



### About 12 Texans Develop Leprosy Every Year

Austin.—About 12 persons in Texas come down with leprosy every year, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. "Since 1921 over 300 individual cases have been diagnosed, mostly in counties bordering the Gulf

Coast and Rio Grande River. "Leprosy," Dr. Cox says, "is one of the penalties of being human. No other animal ever gets it. You do not need to worry a great deal about it because it is probably the least catching of all communicable diseases. The horror and shame in which the disease is held today

is a hold over from Biblical times. "One consolation about the whole thing is that a Russian satellite-Rumania is the world's focus of

"The disease takes two forms, one called tuberculoid because it resembles tuberculosis; and the other lepromatous. The second type affects twice as many men as women; presumably because 'there are more modes and opportunities for infection in men.' "Lepromatous patients live an average of 3 to 10 years, while the tuberculoid type apparently doesn't affect the patient's life span. Neither type is as catching s tuberculosis or other communi-

"Most cases of the disease are contracted during childhood," Dr. 'ox reports, "Cox reports, "with manifestation actually appearing in the teens or early 20's.

### Number of Draftees To Receive Examinations Increased for January

Austin, Texas. - The number of Texas draft registrants to be ex- when they are on leave or are alamined at armed forces examining stations in January has been raised from 1,880 to 4,271, Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, announced today.

Announcement of examination of the orginal group of 1,880 was made in early December. General Wakefield said his headquarters received the call for the additional 2,391 just before Christmas.

The 2,391 men to be selected will be from among men who have been examined before and failed to pass mental tests given by the armed forces. Under provisions of 1951 amendments to the draft law hese men must be reexamined because of lowered mental standards now authorized as acceptable.

Among men to be included will be some whose liability for service under the draft law has been extended until age 35. Local boards have been called upon not to order any registrant for examination who appears to be eligible for any other deferred classification.

The state Selective Service director said the program of examining men who previously have failed mental tests will "go on for months." He said he was not able to estimate how many would be reexamined before the program is

"Our statistics at state headquarters show that we have around 87,000 men classified IV-F over the state," General Wakefield said. They are men who have been considered unfit for physical, mental, or moral reasons, or a combination of two or three of those

"Until a survey of our local boards records is complete, we will not know exactly how many have been classified IV-F solely because of failure to pass the mental test,' he concluded.
