



New Species of Sea Shell Named for Baughman

A new species of sea shell, recently discovered by the marine laboratory of the Texas Game and Fish Commission in Rockport, has been classified and named in honor of Jack L. Baughman, chief marine biologist.

Dr. Leo George Hertlein of the California Academy of Science classified and named the series. Closely resembling the small,

brown, ribbed shells children pick up on Texas beaches, the clam-like animals were found in numbers on experimental trawls at a depth of 240 feet.

Dr. Hertlein said the new species has a closer resemblance to fossil remains on the Atlantic slope and West Indies dating thousands of years back to the Miocene Age than with any other known living species. It was named Andara Baughmani.

Baughman said that while the species appears to be abundant southeast of Port Aransas, it has remained unknown to science because there have been no deep explorations off the Texas shore until about a year ago.

Two additional species have recently been taken on trawls at depths of 212 fathoms (672 feet) by the marine laboratory. These have been sent to Dr. W. J. Clench at Harvard University. Dr. Clench is recognized as one of the greatest living authorities on shells and is now studying them to determine if they are a new species. He recently wrote Baughman that he has never seen anything like them before. One resembles the trade mark of Shell gasoline while the other looks like an auger.

Members of the species named for Baughman are heavily ribbed Pelecypoda class, Prinodesmacea order, Arcidae family, Anadara gray genus-a new species named Anadara Baughmani Hertlein.





Garrison Discusses Method of Reporting Traffic Accidents

Austin.-Public confusion over the method of reporting traffic accidents under the state's new Motor Vehicle Safety Responsibility Law was cleared up today by Public Safety Director Homer Garrison, Jr., who showed that any change in the present system is so slight that it should cause no difficulty among motorists.

The present confusion was brought about by the discrepancy in time for filling regular accident reports, which must be sent to the Texas Department of Public Safety within 24 hours, and the time for filing additional information under the Safety Responsibility Law, which may be sent to the Department within as much as 10 days. This gave rise to belief among motor vehicle owners and operators that they would be required to file two lengthy reports which is not true.

Here are the rules for reporting traffic accidents beginning Jan. 1, when the Safety Responsibility Law becomes effective, as explained by Director Garrison for the guidance of all motorists:

Under the state's Uniform Traffic Law, the operator of every motor vehicle that is involved in an accident resulting in death or injury to a person, or total property damage to an apparent extent of \$25 or more, must file a complete written report with the Texas Department of Public Safety within 24 hours, exactly as they do now. Official forms for this purpose may be obtained from any sheriff's office, local police station, highway patrolman or the Texas Department of Public Safety, as at present. In other words, there is no change whatever in the present rules for reporting accidents of the type just described. When you obtain a regular ac-

cident report, beginning January 1, there will also be furnished by W. R. Law. If the accident did not involve death or injury to a person, or property damage to any one person, including yourself, in excess of \$100, you may disregard this insurance Information section. If you are required to file it, however, be sure that you still get the regular accident report section off to the Texaas Department of Public Safety within 24 hours, despite the fact that you may take up to 10 days to send in the insurance section.

1. Carefully read the state's leaflet about the law and keep it

handy in your car. 2. Get a report form, study the questions, and keep it in your car;

you may need it in a hurry. 3. If you are insured, keep the name of your insurance company, number of your policy and amount and kind of insurance it provides. in your car for immediate re-

4. If you are not insured, make up your mind in advance how you will meet the new law's security requirements by other means, as explained in the state's leaflet, if you are involved in a traffic acci-

"It cannot be repeated too often," Director Garrison said. "that the driver of every car involved in an accident must file all, required information with the Department of Public Safety within the brief periods stated. Any question of who was at fault must not even be considered—the law says every driver, regardless of fault. The penalty for failure to report is a fine of \$25 and suspension of your operating license until the report is filed. If an operator is physically unable to report, and was driving another person's motor vehicle at the time of the accident, the owner of the vehicle must file the report."







When the child comes in to shed his coats and sweaters and is sweating, he has had on too much clothing. But if he went outside for less active play, that same amount of clothing might have been all right. Which makes it a hit and miss deal, doesn't it? So you get into such general rules as that the clothing should be comfortable both as to fit and as to warmth according to the weather and to the activity of the child.

Bedclothes are always a problem with small children, too. Even for sleeping, the needs of some children in the same family will vary greatly. One will want heavy pajamas with heaps of covers over him and another will be miserable in the same situation.

So the clothing needs of children do vary, radically. It takes a lot of a mother's time to figure out just what the needs of each of her children are. But when she realizes that each one may have different requirements at different times, the children will be happier and healthier in their winter clothing.

And there is need for a word of caution there, too. The child is not always by word a reliable gauge for his needs. 


