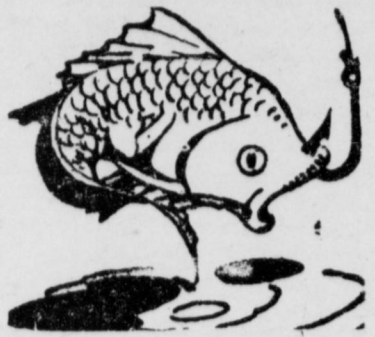

Along The Waterfront



The tide is high in this area and there should be plenty of good fishing as soon as the weather settles. The thunder showers and squalls keep the fish from biting freely, although there are many getting large strings of fish.

At the Jolly Roger, those fishing from the pier are catching reds, sheepshead and drum every day.

Mr. Luthey and Mr. Lusk fished with Fred Christilles Thursday, getting 38 nice large trout; on Friday, Dr. and Mrs. Grizzaffi and two sons from South Texas, caught 78 large trout. John Dawson got 48 Saturday, and Wesley Nelius and party from Houston, landed 64 Sunday. John Coffee and party of Houston, fished with Christilles Monday, bringing in 32 large trout and Tuesday, A. T. Heinen of San Antonio, caught 100.

The water is a little rough in the back bay too, but there were nice strings of fish caught at Perry Jones' Bait House over the weekend.

Earle Thomas had Ben Morrill and party from Houston out fishing Thursday, getting 46 trout, and J. R. Guile and party from La Marque, Texas, caught 53 Saturday. Sunday Mr. Thomas said he had the "United Nations" out fishing with him. They were Karl Bunchedler Tollered from Sweden, Ernesto Papizzi Melano from Italy, and Werner D. Gosch, Brenman, Germany. They caught 84 trout. These men are stopping at Hallettsville, studying farming, cotton markets and etc.

At Johnson's Bait Stand most fishermen get a few reds and trout and some are taking some nice strings of fish.

J. H. B. Hendricks and party from Dallas and Grand Prairie, fished with Hugh Morrison Friday, bringing in 65 trout.

Bill Crist took Mr. Stinnell and party out Thursday, bringing back 61 fish, and Hollifield and party from Fort Worth, caught 61 very nice trout Friday. On Saturday, Mr. Grifaffi and party of three, landed 53 trout. On Sunday, Mr. Plummer and party of five from Kenedy, brought in 65 nice trout. Monday and Tuesday H. M. Goodpaster and son fished with Crist, getting 47 trout Monday and 32 on Tuesday.

The U. S. Navy will begin their landing operations at the Aransas County airport, Thursday, Sept. 18. It is believed that permanent improvements will be constructed at the airport in the near future.

Sun Will Drill Wildcat 2 Miles South of Rockport

Aransas County had a pair of new wildcats coming up Monday in Aransas Bay — a 10,000-footer by Sun Oil Co. and a 9,000-foot try by Hunt Oil Co.

The Sun test will be at the No. 1 Aransas State 195, 660 feet out of the northeast corner of the 320.07-acre tract two miles south of Rockport.

Location scales about 5,400 feet west southwest of the Humble Oil and Refining Co. No. 1 State Tract 190, gas-distillate discovery completed early this year on perforations at 9,454-95 feet. It is about five miles northwest of the new Blind Pass Field, about 2,000 feet east of the shoreline and some 2,500 feet northerly from the Nueces County line.

The new Hunt wildcat, permitted to 9,000 feet, will be at the No. 1 State Tract 91, about 6,400 feet north and a little east of production in the new East Fulton Beach Field.

Location is 330 feet from the northwest line (shore) and 1,550 feet from the south line of the 135-acre tract. This scales about 5,050 feet northwest of Hunt's No. 1-93, 9,575-foot dry hole, and is some 6,400 feet north northeast of the Atlantic No. 1-121, third East Fulton Beach Field oilwell.

Hunt Oil Co. No. 1 State Tract 81, Aransas County wildcat four miles northwest of Fulton, was making hole at 6,605 feet on a proposed 10,000-foot project.

The Atlantic Refining Co. No. 1 Aransas Bay State Tract 123, in East Fulton Beach Field, was drilling at 7,365 feet on a 8,500-foot project.

Sun Oil Co. No. 5 Copano Bay State Tract 41, in Fulton Beach Field, was drilling at 3,221 feet on a 7,500-foot project.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 33 Copano Bay State Tract 31, in West Fulton Beach Field, was drilling at 3,492 feet on an 8,000-foot project.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 47 Copano Bay State Tract 32, in Fulton Beach Field, was bottomed at 9,199 feet and was closing off formation after losing circulation.

In the near future a highway postoffice will be established between Houston and the Valley and San Antonio and the Valley. This will provide faster and better mail service in the 14th District.

Allen Lawrence of Sinton acted as master of ceremonies.

Postmaster McElveen was loud in his praise of the Chamber of Commerce, the Woman's Club and others who assisted in making the meeting so successful. There was most favorable comment among the guests on the Chamber of Commerce building and the Woman's Club building.

The date for the next meeting has not been set.

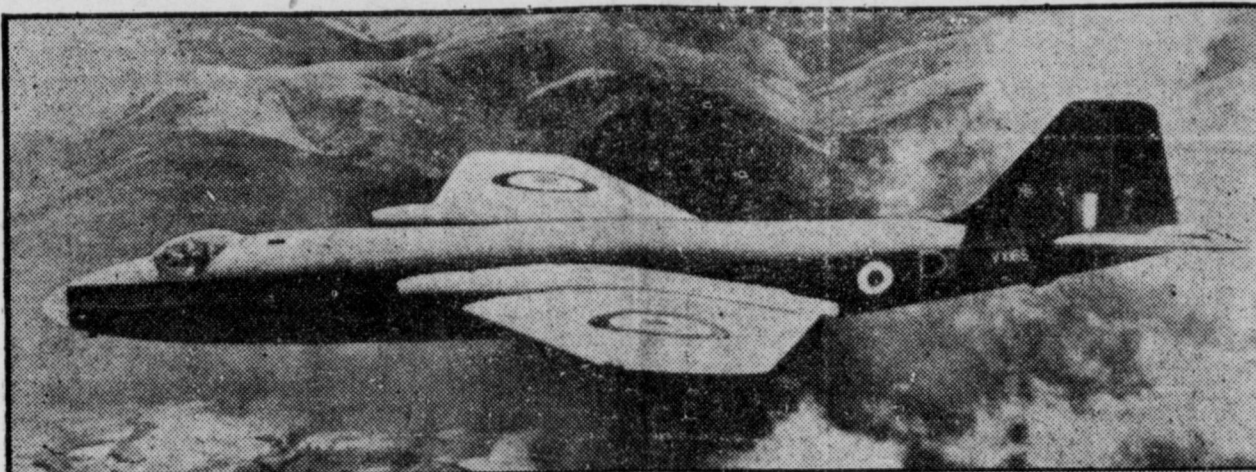
Rockport P-TA Will Meet Wednesday, 17th

Public Schools Lack 3 Teachers

So far the Board of Education of the Aransas County Independent School District have not been able to secure a band director, although they have heard of several and hope to be able to employ a suitable instructor in the near future. The Fulton Elementary School is still short one or two teachers also.

The trustees are having black dirt put on the campus at each of the schools. There has been approximately 1,200 yards of dirt placed on the campus at Fulton and a large amount on the campus at Rockport. Much of this dirt has been donated by Emory Spencer and the county has allowed the school to use their equipment for this work.

During the summer two shallow wells were dug on the Rockport campus to furnish water to use in beautifying the grounds.

There has been a marked increase in the attendance at all the schools this fall. In the Rockport Elementary School there are 70 pupils registered in the first grade; 2nd grade, 52; 3rd grade, 71; 4th grade, 74; 5th grade, 58; 6th grade, approximately 64; 7th grade, 59; and 8th grade, 65—a total of 513 pupils.

The teachers request the parents to send their children to school regularly as the average daily attendance is very important when the report is made to the State Board of Education for its financial benefits.

The Aransas County High School now has 52 freshmen, 42 sophomores, 28 juniors, and 39 seniors. The increased enrollment in the high school has made it necessary to add three new classes, an extra typing class, H.E. class and a Spanish class.

In the business session, presided over by Mrs. J. H. Mills, the resignation of Mrs. Fred Christilles as first vice-president was accepted and Mrs. Tom Nagle elected to fill that office.

Mrs. R. B. Melton and Mrs. Roy Hayes were elected to membership in the club. Mrs. H. F. Elliot reported that the dinner served by the club to the district meeting of the National Postmasters Convention, was a success, both socially and financially.

The organization voted to provide suitable covering for the garden hose and other outside equipment and to erect a trellis around same.

Mrs. O. W. Haynes served coffee and doughnuts during the social hour.

The trial of Ernest Garcia, charged with murder with malice aforethought has been continued until Monday Nov. 10, due to the death of the defendant's father, John Garcia, who died early this (Thursday) morning.

Trial was originally set for Monday, Sept. 8 and was then continued until today.

Garcia is charged with the murder of Isidiro Martinez, 21, who died of gunshot wounds in the Rockport Hospital June 26.

Martinez was struck by shot from a .12 gauge shotgun about 7 o'clock the night of June 25. He was standing near the stove in the home of his brother, Joe Martinez, when he was shot.

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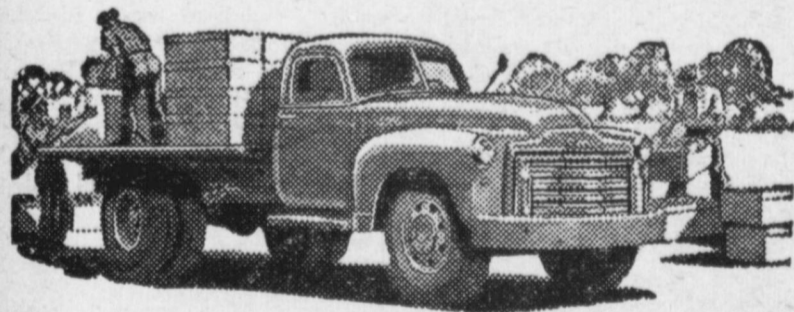

Governor Will Officially Open Prison Rodeo

Governor Allan Shivers will, for the fourth consecutive year, again officially open the Annual Prison Rodeo, Sunday, Oct. 5 and that date has been named Governor's Day by prison officials.

The announcement of the Governor's acceptance of the Prison Board's invitation to officiate at the rodeo's 21st year opening day ceremonies was made by the board's rodeo committee co-chairman, French M. Robertson of Abilene, and H. H. Coffield of Rockdale. In addition to the state's first citizen, members of the Legislature and other state officials have also been invited to attend the big convict show on that date as guests of the prison management.

To be featured as special guest attraction for the day, the 130 piece University of Texas Longhorn Band will come to Huntsville to play and perform drill and marching routines between inmate riding events. Featured with the Longhorn Band will be the Texas Stars, a separate organization of twirlers and majorettes who appear with the band at football games wherever the band plays. On Saturday, before the appearance at Huntsville the band plays at Memorial Stadium in Austin for the Texas-Notre Dame game.

One-half of Children From 3 to 9 Have Never Been to a Dentist

Austin, Tex. - One-half of all children between three and nine have never been to a dentist, according to surveys, and the State Department of Health tags that as one reason why there are some 284 million cavities in the teeth of American kids between those ages.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, recommends these four rules as a method of getting children into sound dental health habits:

1. A well-balanced diet with consumption of sweets kept to a minimum. Sugar in excessive quantities produces the destructive mouth acids that cause dental decay.

2. Proper tooth brushing, beginning at an early age. This means brushing the teeth within ten minutes after eating.

3. Early detection and care of dental defects. This will prevent larger troubles later. Neglect may produce serious dental problems which will continue throughout life.

4. Either access to drinking water from a community water system containing the proper amount of fluorides for tooth decay prevention, or application of sodium fluoride to the teeth at periodic intervals. Children who drink fluoridated water from birth have from one-half to two-thirds less tooth decay than those who drink fluoride-free water.

Americans as a whole are highly susceptible to tooth decay by virtue of their diet, the state health officer points out. As a matter of fact, dental authorities say, this country has often been called "a nation of dental cripples."

They urge all parents to realize that so-called "baby teeth" are vital to good dental health in adulthood.

Social Security Credit For Military Service

Men and women who have served in the armed forces of the United States since World War II now get social security wage credits for time spent in the service.

According to H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Social Security office in Corpus Christi, Congress recently enacted this provision of the law.

"The law now provides a wage credit of \$160 for each month spent in the military service any time

from September, 1940, through December, 1953," Cleveland said. "This means that members of the armed forces earn social security protection just as though they were at home working for \$160 a month on a social security job.

"No action is required now to get the credit, but it will be established at the time a claim for retirement or survivors insurance is filed.

"The young children of deceased former servicemen may benefit immediately if their mothers apply

for the social security insurance," he added.

Applications in this area should be filed with the Social Security Administration, 424 Taylor Street, Corpus Christi, Texas.

Jimmy Goes to School For First Time

Six-year-old Jimmy is bursting with pride. It's his first time to go to school, and for weeks he and his parents have been getting ready for the big day. Packed in his satchel are a box of crayons, a ruler, and plenty of pencils with the biggest erasers he could find for the many mistakes he thinks he'll make. His brand new shoes have a shine—and their squeak is almost unnoticeable. All in all, he's one of the happiest boys in town.

Jimmy is lucky if his health equipment is in as good shape as his school equipment. Soon after Jimmy was born, the family doctor or a pediatrician (a specialist in the care of children) examined him, prescribed his diet, gave him the necessary shots, and saw him safely through the first year of life. Ideally, Jimmy should have been taken back to the doctor every six months or year until school time. However, because his parents do not allow enough in their budget for these important periodic check-ups, he may have been seen by the doctor only on rare occasions, such as when he had scarlet fever or when he stuck a nail in his foot. More than likely what he remembers is being in pain, feeling bad, and having to take nasty medicine, and unfortunately he may associate all those bad memories with the doctor.

It's no small wonder, then, that he balks like a mule when it's time for a pre-school checkup. Some schools have round-ups for health examinations early enough in the

summer to be of the most benefit. However, it may be easier for Jimmy's mother and father to give in and not take him until the last minute, when forced to do so by rules which require examination and vaccination before he can enter school. Perhaps they will follow the recommendation of the school officials or the doctor and see that he is protected against diphtheria, tetanus (lockjaw), and whooping cough, as well.

A school health examination has a two fold purpose: to advise school authorities of physical or mental handicap which should be considered in the teaching program and to enable the parents to take care of any defect like bad eyesight, which can be remedied before it becomes a handicap.

What if Jimmy comes up short? He may need glasses or may be run-down and anemic. He may need to be sent to a dentist for work on his teeth such as filling cavities or straightening teeth. It's pretty late to do anything about these things without cutting into the school schedule. In addition, if he needs more than "boosters" or re-vaccination, the larger doses of vaccine may make him ill. Wise parents have taken their children for examinations and injections earlier in the summer, but Jimmy's are learning the hard way. They promise that next year will be different.

If Jimmy hasn't been seeing the doctor and dentist all along, there are several ways his parents can help prepare him for his first visit. First, they should not tell him the doctor won't hurt. Needed im-

munizations are painful at least to a slight degree and part of the check-up, such as the throat examination, may not be very pleasant. If Jimmy wants to brag afterward that "it didn't hurt a bit," that's okay, but to make false promises and then to violate his trust is to stir up bad feelings. Like a little elephant, he'll never forget.

Jimmy usually will cooperate better if his parents take him into their confidence. They should let him know that some things which are to be done may hurt for a while but are necessary before he can go to school with the other kids, who are getting the same treatment. Then if he asks questions, he should receive simple, frank answers.

If Jimmy realizes that before long he will be on his own in school, away from his mother's apron strings, and is filled with the idea of independence, he might want to have a man-to-man talk with the doctor. Mother can give the doctor information about Jimmy's history, something needed badly, but there is little she can do during the actual examination and treatment. Therefore, unless Jimmy insists upon her being present, she could be most helpful in building up Jimmy's ego by staying out of the examining room.

In a way, a health examination for Jimmy just before he goes to school is a blessing. He isn't ill, so the doctor has a chance to impress him favorably. The good relationship which can be established at this time will last him all his life. It will awaken in him a conscious-

ness of the need to stay in good health by going to the doctor and dentist regularly, and he will know that when he is sick, he can count on the doctor as his friend.

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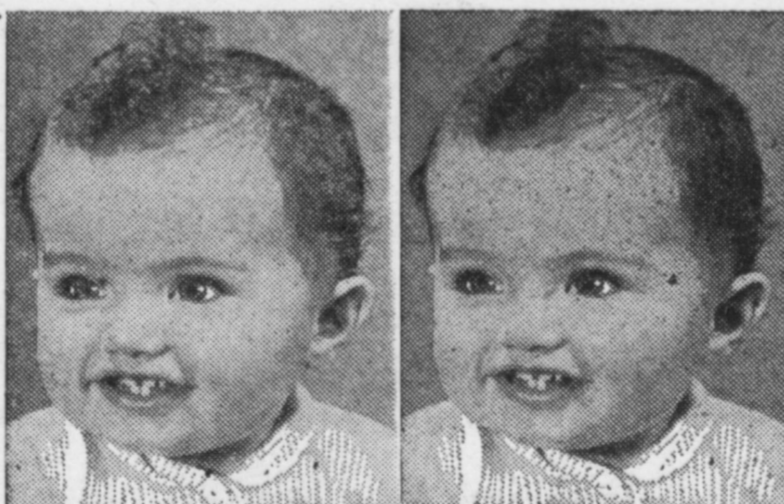
