

Self-Employed Should Inform Themselves **About Benefits**

If you work for yourself and plan to retire this year, it may be to your advantage to get exact information from the Social Security office before making your decision.

Miss Ruth Hardt, Claims Assistant of the Corpus Christi office of the Social Security Administration, gives this further explanation. "Anyone who has worked regularly under social security

since 1950, will be eligible for oldage insurance payments after April of this year if he is 65 years old and retires," she says. According to Miss Hardt, it will be impossible for an insured person to immediately get the highest bene-

fit payments on the basis of earnings after 1950. This is because self-employed income for the year a claim is filed cannot be used in figuring a benefit payment, and two full years of such work are required to get the largest payments under the benefit formula. In most cases, it will be to the

advantage of the self-employed person to defer retirement until after 1952 or at least to wait until January 1953 to file his claim.

It is suggested by Miss Hardt that the self-employed person who contemplates retirement in 1952 get in touch with the social security office at 424 Taylor Street, in Corpus Christi, to discuss the matter before making a decision. She also invites every self-employed person to ask for a copy of a new booklet, "Do You Work for Yourself?" This booklet clearly explains the rights and obligations of everyone self-employed in a trade or business coovered

by social security.


