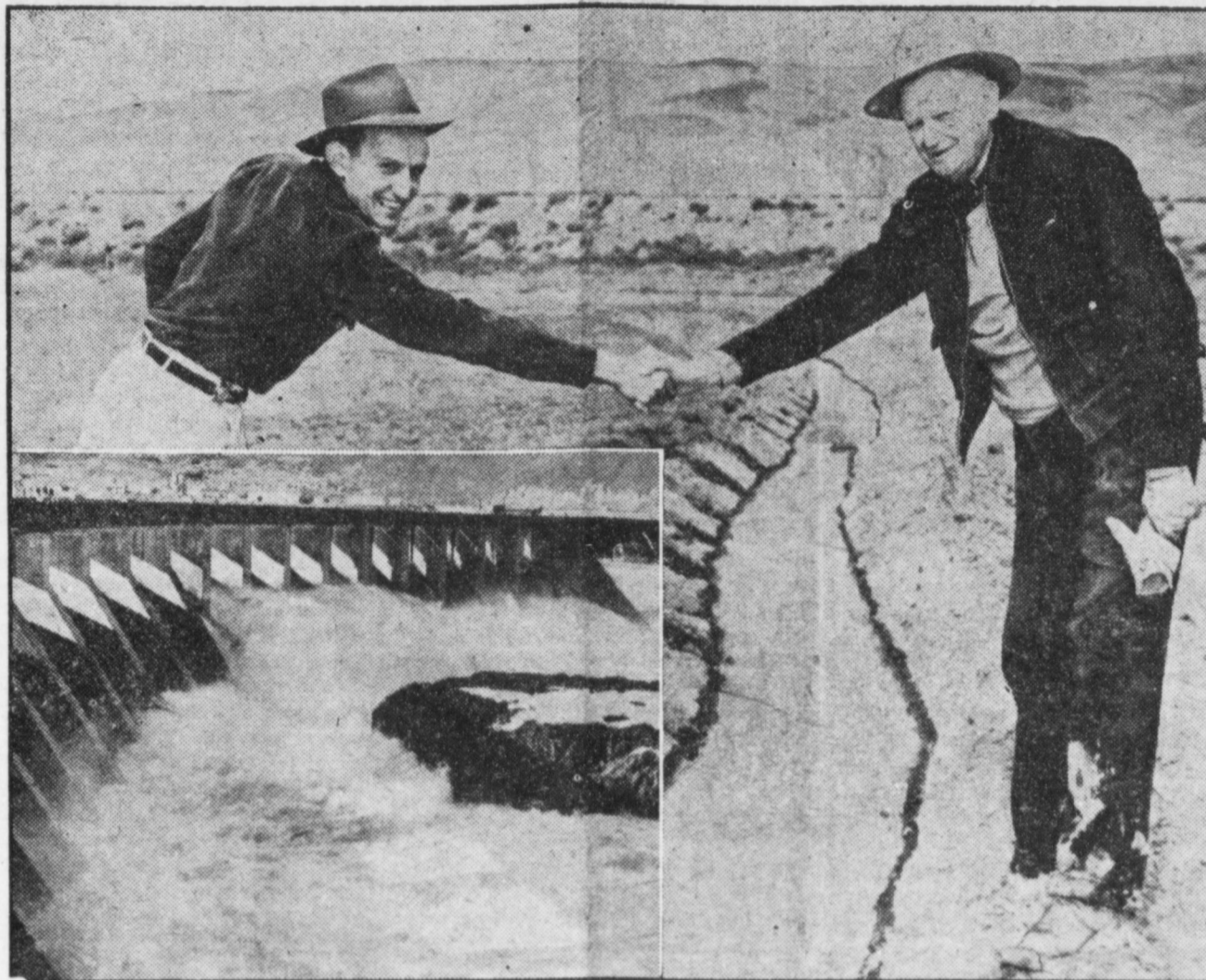

Wildlife Conference In Nation's Capitol

The 18th North American Wildlife Conference will convene in the nation's capitol on March 9, 10 and 11, 1953. It is the largest international meeting of its kind on the continent devoted to the improved management, conservation and restoration of renewable natural resources.

The disastrous floods in the midwest call for an immediate re-evaluation of national flood control policies. The entire current national policy is fallacious in that it expends its resources in a frontal attack on nature instead of softening the blow and rolling with the punch. While complete prevention is as impossible as complete control, a program designed to hold the water on the land through revegetation, head-water retention and soil conservation would make control of dangerous surplus water much simpler, less expensive and more permanent.

Mass Chest X-ray Scheduled In June

The mass chest X-ray for Aransas County will be held again this year at the Post Office in Rockport on the 18th and 19th of June, from 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.

This is a service paid for by the taxpayers and everyone is entitled to this privilege of having their chests X-rayed and be sure there is no abnormal condition.

It is hoped that everyone over fifteen years of age will be X-rayed as the machine can take care of 800 persons a day and if Aransas County does not make a good showing other counties may have the use of the machine next year when it is needed here.

The first year, 1949, the mass X-ray was held in Aransas County 59.7 per cent of the eligible population came. There were 20 cases of tuberculosis suspects and 15 other chest abnormal conditions. In April, 1950, 38.2 per cent of the eligibles came. There were fewer cases found, and in July, 1951, only 22.9 per cent were X-rayed, finding 10 cases of tuberculosis and 2 other abnormal chest conditions.

Aransas Try Cores Below 9,710 Feet

A projected 10,000-foot, Humble Oil and Refining Co. No. 1 Aransas Bay State Tract 116, wildcat, six miles northeast of Rockport in the East Fulton area, was coring at 8,029 feet with a diamond core bit.

A. O. Phillips and others No. 1 L. E. Sanders, scheduled 8,500-foot wildcat in the Fulton townsite, was drilling at 2,475 feet. Running log upon reaching 7,000 feet and attaching mud logger was planned. TG&M has the contract.

Log was being run to 7,250 feet in Phillips No. 38 Copano Bay State Tract 30 in the West Fulton Beach Field.

Running an electric log to 9,600 feet was scheduled in Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 32 Copano Bay State, Fulton Beach West Field test in State Tract 65.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 37 Copano Bay State Tract 65, bot-tomed at 7,105 feet in the Fulton Beach West Field, was running 5 1/2-inch casing.

Sun Oil Co. No. 1 Aransas Bay State Tract 79, Lamar Field test, was testing through perforations at 7,598-7,610 feet.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 14 Copano State, in Copano Bay Field will be 1,980 feet from the south and 660 from the west lines of State Tract 16. Permit depth is 9,000 feet.

Sun Stakes Deep Test In Aransas

Roads were being built preparatory to starting operations on a planned 12,000-foot Aransas County wildcat approximately 1/2-mile southeast of Lamar.

Sun Oil Co. No. 2 State Tract 66 Aransas State is 330 feet from the north and west lines of State Tract 66 in a subdivision of Aransas Bay. It scales 2,550 feet northeast of Goose Island.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 1 Lamar (Preston Paul and others) wildcat eight miles north of Rockport, had run electric log to 9,800 feet, the total depth, and was waiting on orders. This test is in M. Hunt Survey, A-79.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 34 Copano Bay State Tract 37, in Lamar Field, has reported final gauge of 75.82 barrels of 47.5 gravity oil daily through 3/4-inch choke from 136 perforations at 7,117-42 feet. Tubing pressure was 1,300 pounds. Gas-oil ratio was 19,800-1.

ROCKPORT "Toast of the Coast"

The Bar Harbor and Newport of Texas

They call Rockport "the Toast of the Coast," and with good reason.

For Rockport can match Newport or Bar Harbor millionaire for millionaire, mink for mink, Cadillac for Cadillac, and in beauty and charm—and still have left half a hundred oil wells in change.

Nature has been generous to our great state; but in Aransas County—where Rockport is the county seat—she was positively lavish. Not one but seven bays are within casting distance. Aransas and Copano are the two largest; and all, including Red Fish, Mission and St. Charles, are so breathtakingly blue and beautiful that we had to pinch ourselves to realize we were not in the Land of Oz. The 184,000 acres of bay make quite a bit of "working" water for the fishermen and hunters. For variety take your choice of trout and red fish, flounder, drum, sheepshead, golden croaker and topsails and even silver tarpon—of ducks and wild geese; redheads, mallards, blue bills, or pin wheels. And after getting his limit in an almost disgustingly short time, your sportsman can spend the afternoon in adding up a sizeable string of 50 to 100 speckled trout. Yes, it's true.

One of the finest yacht harbors on the Gulf Coast, the "Fish Bowl," is located within walking distance of the business section of Rockport where all supplies are available. Marine ways can handle craft up to 100 feet in length and seven-foot draft. Bay fishing is excellent until Decem-

ber, and during the winter months fine catches are also made in the Yacht Basin.

Where is this fabulous place? Along Highway 35 known as "Hug the Coast Highway" just four hours drive from Houston, 170 miles south of San Antonio, and just four hours from the Rio Grande Valley. The thermometer rarely climbs above 88 and seldom drops to the freezing mark in winter. Cool and refreshing sea breezes make it delightful in the summer and warm Gulf waters bring moderate weather in the winter. The average winter temperature is 79.6. And that's that. Let's all strike oil, go to Rockport and retire, and hope to live forever!

Speaking of oil—there are derricks even sticking their heads up out of the bays, and the land is already dotted with "Christmas trees." Just how indulgent can Mother Nature be to some of her favorites?

Our visit began by seeing vivacious little Mrs. Mary Juergens, secretary-manager of the Chamber of Commerce, which has offices in the Rice Boat Company building, but which "will soon have a new place" by the water's edge, and next to the Woman's Club. She was "from some other place," and had stayed after her husband's death because she "loves Rockport and loves the people."

"Let's see, you must see our Marine Laboratory. J. L. Baughman in charge is so smart—he has written loads of articles and books, and is utterly fascinating." It didn't take a little black book to make a note of that.

"Then the Woman's Club—did you know that the women bought that building from the Humble Oil Company at Ingleside just three years ago. They raised the money at once, had it brought over—a brick veneer building—then had that beautiful native stone put on. Do go by there. Mrs. Jack Hagar is the present president. She is an eminent ornithologist.

Members of the Audubon Society come to see her frequently. And, we waited for the question, "did you know the Rockport waterfront is a wild life refuge? Rockport is the only city in the United States where ducks can be observed from the main street. All of the waterfront is a protected area for the

waterfowl. Just 40 miles from here," she added, "is the Aransas Wildlife Refuge, the only known wintering ground of the whooping crane. It was bought by the government fifteen years ago—used to be called Blackjack Peninsula because of the blackjack oaks. (Continued on page 5)

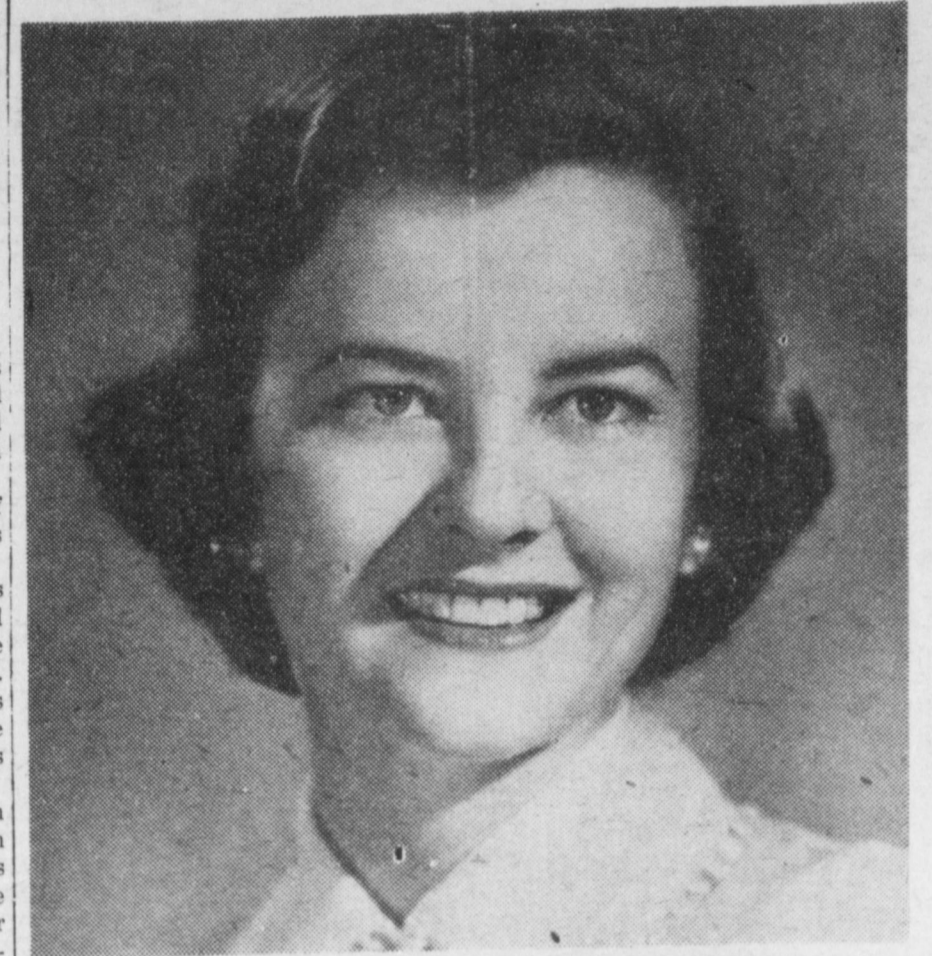

official historian. We are just bursting with history, too, and he knows all about everything and everybody. He is nice and will be glad to show you around," she concluded.

The first stop was at the \$80,000 Marine Laboratory down by the waterfront. We gazed at some most interesting and unusual fish caught in these parts, and then met Mr. Baughman.

Since Mr. Baughman has written about 40 technical papers, innumerable magazine articles, and not a few books on fish and natural history, the knowledge we attempted to assimilate in a few minutes left us dizzy, to put it mildly.

The Marine Laboratory was completed in Rockport in 1948, and is the largest and best equipped laboratory in the entire South. The location on the shore of Aransas Bay was chosen because it was believed to be in the center of the most desirable habitat and terrain on the Texas coast for the work that needed to be done.

"But," according to Mr. Baughman, "the first collection of fishes in this region for scientific reasons was made by John H. Clark in 1851."

Since the fishing industry, especially shrimping, is one of the biggest industries in the Rockport-Fulton area, the research is invaluable. As early as 1890 Charles H. Stevenson canvassed the coast, and at the time 1277 people were engaged in commercial fishing, taking out 7,961,400 pounds valued at \$313,912. From Aransas Bay came 1,244,100 pounds of these fish. And all delicious, too! Have you ever eaten Redfish? The catch today is something over 4,000,000 pounds worth an annual \$1,311,000.

Lucky day! The next stop was at the "Woman's Club." We "crashed a party," the weekly bridge and canasta party for tourists.

Not only is there a weekly party for ladies, but there is also an

evening party for men and women, and in the summer, a regular dance for teen agers.

The Woman's Club is federated, and its place as a civic institution as well as a social one is not to be disputed. This year's study sounded tremendously interesting. They were learning all about their own Live Oak Peninsula by research and well prepared talks.

The English department of their progressive school—a new \$350,000 building is soon to be erected for the Junior High—was cooperating with the ladies in their study, and the children were fascinated with the project.

The history of Rockport-Fulton, and surrounding countryside including the old town of Lamar, is utterly fascinating; and in the course of a trip with Mr. Traylor, the old was mingled with the new, as quaint old houses carefully preserved or restored were seen in chummy juxtaposition to the new, often luxurious homes of present residents—most of them sitting high on the bluff with its fantastically lovely windblown live-oaks. Mr. Traylor kindly pointed out the homes of various notables as he told the past history of the Rockport area. Never have I spent a more enjoyable afternoon.

The first colony to be established in Aransas County was made up of a group of Irish settlers, most of whom were brought direct from Ireland by James Power in about 1827. After Colonel Power settled his colony, he established his home on the high bluff at the extreme end of Live Oak Peninsula, locating it among the stately oak trees overlooking the waters of both Copano and Aransas bays.

Long before Aransas County was organized, even during the period of the revolution and the war between the states, several settlements had been established in the area now comprising the county. Foremost among these settlements was the town of Lamar which was so named after Texas' President Mirabeau B. Lamar, who had conceived the necessity of establishing an important port

in this section of Texas. He supported a well equipped merchandising establishment that supplied a wide scope of country and did wholesaling business as well as export and import trade. An earthen dyke, large enough to accommodate vehicle travel, which was used as a wharf, was constructed from the shore to the channel for convenience of shipping.

The first efforts to build a city where Rockport now stands were made in 1837, shortly after the battle of San Jacinto, and inhabitants of the area envisioned the establishment of a port. With these first efforts a brick making plant was set up, but titles to land were uncertain, and only slow progress was made until the project was abandoned.

It was in 1867 that J. M. Mathis, T. H. Mathis and J. M. Doughty, trying to find a safe harbor to unload cattle, landed on a rocky point. They were so impressed with the possibilities of the location as a shipping point that they obtained the right to lay out a townsite, which was known as the Doughty and Mathis Subdivision. Because of the rocky point on which they had landed and their hopes of building a great seaport, the men named the new settlement Rockport.

The sturdily built residence of the T. H. Mathis family still stands, and has been restored and redecorated by Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Fowler. It has been furnished with priceless antiques in furniture and in china, and retains its old world charm with additional modern luxurious conveniences. It is a show place, and yet a delightful home.

In the early days many thousands of dollars were spent in the construction of jetties over the Aransas Bay, and more than a million dollars worth of real estate was lost as bonuses.

Products of cattle and meat from four large canneries were moved by boats of the Morgan Steamship line, which made regular weekly trips bringing back freight for Corpus Christi, St. Mary's, Copano and other points. As many as seven large steamers a week were loaded and unloaded at Rockport until the rails of the San Antonio and Aransas Pass railroad reached the town in 1888.

A colorful character in the old days was Colonel George W. Fulton, an account of whose achievements would fill a book. His mansion, an ancient structure still stands, and looms up on the bay amid the live oaks—a giant of a house, and still surprisingly sturdy. Fulton, a cousin of the famous inventor, as a young engineer surveyed the coastline north from Nueces to the Guadalupe River. He also was Texas' first customs collector. After marrying Miss Harriet Smith, daughter of Henry Smith, last provisional governor of Texas, he built his famous mansion. He became a rich cattle baron, and increased his holdings to thousands of acres. Fulton established one of the first meat packeries, and it is said that in it, in 1871 the first packing house refrigeration in America was installed. Turtles were prepared for shipping on this sophisticated coast, and Rockport-Fulton boasted more population and wealth than Corpus Christi, 30 miles away. Stockmen drove their cattle to the coast where Fulton and his partners also sold their longhorns. Slaughtering at first was for hides and tallow; and flat-bottomed, side wheeled steamers took these cargoes to New Orleans. Before the packers knew how to preserve meat, they gave the best steaks and roasts to the townspeople, and burned the rest. Imagine!

We went to St. Mary's where the Wood family once owned 36,000 acres in one pasture, and for con-

venience built their own church in their home (still standing) and then to Lamar—perhaps of all the adjacent communities, the oldest. Settlers came there in 1838, and some remains of the concrete and adobe houses they built are still standing. A restored Catholic chapel on an enviable site overlooking the blue windswept bay bears the imaginative name of "Our Lady Star of the Sea." Also, in this paradoxical land where murderous Indians roamed was a fashionable girls' school!

But we musn't linger too long, reluctant as we are to come back to the 20th Century. Rockport-Fulton from a bustling past entered into a somnolent decline, but now the community is quite active again.

Commercial fishing has expanded; oil, which we touched on lightly, is definitely there in quantity as the activities of such companies as Hunt, Humble and Placid indicate; the tourist trade in both summer and winter, though formerly taken care of by a number of well-equipped courts, is getting out of bounds—2500 extra guests in summer, 1000 in the winter.

The beautiful homes on the bluff are owned by our economically privileged citizenry, so to speak, from all over the state; and now, even a few choice "Yankee" representatives can be found in the colony. Never having been gifted in mathematics, we would hate to attempt to estimate the staggering total of the fortunes suggested by these names, all housed cozily on the shores of the blue bays. They are the O'Connors, Tom and Dennis from Victoria, Mrs. Van Petty of San Antonio; John Shook and S. G. Tayloe also of San Antonio; the Larsens of Houston, James A. Jarboe formerly of Fort Worth and T. Noah Smith who gets by with only three yachts . . . The ultra, ultra St. Charles Hunting and Fishing Club is in the neighborhood, and its fortunate members bask in a golden fraternity that would cause the green-eyed monster of envy to rear its
