State Health Officer Describes Dysentery As An Infectious Disease

Austin, Tex. — Commenting on the unusually high incidence of dysentery in Texas at the present time, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, described dysentery as being an infectious disease characterized by diarrhea, pain in the abdomen, and toxemia. It is caused by a specific bacteria or germ. These germs cause inflammation of the lining of the intestinal tract which produces pain throughout the abdomen and the discharge of many loose stools that frequently contain blood and mucus. Toxemia results from absorption of the poisonous substances produced by the germs.

"The germs gain entrance to the body through the mouth," Dr. Cox said, "and then make their way to the intestines in the same manner in which food does. When they reach the intestines they find conditions favorable to their growth, and there they establish themselves at the expense of the person infected and produce their

harmful effects."

Dr. Cox warned that dysentery affects young children more often and more seriously than adults, frequently resulting fatally; however, he said, it may occur at any age. It is usually more prevalent during the summer season, and the great number of cases now being reported are unusual for spring.

"The germ is always expelled with the excreta of persons sick with dysentery and may continue

to be expelled for some time after the patient recovers from the disease. These persons who still discharge the germs after they recover are called carriers, and they occur more frequently in this disease than in the majority of other infectious diseases.

"Food protection and adequate sanitary measures are more urgently needed now than ever before if we control the potential possibilities of epidemic dysentery in this state."

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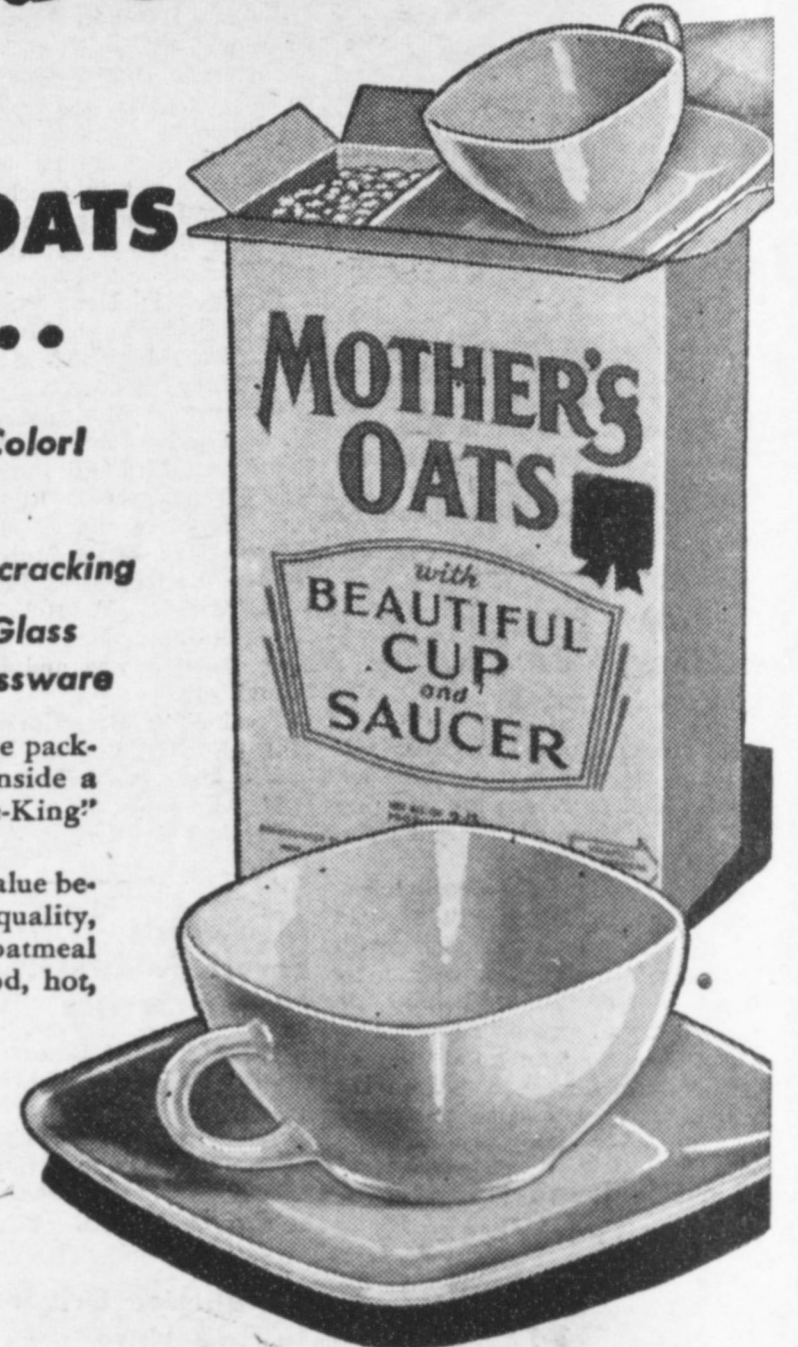

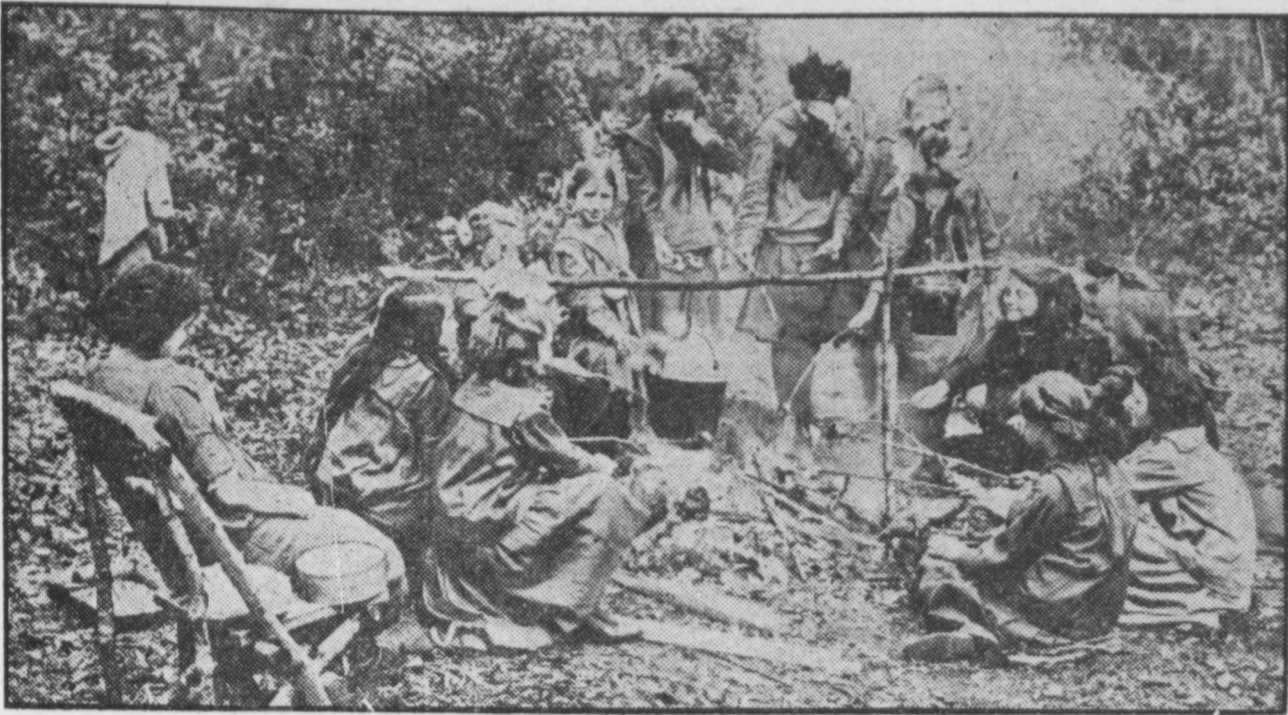

U.S. ARMY SEEKS CIVILIANS FOR OVERSEAS EMPLOYMENT

An overseas recruiting representative of the Corps of Engineers, U. S. Army, will be at the Texas Employment office in Corpus Christi, Texas, on March 14, to interview applicants interested in civilian employment with the Corps of Engineers in Alaska, Japan, Okinawa, Caribbean and Austria.

Vacancies now exist for most types of engineers, draftsmen, and engineering aids.

April Draft Calls 1,184 Texans

Austin, Tex. — The April draft call for Texas is 1,184 men, Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, announced today.

Local board quotas will be figured and mailed to the boards "sometime during the present week," the state draft director said. The national quota for April is 19,000.

The call will be filled with men 21 years of age and older. Current man-power inventories at state Selective Service headquarters show more than 2,000 men available for induction in this age group.

Delinquents and volunteers of a younger age can be inducted, the state Selective Service director pointed out. Texas is authorized to induct 20-year-olds if necessary.

The April call of 1,184 compares with a call of 1,858 in March. The April quota in 1951 was 2,075.

No pre-induction physical examinations will be given in April, under present plans of state Selective Service headquarters, except possible re-examination of 4-Fs.

A total of 606 4-Fs are being re-examined in March, along with pre-induction examination of 3,828 men. All 4-Fs being re-examined in March come from local boards at the following places only: San Antonio, San Benito, Dallas, San Diego, Pearsall, Galveston, Houston, Edinburg, Beaumont, Corpus Christi, and Austin.

WOMEN OF CHURCH HAVE BIBLE STUDY

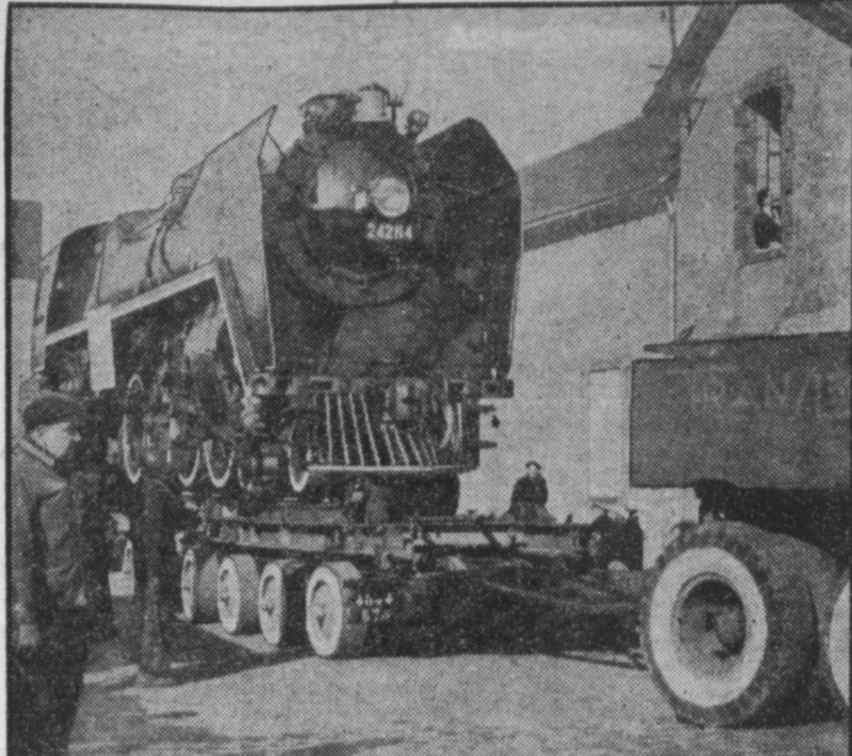
The Women of the Presbyterian Church had an intensive Bible study at the church Thursday, March 6.

'Braceros' Not Covered By Social Security

Agricultural workers who are recruited and brought to the United States from the Republic of Mexico under contracts to do farm and ranch work are not covered by Social Security, according to H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Corpus Christi office of the Social Security Administration.

"There is some confusion among farm and ranch operators in this area as to whether or not 'braceros' are covered by Social Security," Cleveland stated. "Under an amendment by Congress, the Social Security Act specifically excludes those Mexican agricultural workers."

This exclusion does not apply to non-citizens generally, but it applies only to those who do agricultural work under what is commonly called the "Braceros contract."

Other aliens who work for American employers are covered by the law the same as the citizens of the United States.

"Accordingly, farmers and ranchers who regularly employ these contract workers should not withhold social security taxes from their wages, or report them on their quarterly tax returns," he said.

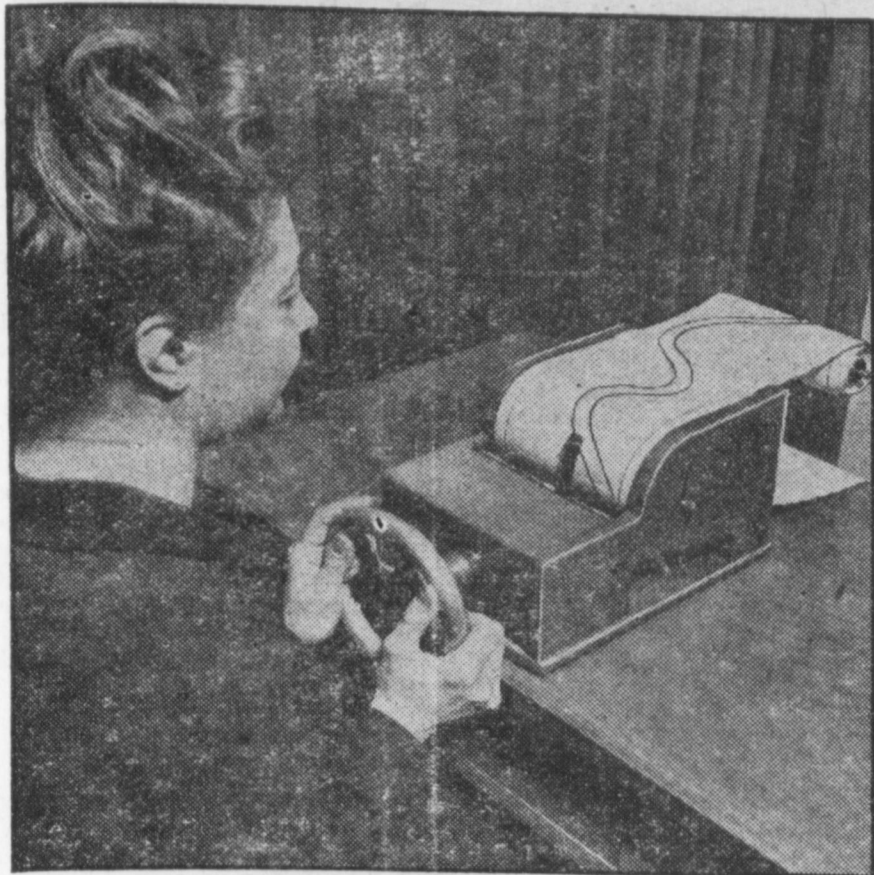

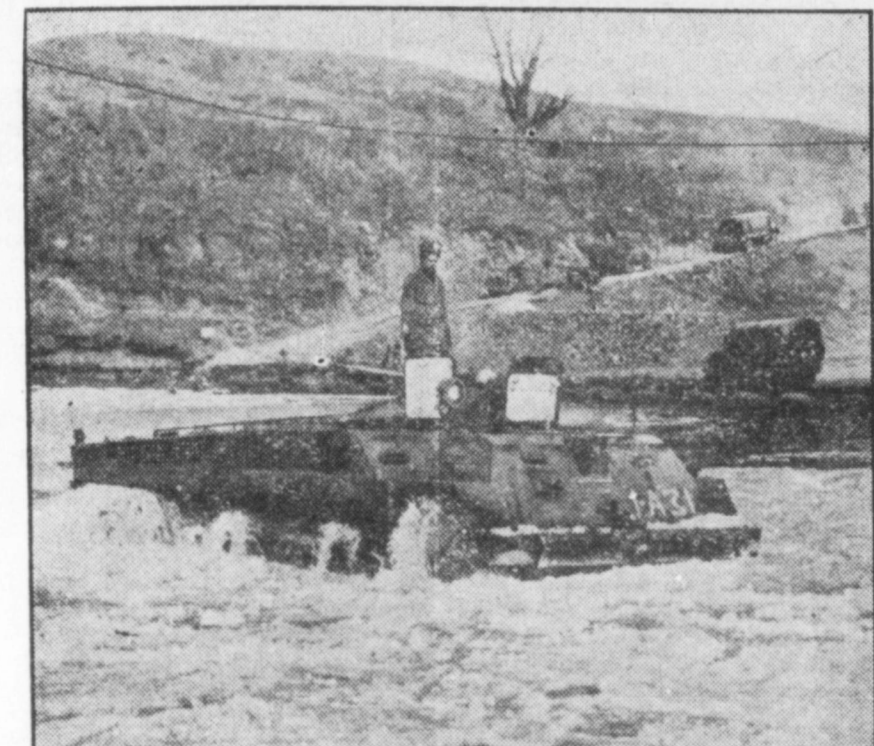

Administrative Cost Of Social Security Is Low

The Social Security tax rate remains the same in 1952 as was last year, according to H. M. Cleveland, Manager of the Social Security Administration in Corpus Christi.

Employees and their employer each pay 1 1/2% of wages, and the self-employed pay 2 3/4% of their net earnings for social security. Under the old-age and survivors insurance provisions, the tax applies to wages and net earnings up to \$3,600 a year.

When questioned about the financing provisions of the insurance system, Cleveland explained that Social Security taxes have amounted to more than the benefits paid each year to date. In 1951, taxes amounting to \$3.4 billion were collected, and total benefit payments were \$1.9 billion.

The excess of taxes over benefits goes into a trust fund that is invested only in interest bearing government securities. At this time, the total assets in the Old-age and Survivors Insurance, including the cost of collecting the taxes were \$83 million. The cost of administration was only 2.4% of the social security taxes collected during the year.

Mrs. Sorenson's 3rd Grade Studies Transportation

Mrs. Lillian Sorenson's third grade, of Rockport Elementary School, is studying modes of transportation. As part of their lesson each pupil bought a round trip ticket and went to Aransas Pass on the bus with Mrs. Sorenson, Wednesday. Each child took care of his own ticket and managed his own trip.

Not Too Late to Save On 1951 Income Tax, Bar Says

Waiting until the last minute to file your 1951 income tax return? Even if you have already filed, same tax savings may be possible.

While there are few bright spots in the tax picture for the average taxpayer, lawyers say that some lucky individuals may be able to take advantage of certain relaxed provisions of the 1951 Revenue Act. For example, you may now claim an exemption for a dependent whose gross income during the year was any amount less than \$600. Previously, an income of \$500 or more by the dependent barred your claim for an exemption on his account.

If you sold your home during 1951, you may avoid being taxed on any profit made in the transaction by purchasing and occupying a new home within one year. The new residence must cost as much or more than the sales price of the old one. However, you may include notes and other liabilities forming part of the consideration in figuring the cost of your new home.

Suppose you bought a home in 1945 for \$5000 and sold it on July 1, 1951, for \$8500, making a profit of \$3500. If you buy and move into a new home not later than June 30, 1952, costing as much as \$8,500, no tax will be due on your \$3500 profit. This is true even though you may pay only \$500 or less as a down payment on the new home and the balance of the purchase price is represented by a note and mortgage.

However, the bureau wants a record of your transactions, even though no tax is due. If you have already repurchased, both your sale and your purchase should be shown on separate Schedule D and attached to your tax return. If you have not bought your new home as yet, but expect to do so before the one year limit runs out, report the 1951 sale on Schedule D anyhow. But, enter the word "None" in the gain or loss column and add a short explanation that you expect to purchase or rebuild. Then, when you do replace, write the collector giving him full details on the transaction. If your plans for replacement should fall through, an amended 1951 return would be necessary.

Another new feature which may save taxes for some people is the removal of one limitation on medical expense deductions for all persons over 65. They are no longer limited to the excess over and above 5% of adjusted gross income. The limit still applies to all taxpayers under 65, unless their husband or wife happens to be 65 or older. In this event, both husband and wife may deduct medical expenses without reference to the amount of adjusted gross income. However the general limitation of \$1250 per individual still

applies in all cases. If you have passed up any of these savings, an amended return may pay dividends.

The new self employment tax is causing extra tax return headaches for some people this year. If you had net earnings of \$400 or more derived from a trade or business which you conducted during 1951 as a sole proprietor or as a partner, this new tax may apply to you. Public officials, railroad workers, ministers and various professional people are excluded from the application of this tax, as are non-resident aliens.

Similarly, income derived from farming, interest and dividends from securities, and gains and losses resulting from sale or exchange of capital assets are excluded. Rentals from real property are excluded except in the case of a real estate broker.

This new tax covers many people newly added to the list of those covered by the Social Security Act, and is imposed to help finance the benefits they may later receive. If you are liable for the self employment tax, you should obtain separate Schedule C and file with your regular tax return.

Applying in many instances where no regular income tax is due, this tax will also force some people to file returns even though their gross income of less than \$600 would not otherwise require a filing. Suppose you operated a very small business and grossed only \$590 in 1951. Under the old law, no return would be required.

However, under the 1951 Act, the self employment tax is carried from Schedule C to Form 1040 and collected as a part of your total income tax liability. If your

net income from this small business was \$401, you would be required to file a completed 1040 return along with Schedule C in order to comply with the law.

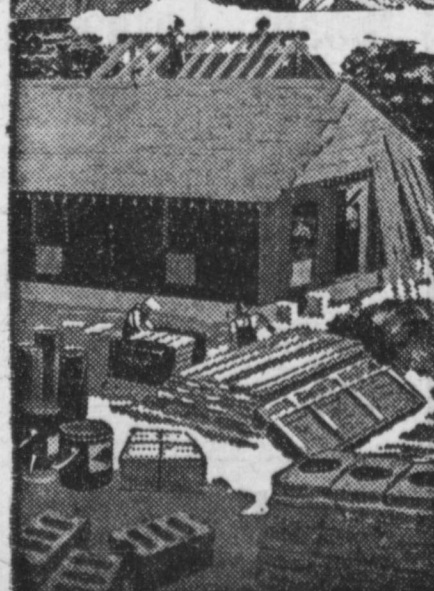

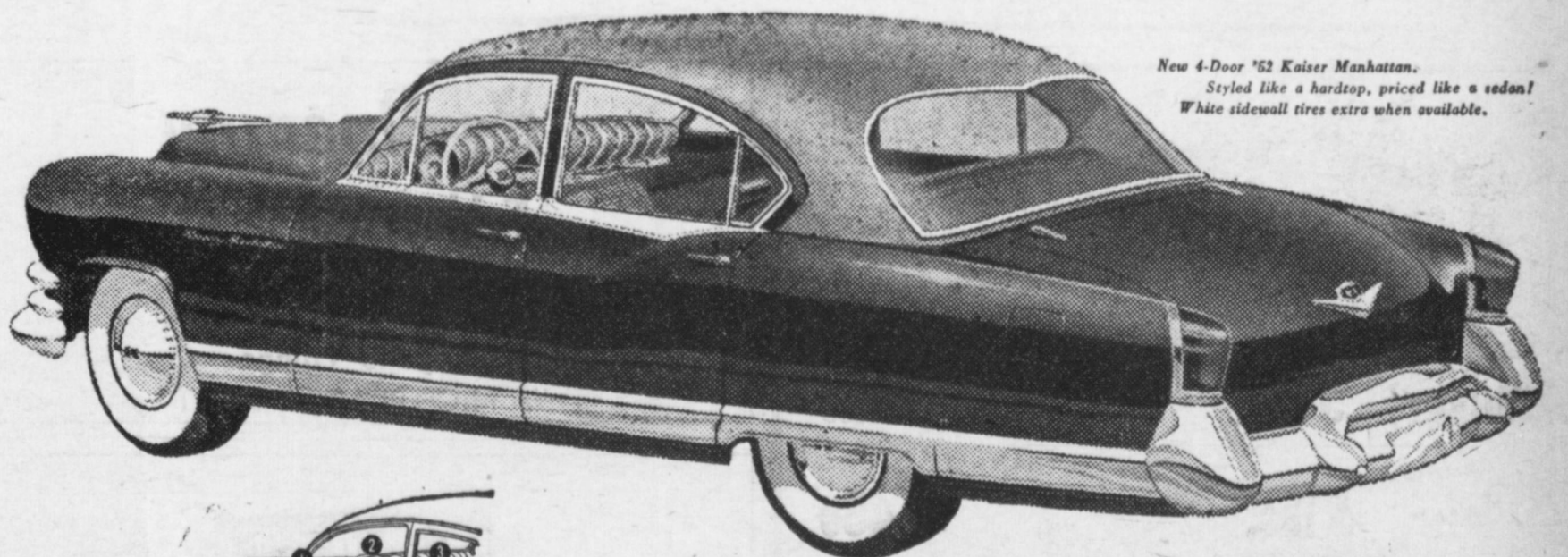

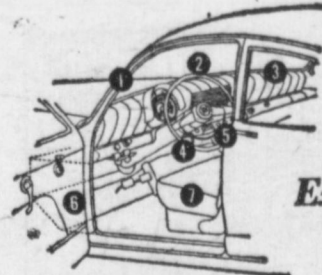
