

If your doctor asked you "How does your garden grow?" instead of "How are you feeling?", you might thing him a little childish. But the development of your health is very similar too the development of a garden.

You are made upon three things, fluids, gases and solids. These three substances are constantly undergoing change, getting used up, being replaced, and having the waste eliminated. 




