Harry Rogers Speaker At Rotary Luncheon

The Rockport Rotary Club had their regular dinner meeting in the Methodist annex Wednesday at noon with three guests, C. L. Utz of Tribune, Kan., Bill Davis of Corpus Christi, and Clark Wren of Rockport, present.

The secretary, Ed Beasley, reported that the club had three 100 per cent meetings in November. Reid Simmons was program chairman and introduced Joe Sheldon of San Antonio, who in turn introduced Harry Rogers, a native of Oklahoma, who has resided for a number of years in San Antonio. Mr. Rogers is president of the school board in San Antonio and he was president of Rotary International in 1926-27.

He said he had visited Rotary Clubs in nearly all the countries of the world, and that it is a fence-building organization; that all members of Rotary must be in business or have a profession. He thinks one of the fences of Rotary is honesty, not buying on black markets or stealing from the government.

Mr. Rogers went on to say that America is a Christian nation, with the constitutional meeting a Christian meeting, and that President Thomas Jefferson said that the people of the United States can be prevented from wasting the resources of the people, and he warns against this peril now. He believes the American people should return to work. The reform schools in the United States are over full, and if the boys and girls could work it would not be so.

Dept. of Public Safety Cannot Determine Fault In Traffic Accidents

Austin, Texas. — Public Safety Director Homer Garrison, Jr., emphasized in a statement today that the state's new Motor Vehicle Safety Responsibility Law does not give his department the slightest judicial authority to determine questions of fault before applying the law's full requirements to motorists who are involved in severe traffic accidents.

"The saddest mistake a motorist can make," Director Garrison said, "is to think the state cannot compel him to furnish proof of his ability to meet damage claims and suspend all of his motoring privileges if he fails to do so, because he is quite sure he was not to blame. Those who imagine they can postpone meeting the new law's security requirements until a court decides the issue of fault will find that they are wrong."

"This does not mean that any motorist will be required to pay for damages he did not cause, or that he does not have full recourse to the courts if he feels that any order issued under the new law violates his rights. It does mean, however, that pending a final court decree on a question of liability, the involved owner or operator must satisfy the Texas Department of Public Safety that he is prepared to meet damage claims for which he is apparently responsible."

"Here are the circumstances that will prevail when the new law becomes effective on Jan. 1:

"If you are involved in an accident resulting in death or injury to a person, or property damage exceeding \$100 to any one person, including yourself, you must file a complete report with the department not later than 10 days after the accident. If the report shows that you were properly insured at the time of the accident, you are not subject to the safety responsibility law because it recognizes insurance as proof of ability to meet damage claims up to \$15,000.

"If you were not insured, the department will determine the extent of damages for which you may be held liable, ranging from a minimum of \$101 to a maximum of \$15,000. You must then furnish the department with satisfactory proof that you will be able to respond in the fixed amount, either

Sheriff Sells 950 San Pat Tracts Owning Taxes

Sinton, Tex. — Approximately 950 city lots and acreage tracts in and around Aransas Pass were sold at a sheriff's sale Tuesday for a total of \$36,083. The sale resulted from suits filed to collect delinquent taxes on the property.

When the sale closed at 4 p. m., 245 lots and tracts remained to be sold. Ross Terry of Austin, tax attorney for San Patricio County said the remaining property will be sold at auction in February.

In three prior sales, more than 2,000 pieces of property have been sold at bids totaling \$39,000, all from the Aransas Pass area. Terry estimated that 60 percent of the delinquent property in the county is represented in the four sales of property from that area.

A few of the tracts offered Tuesday failed to sell. These can be purchased at the tax redemption price at County Judge William E. Nicholas' office, Terry said.

Western Natural No. 17 Prepares to Look for Leak

Western Natural Gas Co., No. 17 St. Charles Ranch Co., in the new Blackjack Field, was running tubing yesterday to condition mud before starting to look for a possible leak in the 5 1/2-inch casing, which is set to 11,255 feet, 5 feet off bottom. This venture had started to kick soon after casing was set, but was controlled with mud, and yesterday remained quiet.

In St. Charles Field, Western Natural No. 18 St. Charles set 7-inch casing at total depth, 8,720 feet, and yesterday was waiting on cement.

Last Air Crash Victim's Body Recovered In Bay

The last body from the ranch plane which crashed near here with two men on the night of Nov. 20, was found floating in Aransas Bay about 1 1/2 miles south of Mills' Wharf at 4:30 p. m. Monday. It was the body of Willie Hawkins, cook on Matagorda Island. Crew members of the Brown and Root tug discovered the body. The body was taken to Cagle Funeral Home in Aransas Pass.

Hawkins' only known survivor is a niece whose name is not known. He was originally from Kaufman.

John McBride Receives Scholarship at University

Austin, Tex. — John Austil McBride of Rockport has been awarded a LaVerne Noyes scholarship at the University of Texas.

The scholarships, which cover all required fees except the supplementary fees in fine arts and the general property deposit at the university, are awarded annually to descendants of World War I veterans.

This is the third straight week that entries from Rockport have won first prize in the trout division. Mrs. Bill Bardwell won the second week and Joe Everett won the first.

Yesterday Mrs. Bardwell and Mrs. Mary Juergens, secretary of the local Chamber of Commerce, appeared as guests on the Tip Top Shopper radio program at 11:15 a. m. over station KRIS in Corpus Christi. Next Wednesday Mrs. Wells and Mrs. Juergens will be on this program.

Bill Shell on Padre Island made a major contribution to the Winter Fishing Sweepstakes in last week's competition, according to information released this morning following a meeting of the judges. A drum, 51 inches long and weighing 43 1/2 pounds, was caught by Dr. Robert A. Cagle of Corpus Christi. This is the largest fish landed in the month-old sweepstakes, committee members said.

The week's first prize for the largest redfish went to Jack Edwards of Corpus Christi. This catch was also made on Padre Island. It measured 44 inches and weighed 36 pounds.

The largest sheephead was caught by Royce Exum of Corpus Christi. This was taken at the Intracoastal Canal intersection with the Padre Island causeway. It measured 19 inches and weighed 5 1/2 pounds.

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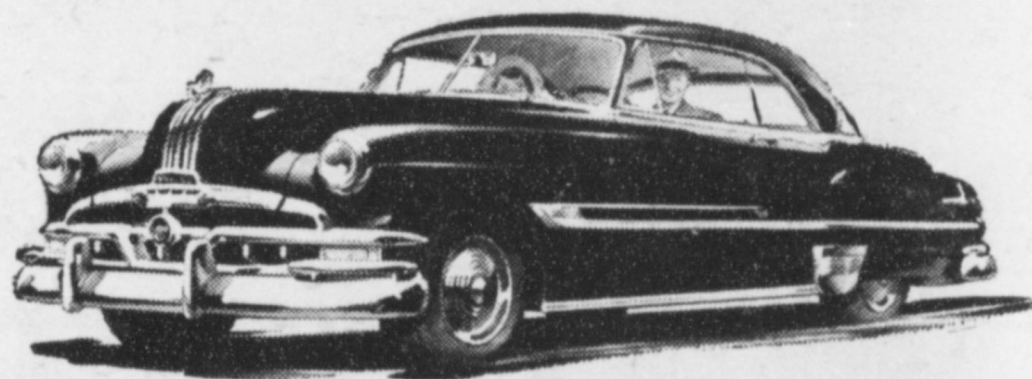
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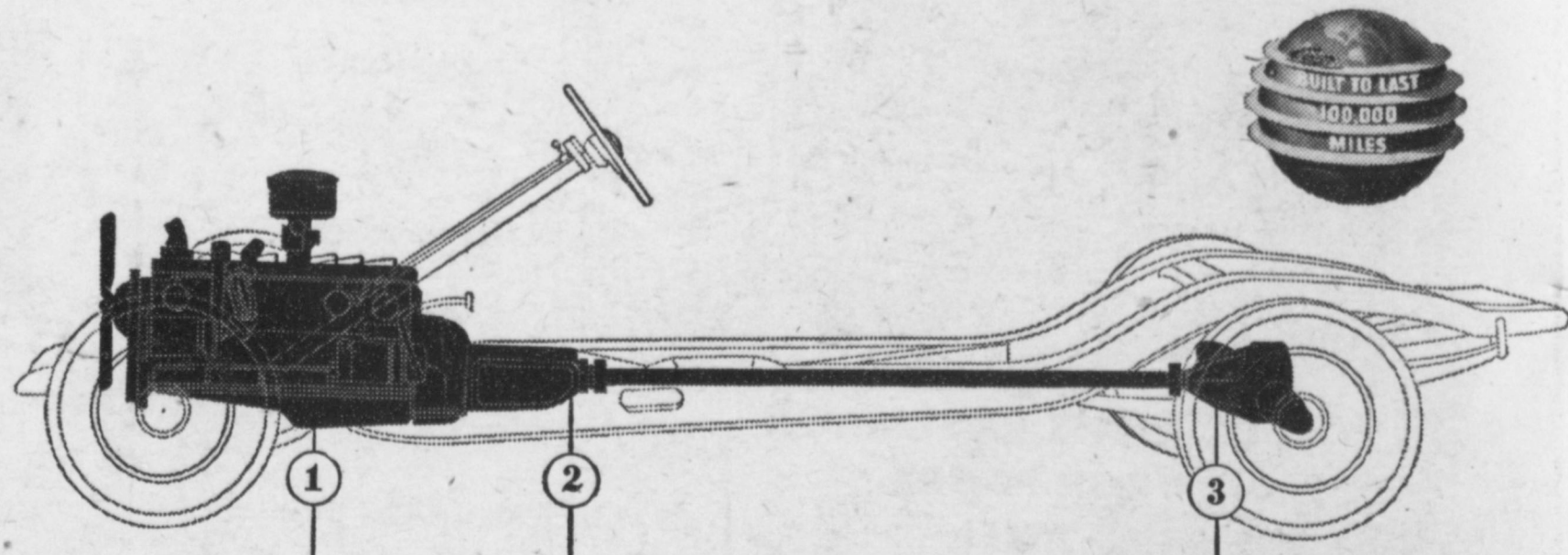

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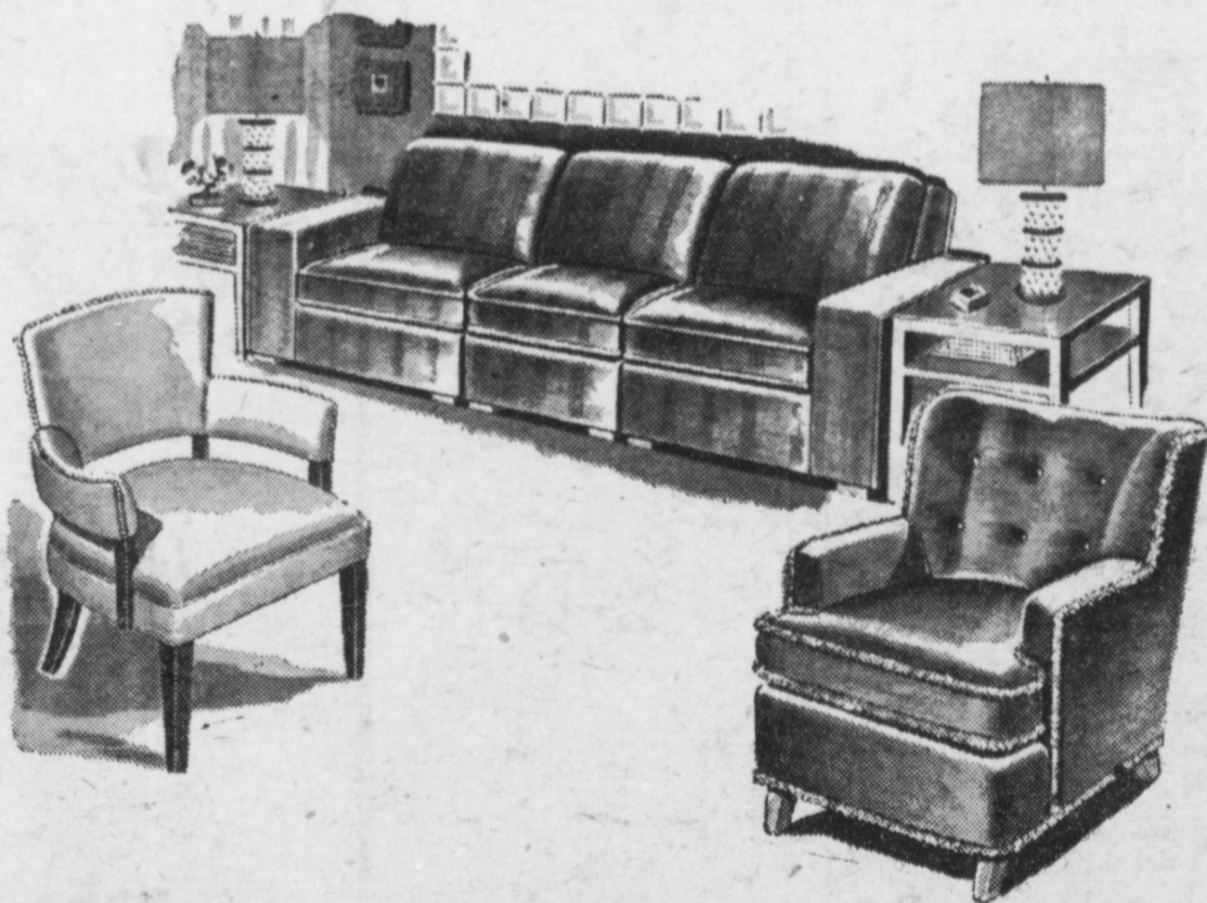

Medical Ass'n Warns Of Winter Dangers

Your habits change a great deal when the cold winds put a damper on lots of the outdoor activities. And even such outdoor fun as you do seek is quite a bit different from that of the balmy fall days. Fires, outdoors and indoors, are the biggest change in living habits during the winter and fires can also be one of the biggest threats to health. A fire is one example of the idea that a little bit of a good thing in its proper place is a blessing whereas too much of a good thing in the wrong place is a great danger.

From infancy to old age, playing with fire is one of life's most dangerous habits, whether the fire be in a cooking stove, heater, camp fire or just on the end of a match. There are few accidents that leave deeper scars than those caused by fire, affecting not only the person burned but also those who love him. Injuries from fires are greatest during the month of December.

Burns are classified medically as

first, second, and third degree burns. First degree burns are those in which the skin is reddened. They are painful but there is slight danger of scar or infection since only the top layer of skin is burned. Butter or some bland salve applied gently to the burn will usually relieve the pain and a loose bandage over the burn will cut down on any possible infection.

Second degree burns are the kind where blisters form and third degree burns are those that have destroyed several layers of skin. Since the skin, which forms a protective layer for the body, is destroyed to some extent in these two kinds of burns, it is easy for the germs to grow there and cause infections.

Second and third degree burns that cover 10 per cent or more of the body are considered major injuries and should receive medical attention as soon as possible. If medical attention is not immediately available, wet packs may be applied to the burned area. You mix three tablespoons of baking soda or Epsom salts with a quart of warm tap water and dip clean strips of cloth into the liquid; place that over the burns and cover the whole area with dry, clean towels.

Burns that cover a large portion of the body are called massive burns, and the person should be wrapped in a large clean sheet, covered with as much other wrapping as the weather demands, and taken to a hospital as quickly as possible. If the person is conscious, your doctor may advise you to give him a glass of salt water enroute to the hospital.

There is a state of shock which accompanies bad burns that cover a lot of the body. The body loses a lot of plasma, that yellowish salty part of the blood, when burns sear the skin, and salt water, if your doctor advises it, may help replace some of the plasma until

real blood plasma can be given at the hospital.

In minor burns, the greatest danger lies in infection. In major burns, there is always danger of infection and also danger to the person in a state of shock.

Fire is essential to life but all precautions must be observed to keep fire in its place. Just like the family car. Life is much easier with an automobile but if that car isn't handled properly it can be a robber of life. Added to the year-round hazards of an automobile are the winter risks involved in starting the car in a closed garage and riding in the car with all windows up.

That air coming out of the exhaust pipe of your car contains carbon monoxide gas, a deadly poison. In an open place it is quickly thinned out in the air and is made harmless. In a closed place, however, it accumulates and when breathed into the lungs it causes suffocation. If all the windows of the car are up and no air is coming into the car, that carbon monoxide gas may accumulate in the car without your knowledge. It takes just a little circulation of air to make the odorless gas become harmless.

Suffocation by carbon monoxide poisoning is one kind of asphyxiation and the automobile is not the only source of the poisonous gas. Without proper ventilation, the gas heaters in the home can cause asphyxiation if they are not properly adjusted. Clogged chimneys and improperly operated dampers with an open fire can cause enough carbon monoxide to be pushed back into a tightly closed room to be a danger.

So you want adequate ventilation without draftiness to ward off the threat of asphyxiation, whether you're at home or in the car during the cold winter months. It's as simple as that.

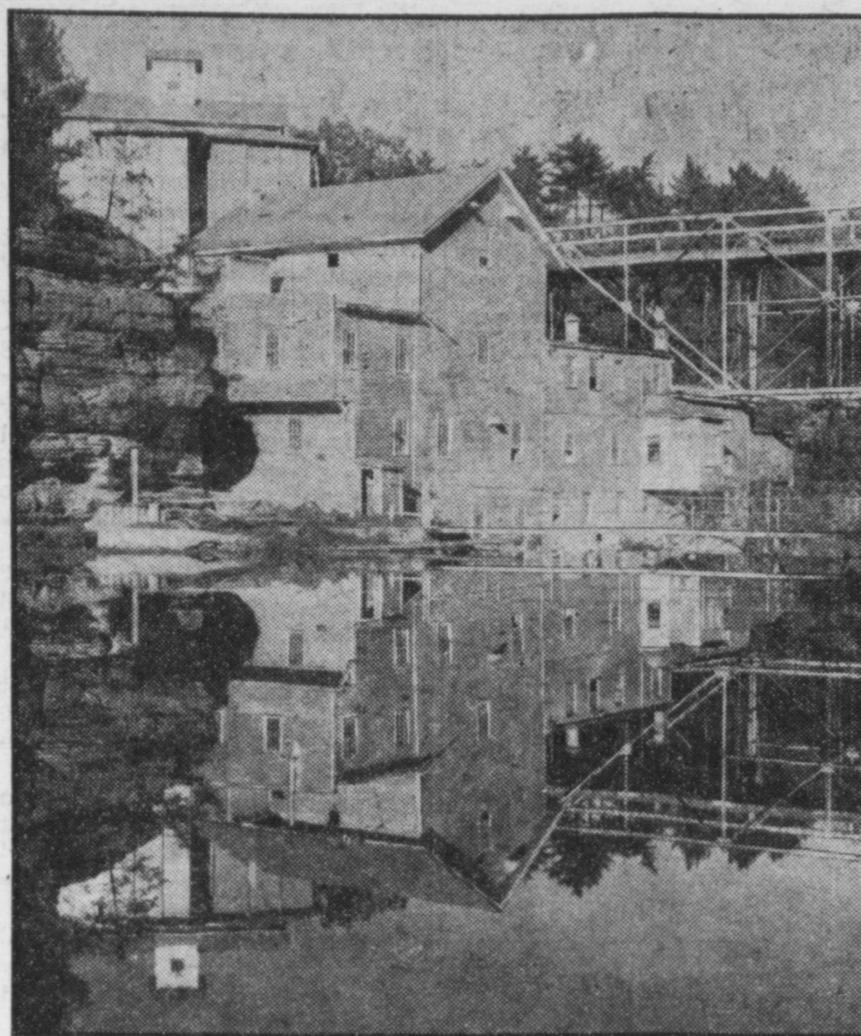

HERE'S WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW ABOUT THE NEW TEXAS "SAFETY RESPONSIBILITY LAW"

- 1 Enforcement Begins January 1, 1952.** On this date, the new Safety Responsibility Law, as passed by the Legislature, goes into effect. This law was designed to protect you against financially irresponsible drivers and owners of motor vehicles involved in accidents. It affects all drivers and motor vehicle owners (except Federal, State, County and City-owned cars).

- 3 You Don't Have to Carry Liability Insurance, But . . .** If you are not insured against bodily injury and property damage liability, you must be able to deposit with the Department of Public Safety security equal to the estimated damage, not exceeding \$15,000.00, to cover all claims growing out of an accident anywhere in Texas in which you or your motor vehicle were involved. If you cannot establish financial responsibility for the future, your driver's license and your motor vehicle license plates are automatically suspended.
- 4 It's Easy to Establish Financial Responsibility** with a motor vehicle liability insurance policy. If you do not now have such a policy, call your local insurance agent today. He is a qualified insurance counselor who will be happy to advise you concerning your needs.
- 5 What is the Minimum of Your Liability?** The law permits each driver to establish the following minimum limits of liability: up to \$5,000.00 for injuries sustained by one person; up to \$10,000.00 for all personal injuries resulting from one accident, and up to \$5,000.00 for property damage. You do not have to establish such liability but it is the easiest way.

New Vehicle Law

by depositing collateral or posting a bond. You will not be required to furnish any security, however, if you have all other persons involved in the accident release you from liability, obtain a final court decree of non-liability, or execute a legal agreement providing for installment payment of claims. Neither will security be required if you show that your car was legally parked or being operated without your permission, or that all injuries and damages were confined solely to yourself.

"The law allows you a maximum of 70 days, however, in which to satisfy it in any one of these manners—10 days to file your safety responsibility report and 60 days thereafter to satisfy the security requirements. If within the stated period you have not satisfied the law, regardless of how innocent you think you may be, the Texas Department of Public Safety has no alternative but to suspend your operator's license and the registration plates for all cars owned by you.

"Should you later meet one of the security requirements, obtain a final court decree of non-liability, or if a year elapses without court action for damages being filed, the suspension will be lifted immediately; or if security was deposited, it will be returned. In the meantime, however, others involved in the accident have their rights protected, too. Thus our new law is fair to everyone."
