of the Custom House as aforesaid is in direct opposition to the wishes and interest of the country at large, and to those, the citizens of Refugio County in particular and is an arbitrary stretch of power and favoritism not to be borne tamely by the citizens of a free Republic.

"Resolved that we deem it a duty we owe ourselves, our fellow citizens and the country of our adoption to set this matter forth publicly in its true light that it may be seen what a pass rulers may be brought when biased by contracted sinister views, and that such judgment may be passed upon acts of its kind as a free and independent people have a right to decide upon the deeds of their fellow servants.

"Resolved that we can conceive of no reason for the removal aforesaid other than the fact that the Acting Secretary of Treasury was at the time an alien and unacquainted perhaps with the constitution and laws and with the general weal of the country or through special favoritism to the place from it being called Lamar and after the present President of the Republic, as the place was never intended by nature nor can it be made by art without the expenditure of millions of dollars, a town of importance.

"Resolved: that we view with deep and fearful concern this step of the Executive as making use of power not granted him by the con-

stitution or laws, a power inimical to the best interest of the country and subversion of the right and the freedom of this people."

Copies of the resolution were sent to Lamar at the capitol in Houston and also to the editor of the Houston Telegraph and the Galveston Civilian. The old patriots possibly derived a lot of personal satisfaction out of venting their spleen through the resolution route and no doubt left the meeting with their high silk hats at a jaunty angle. But, they didn't get the customhouse back.—Corpus Christi Caller-Times.

Local Draft Boards Increase Pool of Men
Austin, Texas. — Actions of state draft boards in October reduced the manpower pool of men with dependents by 25 per cent, a state Selective Service report to Washington revealed today.
During the same period, local board actions increased the pool of men available for military service by 34 per cent, the report showed.
At the end of September, draft

boards had 69,610 men deferred because of dependents. At the end of October the figure had dropped to 52,508. At the end of September, boards had 43,328 classified in 1-A. By the end of October this pool was increased to 56,411.
Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state selective service director, explained the decrease in the number of men with dependents.
"Men with only dependent wives are no longer deferred under our new regulations," he said, "unless they can show extreme hardship. The local boards are reopening all these cases, and the figures show that many of them are being reclassified into 1-A."
"This is proper and is in compliance with law and regulations," the state director continued, "if the man with a dependent wife alone is not otherwise deferrable because of some other status."
General Wakefield again reminded men of their legal responsibility to notify their draft boards if they get married, or if wives are expecting a child.
Under present draft regulations, if a man's wife is expecting their first child, the man is required, prior to the date his draft board mails him an induction order, to file a statement from a licensed physician that a child has been conceived.
If he fails in this responsibility, present draft regulations make it mandatory that he be inducted into the service.
"Draft boards are currently hard at work reclassifying men with only dependent wives," General Wakefield said. "Several registrants over the state already have been too late in notifying their boards."
"There's nothing we can do about their cases. All we can do is implore all young men affected by the draft to notify their boards of any change in status."
"Tomorrow may be too late. The time to act is now," the state draft director concluded.
