He was reared in Rockport, but had lived at Matagorda for the past five years. He was a member of the Catholic Church.

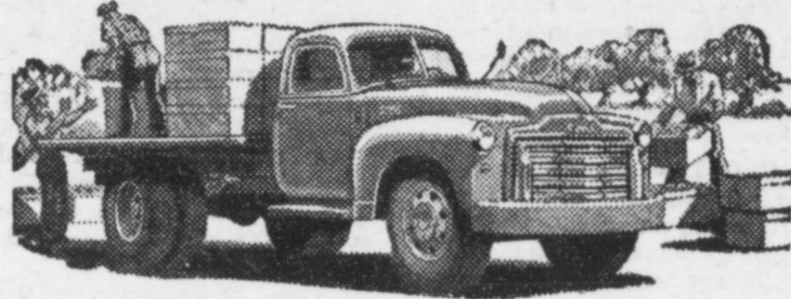
Funeral services were held at 3:30 p. m. Wednesday at the Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Rockport and burial was in the Rockport Cemetery.

#### No Age Limit For Payment of Social Security Taxes

"Am I required to pay the social security tax on my earnings after I am 65 years of age?" The answer is not generally known, since that question is frequently asked at the social security office.

"There is no age limit on the payment of taxes, and workers who continue to work on a job covered by social security after they reach age 65 must continue to pay the social security tax, regardless of their age," says H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Corpus Christi office of the Social Security Administration.

Many employees, and employers alike, are confused on this point. Some seem to believe that because the minimum age for entitlement to the retirement insurance is age 65, the taxes need not be paid after a worker reaches that age.

"This is not true," Cleveland emphasized. "Employers, their employees, and the self-employed pay the tax on their social security income even after an application for the benefits has been filed. This is required, and it is equally applicable to all persons even to those who are receiving the insurance payments after age 75 years whether they are retired or not."

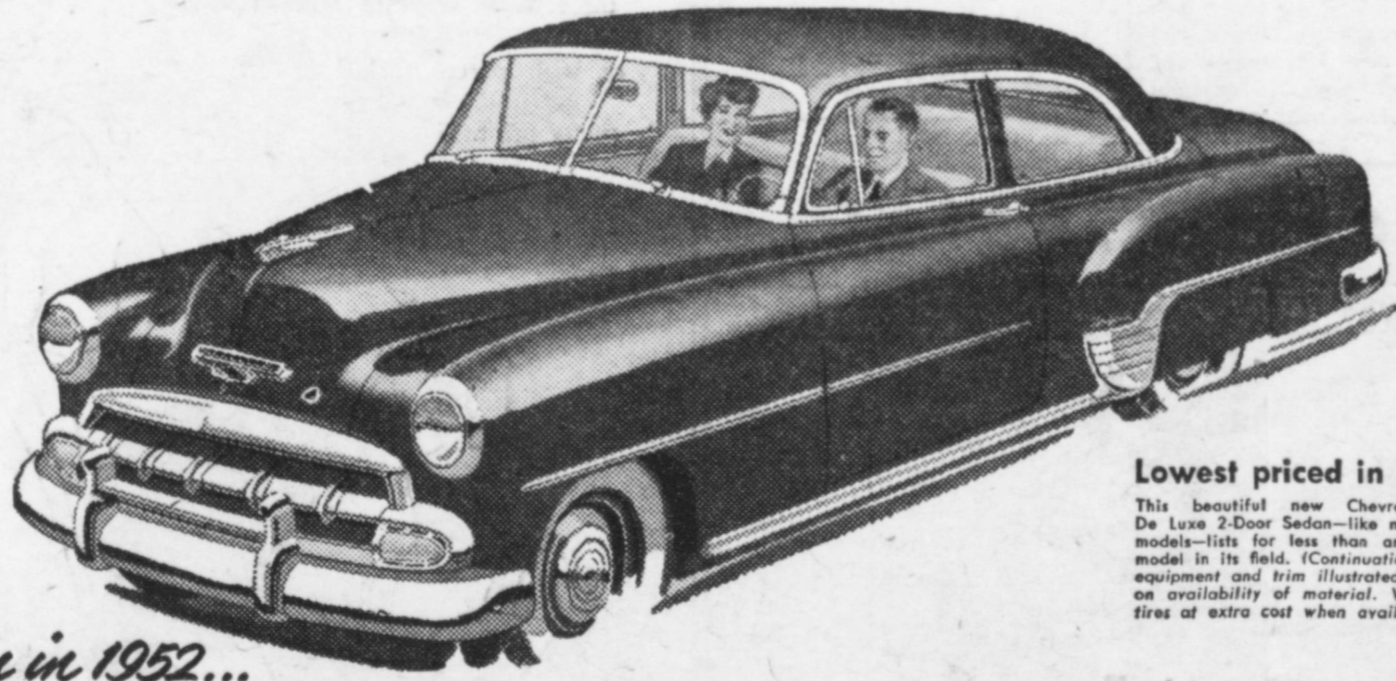

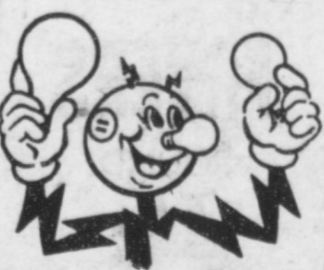

**COURT RULES PROTECT RIGHTS AND INSURE FAIR TRIALS**

Many people regard rules of legal procedure as mere tools of delay, of concern only to lawyers and judges. For from this, they are instruments of justice, and of real significance to all of us. Procedure is the lubricant which makes the machinery of uniform justice run smoothly.

The law is composed of two parts — the substantive and the adjective law. The substantive law defines rights, duties, and remedies; it enforces contracts and rights wrongs; it describes crimes and sets up penalties. People can usually see the value of substantive law. Adjective law deals with legal procedure and describes the steps a person must take to invoke the substantive law.

Some of our most important rights are to be found in the body of procedural law. For example, as a people who want justice to prevail, we like to think that every man, rich or poor, shall have his day in court. This is an important right, for a day in court implies more than merely the right to have your say before a judge and jury.

Your day in court implies that you shall have the right to be properly represented, to have your case presented before an impartial jury and an unbiased judge, and to have a reasonable time to prepare for the trial. It holds that you shall have proper notice of the action against you; that the complaint or indictment shall state a clear cause of action. It means that you shall be confronted by

your accusers; that you shall have the right to cross-examine them; that you shall be able to present evidence in your own behalf.

Finally, the law governing procedure tells you how you may appeal your case to higher courts when you feel that you have not had a fair trial or that a prejudicial error has been committed in the trial court.

Much of our procedure law comes down from centuries of experience in the courts of other lands. It was inevitable that through the centuries some of the procedure would become cumbersome, obsolete and difficult. For this reason the history of procedure has been characterized by great periods of reform. In America we have experienced many advantageous changes in our laws governing the procedure of courts and administrative agencies. There is a growing custom in the United States of giving the courts the power to revise their rules in certain fields. Our Texas rules of civil procedure are made by our state Supreme Court. The Court is constantly striving, with the recommendations of the practicing lawyer, to improve these rules. The aim of the Supreme Court is to provide a uniform and relatively simple set of rules for dispensing justice with a minimum of delay.

### U.S. ARMED SERVICES INAUGURATE METHOD OF SHOWING EQUIPMENT COST

In support of the Defense Department's "Cost Consciousness" program, all vehicles and major equipment of the U.S. Army and U.S. Air Force Southwestern Recruiting District now bear a painted sign showing the cost, Major Clyde J. Schvaneveldt, commander of the Corpus Christi recruiting station revealed today.

Prominently displayed, the sign reads as follows: "This vehicle (or equipment name) cost Uncle Sam (\$1,500). Take care of it!" Major Schvaneveldt said.

Defense officials have for many years studied the problem of conserving expensive equipment. The reclamation of World War II weapons, planes, and other material saved taxpayers millions of dollars in Korea. Thousands of jeeps, guns and aircraft engines stored in depots throughout the world are once again being used to equip newly formed military units.

Also, every member of the armed forces is being indoctrinated with the need to conserve everything he uses, including paper clips and stationery. The theory is that if he knows the cost of individual items of equipment he can better appreciate the importance of their proper care. And as a taxpayer himself, the American fighting man has a definite interest in saving the government money.
