Bay Wildcat Coring Two Are Complete

An Aransas Bay wildcat was coring near bottom last weekend. It was Humble Oil and Refining Co. No. 1 Aransas Bay State Tract 190, 2.3 miles southeast of Rockport, which was coring at 9,958 feet. Permit depth is 10,000 feet.

F. William Carr No. 1 R. H. Winsor and others, wildcat 19 miles east of Refugio, William Nettles Survey, has been plugged and abandoned at 8,508 feet.

Sun Oil Co. No. 1 Aransas State Tract 79, in Lamar Field, was preparing to run 7 5/8-inch casing at 8,462 feet after coring at 7,354 feet, 8,045 and 8,071 feet recovered strong gas distillate and oil odors and fluorescence.

Flowing 120.46 barrels of 39 gravity pipe line oil daily through 1/8-inch choke from 60 perforations at 6,252-62 feet, Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 31 Copano Bay State Tract 47, in West Fulton Beach Field, A-5 Sand, has been abandoned.

An indicated gas distillate strike eight miles southeast of Rockport has drawn its third offset.

Richardson & Bass, of Ft. Worth No. 1 State of Texas No. 31904, Tract 237, a northeast offset to the same operator's No. 1 State Tract 264, will be 660 feet from the south and west lines of State Tract 237. Permit depth is 13,000 feet.

No. 1 State Tract 264, a project being drilled tight, last month was reported drilling below 8,000 feet on a 13,000-foot project. Earlier the operator staked north and east offsets to the prospective discovery.

Union Producing Co. No. 7 Taton, proposed 11,500-foot wildcat 3 1/2 miles northeast of Lamar, John Durst Survey, had reached 9,850 feet.

Rockport Spring Seminar Set For April 11, 12, 13

The spring seminar and field study sponsored by the Texas Game and Fish Commission will be held in Rockport Easter week end, April 11, 12 and 13, according to the Commission's Chief Marine Biologist, Jack L. Baughman.

This year's session, which is the fifth handled by the Commission, will be combined with the South Texas Regional meeting of the Texas Academy of Science.

Most of the attendance will be made up of groups from schools and colleges, said the Chief Marine Biologist.

There will be addresses on various phases of marine science as well as field trips both on land and in the Gulf. One favorite area of exploration will be the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge.

The Rockport Chamber of Commerce is helping arrange housing facilities. Special rates for advance reservations will be provided by tourist courts in this area.

Scheduled speeches include: "Rain and Erosion", Ben O. Osborn, Soil Conservation Service; "The Role of Native Vegetation in the Control of Erosion in Texas", Dr. Vernon A. Young, Texas A. and M.;

"Water Resources of Texas", Trigg Twichell, Department of the Interior;

"Coastal Silt", Mr. Baughman; "The Effect of Domestic and Industrial Pollution on the Gulf Bayou - Galveston Bay Area", Frank T. Metyko, Houston;

"The Coast and Wildlife", W. C. Glazener, Director, Division of Wildlife Restoration, Game and Fish Commission.

Pollution Bill Merits Support

What is probably the soundest and most equitable bill ever written for the prevention of stream pollution has been introduced in the House of Representatives by Congressman John W. Byrnes.

The Byrnes bill provides for the amortization for income tax purposes of expenses incurred by industries for the elimination and treatment of waste which must be disposed of in public waters.

It would aid small industries and corporations which often are the most flagrant polluters because they cannot afford to install adequate treatment facilities.

Many of these industries would take advantage of any opportunity to recover valuable chemicals and materials which now flow untreated into the streams.

A bill introduced by Senator A. Willis Robertson would make all hunting on military reservations subject to state law.

The Robertson Bill is admittedly aimed at a growing practice of Army post commanders to set up their own fish and game codes, and in a few cases, to make public land on military reservations, purchased and supported by public taxes, private hunting preserves for small cliques of high ranking officers.

Under the proposed law all military reservations would not be thrown open to the general public, but it would make any hunting permitted on such land subject to the game code of the state in which the military reservation lies.

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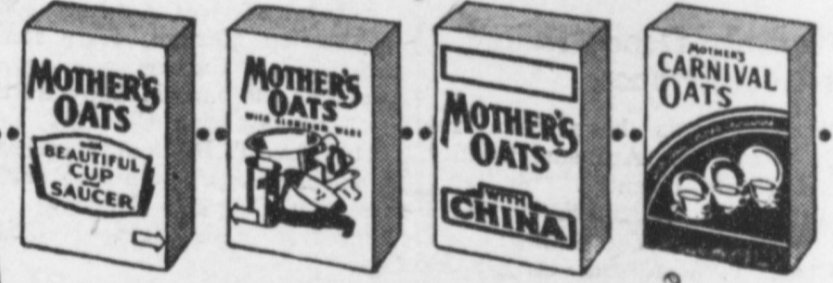

Now comes Perry Z. Baxter, hereinafter called plaintiff, who resides in Aransas County, Texas, complaining of Barbara Jo Scott Baxter, hereinafter called defendant, whose residence is unknown to plaintiff, and praying for a divorce, for grounds, shows the Court the following:

1. On or about May 28, 1950, plaintiff was duly and legally married to defendant in the state of Georgia, and continued to live with her as man and wife until about September 29, 1950.
2. Plaintiff is and has been for more than twelve months immediately prior to exhibiting this petition an actual bona fide inhabitant of the State of Texas, and has resided in said County of Aransas, where this suit is filed, for a period of six months next preceding the filing hereof, having been a resident of Rockport, Aransas County, Texas, since September, 1950.
3. At all times while married to the defendant the plaintiff has conducted himself with propriety, doing his duty as a husband, has at all times treated defendant with kindness and forbearance, and has been guilty of no act bringing about or causing the hereinafter described acts, omissions and conditions on defendant's part.
4. Plaintiff would show that defendant, disregarding the solemnity of her marriage vow and obligation to treat plaintiff with kindness and attention, soon after their said marriage, commenced a course of unkind, harsh and tyrannical conduct towards plaintiff which continued, with very slight intermission, until plaintiff finally separated, from defendant about September 29, 1950. On divers occasions, while plaintiff lived with defendant, defendant was guilty of excesses with cruel treatment towards plaintiff of such a nature as to render their living together insupportable. 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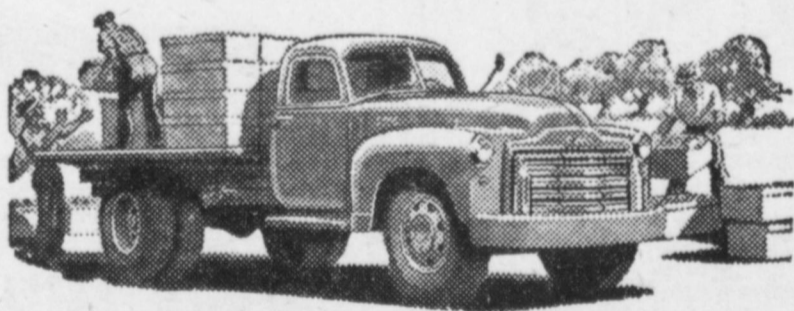

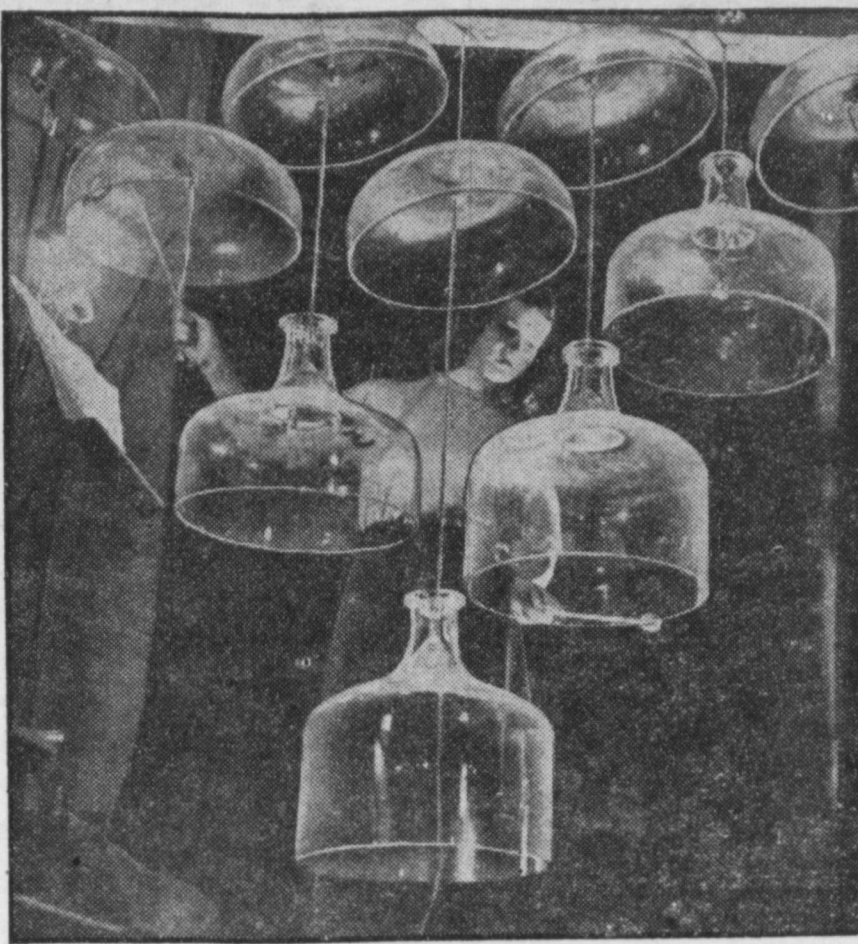

GRAND JURY INDICTMENT OFTEN CONFUSED WITH CONVICTION FOR CRIME

What does indictment by a grand jury mean? Lawyers find that many persons are inclined to confuse indictment by a grand jury with a court conviction for a crime.

This misconception is unfair to anyone who becomes the subject of a grand jury investigation. Justice, in the United States, is based on the theory that a man is innocent until proven guilty, and public opinion should withhold its verdict until the courts have had an opportunity to determine guilt or innocence.

An indictment is simply a written accusation presented by a grand jury to the district judge. It charges some person or persons with a crime. It is not a conviction. When a grand jury indicts a person it merely affirms that there is sufficient reason for him or her to stand trial. That is as far as the grand jury goes.

After that, the judge and the trial judge take charge of the case. At the trial the indictment is simply the State's pleading in the case, to which the defendant may plead "Not Guilty". The trial jury is instructed by the judge that it must not consider the indictment as any evidence of guilt.

All felony offenses in Texas, that is all offenses punishable by imprisonment in the State penitentiary, must be prosecuted on an indictment by a grand jury. A grand jury may indict an individual for a misdemeanor, an offense punishable only by a jail sentence or by fine, but this is rather an unusual procedure.

Misdemeanor cases are customarily prosecuted on the basis of an "information" filed by the County Attorney. This serves the same function as a grand jury indictment.

The importance of a grand jury verdict is this: If it votes a "True Bill"—that is, if someone is indicted—the District Attorney must prosecute the person indicted; but if the jury votes a "No Bill"—that is, not to indict—the suspected person cannot be tried.

It most cases, the District Attorney informs the grand jury of persons or crimes to be investigated and produces the evidence for it. However, the jury is free to order any further witnesses it may wish to hear brought before it, and is by no means limited to the evidence the District Attorney produces.

A grand jury cannot require a suspect to testify before it. But suspected persons sometimes ask to be allowed to appear before a grand jury to testify in their own behalf. They may do so and still be prosecuted and convicted.

The grand jury procedure is one of the basic protections enjoyed by the common man against outrageous procedures of would-be tyrants, and dates from early Anglo-Saxon times. It assures that no person shall be forced to stand trial for a felony on the basis of a malicious or frivolous accusation having no apparent factual support.

When called to serve on a grand jury you share with a group of fellow citizens some of the most solemn responsibilities known to our democracy. Consequences of life-or-death importance may depend upon your vote.

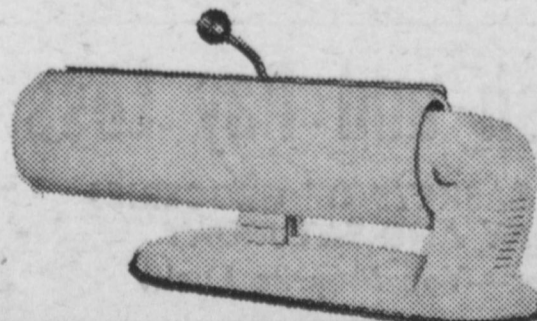
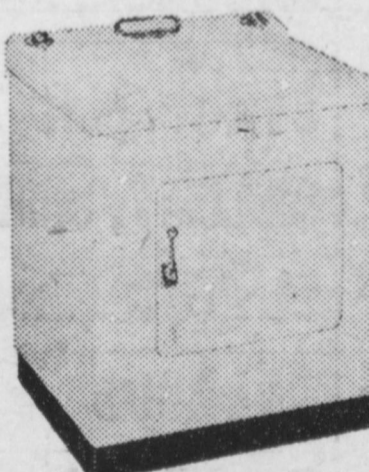
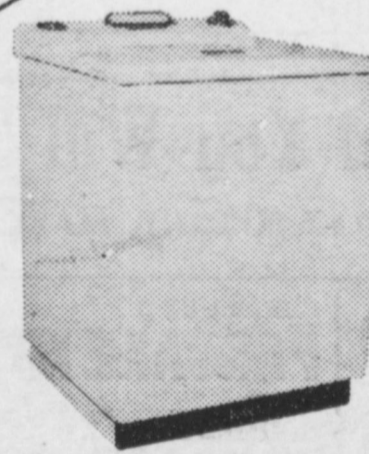

C. P. & L. Wins First Place In National Safety Contest

Central Power and Light Company won first place in the 1951 Motor Vehicle Accident Prevention Contest sponsored by the Bureau of Safety, Inc., of Chicago, it was announced by J. L. Bates, CPL vice president and general manager.

A bronze plaque signifying the award was presented to Bates by Paul Windsor, safety director of the Bureau of Safety, in ceremonies at the Nueces Hotel in Corpus Christi, March 14. CPL executives, district managers and department heads attended the presentation dinner.

Central Power and Light Company had the fewest motor vehicle accidents per 100,000 miles of any of the ten competing utility companies. CPL vehicles were driven 8,028,620 miles in 1951 and were involved in 70 accidents. The average was .87 accidents per 100,000 miles of operation. The average for all companies entered in the contest was 1.12 accidents per 100,000 miles.

The national average for public utility fleets in 1951, according to the National Safety Council, was 2.45 accidents per 100,000 miles. Had this rate prevailed for Central Power and Light Company, the Bureau of Safety pointed out, the company's vehicles would have been involved in 197 accidents.

"Careful, courteous driving has been strongly emphasized in our safety program," Bates commented. "For that reason we are particularly proud of this award, which shows how well our employees are doing their part to hold down the accident rate on our streets and highways."
