The cool weather this morning should make the fishing better in the basin for the next few days. Some redbfish and trout are biting all the time, but there are not as many persons fishing as usual this time of the year.

W. F. Close, local shrimper, really brought in a BIG ONE to Johnson Fish Company this week. It was a jewfish and one of the largest ever seen in this area. The fish measured seven feet long and tipped the scales at 427 3/4 pounds.

W. G. Langston, fishing in front of Fulton on the flats, last Friday, caught 82 pounds of nice redbfish, the largest one weighed 9 3/4 pounds.

Some reds are being caught on the flats in front of Floyd's Boat and Sales Company and trout are biting out on the reefs.

Last Tuesday, Bill Bardwell went out from Johnson's Bait Stand and caught 60 pounds of redbfish and Wednesday he landed 4 more nice reds.

A few trout are biting around the bait stand, also.

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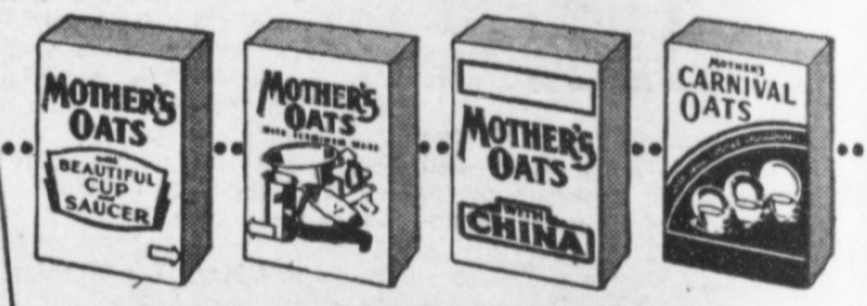

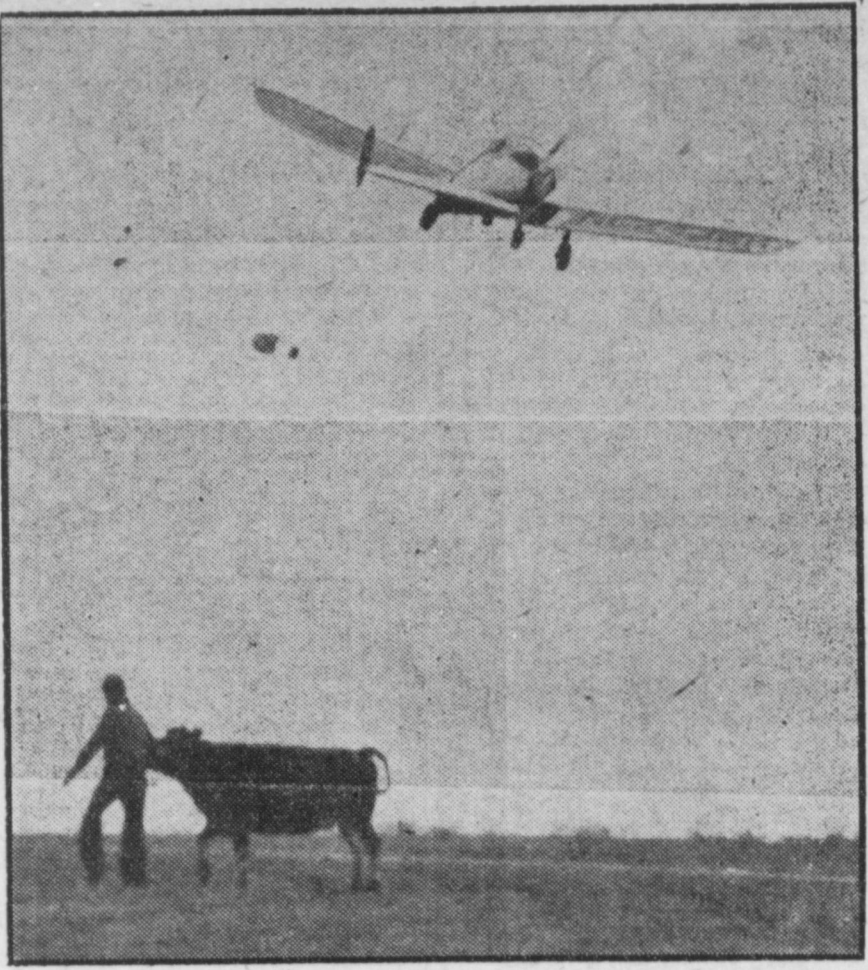

Correct Name, Number Insures Proper Credit

"Have I received credit for all of my wages in my social security account?" That is a question that is frequently heard according to Mrs. Doris Reindl, wage record clerk in the Corpus Christi social security office.

You can usually be certain that your account is correct if you will carry your social security card with you only when you are looking for a job or starting to work on a new job; and show it to your employer so that he can enter your name and number on his records exactly as they appear on your card.

If your job is covered by social security, your employer is required to report your wages with your name and number every three months. When he does not have your correct name or number on these reports, the Social Security Administration must request the correct information from him.

If you do not have your card,

apply for a duplicate number by getting an application blank from the social security office or your post office. The same application blank will get you a new card if you have never had an account number before.

"Make sure you are getting credit for all of your wages," Mrs. Reindl says, "by making sure your employer has your correct name and account number."

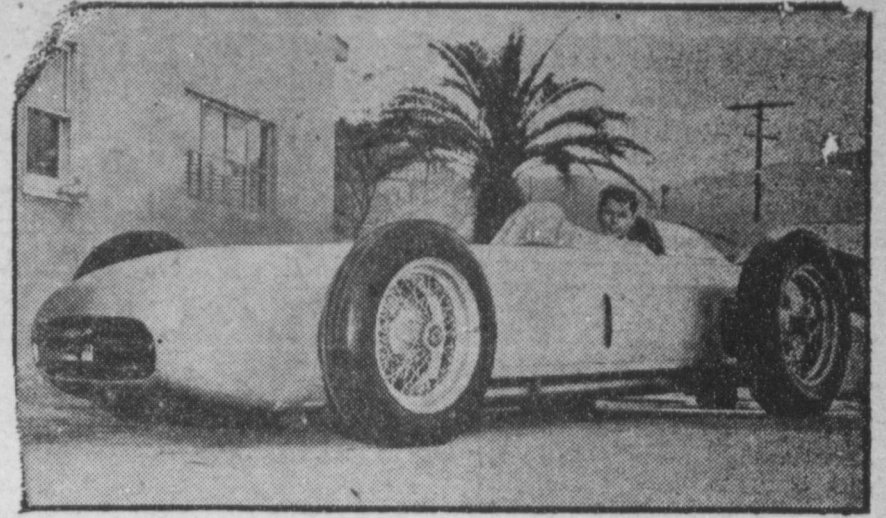

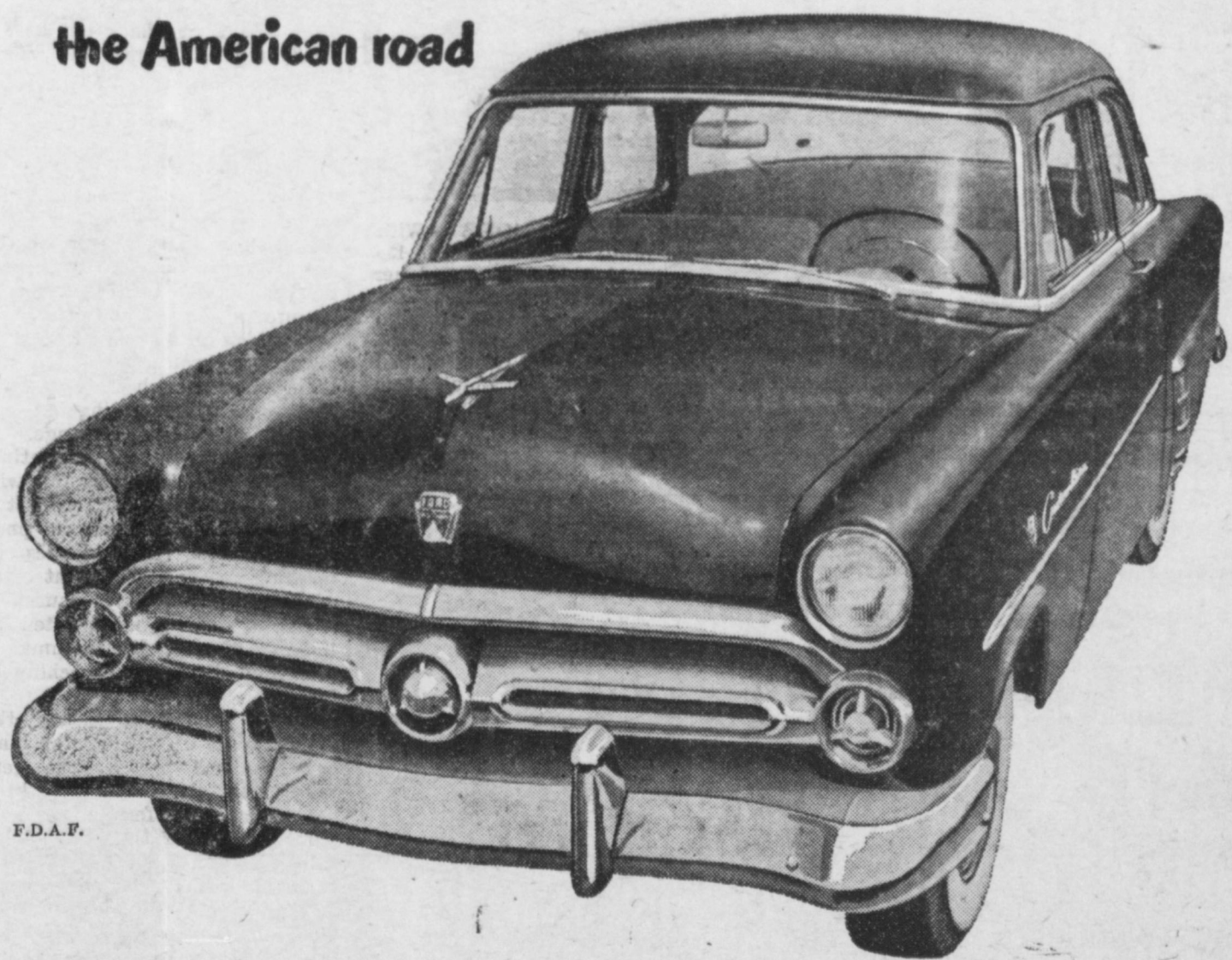

Health Talks

Pneumonia is a condition which interferes with the proper function of the lungs, that pair of gadgets in your chest which look like waterwings.

When you breathe air in, those lungs inflate and when you breathe air out, they deflate; disease in practically every part of the body can in some way affect and be affected by the inflation and deflation of those lungs. When the effect shows up in the lungs, it is often pneumonia.

Factors outside the body also can interfere with the work of the lungs. There is one class of pneumonia which is called lipid pneumonia, meaning that oil has gotten into the lungs from such sources and oily nose drops or from taking mineral oil over a long period of time. Sometimes food vomited from the stomach does not clear from the body, some of it being drawn into the windpipe and into the lungs, creating a difficulty which is known as aspiration pneumonia; small abscesses often form in the lower part of the lung from this vomited material.

Atypical pneumonia is thought to be caused by a virus which gets from the upper respiratory tract (nose and throat) into the lungs. It is a slow-developing type of pneumonia, often preceded by a week of general "run-down" feeling which keeps getting worse and worse. You have fever, chilliness, headache and lack of appetite, plus a cough that keeps getting worse; the cough at first is often just a dry hack but as you start feeling worse the cough becomes heavier and produces mucus, which may have some bright blood streaks in it.

The usual diagnostic procedures for pneumonia fail to reveal the lung trouble with atypical (not typical) pneumonia but an x-ray of the chest usually confirms your doctor's suspicion of this condition when you present a list of symptoms and a general appearance which he associated with the disease. Convalescence may take a long time though the new drugs are wonders in turning the tide of virus invasion of the lungs.

Bacterial pneumonia sometimes breaks out in epidemics following measles and the "flu", but it is one of the least common pneumonias except for epidemics, accounting for only 5 percent of all pneumonia cases. It is caused by a "strep" germ, most often attacking those with asthma or bronchial disorders, especially infants.

Lobar pneumonia means that a large part of the lung or lungs has been affected by the germ known as pneumococcus; bronchopneumonia refers to a more patchy effect of the lung's lobes, rather than the uniform effect associated with lobar pneumonia. Lobar pneumonia was the big killer of pneumonia a few years ago before the new drugs such as penicillin were made available in the medical fight. Today it is still a serious disease, especially in those persons already weak from other diseases, but the stigma of killer has been removed from it.

It still has the ability to cause complications within the body, however, and for that reason is deserving of the same close medical attention that it has always called for. All the pneumonias, in fact, bear some resemblance to tuberculosis, in signs and symptoms, and since both are essentially afflictions of the lungs, no pneumonia should ever be taken lightly.

Pneumonitis is another name which is being more frequently applied to those conditions which cause an inflammation within the lungs, instead of just a congestion.

The nation's 2,900,000 Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Explorers and their adult leaders will observe Boy Scout Week, Feb. 6 to 12, marking the 42nd birthday of their organization by giving the nation a unique birthday present.

The Boy Scouts of America will launch a new three-year program known as "Forward . . . On Liberty's Team," a program of action designed to help keep America strong and free. The Boy Scout birthday will be observed throughout the United States, its territories and wherever American families live, either in service in the Armed Forces, or as representatives of the Govern-

ment and business. This year's celebration will honor the organizations and institutions whose sponsorship make possible the existence and growth of the nation's 80,298 Packs, Troops and Explorer Units. At public ceremonies, the Scouts and leaders will express their appreciation to the religious bodies, social organizations, veteran's associations, fraternal groups and service clubs which sponsor them. The Units will then review all the ways in which the sponsoring institution has helped the Unit as a whole as well as the individuals in it. The Scout Units will announce the goals of their three-year program to help achieve the goals of the "Forward . . . On Liberty's Team" program, which is to make the boy, the Scout Movement and the Nation—physically strong, mentally awake and morally straight.

Observed in every city and town and most villages and hamlets by more than 80,000 Units, Boy Scout Week is the largest single birthday observance by young Americans. The Boy Scouts of America was incorporated at Washington, D. C. on Feb. 8, 1910. Traditionally, on that day, the members recommit themselves to the Scout Oath or Promise at 8:15 p.m., in the four time zones. Boy Scout Sunday will be observed Feb. 10 in thousands of churches with Scouts and leaders attending services in uniform. Those of Jewish faith will hold their observances in synagogues and temples Friday evening and Saturday, Feb. 8 and 9. During Boy Scout Week it has also become a tradition for Units to be hosts to friends and parents at Open House meetings and show

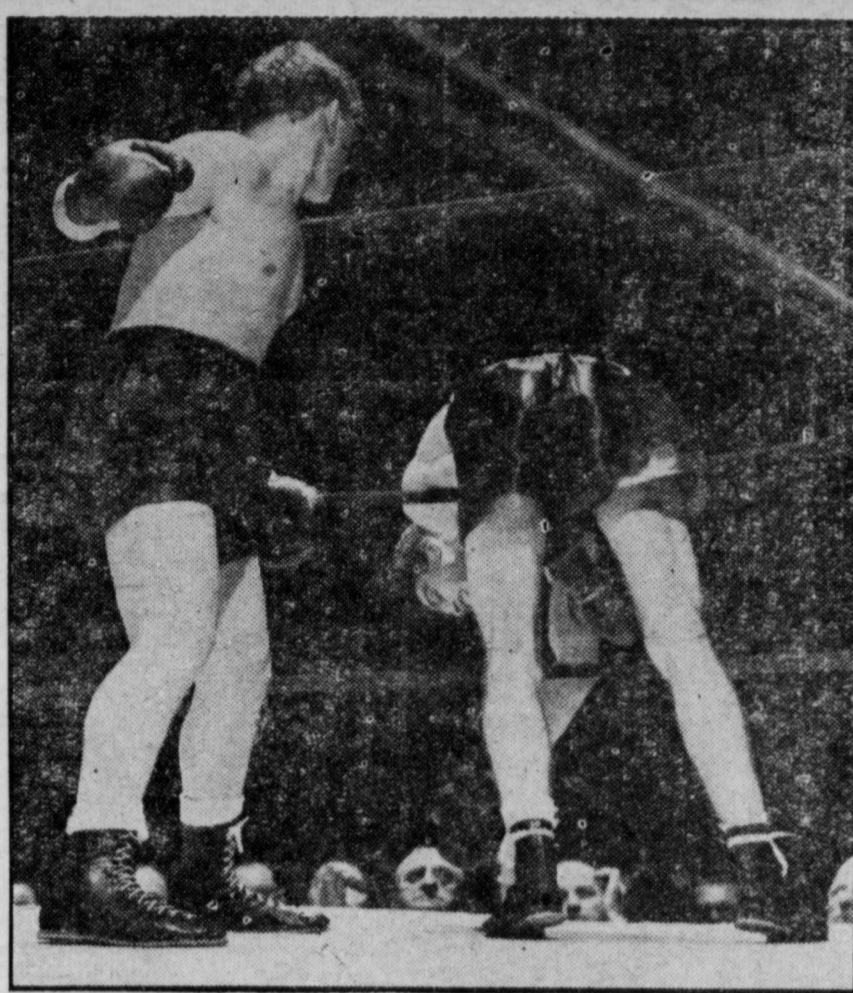

Self Employed Business Men Need Social Security Numbers

Self-employed persons should apply now for their social security numbers, according to H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Corpus Christi social security office. Self-employed persons are required to

report their '51 earnings for social security when they file their income tax returns before March 16th.

Every self-employed person who does not have a social security account number card should apply for one now to be certain he has the number when the tax report is made. Applications for account numbers can be obtained from post offices, offices of the Bureau of Internal Revenue, the Texas Employment Commission, or from the Social Security Administration located at 424 Taylor Street, Corpus Christi.

With a very few exceptions, the owner or partner in a trade or business who has net earnings of \$400 or more a year is required to pay the tax of 2 1/4 of his net earnings, up to \$3,600 earned in the year, at the time the combined income tax and social security tax form is filed. This coverage of the self-employed is not voluntary, Cleveland stated. Participation is required by the law unless net earnings from self-employment are less than \$400 a year, or if the income is derived from the ownership or operation of a farm or from certain professions excluded by law; such as, doctors, lawyers, professional engineers, public accountants, and undertakers.

A new booklet entitled "Do You Work For Yourself?" which gives a complete explanation of the new social security law as it applies to the self-employed can be had by writing to, or calling at, the Social Security Administration office, Cleveland concluded.

Health Talks

Two of the most painful complications of the common cold are an earache and sinus trouble. And they are frequent complications of a cold.

Earaches don't always follow a cold, of course, and may start up without any "cold" signs, just the sudden aching of the ear. Most people have at one time or other experienced a sudden earache that just hurts awfully bad and then by the time you get to the doctor there is no ache left at all; that type of earache is often caused by a tiny blister, blop, which forms in the ear, flares up for a brief period and then subsides without any after effects.

More serious and more prolonged is the inflammation of the middle ear which is called otitis media, which may follow a cold. This earache starts up a little slower, usually with a feeling of fullness in the ear which you can relieve by swallowing or yawning. If you have a cold at the time you probably hear bubbling and cracking noises in your ear when you blow your nose.

But then the inflammation usually flares up with yawning no longer relieving the pressure and you may get a severe headache along with a ringing, roaring or hissing in your ear or ears. When the middle ear becomes completely filled with liquid, your hearing is not good and your own voice sounds unusually loud to you.

That is every indication that you have a complication from your cold or else a well-developed earache. It may last a few days or more than a week and you need to stay in the house, eat a light diet and drink plenty of water. If you have a fever, you should be in bed.

But you should not put a thing in your ear without your doctor's advice. Aspirin may help relieve the pain or quiet the disturbing noises or it may be that stronger drugs, such as codeine or morphine may be necessary; they should be taken only upon a doctor's advice, of course.

Ear drops, hot water bag, or electric pad may offer relief, as your doctor prescribes, but used promiscuously they may make matters worse. The sulfa drugs and penicillin are often prescribed for such an earache but it is still necessary in many cases for your doctor to puncture the tympanic membrane, sometimes more than once.

Earaches and sinus infections can lead to very serious complications themselves and deserve the most professional medical attention; they should never be "treated" by haphazard, guessing home remedies.

There are many varied treatments for sinusitis, that distressingly painful inflammation of the air cavities which join the nose. These cavities (sinuses) are lined with mucous membrane, a continuation of the same wet tissue that lines the nose, and frequently fill with infected material from the nose during or after a cold. The sinuses lie above, behind and below the eyes.

The treatment that is ideal for one sinus patient will often prove inadvisable for another. Irrigations, packings, mists of penicillin or streptomycin and surgical treatment are all entitled to a place in the medical relief of sinusitis, depending upon your doctor's preference for your particular case. There is no one method that has been accepted as the preferred treatment of all cases.

Your doctor will explain the different methods to you and what results can be expected from each. When sinusitis sufferers get together, they almost always are interested in treatment that has been successful for someone else; such is the pain and suffering in

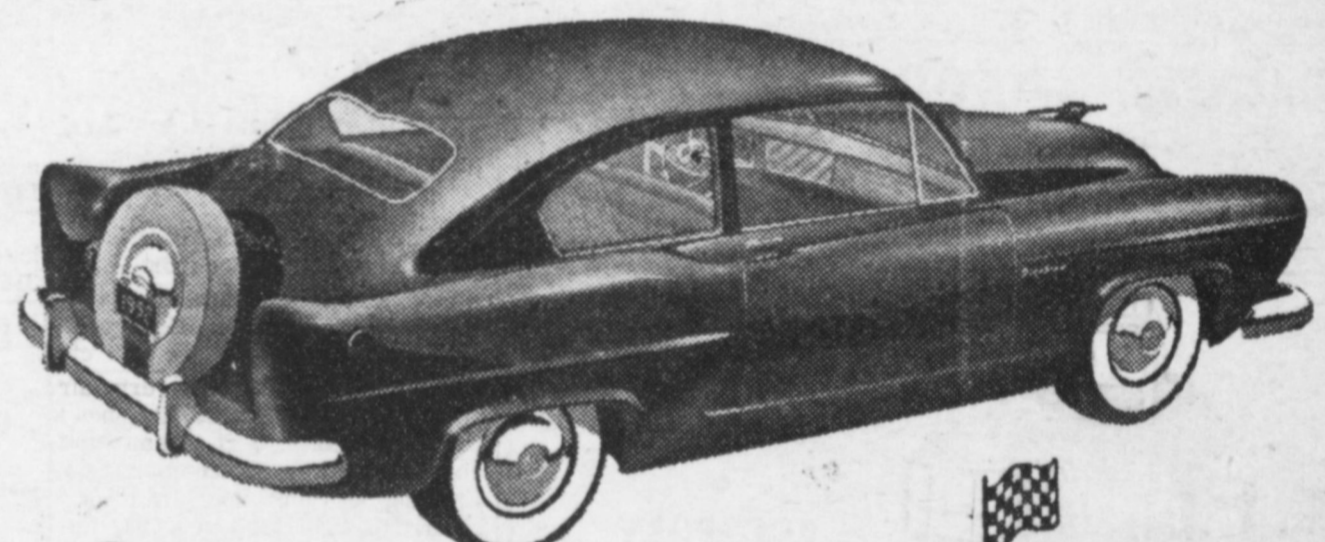

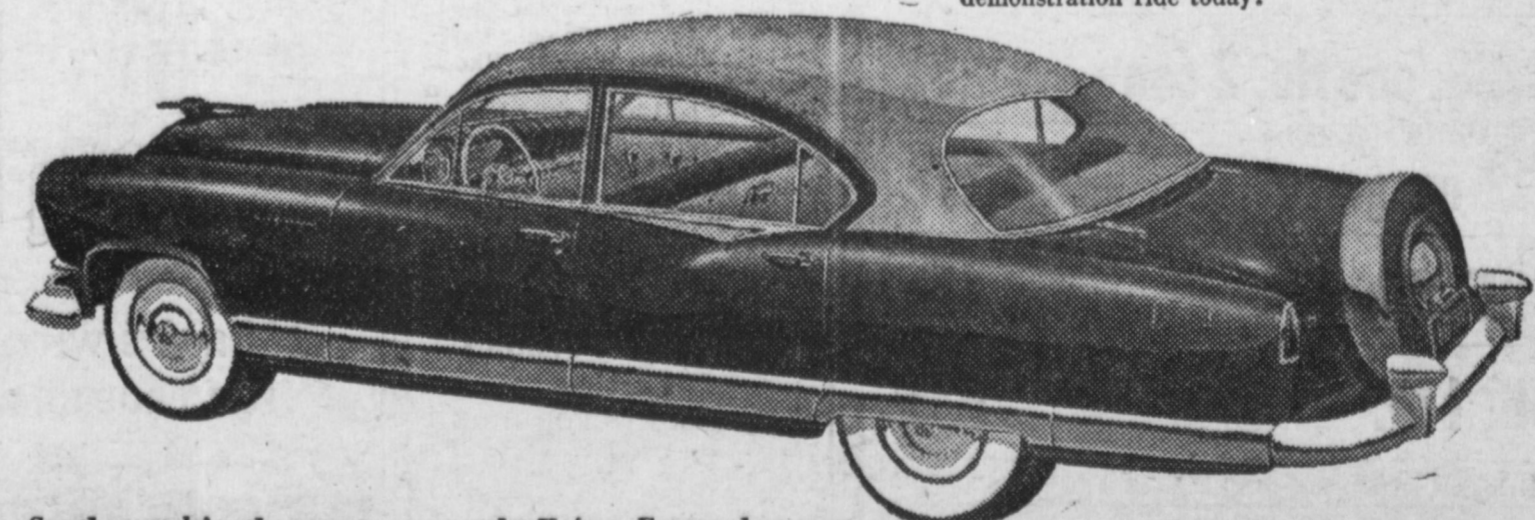
