The news all along the waterfront is much better this week. Plenty of trout everywhere, so it seems, although some are wanting to get some smaller bait, as the fish bite better with small shrimp.

Fred Christilles had several parties out last week and all report good catches. A party from Ft. Worth fished with him Friday and caught 55 large trout and Saturday Mr. and Mrs. Lee Moffett and small son brought in 169 trout. Mr. Christilles took Mr. Shuart, of Corpus Christi, out Sunday. He got 57 nice trout. Mr. M. Woolley and party, of Houston, fished with him Monday, catching 45 and Tuesday and Wednesday John McDade and party, of San Antonio, fished with Christilles, getting 50 trout Tuesday and 86 Wednesday. Mr. Christilles says the fish are larger this year than they were last year at this time.

Alex McDonald, J. A. Pell, Jim Bennett and Jimmy Kerr, of Lubbock, went out from Floyd's boat house Thursday to Long Reef and brought back 84 trout and they went out again Friday, catching 38. Carl Kutzer and Coy Trulove caught 78 trout Sunday on Long Reef and H. C. Floyd got 38 the same day.

## County Due Three Wildcats One Fails

Richardson and Bass of Fort Worth have staked three more slated 13,000-foot Aransas County wildcats eight miles southeast of Rockport. This brings to seven the number of operations the firm has permitted for in the Aransas Bay area.

Their No. 1 State Tract 264, which was staked last year and started the first of this year, has been drilled tight after reaching 8,000 feet. In late March it was unofficially reported drilling between 10,000 and 11,000 feet.

The new locations are: Richardson & Bass No. 1 State of Texas No. 31908-Tract 263 will be 660 feet from the north and east lines of State Tract 263. No. 1 State of Texas No. 31906-Tract 239 will be 660 feet from the south and east lines of State Tract 239; No. 1 State of Texas No. 32903-Tract 236 will be 1,979 feet from the south extremity of the lease and 467 feet from the west line of State Tract 236.

Humble Oil and Refining Co. No. 1 Aransas Bay State Tract 116, wildcat in the East Fulton area of Aransas County, was diamond coring at 7,575 feet. The test is slated to 10,000 feet.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 1 Lamar (Preston Paul and others,) planned 9,800-foot wildcat eight miles north of Rockport, M. Hunt Survey, was making hole at 8,470 feet.

Union Producing Co. No. 7 Taton, Aransas County wildcat 3 1/2 miles northeast of Lamar, John Durst Survey, has been plugged and abandoned at 11,515 feet.

Sun Oil Co. No. 79-1 Aransas State, Lamar Field test, was running electric log to 10,507 feet. The test is in State Tract 79.

Phillips No. 32 Copano Bay State Tract 65, Fulton Beach West Field, was trying to regain circulation at 8,983 feet.

In Copano Bay Field, Phillips No. 35 Copano Bay State Tract 17 has been plugged and abandoned at 9,000 feet.

Western Natural Gas Co. of Houston No. 1 St. Charles Bay State Tract 373, Aransas County wildcat six miles northeast of Lamar, had set 13 3/8-inch casing at 1,456 feet. The slated 11,500-footer is being drilled by a Salt Dome rig.

## Golf Club Site Selected On Back Road

A short time ago a meeting was held in the Rockport School Gym of persons interested in organizing a golf club in this area and building a golf course.

George Clark of Aransas Pass was appointed chairman and a committee was appointed to select a site.

Last Friday night another meeting was held in the City Hall in Aransas Pass when the organization was completed.

A site for the course was selected, on the back road, between Rockport and Aransas Pass, one and one-half miles this side of the "Y" where the Bayside road forks off. It is five and one-half miles from Rockport and six miles from Aransas Pass. The site contains 150 acres and the club has a ten year lease on it, with an option to buy the land at the end of ten years for \$30.00 an acre.

Aransas Pass, Rockport, Ingleside, Fulton and Port Aransas are the towns included in the organization.

Membership in the club is \$100 plus \$20.00 tax, total \$120, with the membership limited to two hundred to start with. One membership includes the wife and all unmarried children under twenty-one. Stierly Rozzell is the membership chairman here and those wishing to join the club should contact him as soon as possible.

The club will start with a nine hole course, but as the money is available a club house, tennis court, swimming pool and an eighteen hole course will be built.

**IT'S THE LAW**  
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### PROPER RECORDS GUARD SPOUSE'S SEPARATE PROPERTY

Texans are generally aware that we have what is known as the "community property" system in this state, but many do not understand the significance and implications of this fact. Most of the property acquired by a husband and wife, or either of them, during their marriage belongs to them jointly and is referred to as "community property". In fact, the law presumes that all property acquired during the marriage is community property unless the contrary is clearly proved.

Not included in this category is property owned by either husband and wife before marriage, and that which is acquired by gift or inheritance. Such items are regarded rather as the separate property of the individual spouse.

May the husband and wife divide their community property so that each will thereafter own one-half of it as his or her own separate property? Until the passage of a recent constitutional amendment, such action was not permitted by our laws. Now, existing community property may be so divided under

certain circumstances. However, an agreement by the husband and wife that future earnings or income will be separate property is invalid.

In contrast, it has always been possible to convert separate property into community property. This is usually done unintentionally when separate property is sold or exchanged, and the parties fail to indicate clearly that the purchase money or the new property is to be the separate property of the husband or wife.

Very often the money received from such a sale of separate property is deposited in the joint bank account of the husband and wife, mixing or "co-mingling" such separate funds with the community funds. This ordinarily results in the entire amount becoming community property through the inability of husband or wife to trace the separate funds at a later date.

The distinction between separate and community property is important for many reasons, and married persons owning separate property should normally exercise

care to prevent its being co-mingled with the community estate. Lawyers say that separate bank accounts and proper records will help keep matters straight.

Failure to use proper safeguards can result in an alteration of the legal order of descent at the death of a person leaving no will, since community property passes in one way and separate property in another. Or, one of the parties may lose his right to will what was once separate property to whom-ever he chooses.

Other consequences include the possibility that the separate property of one spouse may become subject to the debts of the community or of the other spouse. Or, if a divorce should occur, one of the parties may lose part of his separate estate during division of the couple's various properties.

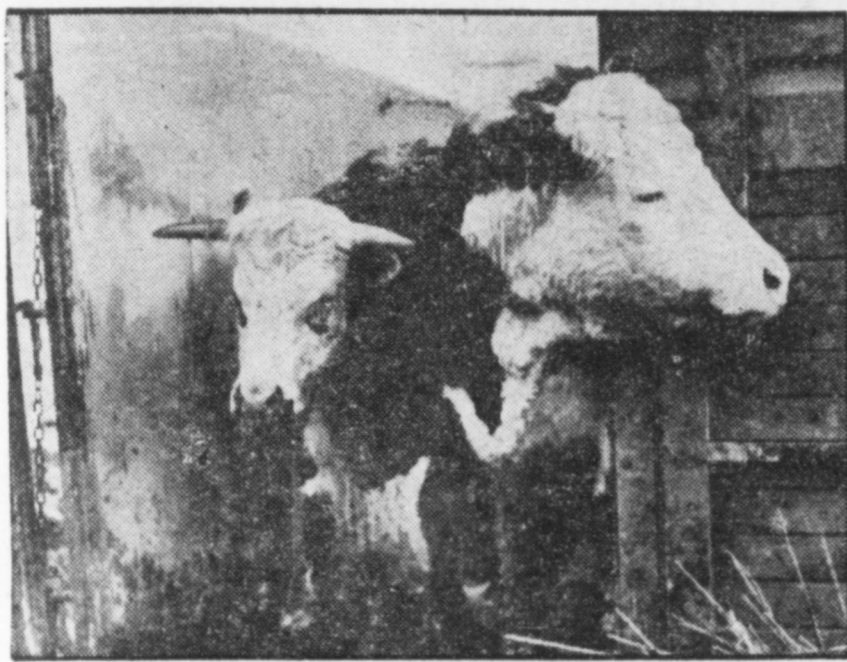

**Health Talks**

Galen, a Roman medical scholar of the first century, presented a unique idea of a health Utopia by writing at great length on how a boy born with a perfect physical structure should be raised to maintain that perfect health. Galen was so intent upon physical health however, that his so-called perfect specimen was to devote himself to no other pastime than the care of his body.

Such preoccupation with health today is considered an unhealthy attitude in itself, but since Galen was a pioneer in the field of physiology he established this hypothetical perfect torso to impress upon his readers some of his ideas about the proper care of the body. And his readers were impressed—so impressed that for about 1500 years, Galen's theories dominated all medical learning.

Even today much of his medical lore remains impressive, though certainly no one today would be encouraged to live for health alone. Health is an important part of life but not the whole of living.

The predominant note of Galen's writing that does hold sway in modern medicine is the damage by excessiveness, too much of anything, even good things. Today as in Galen's day the premise in maintaining a healthy body is the practice of moderation.

The too-muches and the too-littles are the deviations from moderation which can change the most perfect physical specimen into a case history in the doctor's book. An awareness of the needs of the body, which can be gained by a medium of health education, does not mean abnormal preoccupation with thoughts of health.

You don't need to know everything about chemistry and physics in order to drive an automobile, but you do have to learn to drive it. You have to take time to learn the rudiments of driving, which once earned, need little review thereafter. Knowing how to drive the car doesn't make the car run.

You have to know how to stop the car and you have to keep an eye on the traffic in order to avoid mishaps. There are certain safety rules which you not only have to know but you also have to obey.

So it is with health. You may not know the gasoline does not make the car go but you do know that the car needs gasoline, oil and water. It isn't essential that you know what food, air and water do once they get inside of you, but it is essential that you get them to your insides in the proper amounts. A gas tank will hold only so much gasoline before it spills over; your own "gas tank" spills over in the form of excess weight when you eat too much food. Overweight is just as much an indication of waste as the spilling of gas when the tank overflows.

An automobile that is seldom used requires much less refilling of the gas tank than one that is much in motion. A person who exercises little also requires considerably less "gas" than the active person.

Automobiles are wonderful inventions but become a simple toy when compared with the complexities and wonders of the human body and mind. If you would make yourself as aware of the needs and uses of your body as you are of those of your automobile, you would have less apprehension and fear when something does go wrong and you have to haul yourself to the "mechanic". Your doctor is versed in detecting sputters where there should be silences, rattles where there should be silences. But like the automobile mechanic, your doctor often feels that if you had just known how to take care of your "car" in the first place, it wouldn't have gotten into such sad shape.

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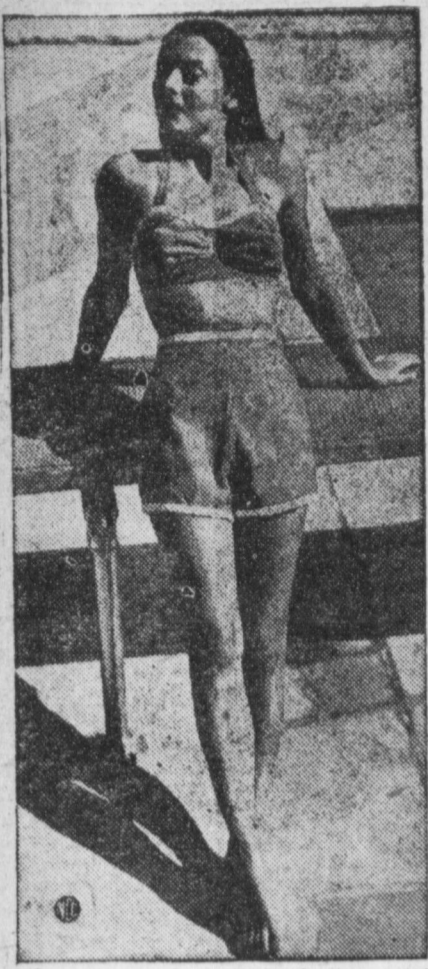

**Navy Seeks College Men For Flight Training**

Single men between 18 and 27 who have completed at least two years of college are needed immediately to apply for the Navy's Flight Training Program, it was announced today by Captain H. R. Nieman, Jr., USN, Commanding Officer of the U.S. Naval Air Station at Dallas.

After having been closed for nearly a year, the Naval Aviation Cadet Program is again "wide open." Captain Nieman's command in Dallas is charged with the responsibility of enlisting Naval Aviation Cadets, or "NavCads," as they are termed, from the State of Texas.

Captain Nieman said that a continuing need exists to interest college students, particularly graduating seniors, in Naval Aviation. For those who expect to have Selective Service obligations to fulfill, Navy flight training offers an alternative to ordinary enlisted service.

Pre-flight and basic training is conducted at the "Annapolis of the Air", Pensacola, Florida. Advance training is carried out at Corpus Christi, Texas. NavCads who successfully complete the 18-month period of training are designated Naval Aviators, and commissioned Ensigns, U. S. Naval Reserve, or 2nd Lieutenants, U. S. Marine Corps Reserve.

NavCads are paid \$105.00 per month, plus food, quarters and uniforms. Pay and allowances upon commissioning amounts to \$355.75 per month without dependents, or \$430.75 with dependents.

Men desiring further information on the program should write NAVCAD, U. S. Naval Air Station, Dallas, Texas. Transportation costs are paid for applicants who wish to take the qualifying physical examinations.

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**Health Talks**

From the top of your head to the tip of your toes you are a closely-woven cloth. Some parts of you are bundled like stalks of sugar cane, some are packaged like bales of cotton, some are braided, some are coiled like spirals, some are hollow shells, some are frothy like cotton candy—all shapes and all forms are present in the human body.

A simpler way of saying it is the old saw "Snakes and snails and puppy dog tails" or "sugar and spice and everything nice."

But the important health fact in what you are made of is that whatever goes into the making, you are continuous. There aren't any seams in you, you are woven and underwoven and overwoven and crosswoven in a continuous pattern. That means that what affects one part of your body necessarily affects all parts, since the body is all a continuous pattern.

The threads with which the pattern of you is woven are handed down from your ancestors. The \$64 medical question is where the weaving starts—what part of the human body is the focal point where the "signals" are set to make you physically and mentally what you are?

This "target" area has been speculated about for centuries, and the present unofficial beginning point is placed, by many, in the pituitary gland. This is a pouch-like gland that hangs down from the floor of the brain, just above the nasal cavity, almost in the exact center of the head.

During childhood, this pituitary gland is divided into two parts, a front and a back part. A third part creeps in between those two pockets and is usually a distinct part of the pituitary in the early teens. You can picture the parts better if you visualize them as signal lights, with the front part as the green light, the middle part as the yellow light and the back part as the red light.

The colors do fit in fairly well with the known functions of the pituitary gland. The front part is thought to be the regulator of growth, the go ahead signal for the weaving of the threads that go into your physical structure. It has an affect upon the other glands of the body and releases cells, called alpha cells, into the bloodstream.

The back part of the pituitary gland, the red light of the signal, may be considered the break, the stop of the pattern. It has an effect upon blood pressure, upon the contraction of muscles, and upon the function of the kidneys. Its cells, called beta cells, also are found in the bloodstream.

The part played by the yellow light, the middle portion of the pituitary gland, is little understood, though some medical scholars believe it has some tie-in with the color changes in parts of the body.

Though diseases of this gland can cause changes from normal in the development of the human physical constitution, it is not the only factor involved in growth and development. The genes, the cells that are handed down from ancestors, are one of the important factors in the pattern of development. The nervous system, too, enters the picture, as well as the pituitary and other endocrine glands which have a bearing upon the stops and goes of growth.

Diseases within the body, anywhere in the body, may change the pattern at any period of a person's development. They may represent broken or knotted threads in the weaving of the cloth that makes up a human being.

**Nurses Are Not Excluded By Social Security**

Private duty nurses are generally self-employed as far as social security is concerned, according to H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Corpus Christi social security office, who explained that some questions have arisen on the type of work.

Some professions named in the law are not covered by social security, but nursing is not one of them.

A nurse who had net income of at least \$400 from private duty in 1951 is required to pay a social security tax on her earnings, and she gets credits for social security benefits. This applies to both registered and practical nurses.

Nurses who work for hospitals or in doctor's offices are employees, and they would be covered by social security as wage earners, Cleveland said. In this case, the employer would report their wages quarterly on his regu-

lar social security return.

Nurses in private homes who do household work and are not under the direction of an attending physician, are generally domestic employees, rather than self-employed. As such they are covered by social security in the same manner as other household workers. They must work for the same household on at least 24 days in a calendar quarter and be paid at least \$50 in cash wages during the quarter, to receive credit for such earnings. The employer in this case would report their wages on a quarterly return.

**House Deletes State Pollution Control Grants**

An amendment deleting the sum of \$800,000, recommended for grants to the states under section 8 of the Water Pollution Act of 1948, has been passed. These grants are used by the states for investigations, research and studies relating to the abatement and prevention of water pollution caused by industrial wastes.

During the past three years these funds have been used wisely in finding approaches to a critical conservation problem and have returned great value to the people of America in relation to the amount expended. Since the grants are made directly to the states, they have furthered the initiative of state agencies in attacking pollution, and conduct vital research through existing agencies and personnel.

A bill introduced by U. S. Congressman T. Millet Hand, would direct the Secretary of the Interior to open "not less than 20 per cent of the total area of the Brigantine National Wildlife Refuge" to hunting each year.

The Hand Bill will undoubtedly receive opposition from thinking sportsmen and others who realize that the refuge system is one of the first lines of defense in the preservation of free water fowl hunting in North America. The Bill contains no discretionary clause, making the opening of the affected refuges mandatory without consideration of the status of the waterfowl crop. The act of Congress which raised the price of the Migratory Bird Hunting Stamp last year, provided for the opening to public hunting up to 20 per cent of the areas of wild life refuge at the discretion of the Secretary of the Interior in years when the waterfowl pollution is

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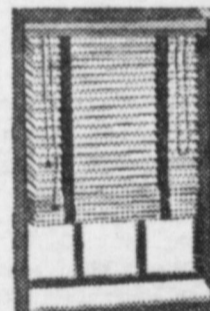
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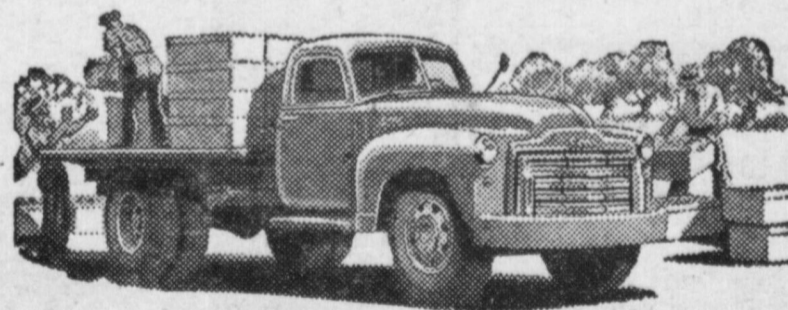
