You are hereby commanded to appear before the Honorable District Court of Aransas County at the Court House thereof, in Rockport, Texas, at or before 10 o'clock A.M. of the first Monday next after the expiration of forty-two days from the date of the issuance of this citation, same being the 21st day of April A.D. 1952, then and there to answer Plaintiff's Petition filed in said Court, on the 3rd day of March A.D. 1952, in this cause, numbered 2890 on the docket of said court and styled Perry Z. Baxter Plaintiff, vs. Barbara Jo Scott Baxter Defendant. A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to wit:

THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF ARANSAS IN THE DISTRICT COURT OF ARANSAS COUNTY, TEXAS To the Honorable Judge of said Court:

Now comes Perry Z. Baxter, hereinafter called plaintiff, who resides in Aransas County, Texas, complaining of Barbara Jo Scott Baxter, hereinafter called defendant, whose residence is unknown to plaintiff, and praying for a divorce, for grounds, shows the Court the following:

- 1. On or about May 28, 1950, plaintiff was duly and legally married to defendant in the state of Georgia, and continued to live with her as man and wife until about September 29, 1950.
2. Plaintiff is and has been for more than twelve months immediately prior to exhibiting this petition an actual bona fide inhabitant of the State of Texas, and has resided in said County of Aransas, where this suit is filed, for a period of six months next preceding the filing hereof, having been a resident of Rockport, Aransas County, Texas, since September, 1950.
3. At all times while married to the defendant the plaintiff has conducted himself with propriety, doing his duty as a husband, has at all times treated defendant with kindness and forbearance, and has been guilty of no act bringing about or causing the hereinafter described acts, omissions and conditions on defendant's part.
4. Plaintiff would show that defendant, disregarding the solemnity of her marriage vow and obligation to treat plaintiff with kindness and attention, soon after their said marriage, commenced a course of unkind, harsh and tyrannical conduct towards plaintiff which continued, with very slight intermission, until plaintiff finally separated from defendant about September 29, 1950. On divers occasions, while plaintiff lived with defendant, defendant was guilty of excesses with cruel treatment towards plaintiff of such a nature as to render their living together insupportable. In

consequence of such cruel treatment and inhuman conduct towards plaintiff, the defendant has rendered it impossible for plaintiff to live with her, and plaintiff was, on or about September 29, 1950, obliged to separate from defendant and has not lived with her since. Plaintiff would show that defendant left him a note saying that she was leaving and would not be back. That she was gone when plaintiff came home and plaintiff discovered that she left with a man from Taft, Texas, from Woodboro on a bus and both parties had tickets to Mississippi. That plaintiff was informed by defendant's mother that defendant was in California in 1951, was leaving for New York State and that she did not have her daughter's address.

5. There are no children of the marriage and no community property to be divided. WHEREFORE, PREMISES CONSIDERED, plaintiff prays that defendant be cited to answer this petition; that on final hear-

ing plaintiff have judgment of divorce, dissolving the marriage between plaintiff and defendant, for division of the community property and for such other and further relief as the court shall deem proper to grant with costs of suit.

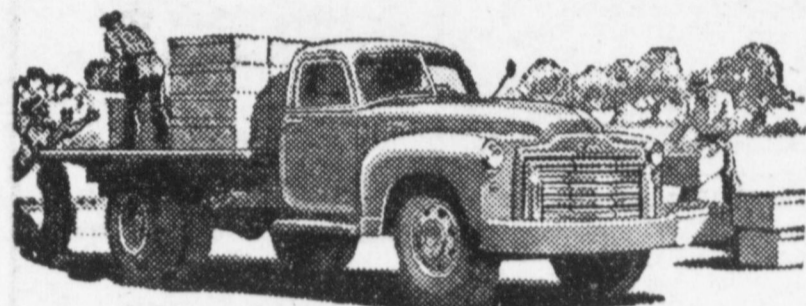

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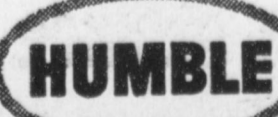
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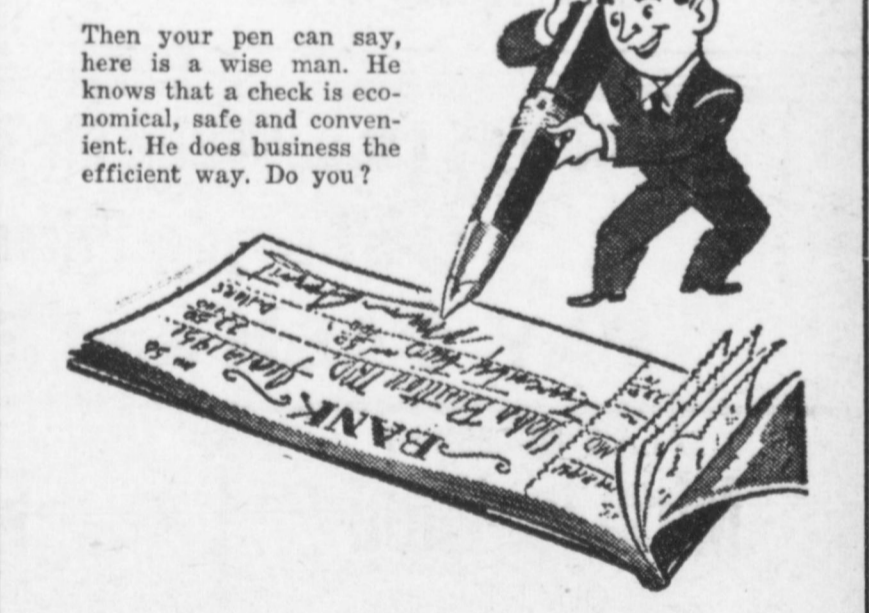

SPECIFIC AGREEMENTS HELP AVERT DISPUTES, BAR SAYS

A well drawn contract is designed to avoid the 'unfortunate' disputes which are usually based on honest misunderstanding, and not to let one person take advantage of another. Lawyers agree that one of the most important functions served by the careful execution of a contract is the preservation of business friendship.

Nearly every day all of us are making agreements with our fellow citizens. We base our plans and decisions on the faith that such agreements will be carried out. The grocer delivers food to us, relying on our promise to pay at a later date. We go to work each day on the faith of our employer's agreement to pay at the end of the week or month. Our whole system of free enterprise and trade is based, to a large extent, upon mutual agreements or promises to do something in the future.

Oral or written, such agreements are usually contracts. Probably the great majority of contracts that we enter into are never put into written form.

Generally speaking, you can enter into a verbal agreement that is just as binding as a written contract. The important thing for each party to remember is to make the agreement or understanding perfectly clear whether it is oral or written. Usually you will find that the best way to do this is to put it into a written contract. Exact terms of an oral contract may be difficult to establish if a disagreement arises.

It is easy enough to define a contract as an agreement between two or more people where each of the parties does something or promises to do something in return for the act or promise of the other. The real problem is to be actually certain what each party has agreed to do.

Suppose Mr. Householder has a paper on which is written the heading "Proposal" and which thereafter reads as follows:

"We will build a garage for you on your lot for the estimated price of \$800, work to be done in a workmanlike manner. All of

our work is guaranteed to your satisfaction. Subject to the conditions printed on the reverse side."

This is signed by the XYZ Company. Under this signature is the word "Accepted" followed by a line for the signature of Mr. Householder. His question is, should he sign it?

Before he signs it there are some things he should consider. He should first remember that once he and the XYZ Company have both signed the agreement, no matter how informal it may appear, they have bound themselves to the terms as written and cannot later escape the obligations they have assumed.

With this in mind, here are some of the misunderstandings that might arise from such an agreement: The company has agreed to build a garage—yet nothing is said about the size or type of construction. It has not even been stated whether it is to be a single or double garage. There is not indication in the agreement as to where on the lot the garage will be built. It says nothing about when the work is to be finished. There is no agreement as to whether Mr. Householder is to pay in advance, in installments, or not until it is completed.

Further, they have not actually agreed upon a price. The agreement refers to an estimated price of \$800. They should be specific and make either a fixed price contract or an agreement whereby the builder is reimbursed for his expenses plus a definite profit percentage. Perhaps the XYZ Company feels that if their expenses are higher than anticipated, they will be able to charge more than the estimated \$800. On the other hand, Mr. Householder probably feels that \$800 is the maximum price he will have to pay.

The most important thing in a contract is to determine the essential elements of performance. This is not as difficult as it might seem. Here is a good rule to follow: As to the acts of each party determine what is to be done, when, where and by whom. See that these essential parts are included in your agreement. In addition, remember that if a contract is worth signing, it is worth reading and understanding—all of it.
