City Council Met Tuesday Night

The City Council held its regular meeting Tuesday night, May 27, 1952.

Mayor Travis Bailey and Aldermen J. P. Hanway, J. H. Ray, J. W. Hunt and T. D. Picton were present.

A delegation of about twenty citizens visited the Council and Fred Christilles ask for an open alley through the back of his property, or build a bulkhead in front for a road. The Council agreed to cooperate in some way to help the property owners on the beach whose front lots are being used for a road. A motion was made by Picton and seconded by Hanway that the Mayor appoint two of the aldermen to see whether it will be best to build a bulkhead or open a street where the alley is in back of the beach property. More Wildcats Slated For Drilling

Hunt Oil Co. will drill its No. 1, State Tract 81 as an Aransas County wildcat three miles northwest of Fulton.

Location is 660 feet from the north and east lines of State Tract 81 in Aransas. Permit depth is 10,000 feet. This test is about 3,000 feet east-southeast of the Copano Bay causeway.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 1 Lamar (Preston Paul and others) wildcat eight miles north of Rockport, M. Hunt Survey, was drilling below 10,307 feet.

Western Natural Gas Co. No. 1 St. Charles Bay State Tract 373, wildcat six miles northeast of Lamar, was drilling at 8,189 feet after earlier running log to 8,106 feet. Permit depth is 11,500 feet. Shelby-Walker Corp. and Joseph T. Dawson No. 1 Travis Bailey, wildcat three miles northwest of Rockport, Joseph Fessenden Survey, was drilling plugs from 10 3/4-inch casing at 1,015 feet. Permit depth is 7,500 feet.

Sun Oil Co. No. 1 St. Charles State Tract 385, wildcat two miles east of Lamar, was preparing to run 10 1/2-inch casing after drilling to 1,115 feet. The test is projected to 11,500 feet.

Humble Oil and Refining Co. No. 1 Aransas Bay State Tract 116, wildcat six miles northeast of Rockport, was waiting on cement after placing cement plug in a hole in surface casing at 3,345 feet.

Sun Oil Co. No. 2 Aransas State Tract 66, wildcat approximately 1/2 mile southeast of Lamar, had completed roads and was filling in drilling pad. The test is in Sub-division of Aransas Bay.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 44 Copano Bay State Tract 30, in Fulton Beach West Field, will be 660 feet from the south and east lines of Tract 30. Projected to 7,225 feet, location will be 1,525 feet north-northeast of Phillips No. 38 State Tract 30 location.

Phillips No. 38 Copano Bay West Field test, was cleaning on perforations at 6,215-20 feet, with total depth 7,250 feet. Tubing pressure was 825 pounds.

Phillips No. 37 Copano Bay State Tract 65, Fulton Beach West Field, was completed for 88 barrels of 39 gravity oil through a 9 5/8-inch tubing choke from perforations at 6,245-50 feet. Tubing pressure was 500 pounds and casing was sealed. Gas-oil ratio was 970.1.

Also in the field, Phillips No. 32 Copano Bay State Tract 65 was preparing to squeeze perforations in 7-inch casing from 6,550-52 feet, with total depth 9,710 feet, was reoperating a higher section than planned.

Sun Oil Co. No. 1 Aransas State Tract 79, in Lamar iFeld, recovered .86 million cubic feet of gas and 4.44 barrels of distillate on a test through 1/4-inch choke from perforations at 7,348-58 feet. Tubing pressure was 767 pounds.

Red Cross Blood Mobile Comes To Rockport

Seth Steele, chairman of the Aransas County Chapter of the American Red Cross, called a meeting of representatives of the various organizations in the county Monday afternoon at the court house to discuss having the Red Cross Blood Mobile visit Aransas County.

Miss McAfee, district representative from Corpus Christi, met with the Rockport chapter. Miss McAfee stated that the American Red Cross is only a coordinating agency with the Defense Department of the U. S. Armed Forces in the blood mobile movement, and that every drop of blood taken is sent to a point designated by the Defense Department. The Red Cross has some blood depots in hospitals, but it was not taken by a blood mobile unit.

July 21 is the date scheduled for the blood mobile to come to Aransas County, and the unit will be at the Woman's Club building. The age limit is from 21 through 59 years for blood donors and minors from 18, through 20 who may donate blood with the consent of their parents.

Two committee chairmen were appointed, Mrs. J. H. Mills to see after the building, getting nurses and other helpers and obtaining refreshments, etc. R. R. Rice is chairman of the recruiting committee.

Dual Completion On Well At Fulton

The Frances E. Sanders, oil well at Fulton was brought in a dual completion, Tuesday, May 27, by Thomas E. Beard, production man for the A. O. Phillips Oil Company of Dallas.

On a low estimate the well will make 50,000,000 cubic feet of gas a day with an average of 40 barrels of distillate for each million cubic feet of gas, or 2,000 barrels of distillate daily on casing with 7/64-inch choke.

The tubing with 550 pound pressure on the well head will produce 150 barrels of 45 gravity oil daily. This is the best well produced so far in this area, according to Bonner Smith.

An example of human good will and material reciprocity, the following incident is outstanding. Some six years ago when the terrible disaster at Texas City sickened the world, Rockport was the first to respond with financial help and was one of the most generous. And Texas City has not forgotten, last month when an Aransas County woman became desperately ill in Galveston, her family appealed locally for blood donors. Eight were needed badly and as often the case, the appeal went to Rockport's Veterans of Foreign Wars, and was handled by Commander McElveen. Eight veterans volunteered, but rather than have them leave work to make the long round trip, Commander McElveen phoned Mr. Pointsley, Texas City V.F.W. Commander and requested his help. The response was instantaneous and willing. Mr. Pointsley immediately contacted his own membership, eight of whom went to the John Sealy Hospital in Galveston, fifteen miles away and gave the needed blood.

This was American fellowship at its best. Quite possibly none of the eight ever knew that Rockport had contributed to Texas City's welfare. Most certainly they did not know the person they helped save, nor would it have made and difference. They were ask to help so they helped. That is America's way. xxx

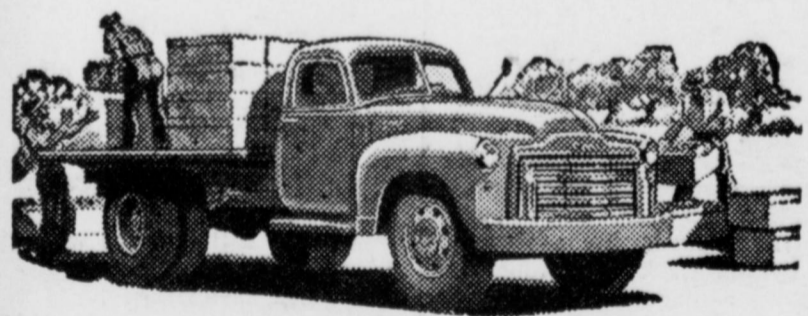

Mr. Donaldson thinks his best work has been done here in Rockport, and while no poems of a local nature were included in the present volume by those authorities who selected the contents, he is working on a group of poems dealing with the local scene which he hopes to complete and publish when time permits. After his pen having been dry, so to speak, for a number of years it began to flow again in 1943, producing "Odysseys." This was followed by "Fantasia," "Polestar of Song," "To Jet Pilots," "Pagans," "Take Time at Plowing," "Following," and "Western Summary." Also the humorous skits "The Disunited States," "Old Dog Learns New Tricks," and "Labor Day Hymn."

Mr. Donaldson has been a resident of Rockport since 1940, a member of the Southwest Writers' Conference for the past three years. It was because of the encouragement and counsel of the director and staff members of the Conference that the book was produced.

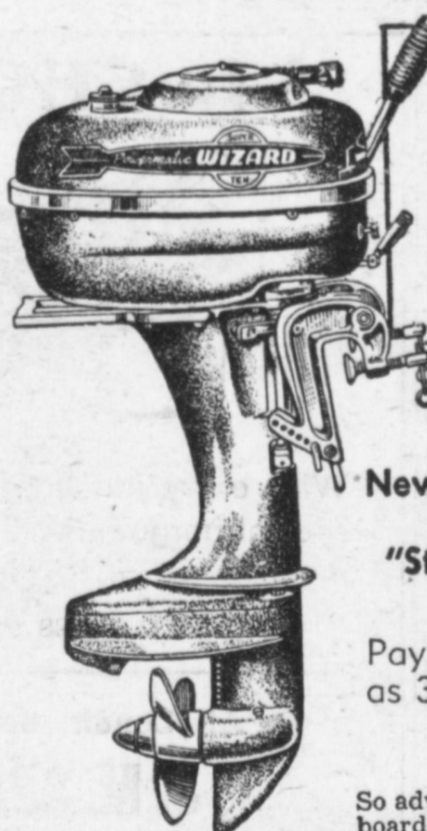
