## Second Producer From West Fulton B Sand Completed

Completed as the second producer from the B Sand in the West Fulton Beach Field in Aransas County, Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 28 Copano Bay State flowed 168 barrels of 42 gravity, pipeline oil in 24 hours.

Gas-oil ratio was 704-1, with tubing pressure 900 pounds. The flow was through a 9/64 inch tubing choke from 24 perforations at 6,292-96 feet. With total depth at 6,750 feet, the well is in State Submerged Lands, Tract 64.

Phillips No. 29 Copano Bay State was drilling ahead at 525 feet.

Sun Oil Co. No. 1 State-67, wildcat in Aransas Bay, 1 1/2 miles southeast of Lamar, ran electric log survey to bottom at 10,011 feet and took 6 sidewall cores. There was recovery on four of the cores. A core at 9,326 feet yielded 3/4 inch of sand with some odor and fluorescence and a core at 9,764 feet showed similar recovery. Setting 5-inch liner on bottom was likely.

Sun No. 3, Copano State 75, Salt Lake Field project, was preparing to perforate and test through its seventh set of perforations at 8,185-90 feet. It had earlier drilled to 8,673 feet and run 5-inch liner to 8,666 feet. Perforations from 8,288-98 feet tested salt water and were squeezed.

Richardson and Bass No. 1 State Tract 264, Aransas Bay wildcat 6 miles southeast of Rockport, was still drilling at an unspecified depth Friday. A tight well it was drilling at 4,112 feet at last report, Dec. 29.

Plymouth Oil Co. No. 3 State Tract 103, Copano Bay test 4 miles northwest of Rockport, was drilling at 8,890 feet in shale Friday.

Hunt Oil Co. No. 1 Travis Bailey wildcat 4 miles northwest of Rockport, has been abandoned.

## 588 Boys Participate In Karankawa District Scouting Program

The Karankawa Boy Scout District closed the year with 588 boys in the scouting program, according to a report to the district committee this week by Judge William E. Nichols, district organization and extension committee chairman.

This represents a net gain of 70 boys over a year ago. There are 260 cub scouts now; a year ago there were 255; showing a net gain of 5. Boy Scouts a year ago totaled 263, now there are 328, showing a net gain of 65. "We hope to have 643 boys in the program at the end of 1952," Nichols said.

## Aransas Fields Gain New Wells

Two Aransas County pools have gained a producer each.

Western Natural Gas Co. T-18 St Charles, St. Charles (B Sand) Field well, Sumpter-Turner Survey, was finalized for a 24-hour flow of 289.73 barrels of 41.4 gravity oil. The flow was through a 3/4-inch tubing choke from 100 perforations at 7,870-95 feet, with total depth 8,720 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 1,194-1.

The project was earlier completed for 18,500 millions cubic feet of gas daily, with gas-liquid ratio 23,800-1, from perforations at 7,926-40 feet.

Flowing 120.46 barrels of 41.7 gravity oil daily, Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 28 Copano Bay State, Fulton Beach, West Field, State Submerged Lands Tract 45, was finalized through a 1/8-inch choke from 60 perforations at 6,300-10 feet. Total depth was 7,950 feet, with gas oil ratio at 980-1.

Phillips Petroleum Co. has planned two trys in the area. No. 30 Copano Bay State, projected to 8,050 feet, will be 660 feet from north and west lines of state submerged lands Tract 44. No. 31 Copano Bay State, slated 6,750 feet, will be 467 feet from south and west lines of state submerged land Tract 47.

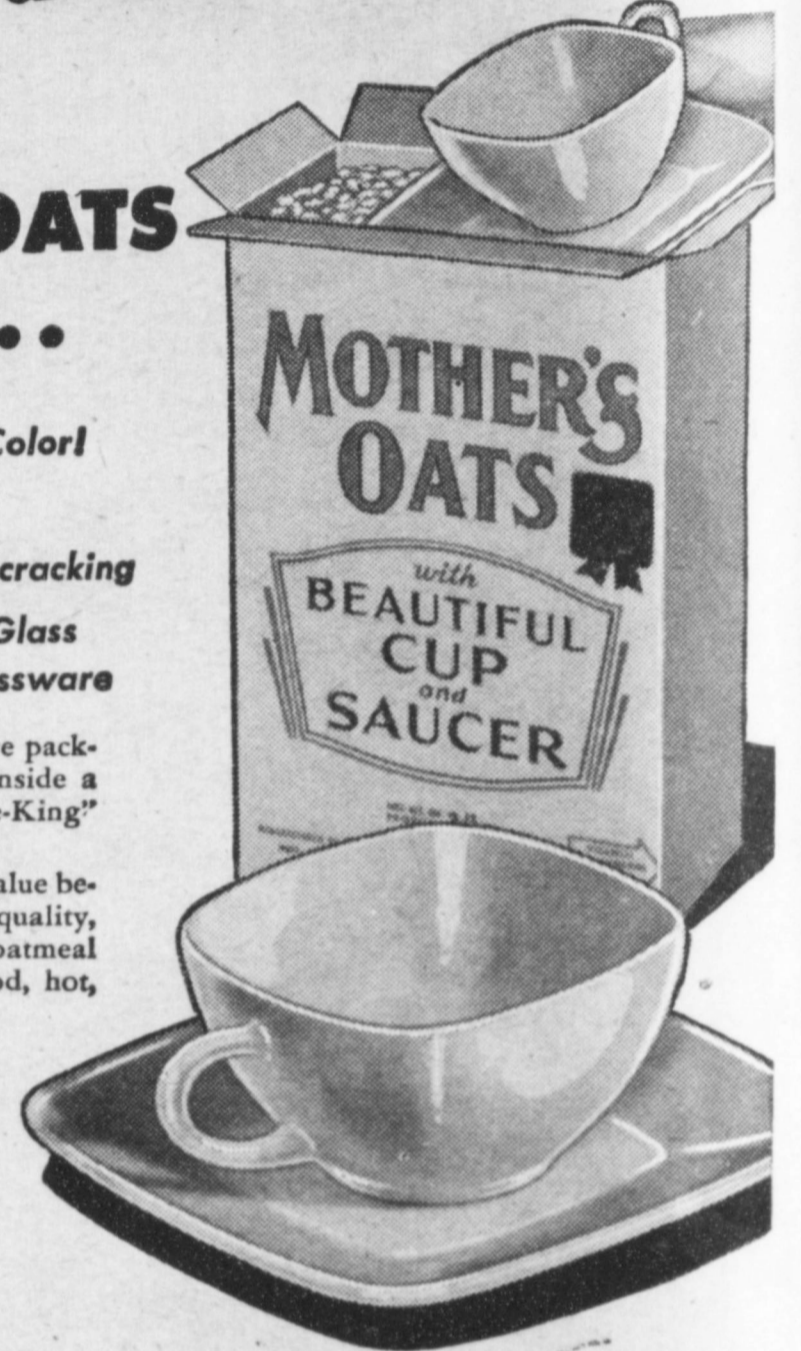

Slim trusts them to pay for as much as they eat—you simply tell Sally, his cashier, the amount of your bill. It works, too. Take the other day when Buck Harris told Sally his bill was 35¢.

Now I was right there with Buck and I knew all he had was coffee and pie which comes to a quarter. "How come thirty-five

cents?" I asked Buck. "Had an extra cup of java the other day, Joe, and forgot all about it—'til now," he says.

From where I sit, most people are basically honest—and that goes for their opinions, too, even though they may be different than our own. I like a glass of beer with my dinner; you may prefer something else... but we all ought to be allowed to "figure it out" ourselves.

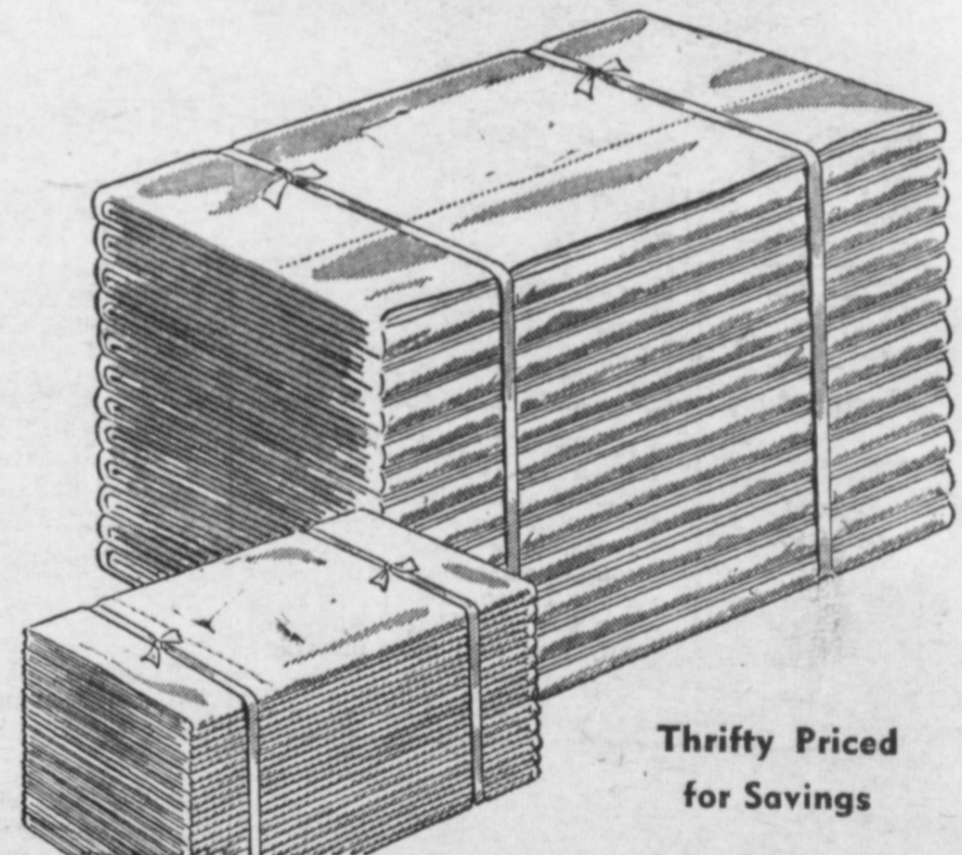

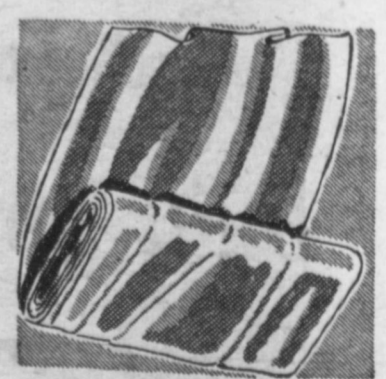
