## Cancer Not Caused By Fluorine In Drinking Water

Austin, Tex. — Cancer does not develop any earlier in areas where the water contains a high proportion of fluorides than it does in fluorine free areas, morbidity statistics compiled by the Texas State Department of Health and the M. D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer Research in Houston show.

State Health Officer George W. Cox, in a statement flatly refuting claims by a University of Texas biochemist that fluorine in municipal drinking water might speed up the development of breast cancer, said the M. D. Anderson cancer research center, an adjunct of the University of Texas, completely supported the State Health Department's contention that fluoride additions to city water supplies does not accelerate the trend toward mammary cancer.

The state health agency has for the past two years recommended that municipalities add fluoride in the amount of one part fluoride to one million parts of water as a (continued on page 8)

## Sun Slates Deep Aransas Wildcat

Sun Oil Co. will drill its No. 1 Aransas State Tract 78 as an Aransas County wildcat 1 1/2 miles southeast of Lamar.

The scheduled 10,500-footer will be 660 feet from the north and west lines of State Tract 78, Aransas Bay Division. This location is about 3,000 feet south of Goose Island.

Phillips No. 1 Lamar (Preston Paul and others), scheduled 9,600-foot wildcat eight miles north of Rockport, M. Hunt Survey, A-79, was making hole at 7,800 feet.

In Salt Lake Field, Renwar Oil Corp. No. 4 State Tract 105 has reported final gauge of 41.43 barrels of 41.6 gravity oil daily through 3/4-inch choke from 24 perforations at 7,866-72 feet. Tubing pressure was 60 to 100 pounds. Casing pressure was 540 pounds. Gas-oil ratio was 630-1.

The Chicago Corp. and George W. Graham No. 1 W. H. Wheeler wildcat four miles southwest of Rockport, A. P. Davis Survey, was drilling at 8,014 feet. Running log to 8,500 feet was planned in the scheduled 10,600 footer.

Sun Oil Co. No. 1 Aransas State Tract 79, Lamar Field test, was drilling at 10,041 feet on a 10,500-foot contract.

In Fulton Beach West Field, Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 40 Copano Bay State Tract 31 will be 660 feet from the south and east lines of State Tract 31. Permit depth is 8,000-feet.

Union Producing Co. No. 7 Taton, Aransas County wildcat 3 1/2 miles northeast of Lamar, John Durst Survey, was coring below 11,200 feet. Permit depth is 11,500 feet.

Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 1 Aransas Bay State Tract 116 wildcat in the East Fulton area six miles northeast of Rockport, was preparing to run electric log to 7,050 feet. The slated 10,000-footer is in State Tract 116.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 30 Copano Bay State, Fulton Beach West Field, was waiting on potential from 30 perforations at 6,956-62 feet.

In Copano Bay, Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 35 Copano Bay State Tract 17 was drilling at 8,750 feet.

In the Fulton Beach, West Field Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 32 Copano Bay State Tract 65 was drilling at 8,767 feet.

Sun Oil Co. No. 89-1 Aransas State was drilling ahead at 10,454 feet on a 10,500-foot project. The Lamar field test is in State Tract 79.

## 1952 Cancer Crusade Opens Here This Week

The 1952 Cancer Crusade opened here this week.

A. C. Glass, Aransas County Crusade chairman, said that volunteers will canvass every neighborhood in the city. Contributions can also be mailed to CANCER, in care of the Rockport bank.

"At every home visited by our volunteer solicitors," he announced, "an American Cancer Society educational leaflet, explaining the Texas Cancer Crusade, important facts about cancer and the warning signals which the disease gives, will be left whether a contribution is made or not."

Mr. Glass said that imparting this life-saving information to the public is equally as important as the fund-raising success of the campaign.

"Reaching every person with the simple truths about cancer is our chief aim. To collect voluntary contributions for the nation-wide research effort and to enlist workers for the educational and service programs carried on by the Aransas County unit of the American Cancer Society is the secondary objective.

The goal for the state is \$600,000. The slogan for this year's Crusade is "Cancer Strikes One in Five. Strike Back! Join the Texas Cancer Crusade."

Mr. Glass emphasized that one of the surest ways to strike back at cancer is to know the vital facts of the disease and to act promptly at the first sign of a symptom.

He said, "22 million people now living will die of cancer unless present mortality rates are altered. In Texas alone, more than 8,000 persons die of the disease each year. Nearly one-half of these lives could be saved if everyone were aware of the early warning signs and each sought prompt accurate treatment."

A new member, A. C. Glass, was introduced by Rotarian Jack Horton.

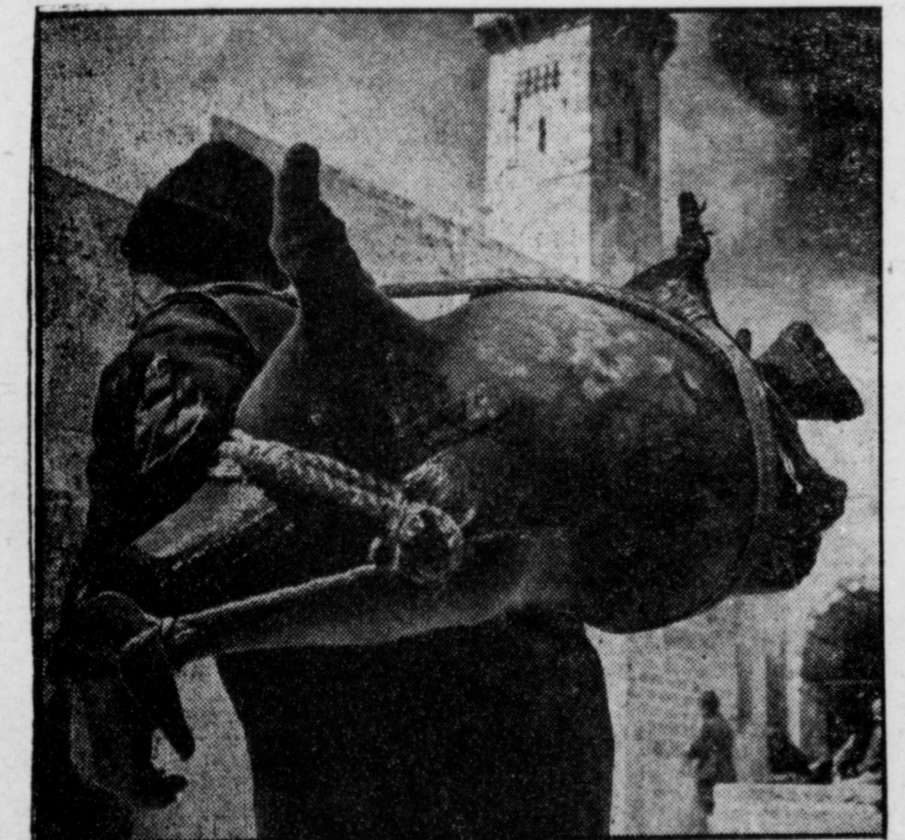
Mr. and Mrs. Dudley Bracht were honored, this being their 25th wedding anniversary.

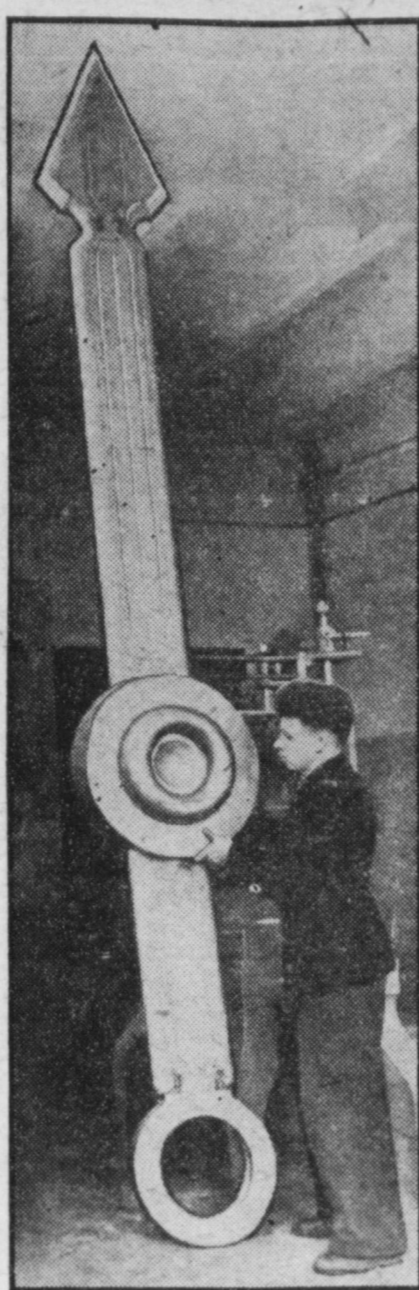

### SOCIAL SECURITY TAX ON HOUSEHOLD WORKERS EXPLAINED

April 30th is the deadline on which social security payments for household workers for the first quarter of 1952 are due at the office of your Collector of Internal Revenue.

The federal law bringing household workers under the old-age and survivors insurance system went into effect January 1, 1951. However, lawyers say that many persons who employ help in their homes are still in the dark about requirements of the law.

Here are some provisions everyone should know. Household workers covered by the law include maids, laundresses, housekeepers, cooks, nursemaids, gardeners, handymen, valets, footmen, grooms, chauffeurs of privately owned cars, practical nurses and others.

Whether or not a household worker is included in the law depends on how many days she works and how much money she is paid. If the person works 24 days and earns \$50 during any one of the three month periods into which the calendar year has been divided, a tax report must be filed and payment made.

Only cash wages are considered, which includes bus fare if paid in cash, but does not include bus tokens, clothing, room and board,

or other noncash items furnished the employee. A domestic worker does not have to put in a full day to count on the 24 day rule—any portion of the day worked counts as a full day.

The rule is different for domestic workers on farms operated for profit. In such cases the domestic is considered a farm worker and is covered only if he or she meets the test for farm labor.

The tax in all amounts to 3% of the cash wages paid. You, as an employer, must deduct 1 1/2% from your household worker's cash wages if the person meets the 24 day, fifty dollar test. You then include another 1 1/2% which is the employer's contribution. After the close of each specified three-month period you should send the tax with a report of the wages paid, to the Collector of Internal Revenue.

These three-month periods, or quarters, end on March 31st, June 30th, September 30th and December 31st. Reports and payments are due by the last day of the month following the close of each quarter. During any quarterly period that a household worker does not work 24 days or earn \$50, the employer need not be concerned. You need not consider the work your employee performs for any other employer.

The Bureau of Internal Revenue has a special household report form, printed on the back of a return envelope, which can be

obtained from your Collector upon request. Just ask for Form 942.

Every organ in the body has a filtering system for taking out of the bloodstream the ingredients it needs and putting back in the bloodstream the material it no longer needs. The filter is the capillary bed, a web-like fishing net inside each organ, which is actually the end of the artery and the beginning of the vein.

Since the waste ingredients from one organ may be food for the next, the process of feeding and picking up waste from one organ and taking it to the next goes on throughout the body.

Eventually the blood stream gets to the kidneys, the filtering system for the whole body. Here the needs of all organs are taken into consideration and only that material which no organ needs or can use at that time is eliminated from the body.

The kidneys sit like two boxing gloves, one raised a little higher than the other, in the back of the body around the waistline. The big artery of the body and the big vein come down between the two kidneys, sending off branches which enter at the spot that would that would the palms of those boxing gloves. Each glove may be considered as the outside of the kidney, the cortex.

To see inside a kidney you have to take the glove off. If you would tilt your hand sideways, the palm of the hand would serve as the basin of the kidney, which is called the pelvis. There are five tubes sticking out from the pelvis, in finger fashion, which carry waste material into the pelvis, and from the pelvis the waste material, urine, goes into a tube that looks very much like the arm curving downward from the hand.

Those five tubes that stick out from the pelvis are called calices, and in the kidney they look like the first joints of the finger sticking out from the palm. From the first joint they flare out into many tiny tubes called glomeruli, spread through a pithy material which forms the medulla of the kidney. The blood flows past all those little glomeruli, where the ingredients that be used again are separated and sent on back to the veins.

The rest, the waste material, enters those tiny glomeruli, flows on through the larger stumpy tubes known as the calices, into the palm-like basin called the pelvis, on out the kidney and down the thin arm called the ureter into a stretchable ball called the bladder. Here the urine collects until the bladder is full and the urine is then expelled from the body through another small tube called the urethra.

The Latin word for the kidney is renes, which becomes renal in medical description. The adrenal cortex is the cap that sits on top of each kidney, regulating that kidney in some fashion. The Greek word for kidney is nepros; through the years words of Latin origin

4th. I am not sponsored by any one person nor am I under any obligations to any political groups or clique, and if elected, I will discharge the duties of the office fair to all and special favors to none.

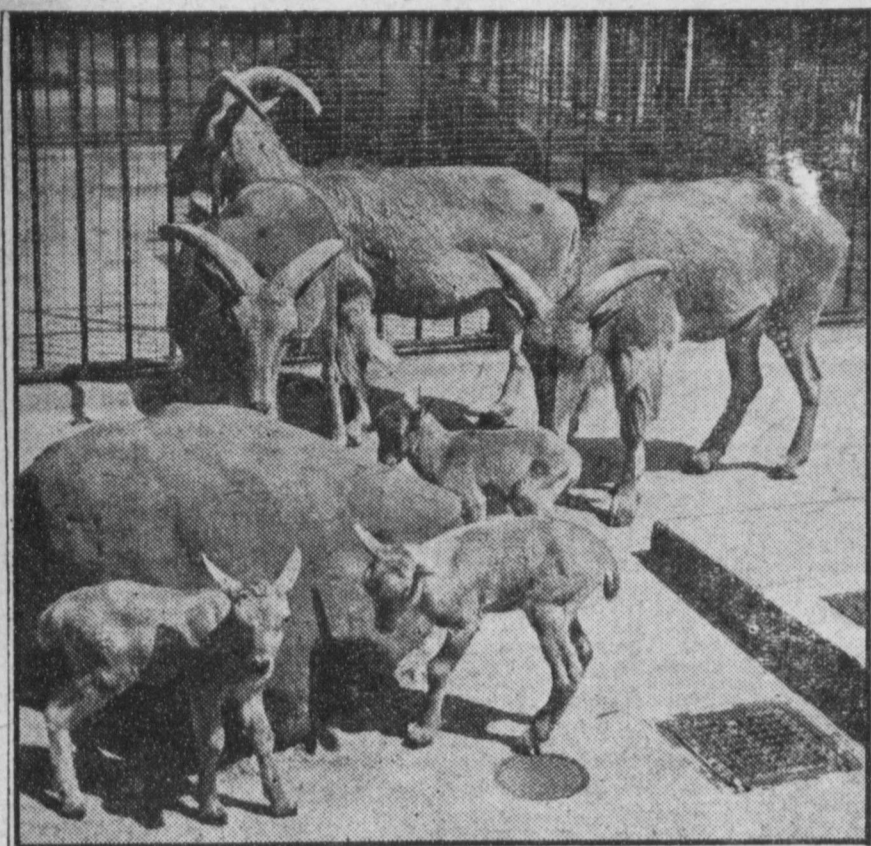

## Cancer Not Caused By Fluorine

deterrent to tooth decay among children.

Also in support of the health department's position is the word of Dr. H. Trendly Dean, director of dental research, National Institute of Health.

Dr. Dean says he and "Dr. Howard B. Andervont (unidentified) have carefully evaluated the data in respect to the alleged relation of fluoride water to an accelerated rate in the development of mammary tumors, and are of the opinion that the evidence . . . does not warrant modification in the policy of recommending fluoridation of public drinking water supplies."

Dr. F. A. Bull, director of dental health in Wisconsin, in a letter to Dr. Cox, wrote that the Wisconsin health department has been accused of contributing to the cancer incidence for the past six years.

"We're going ahead, despite these deterrents, with fluoridation," Dr. Bull said.

Dr. Cox said the same bone of contention came up years ago when chlorine, now a common addition to drinking water, was first used to disinfect water supplies.

"Further postponement of fluorides in water would penalize

children unnecessarily," the health officer said. "They deserve its cavity-preventing properties, and the State Department of Health will continue to recommend its use by any and all cities in the proper proportion."

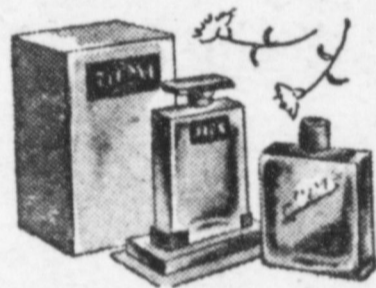
