District Boy Scout Camporee At Goose Island April 4-5

The annual Karankawa District Boy Scout Camporee will be held at Goose Island State Park near Rockport on April 4-5, R. S. Hodges of Gregory, district chairman, has announced.

Troops will check in at the camporee site at 9 a.m. Saturday and will leave for home early Sunday afternoon. Chapel services will be conducted on the grounds for all Protestant boys on Sunday morning and all Catholic boys will attend Mass in Rockport.

The camporee program will match troops of the district in competitive skills in two divisions during the two day event.

Contests in the Boy Scout division include: knot tying, water boiling, tent pitching, first aid, flag pole lashing, chariot race, and tug-o-war. Explorer division: first aid, chariot race, tug-o-war, water boiling, compass problem, signal relay, and scuttlebutt hoist. Camp layout, cooking and serving meals, sanitation, suitable menu for 3 meals and serving of meals on time will also enter into points for judging. Troops will be rated Class A, B, or C and certificates will be given.

E. F. Corbin of Ingleside, district commissioner, will be in charge of the camporee and will act as events director. Members of the district committee will serve as judges in all events. Over 100 boy scouts and explorers are expected to attend.

All these contestants were from the grade school except Arden Hander, Jerome Wallace and Iva Ann Shaver.

The band is now working on a spring concert to be held in May, the exact date to be announced later. This program will be across the board, with hill billy tunes, selections, marches, overtures, novelty numbers and solos.

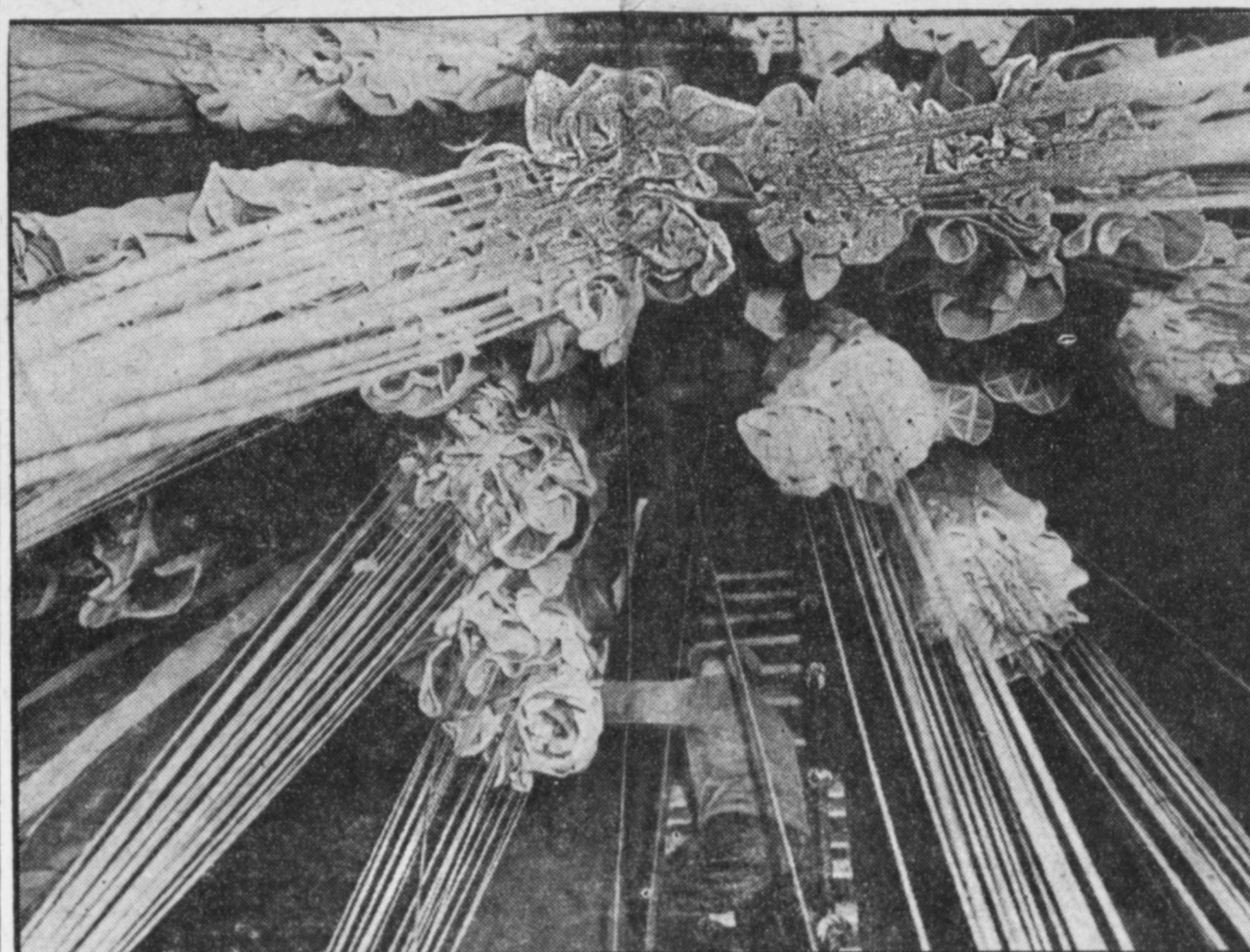
Chamber of Commerce Meets Tuesday Night

Two Class Rooms Needed At Rockport School

The enrollment figures show that there will be two class rooms needed at the Rockport Elementary School next year.

The school census which has been completed shows 943 school age children in the district, of which 73 are six-year-olds. 55 of these will be beginner pupils next September and 18 are already attending school some place in the county.

As determined by the present enrollment figures, the Rockport Elementary School and the Aransas County Junior High School will have 494 pupils next year and they will need the following number of rooms for each grade:

Aransas Gets New Discovery; Chicago Try To Run Log

Humble Oil and Refining Co. No. 1 Aransas Bay State Tract 190, Aransas County discovery 2.3 miles southeast of Rockport, was waiting on potential after gauging 4.6 million cubic feet of gas daily on open flow from perforations at 9,454-95 feet. Gas-liquid ratio was 18,500 cubic feet of gas to one barrel of distillate. Total depth was 10,033 feet.

Gaines Brothers Drilling Co. of Sinton was rigging up on Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 1 Lamar (Preston Paul and others), wildcat eight miles north of Rockport. Contract depth on the test in State Tract 36, M. Hunt Survey, A179, is 9,600 feet.

Union Producing Co. No. 7 Taton, wildcat 3½ miles northeast of Lamar, John Durst Survey, was making hole at 10,640 feet on a slated 11,500 foot project.

The Chicago Corp. and George W. Graham No. 1 W. H. Wheeler, proposed 10,600 foot Aransas County wildcat four miles southwest of Rockport, A. P. Davis Survey, was drilling at 6,084 feet.

Sun Oil Co. No. 1 San Antonio Bay State Tract 80, Calhoun County wildcat 25 miles northwest of Rockport, was fishing at 11,111 feet. The test lost 10,400 feet of drillpipe in the hole when rotary slips gave away. Operators had recovered drill pipe but were fishing for lost cones and waiting on more drillpipe to replace several thousand feet damaged and bent when the slips gave away.

Union Producing Co. No. 7 Taton, wildcat 3½ miles northeast of Lamar, John Durst Survey, was making hole at 9,480 feet on a slated 11,500-foot project.

Sun Oil Co. has staked an 11,500-foot Aransas County offshore wildcat two miles east of Lamar. The firm's No. 1 St. Charles State Tract 385 will be 1,980 feet from south and 2,500 from west lines of State Tract 385.

Flowing 288 barrels of 42.2 gravity oil daily, Placid Oil Co. and George W. Graham No. 1 Milton Jackson and others has been finished in the Fulton Beach Field.

Gas-oil ratio was 77.1. Production was through a 10-64-inch tubing choke from 48 perforations at 7,128-36 feet, with total depth 7,160 feet. Location is Gilliland Survey.

Health Talks

If your doctor asked you "How does your garden grow?" instead of "How are you feeling?" you might thing him a little childish. But the development of your health is very similar too the development of a garden.

You are made upon three things, fluids, gases and solids. These three substances are constantly undergoing change, getting used up, being replaced, and having the waste eliminated. Like a garden of many plants, you are a hodgepodge of seeds, the solids of your body. Like the garden, those seeds must have aid and water in order to grow to reach full bloom. Like the garden, when the blooms have died, there must be air and water in your body to remove the dead parts and salvage the seeds that can be used again.

Air is essentially a gas and most of the fluids of the body are comparable to water. Air serves not only to feed oxygen to the seeds scattered in all parts of the body but as gas may be considered a fuel that provides the heat which the body needs to cultivate its seeds. Heat is also supplied by calories in food and by vitamins, the internal version of sunlight.

Since the fluids of the body serve as the irrigation for the garden of health, they are extremely important in the safeguarding of health.

Many centuries ago Galen, one of the Early Greek medical scholars, took up the study of the fluids of the body and decided that life was a cycle by which the body became less moist from infancy to old age. In his expression, you are born very moist and become drier in all parts through the years, accounting for the wrinkled and brittle condition of the very old. Galen is not credited with the origin of the expression "Aw, dry up," however.

Today the medical scholars know there is a certain desirable balance to be maintained between the solids and the fluids of the body as well as a balance between the acids and the alkalines or salts of the body. Since acids may be a broad indication of the gases and the salts may be generally considered as the solids that are traveling in the body streams from one part of the body to another, this acid-alkaline relationship becomes an important indicator of the whole health of the body.

The body is about 75 per cent water. Half of the body weight is made up of moving water, so-called extracellular water. Your dry bones and the squeezed-out organs of your body would account for only about one-fourth of your total weight if they could be weighed separately.

The gases that provide the heat in the body and the salts that form the structure of the body have a drying-out tendency so that more moisture must always be added, moisture in the form of water, internally and externally. The body streams not only deposit the "seeds" where they belong but also furnish the heat for that seed to expand and contribute to growth. Then the streams carry away the waste materials.

Such is the continuous growth in the body, however, that what is waste for one organ may be a "seed" for the next. So the fluid channels of the body, picking up material from one organ, take it to the next where it is filtered and the "good" is taken out, then carry what's left to the next where whatever that organ needs it takes out, then carry the remains on and on until finally there is only waste which no part of the body needs at that moment and the waste is eliminated from the body.

Some of the materials in the body do not move through the more obvious fluid channels such as the blood stream. Some materials are more versatile and move through the pores of the walls from one part of body to the next, a process called osmosis. From the deep layers of the skin certain waste portions of the under-skin shove through all the layers until they get to the top of the skin, forming tiny scales that rub off and form a ring around the bathtub. As this material moves from the inner skin towards the top skin it is also undergoing changes leaving some parts of it at each layer and becoming less and less moist as it gets to the outside skin. It dries there and warmth, moisture and solids in the form of warm water and soap are necessary to remove the waste scales.

Motorists Urged To Have Vehicles Inspected Before Rush

Austin.—Motorists are urged to have their motor vehicles safety inspected while there is a lull before the expected rush to inspection stations.

G. W. Busby, chief of the Motor Vehicle Inspection of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said 2,400 inspection stations have been certified to aid motorists in complying with the new state law. September 6 is the final deadline for having all motor vehicles certified for safe driving.

Busby said the movement of vehicles to inspection stations is lagging, with only about 40,000 being inspected weekly. If a bottleneck is to be avoided before the deadline, he said, at least 100,000 vehicles a week will have to flow through the stations.

Requirements under the new safety law have been modified considerably following an anticipated rush to inspection stations when the law became effective a

few months ago. Safety Department officials said many new inspection stations are being certified weekly to aid in avoiding another bottleneck.

"We earnestly hope that motorists will take advantage of the lull we are now having and avoid a last minute rush in order to comply with the September 6 deadline," Busby said.

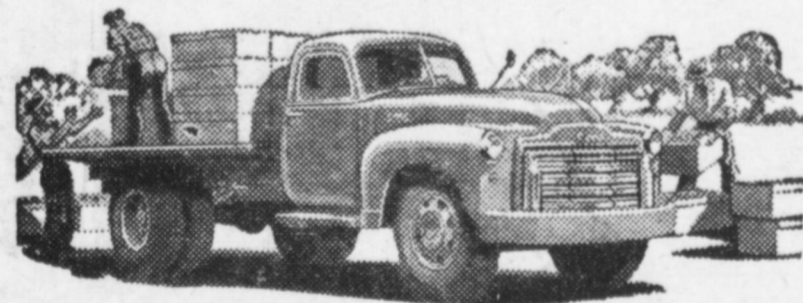

HOMEOWNERS MAY BE LIABLE FOR ACCIDENTS ON PREMISES

Can a homeowner be held responsible for accidents that happen to other people while they are on his property? Lawyers say it is difficult to state a hard and fast rule about liability for such accidents because the facts differ so much from case to case. However, some conclusions can be drawn by noting how the courts have decided in specific cases which have been brought before them.

A postman delivering mail slipped on a child's roller skate one morning. He sued the homeowner for damages. The court held that the delivery of mail is for the benefit of the homeowner and that he must take care to remove any condition on his property which would make delivery of the mail dangerous.

Then there was the case of the meter-reader who slipped and fell on the basement steps and the courts held the owner responsible because the steps were defective.

On the other hand, a guest sued her host because she slipped and fell when she stepped on some beans strewn about the owner's living room. The host's children had been playing with beanshooters on the day she chose to visit. The court held in this case that the host was not liable for her injury.

Similar cases where social calls resulted in disaster involved a guest slipping on a small scatter rug, and another overnight guest who slipped and fell in a shower. Both cases were decided in favor of the homeowners—not the visitors.

From these cases it may be seen that the law is usually more strict about accidents befalling tradesmen and others who enter your premises in the line of duty, so to speak—postmen, laundrymen, meter-readers, delivery boys and the like—than it is in the cases of those who enter your home for purely social reasons.

This does not mean that a homeowner is absolved of all responsibility for injury to his guests. If he knows a dangerous condition exists, he has a duty to correct it and can be held liable for accidents which might happen if he doesn't. For example, a rotted tree branch fell to the sidewalk, injuring a passerby. The general rule here is that the owner was responsible because he knew of the defective condition and should have remedied it.

The law is especially zealous in protecting small children. In many situations where no liability would be imposed for injury to an adult, you may be held responsible to an injured child. If you have a piece of machinery, a pond, a well or some other apparatus or condi-

Just pay the tax dollar to the county in the beginning, that these people need their friends and family to visit them and love them.

tion attractive and dangerous to a child on your property, it may be your duty to take special pains to keep children away from it.

Fortunately, not everyone who falls down the front steps gets up and rushes off to sue his host. However, a substantial body of law has grown out of this type of negligence case. This is not surprising when you realize that more fatal accidents occurred in and around the home last year than from traffic accidents on the highways.

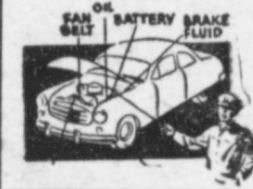

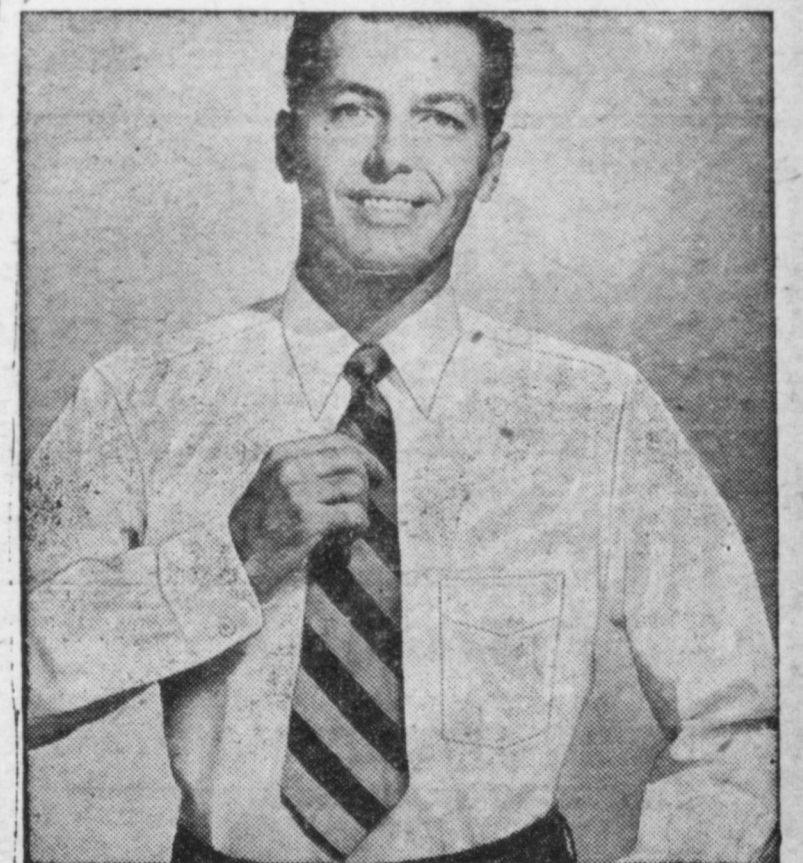

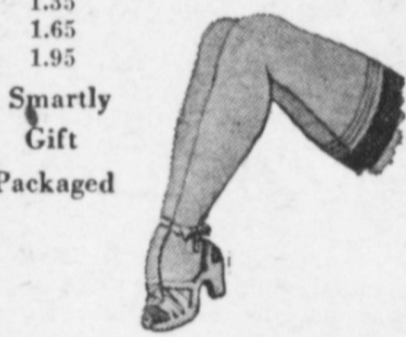
