Last Friday night before the largest crowd of the season the Rockport Pirates dropped their first game of the season to the Three Rivers Bulldogs by a score of 6 to 0. Early in the first quarter of play the Pirates, while on the offense, fumbled the ball twice. The second fumble cost them the only six points of the game and the district loss. One of the Rockport backs fumbled the ball on the Three Rivers 40 yard line and the Bulldogs from that point, by means of power plays over the middle of the Pirate line and end sweeps, worked the ball to the Pirate 6 yard stripe. Then J. Bellows bucked over for the 6 points and the Bulldog score. Gurwitz's try for the extra point went wide and the score at the end of the ball game was 6 to 0.

Most of the game was a vicious defensive battle with neither team demonstrating too much offensive punch. The outstanding defensive men for the Pirates were Leon Barber, Keith Nelson and Kane Lassiter. A statistical breakdown reveals that: Rockport attempted 14 passes, completing six of them. Rockport fumbled three times and did not recover any of them. They made eight first downs, and were penalized four times for a total of 20 yards.

The Bulldogs made 11 first downs; attempted 13 passes completing five of them. They were penalized three times for a total of 25 yards.

GIRL SCOUT WEEK
TO BE OBSERVED HERE

The largest membership in Girl Scout history, nearly 1,900,000, will take part in the observance of Girl Scout Week, Oct. 26 through Nov. 1.

Girl Scout Week is celebrated every year during the week of Oct. 31, in observance of the birthday of Juliette Low, who was the founder of the Girl Scouts in the United States of America. Juliette Gardon Low, an American woman from Savannah, Ga., organized the first Girl Scout Guide Company in 1912. In 1913 the name was changed to Girl Scouts.

Through the first few years the story of the Girl Scouts is the story of the tireless energy and enthusiasm of this one woman.

The week observing Juliette Low's birthday is divided into seven service days, and on these days the Girl Scouts make a special effort to show the community what they are doing.

It begins with Girl Scout Sunday, followed by Home Making Monday, Citizenship Day on Tuesday, Health and Safety Day on Wednesday, International Friendship Day on Thursday, Arts and Crafts Day on Friday and Out of Doors Day on Saturday.

In Rockport there are three Intermediate Girl Scout Troops and two Brownie Troops, which will be taking an active part in celebrating Girl Scout Week.

WHOOPING CRANES
COME BACK TO
ARANSAS REFUGE

Along with the "nother" which blew in this week, that rare and stately bird, the Whooping Crane, made its annual appearance on the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge near here according to Julian A. Howard, refuge manager.

The first seen, a single, was located on Oct. 14 and two days later a pair was observed in the same general area on the refuge. This is approximately 15 days earlier than their initial appearance last year.

Since "whoopers" live and travel as individuals, pairs, or families rather than in a flock, the refuge population will show a gradual buildup as others find the weather in northern climes less desirable.

So far, none of the three birds which have put in their appearance have been young-of-the-year. However, it is normal for the family groups to delay their southward migration until later in the season, Howard said. Presumably this is to give their offspring longer time to develop the necessary strength to make the two thousand plus miles from nesting grounds in Canada to the Texas coast.

Standing more than four and one-half feet high and with a wingspread of as much as six feet, these majestic birds have been on the brink of extinction for several years. Their only known wintering grounds are the Aransas Refuge and vicinity where a maximum of 23 birds was counted last year. Although Whooping Cranes are fully protected by federal laws, their great size, white bodies and black wing tips have made them targets for some hunters who have shot first and thought later.

While on their winter range at the Aransas Refuge, human disturbance is reduced to a minimum and that portion of the refuge used by the whoopers is closed to public travel.

R. D. Torres Named

Appointment of R. D. Torres as Aransas County chairman for the five-dollar membership drive of the Texas Fund for Stevenson and Sparkman was announced today.

Mr. Torres was named to head the local fund-raising campaign by Creekmore Fath of Austin, state vice-chairman for the Texas Fund.

"Money raised for the Texas Fund for Stevenson and Sparkman will be used in Texas to help pay the costs of the Democratic campaign in this state," Torres explained. "Each contributing member, in effect, will be making a payment in affirmation of his faith in the Democratic party and the need for electing Adlai Stevenson and John Sparkman."

"The Democratic party is the party of all the people, and we believe that a great many people in Aransas County want to do their share in supporting the party," he declared.

"Headquarters for the five-dollar campaign will be at my home," the county chairman said. "Membership certificate books are being distributed to volunteer workers, or they may be obtained at the headquarters."

BRUSH FIRE SUNDAY
THREAT TO HOMES

A brush fire was ignited in the northern portion of Rockport near Live Oak Street Sunday afternoon and a number of homes were endangered.

Fire Chief Charles Ankele reported the fire originated at the dump ground, and spread rapidly through the grass and trees. The fire truck from Fulton and the two trucks from Rockport could not control the fire. Aransas Pass sent one fire truck and an emergency truck over to help fight the conflagration. Two Navy fire trucks from the airport also helped fight the fire.

Several Boy Scouts, some of the citizens and the firemen fought valiantly to control the fire.

The property loss was one pig and a few chickens. Several homes were threatened.

Another fire broke out in the brush at the rear of the Red Shuttlers at Fulton Sunday night, but the fire department soon had it under control.

McDavid Heads
Local March of
Dimes Drive

John M. (Jack) McDavid has been appointed campaign director for the 1953 March of Dimes in Aransas County, it was announced today by Jack Horton, chairman of the Aransas County chapter, National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

"With the scientific and medical research sponsored by the national foundation through March of Dimes receipts, showing encouraging progress toward the eventual elimination of paralytic polio, as well as the highest recorded polio incidence in history having occurred this year, we must insure a March of Dimes campaign which will guarantee ample funds for local patient treatment payments as well as insuring support for this so important research program," Mr. Horton stated.

"Hospital bills covering 1952 patients will extend deep into 1953," Mr. Horton continued. "To insure payment of these bills to institutions such as Robert B. Green and Santa Rosa in San Antonio, Memorial in Corpus Christi, V. J. Baylor Baptist in Harlingen and Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation—which received more than \$280,000 in patient treatment payments last year, calls for the complete cooperation of everyone both in contributing to and assisting with the drive within our county."

Persons interested in assisting on any of the March of Dimes committees are asked to contact McDavid.

Dr. William McD. Hammon of the University of Pittsburgh has stated that gamma globulin, derived from commingled blood collected from many donors may protect against paralytic polio. The immunity it gives is only temporary and certainly not 100 per cent effective. He went on to say that science is much closer to the goal of developing a vaccine that will be effective, but it will take much time.

All the fixtures are of natural birch with an aqua marine back and grey shelving.

Mr. Ankele will handle a full line of hardware, sporting goods, gift ware, traffic appliances, Kuhns and Sherman & Williams paints, Philco and Admiral radios, televisions and refrigerators; Bendix and Apex washing machines; guns and ammunition, and many other lines of merchandise.

He has rented his other store buildings and offices to the Central Power & Light Co., Mitchell's Jewelry Store, Star Liquor Store, United Supply Company, and the Arrow Taxi Service.

Mr. Ankele was born and reared at Angleton and was employed by the Sherman & Williams Paint Company before moving to Rockport.

He married Miss Annie Laurie Heiligman in 1939 and they moved to Rockport in January 1945, buying a building and putting in a hardware store on Austin Street. The business has grown until he was forced to enlarge the building in 1949.

Mr. and Mrs. Ankele have two children, a son, Jimmy, 11, and a daughter, Terry Lee, who is 8. They both attend the public school. Jimmy belongs to the Boy Scouts and Terry is a Brownie and both children are active in juvenile social circles.

The Ankeles own their home on South Austin Street. He is fire chief of the Rockport Volunteer Fire Department and a member of the Lions Club.

School Budget
Set for 1952-53

The trustees of the Aransas County Independent School District have set up the budget for operating the school district for the 1952-53 term and at a public meeting Tuesday night presented this budget so that taxpayers and patrons of the school system might be informed as to how the fund is used.

The school budget appears in this issue of The Pilot, showing the approximate receipts of the district and the sources from which they are derived, and the various expenditures for which it will be used: Such as teachers salaries, janitors service, bus drivers and bus maintenance, teaching supplies, bond service, school maintenance, text books, hand supplies, science, physical education, shop equipment, furniture, tuition and transportation (Negro), insurance, etc.

This budget was publicly read and is printed that the patrons of the school may understand both the financial strength and needs of the school system.

Running Surface Casing

Sun Oil Co. No. 7 Copano Bay State Tract 41, Aransas County test in the Fulton Beach Field, was bottomed at 1,080, running 9 3/4-inch casing. Permit depth is 7,500 feet.

Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 51 Copano Bay State Tract 32, in the West Fulton Beach Field, was drilling at 7,249 feet on a 7,500-foot project.

Sun Oil Co. No. 2 Copano Bay State Tract 104, in the Salt Lake Field, was coring ahead at 7,155 feet on an 8,600-foot project.

Humble Oil and Refining Co. No. 1 Aransas Bay State Tract 198, in the Rockport field, was pulling out of hole for repairs after drilling to 9,011 feet on a 10,000-foot project.

Hunt Oil Co. No. 2 State Tract 84, in the Lamar Field, was drilling at 8,420 feet on a 9,000-foot permit.

Hunt Oil Co. No. 1 Aransas Bay State Tract 91, wildcat five miles north of Rockport, was drilling below 8,263 feet on a 9,000-foot project.

Hunt Oil Co. No. 1 Aransas Bay State Tract 91, wildcat five miles north of Rockport, was waiting on cement after running 5 1/2-inch casing to 8,620 feet. Earlier sidewall cores recovered gas shows in the "B" Sand at around 7,100 feet, and oil shows in the E-4 sand around 7,600-7,700 feet, and a slight oil show at around 7,830.

Sun Oil Co. No. A-1 St. Charles Bay State Tract 368, wildcat 14 1/2 miles northeast of Rockport was preparing to run electrical log to 7,488 feet. The test is projected to 11,500 feet.

Ralph B. Lee, trustee has staked two 9,000-foot Lamar Field tests in Fulton township to be drilled in exception to Rule 37.

His No. 1 Mrs. Ida Mae Lowman and others will be 190 feet from the north (Main Street) and will be centered on the line between Outlots four and five. It will also be 200 feet from the west line of Lot 5, and 190 feet north of Aransas Bay shoreline.

His No. 1 R. S. Johnson and others, will be 150 feet from the northwest and 380 from the northeast lines of Fulton Outlot 12. It will also be 330 feet northwest of Aransas Bay shoreline.

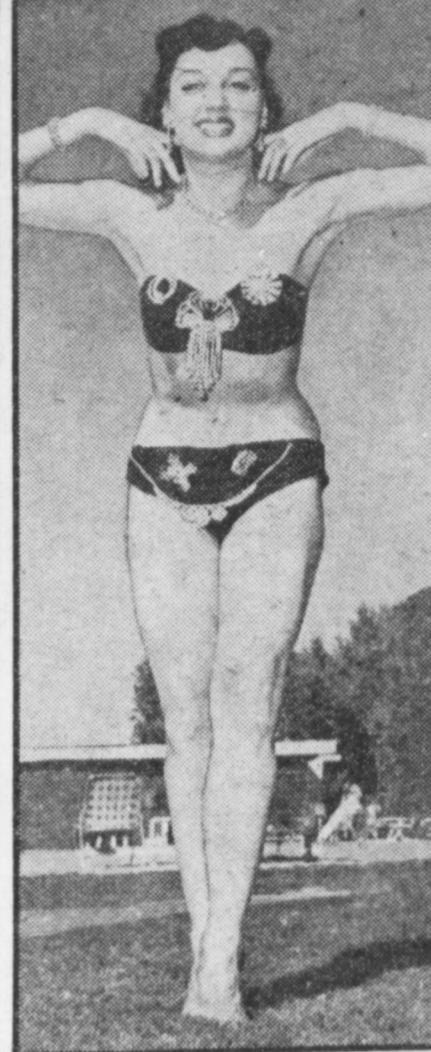

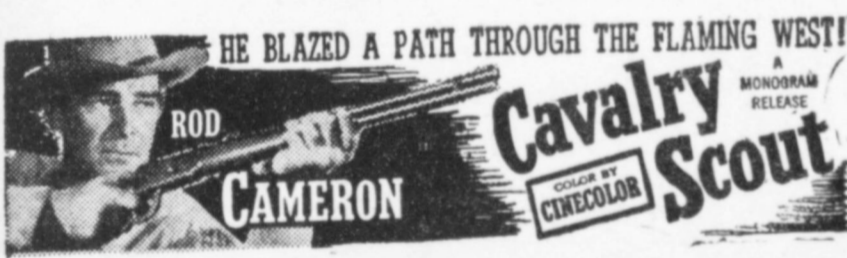

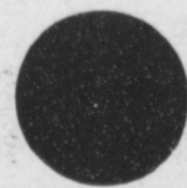

Health Talks

The skin is a pretty wonderful thing. It is the only organ of the body exposed at all times to outside substances, whether they be fluids, solids, or the gases of the atmosphere (the weather.)

Yet with this constant contact, which may not always be good the skin is surprisingly strong. With an ounce of prevention many diseases of the skin can be avoided, and often treatment consists of little more than putting it at rest in some manner—a sound principle of treating any inflamed part of the body.

"The good old summertime" isn't so good as far as the skin is concerned. It is the time when skin afflictions are seen most often. Heat alone as from too much sunning may lead to trouble, or the mixing of heat and moisture as from too much perspiration may be harmful. More play outdoors in less clothing may mean more insect bites, and camping in unclean places ups a person's chances of being bitten by bed bugs, mites and lice.

But since summer is for relaxing, it's no use looking for boogie bears. "Business as usual," or rather business with a big share of pleasure, should be the order of the day. Just by following a few simple rules, a person can keep his skin in good condition so it won't fall prey to infection.

First, bathing carefully and often is a must. However, too much bathing in weather when humidity is high can leave the protective horny top layer of the skin soft and wet, which makes it easier for infection to take hold. In drying after a bath or shower, it is wise to blot rather than rub, and friction should be kept to a minimum. If chafed areas are noticed, they should be kept dry between baths with an absorbent deodorant powder.

The type of clothing is important. The main object in hot weather is to keep cool, so most of the time it calls for the least possible amount of loosely woven clothes which allow free movement of the air. But if long exposure to the sunlight or to an undergrowth of

weeds or bushes is expected, it is better to wear protective clothing, such as coveralls or boots. Such a simple step as taking a shirt or pair of trousers to put over a bathing suit when starting a boat trip may save hours of pain and sickness from sunburn.

In sun tanning, oils or lotions may help. They cannot overcome the effects of too much of the sun's rays, however, and the sun bather would do well to take it easy his first few times out. He should never allow himself to fall asleep while sunning because he may stay out too long.

If a man working long hours in moist heat can sleep in a cool room, preferably one that is air conditioned, he may prevent such conditions as prickly heat. He should not wear heavy clothes at work. Bathing or using soap too often is bad; it is better to take sponge baths and pat on an unscented talcum powder.

Another condition caused by too much moisture and heat, athlete's foot, can be avoided or cured in its early stages by attention to the feet in bathing, care being taken to dry between the toes (without too much rubbing), and by use of an absorbent foot powder. Also, absorbent socks and sandals or shoes with lots of openings allow enough air to move over the feet to keep the skin healthy. Nylon hose or cowboy boots may be fine at other times of the year but the should be set aside for the summer.

It is surprising how much "prevention" is stressed by doctors who specialize in diseases of the skin. However, they are careful to point out that it is important to find and treat at once diseases which spread quickly such as impetigo. In this condition, seen in adults as well as children, the watery fluid in large blisters becomes pus-like, a scab formed, the blister breaks and run, and new sores appear.

Not only impetigo but any skin disease which fails to improve with simple treatment should be seen by a doctor.

Social Security Card Is Key To Insurance Payments

"Your social security card is the key to all future payments of retirement and survivor's insurance for you and your family," says H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Social Security Administration in Corpus Christi.

"The importance of the account number lies in the fact that earnings are recorded in an account which bears the same number. The total amount shown in an account is used to figure the benefit payments at retirement or death," Cleveland explained.

"All earnings will be properly credited, and the full amount of benefits will be assured," he said, "if each worker will be certain that his employer has a record of his correct name and number."

By his own work, a worker earns and pays for his social security insurance during his working years—insurance against the loss of earnings which are reduced or cut off in older years or death.

Old-age and survivors insurance is payable to retired workers after they are 65, to 75-year-old workers whether they are retired or not, and to the families of workers who die at any age, according to Cleveland.

The applications for retirement and family insurance payments for this area should be filed with the Social Security Administration, 424 Taylor Street, Corpus Christi.

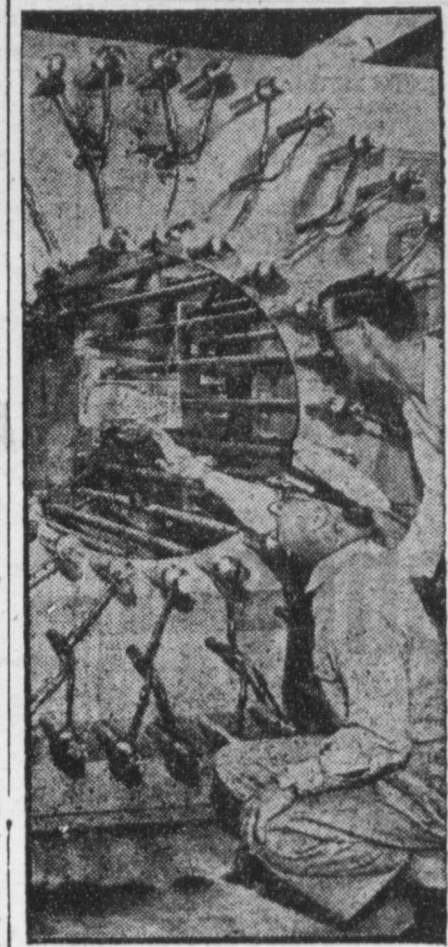

The Fulton Lions Club held their regular meeting Monday night, followed by a directors meeting.

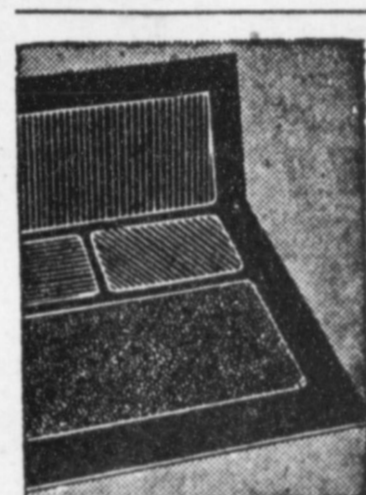
