## '51 School Tax Will Be Delinquent Last Day In Jan.

R. Y. Ayers, tax assessor-collector for the Aransas County Independent School District, said this week that those who have not paid their 1951 school district taxes should do so during January as they become delinquent and start drawing penalty plus interest beginning Feb. 1.

Penalty and interest rates increase each month after the delinquent date until six months, or Aug. 1, at which time the penalty rate automatically increases to 8% and the interest rates of one-half of 1% each month, or 6% per annum.  
Mr. Ayers went on to say that school tax collections have been unusually good to date, having collected a total of \$146,234.78, which represents 85% of the 1951 tax roll. However, the school system does not operate entirely on tax dollars, as approximately 40% of the yearly cost is furnished through state aid, and early payment of school taxes is absolutely necessary to carry on a well-organized educational program.

Approximately 80% of the tax roll is assessed by non-resident property owners.

## Deep Wildcat in Aransas Bay Conditioning Hole For New Test

Humble Oil and Refining Co. No. 1 Aransas Bay State Tract 190, slated 10,000-foot Aransas County wildcat 2.3 miles southeast of Rockport, was conditioning hole to attempt another drillstem test after attempting a test from 8,278 to 8,302 1/2 feet. The packer failed after one minute and recovery was 200 feet of mud, with estimated flowing pressure from 4-20014,400 pounds. Total depth was 8,462 feet.  
Sun Oil Co. No. 1 State 67, wildcat 1 1/2 miles southeast of Lamar in Aransas Bay, cemented 5-inch liner at 10,004 feet, seven feet off bottom. Gamma Ray and neutron logs were being run to total plug back depth of 9,930 feet.  
Flowing 120 barrels of 41.7 gravity oil in 24 hours, Phillips No. 23 Copano Bay State, West Fulton Beach Field, State Tract 45, was completed through a 1/4-inch choke from 60 perforations at 7,300-10 feet, with total depth 7,950 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 980-1.  
Western Natural Gas Co. No. 19 St. Charles, St. Charles Field test, Sumpter Turner Survey, set 10 3/4-inch casing at 1,530 feet.

In the Blackjack pool, Western Natural No. 20 St. Charles Ranch Co., John Kelly Survey, set 20-inch conductor casing at 130 feet.  
Plymouth Oil Co. No. 3 State Tract 103, Copano Bay project, four miles northwest of Rockport, was preparing to run electric log survey, with total depth 9,307 feet.

Location has been cleared and rig was being awaited by C. G. Glasscock No. 2 Copano Bay State Tract 48, slated 8,500-foot test in the Fulton Beach West (B Sand) Field.

Testing perforations from 7-866-72 feet was continuing in Renew Oil Corp. No. 4 State Tract 105, Salt Lake Field Project.

Sun No. 3 Copano State 75, Salt Lake Field test, was preparing to perforate 5-inch liner from 7,991-96 feet after squeezing perforations from 8,070-77 feet which tested salt water.

## Tripled Polio Toll Over Last 4 Years Spurs Dimes Drive

America's average number of polio cases in the past four years has more than tripled the previously accepted "normal" toll, according to Marion McElveen, county chairman for the Aransas County March of Dimes campaign.

He noted that in the first ten years of March of Dimes experience, the average yearly polio cases ranged from 10 to 12 thousand. From 1948 through 1951, that average surpassed 30,000 cases.  
America's price tag for transforming crippled legs to active limbs can only be met by a record 1952 March of Dimes.

"It cost a great deal to bring weakened bodies back to a reasonable state of functioning," McElveen said. "When polio leaves its mark, its a long up hill fight to repair the damage. That's why the March of Dimes has gone into debt for four years running."

"The National Foundation has helped in whole or in part out of every five persons stricken by polio, but there seems to be more and more cases and the March of Dimes has been unable to keep pace with infantile paralysis and \$5,000,000 is owing on last year's bill right now. It is up to all of us to quicken the 'March' by giving to this fight against a vicious disease."

In Aransas County, as elsewhere in the nation, half the funds raised in last years campaign were retained by the local chapter for the benefit of adults and children stricken by polio here, and in emergencies, to supplement the national epidemic aid fund.

Total receipts from the sale of postage stamps and box rent at the local office in 1951 amounted to \$18,732.73. In 1950 receipts were \$16,602.76. This is an increase of \$2,129.97.

Aliens Slow In Reporting Addresses

Area aliens have been slow in responding to requirements that they inform the Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization, by filing out the proper form furnished for this purpose by Jan. 11, where they are living, E. H. Kilgore, immigration officer in charge in Corpus Christi, said yesterday.

Failure to comply with the requirements of the Internal Security Act order would subject aliens upon conviction, to fines or imprisonment, or both, he said.

Kilgore said that only about one-fourth as many aliens have applied at area post offices for the address card blanks as applied last year.

Many aliens are under the misimpression that if they submitted an address report card last year they do not have to do so this year. This is not correct, he said, for the reports must be submitted every year between Jan. 1 and 11.

The blanks are available at any postoffice and they are to be handed in to the postoffices. They are not to be mailed and they are not to be handed in to the immigration offices, Kilgore said.

Telegraphic advice has been received that the deadline for obtaining alien address report cards at all United States postoffices has been moved to Jan. 19, by the United States attorney general, due to a misunderstanding on the part of some aliens.

February Draft Call Will Not Include Men Below Age 20

Austin, Tex. — The state draft call for February will not be filled with men below the age of 20, Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, said today.

The only exception that will be taken to this rule will be in the case of draft volunteers and draftees.

Previously, national Selective Service headquarters had instructed state headquarters not to induct any men below 21 without first requesting authority from Washington.

"We requested authority to induct men as low as 20 years old," General Wakefield said, "and subsequently each state and territorial director was granted this authority. Here in Texas we were afraid that we might not be able to deliver our quota if we were confined to 21-year-olds.

The February induction call is 2,144 men, as compared to 1,471 in January, and 362 in December.

"Texas is going to make every effort to fill the February call from examined and acceptable men who will be at least 21 years of age at the time of induction, regardless of which local board has jurisdiction over them," General Wakefield commented.

"We're calling first on the boards that have examined and acceptable men 21 years old, or older," he continued. "Then we're calling on those our records show have no 21-year-olds examined and acceptable."

Latest available records at state Selective Service headquarters show that local boards at the following places have no examined and acceptable registrants 21 years old or older:

No. 6 at San Antonio, No. 30 at Dallas, San Diego, Galveston, Longview, all boards in Harris County, Edinburg, Port Arthur, Lubbock, Corpus Christi, Sinton, Tyler, No. 111 and No. 112 at Fort Worth, Uvalde, Laredo, Abilene, and both boards in Travis County.

General Wakefield explained that some of all of these local boards can possibly have examin-

ed and acceptable registrants 21 years old or older by the time they are ready to send out February induction orders.

"Results of January physical examinations are not known at present," he said. "Some of these may become eligible to be sent February induction orders, but it is doubtful if many of them will."

A total of 111 of the state's 137 local boards actually have 2,424 examined and acceptable men 21 years old or older to fill the February call for 2,144 men, according to up-to-date calculations of the quotas and calls section of state draft headquarters.

"We must make allowances for possible errors in local board reports, and, also, a lot of things can happen to some of those men that can make them ineligible for service at induction time in February," he commented.

The state Selective Service director pointed to authority in Selective Service regulations for induction of men into the armed forces by age groups. He quoted as follows:

"The Director of Selective Service . . . may provide for the selection of persons by age group or groups whenever he deems such action is necessary in order that persons in older age groups shall, on a Nation-wide basis, be selected and delivered for induction before persons in younger age groups."
