The fishing in the bays in this area is really good now, plenty of warm sunshine and not too much wind.

Perry Jones reports that the fish are biting out at his wharf, but most fishermen waiting for the 4th of July to catch them.

Sun Oil Co. Wildcat Drilling at 6,895 Feet, Another Squeezes

Sun Oil Co. No. 2 Aransas Bay State Tract 66, wildcat approximately one-half mile southeast of Lamar, was drilling at 6,895 feet on a 12,000-foot project the first of the week. The test is in Sub-division of Aransas Bay.

Sun Oil Co. No. 1 St. Charles State Tract 385, wildcat two miles east of Lamar, was preparing to squeeze perforations at 8,404-35 feet after recovering salt water with a trace of oil at that level.

The Atlantic Refining Co. No. 1 Aransas Bay State Tract 123, in East Fulton Beach Field, will be 660 feet from the north and east lines of Tract 123. Permit depth is 8,500 feet.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 1 Lamar (Preston Paul and others) wildcat eight miles north of Rockport, was fishing at 10,755 feet. This test is in M. Hunt Survey, A-79.

Highway Patrol Urges Texans Be Cautious Over July 4th Holidays

Austin, Tex. — Most Texans are looking forward eagerly to the long three-day Fourth of July holiday this year but there is one group who eye the prospects with a tongue-in-cheek attitude. They are Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety and the personnel of his Highway Patrol Division.

Garrison pointed out today that while the nation would be celebrating the birth of its independence Americans generally would find themselves "slaves" of the traffic menace. In Texas alone, he said, 42 persons will lose their lives in traffic accidents on July 4, 5 and 6.

The extra-long holiday period will flood the highways with additional automobiles filled with vacationists and pleasure seekers bound for beaches, rodeos, ball games, parks, night spots and every conceivable place of recreation. Hundreds will be hospitalized as the result of traffic injuries and the morgue with claim the toll of 42.

In appealing to his fellow Texans to break the fetters of traffic "slavery" by cautious motoring, Garrison said: "There is no justifiable reason why intelligent people should slaughter themselves in their quest for a good time. We take no pride at all in the fact that our statisticians can predict with considerable accuracy the disaster on our highways. They know that lack of observance of the traffic laws is responsible for the vast majority of highway deaths and our best recourse is a preventative measure is to appeal directly to the drivers. We urge you to practice a safe and sane Fourth behind the wheel of your car. And, remember . . . in driving, as in a ball game, it's not how many times you start that counts but how many times you reach home safely."

Cochran Writes Land Commissioner Regarding Local Oil Activities

The following letter by M. W. Cochran, addressed to Bascom Giles, Commissioner of the General Land Office, should prove of interest to many residing on Live Oak Peninsula:

June 27, 1952

Mr. Bascom Giles, Commissioner General Land Office State of Texas Austin, Texas Dear Mr. Giles:

Many visitors state that Aransas Bay is Texas' most attractive inland bay. The water is clear and deep enough to provide good fishing. The shoreline also offers the natural facilities for recreation.

Here the rugged live oaks have withstood the ravages of fire and devastation. This Live Oak peninsula with its beautiful water front is unquestionably a natural resource of state-wide interest. It is more and more becoming a resort and recreational area on a national basis.

We have another resource of which we are proud. The oil and gas development on this peninsula and in our bay waters is of benefit to us as well as to the State and nation.

Unfortunately, too many of those who drill for oil and gas have little regard for our other natural resources, such as the trees and the Bay. They destroy the trees with reckless abandon and even pile them so that they become fuel to increase the hazard of fire.

They build tee-heads which cut off the natural current and circulation of the water near the shore. These tee-heads collect rubbish and add stagnant water to the shoreline. They dredge channels to drill within a few hundred feet of the shore and deposit the hydraulic waste in good free water, thus creating shoals. In two specific cases the dredges have just completed two channels to within a few hundred feet of the shore north of Fulton. They deposited their hydraulic excavation in five to six feet of water to such an extent that ugly shoals stick up a foot or more above water.

The shore line opposite their excavation has been eaten away by several storms until the County Bay recreational roadway is threatened. For a very little more cost—while the hydraulic excavation has been deposited in a most unworthy manner, this fill deposit could have been placed along the roadway. It could have been deposited in a rough manner, and the county could fine-grade it. The net result would have been a benefit to our bay front and not a thoughtless liability.

Am I asking too much when I request your consideration and action to help preserve the fine natural resources of the Aransas Bay water front? Certainly those who follow us will be grateful in ever increasing numbers.

I and many of my fellow citizens will be glad to help in whatever manner you may suggest.

Provisions have been made by James Clark Herring, the county clerk, to accept all absentee ballots properly cast, in ballot boxes in his office.

Absentee voting begins July 6, 1952, and ends July 22, 1952, three days prior to the primary election day on July 26, 1952.

All candidates for public office must file their third report of campaign receipts and expenditures by July 7, 1952. Forms may be obtained in the office of James Clark Herring, county clerk.

Sailboat Races Will Entertain Visitors Over 4th

Local citizens and visitors in the Rockport area over the July 4 weekend will have an opportunity to witness a number of sailboat races to be staged on those days—July 4, 5, and 6. Travis Bailey and Steirly Rozzell are in charge of arrangements.

An attempt is being made to hold these races close enough into shore so they will be of interest to spectators. In the small boat races this will be easy to do, and in some of the races, the basin will probably be used as a turning point. It will be necessary for the larger boats, sailing a 15 mile triangular course, to be off shore some distance but always in clear view of the spectators along the beach and the start and finish line will be just opposite the fishing pier, where maneuvers for starting will take place.

Ten large boats, over 25 feet and approximately 16 under 25 feet, together with some fifteen or more small boats (penguins) are expected. These small penguins are brightly colored, both the boat and sails and are very interesting to watch.

Among the boats expected is Mr. Fred Petch of Point Isabel and McAllen, who has a very light weight 36 foot sail boat, having an aluminum mast. Declaration of Independence Expresses Basic American Principles

Our Declaration of Independence, signed 176 years ago, is considered by lawyers as expressing a basic principle of our American way of life—our belief in a government of laws rather than a government of men, and in certain individual rights that must not be denied by governing bodies.

The indictments set out in the document against King George III of Great Britain charge him with numerous violations of that tenet. Among the complaints enumerated are the following:

"He has dissolved Representative Houses repeatedly, for opposing with manly firmness his invasions on the rights of the people.

"He has obstructed the administration of justice, by refusing his assent for laws for establishing judiciary powers.

"He has made judges dependent upon his will alone, for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries.

"He has refused his assent to laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.

"He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his assent to their acts of pretended legislation: . . . For depriving us, in many cases, of the benefits of trial by jury; for transporting us beyond seas to be tried for pretended offences; . . . for taking away our charters, abolishing our most valuable laws, and altering fundamentally the forms of our governments; . . . for suspending our own legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever."

Our forefathers who subscribed to the principles of the Declaration of Independence were willing to fight for their beliefs. The Revolutionary War followed, dragging through weary years of suffering and suspense. Each of us takes pride in their eventual triumph over gigantic obstacles.

In 1787, when the framers of our Constitution met at Independence Hall in Philadelphia, where the Declaration of Independence had been signed 11 years previously, they set to work to create a system of checks and balances, in government which was to perpetuate the fundamental theory mentioned in the preamble of the earlier document:

"We hold these truths to be self-

evident: That all men are created equal; that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights; that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.

"That to secure these rights, governments are instituted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed; . . ."

Some 5 years later, the first ten amendments to our Constitution were adopted at one time, specifically detailing various basic civil rights stemming from the underlying theory of the Declaration of Independence.

Our courts day by day guard these rights for us.

Dove and Duck Poll Heavy

Austin, Tex. — The executive secretary of the Game & Fish Commission reported that advocates of "normal" opening dates for mourning doves and waterfowl now dominate the sportsmen's poll.

Earlier totals showed north zone voters seeking a later dove opener than the southern hunters. The last compilation indicated a predominance favoring the opener for September 1, the same as last year. South zone hunters generally prefer an earlier opener than the November 15 date of last year. The favorite waterfowl opening date for north Texas voters is November 1, although 430 preferred October 15 and 374 wanted December 1. The south state voters prefer November 20.

The Commission will study the poll returns in making its hunting season recommendations to the Fish & Wildlife Service which regulates shooting of migratory game.

The state usually is zoned for doves but not for waterfowl.

Texans Warned of Holiday Hazards

Austin, Tex. — On July 4, 1952, Texans will celebrate the 176th anniversary of our national independence.

Thousands of persons in Texas will enjoy this national holiday, and it is up to all of us to do everything possible to see that this day brings pleasure and not tragedy, says a warning from the State Department of Health.

"While there certainly is no desire to minimize the joys of this nation-wide holiday," said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, "it is only common sense to respect hazards to life and limb, and to govern one's actions accordingly."

"Not so many years ago the newspapers on each July 5, would publish columns detailing the tragedies that were invariably associated with the handling of dangerous fireworks by careless persons. For a number of years now, however, the press has been placing particular emphasis on the need for a 'Safe and Sane Fourth of July,' with the result that accidents of this kind have decreased.

"All injuries, however slight, may carry the lock-jaw or tetanus menace with them. Every wound should be cleaned thoroughly and all foreign matter removed. A physician should be consulted immediately, and tetanus antitoxin administered if necessary.

"Unfortunately, while the hazard of handling fireworks has consistently diminished, that of the automobile has just as consistently been increasing. Every one will agree that to be careless in the operation of a motor vehicle on this day when the roads carry peak loads, is to invite possible injury and even death.

"Your future happiness and health and that of your family may depend on your recognizing and carrying out the ordinary rules of precaution. Obey these rules and live to enjoy many other fourths of July."
