The boards are authorized to induct men 20 years old, if necessary, but can go no lower unless a man is a delinquent or a volun-

General Wakefield indicated that the state will have a physical examination schedule of around 3,-000 men a month during the summer, beginning in June. He said such intention is subject to-revision month-by-month.

A total of 2,965 are scheduled for the pre-induction physical and mental examination in May. In addition, a May call for the reexamination of 624 4-F regstrants was mailed to 43 boards from state headquarters, April 28.







Selective Service Qualification Tests Will Be Held May 22

Austin, Texas. - An additional Selective Service college qualification test to be held May 22 at 60 testing centers in Texas for the benefit of students prevented by illness or other emergency from taking the test in December and April was announced recently by Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state draft director.

General Wakefield emphasized that students who have a certificate of admission for either the December or April tests which they failed to use on the assigned date must submit a new application if they wish to take the May

Application blanks for the May 22 test may be obtained from the nearest local board and should be sent in as soon as possible to the Educational Testing Service, Princeton, New Jersey. Applications postmarked later than midnight, May 10, 1952, will not be accepted.

The test on May 22 will be given at more than 1,000 testing centers throughout the nation.

Students who attain a prescribed upper class standing or make a score of 70 or better on the May 22 test are eligible for consideration by their local boards for deferment during the next academic

Local boards are not required to defer students who meet one or both of the criteria, General Wakefield pointed out, but their classifications are subject to appeal.

These columns go something like this: "Did you know that humpback whales are addicted to snoring? That bees have been bred with red, brown, and buff-color eyes?




